Commissioners struggle but approve budget

What might have been a tame adoption of the yearly budget, turned into a heated debate about county spending and workplace culture during a board of commissioners meeting Wednesday.

The fallout began after county

Roadmaster Richard Christensen laid out his concerns about borrowing \$2.2 million from the road fund to balance the county's budget deficit. Christensen said the road fund reserve money will dry up soon if the county continues to take from it each year without identifying new revenue sources.

"Commissioners, today it's your

choice; to decide if you will be the ones to start the end of the road fund or preserve it for what it was legally intended to be used for," said Christensen.

State law does allow counties to borrow from road funds to fund budget shortfalls in the general fund and portions of the sheriff's departments. Currently, Curry County has

about \$28 million stashed in the historically wealthy road fund.

Nevertheless, Commissioners John Herzog and Court Boice echoed Christensen's concern over balancing the county's budget deficit by drawing from the road fund.

Boice recommended the board take another look at the budget, potentially to make more cuts and reconvene later in the month to officially approve it.

Brookings debates homeless at St. Timothy's

Every Friday morning, Rob Barker opens up the community kitchen at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church and starts to make sourdough crusts for their homemade pizzas.

Last Friday, the special was a bacon and blue cheese pizza, served with a pasta salad dense with vegetables. Barker said his only goal is to fill hungry stomachs, including homeless individuals, people on fixed incomes, the working poor and anyone else who stops by. He said he often loses sleep over feeding people.

"The idea is to get 'em some food man, that's the baseline thing," said Barker.

However, a recent neighborhood petition to "remove homeless from St. Timothy church," may put the community kitchen, and other services offered at St. Tim's, in jeopardy.

The petition garnered 29 signatures from concerned neighbors of St. Tim's, and led to a workshop meeting with the Brookings City Council last week. During the meeting, St. Tim's supporters debated with concerned residents about the church's role in the community.

Neighbor Brandon Usry created the petition. At the meeting, he showed a clip of a presumed guest of St. Tim's having a jarring mental breakdown. The man was shouting in the street around 10:30 p.m. on a weeknight, waking up many households on the street, Usry said.

Usry said some threatening individuals who receive services from the church are alarming him and others in the area.

"I feel like people are trying to find a solution to homelessness, that's not why I'm here today," said Usry. "I'm here today because I don't feel safe in my house."

In conjunction with the petition, a Brookings city staff report claimed St. Tim's has been operating as a "mission," rather than a church, by offering their guests showers, clothing and hygiene kits three days a week, as well as haircuts during their free meal services.

Abblitt returns home for first time since accident

Zac is back.

It's been more than 200 days since Zachary Abblitt dove into shallow water at Sporthaven Beach and shattered two vertebrates in his neck, partially paralyzing him.

Since then, Zac and his mother Kristi have traveled to several hospitals in different states — most recently at Craig Hospital in Englewood, Colorado — undergoing surgeries and doing extensive rehabilitation work. On Monday, though, Zac finally returned to his home in Brookings.

Before sitting down with the Pilot for an interview, Zac revisited the beach where his life changed forever.

"It was so amazing...I was able to kind of cruise across the sand. First time in seven months that I was there...Out of everything to see, that was the one spot I wanted to go

God's grace enables progress and joy, say Christian Scientists at annual meeting

In a year often defined by uncertainty, Christian Scientists gathered at their online annual meeting, including from Brookings and 24 congregations throughout Oregon, to acknowledge the ways in which God's love and mercy have opened paths of progress and joy in individual lives and collec-tive church experience.

The meeting was livestreamed to members around the globe June 7 from The First Church of Christ, Scientist, the church's headquarters in Boston, Massachusetts.

The theme of the meeting, "Grace to go forward," is from a well-loved hymn, and was sung to one of H. Walford Davies' "Hymns of the Kingdom."

Acknowledging the challenges of the past year, Keith Wommack, a member of the Christian Sci-ence Board of Directors said, "Trials cause us to be transformed. As the New Testament teaches, it is Christ that does the transforming, and we gain each step forward through Christly self-surrender."

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In video reports from Europe, Asia, Africa, North and South America, members shared that for them the heart of church is about learning to respond more fully to God's love — a living faith that reaches beyond the walls of any brick and mortar building.

A congregation in Washington D.C. shared how they found new ways to carry out their activities and care for one another in the midst of lockdown restrictions. "I've appreciated that we've moved forward without outlining where the destination is," said an interviewed member. "We know we're moving forward with God and we can rest secure that He will take us where we need to go.... That sense of grace really filled each step with purpose.'

A teen Sunday School class in Switzerland spoke about the value they found in continuing class online as they navigated changes to work and school life, and considered the role of faith as a practical help. A member from São Paulo, Brazil shared how his

prayers for his church and the world brought him full healing in the face of severe COVID-19 symptoms. Christian Scientists typically endeavor to turn to God in prayer for healing, though the decision is always made by the individu-al, not the church.

Meeting participants also previewed a new exhibit titled "How do you see the world?" that is set to open at the church's headquarters in Boston in late summer. The exhibit will explore progress in the world and connect visitors with the vision and ideals of the church's founder, Mary Baker Ed-dy. Project Director Sarah Ingraham from Luci Creative said, "We were so moved by how [Mary Baker Eddy] cares for people. You see that in her letters - how she deeply cares for humanity. You see that she is looking at a deeper sense of love, a deeper understanding of love... [the exhibit invites] visitors to take that journey

The new president of the church, Mimi Oka from New York City, New York, was introduced, and new members were welcomed from 24 countries, including Canada, Columbia, Italy, Japan, Democratic Republic of the Congo, and the United States.

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In-home care workers demand recognition

While the pandemic forced many industries to a screeching halt, in-home care providers like Joy Vegar and Renee Booker never stopped.

"When they were telling everybody to stay home, we didn't have that option," said Vegar. "I had shopping to do for three different clients, so I was in stores several days a week."

Vegar said in-home care workers put their lives on the line to continue serving their disabled and elderly clients

 administering medication, providing meals, facilitating transportation, even providing homemade face masks when there was a shortage of personal protective equip-

Now, Vegar, Booker and their union — Service Employees International Union Local 503 — are fighting to bring more attention, and benefits, to in-home care workers who often go unno-

"We want to lift them up and acknowledge them," said

Vegar and Booker hosted two visibility events on Saturday in Gold Beach and Coos Bay to highlight SEIU's current negotiations with the state to raise wages, protect hours and change state rules to make it easier for personal care workers to serve their customers.

They said in-home care workers are especially important in rural areas, including much of the South Coast, where there is less access to hospitals, doctors and nursing homes, as they are able to fill potential gaps

Although in-home care isn't always a direct replacement for nursing homes, Vegar and Booker said there are obvious benefits for some individuals who may not need around the clock care, especially for disabled and elderly couples.

"Several times in my career I have had husband and wife clients, and they got to stay in their homes together because if they go into a nursing home, a lot of times they are split up," said Vegar.

Despite the inherent risks associated with being in someone else's home during the pandemic, Booker said the state has mostly ignored SEIU's calls for hazard pay.

"They're dragging their feet," said Booker.

However, there is movement in negotiations on other fronts, Booker said. Additionally, SEIU will host a town hall with Senator Ron Wyden on June 28 to further negotiations.

Brookings man arrested for stabbing neighbor

A Brookings man is behind bars and his neighbor is in intensive care after a stabbing Sunday.

According to a press release from Curry County Sheriff John Ward, Justin Graziano allegedly stabbed his neighbor, Christopher Phillips, 42. Graziano was arrested Sunday and is being held on charges of assault in the first degree, assault in the second degree, menacing and unlawful use of a weapon.

Ward said the sheriff's department received a 9-1-1 call at 7:15 p.m. Sunday reporting a stabbing. The woman who called said her boyfriend, Phillips, had been stabbed in the neck by a neighbor.

Deputies responded within minutes along with Cal Ore Light Flight ambulance. Phillips was rushed to the Brookings emergency room. With the little information released by the caller, deputies determined Graziano was the suspect in the stabbing. Deputies learned prior to becoming unresponsive, Phillips told his girlfriend Graziano stabbed him with a large knife. Deputies found a lot of blood inside Phillips' home, but determined the actual stabbing occurred elsewhere.

Brookings police responded to the emergency room to watch over Phillips while deputies continued the investigation at the scene. While in the emergency room, Phillips slipped into critical condition. Doctors and staff were able to stabilize Phillips, and they made plans to fly him to a hospital in Medford.

A request was made to the Oregon State Police for a crime scene analyst, and a state trooper responded and assisted by mapping out the crime scene. A sheriff's detective arrived and took over the investigation and the Curry County District Attorney was notified and responded to

At 8 p.m., deputies located Justin Graziano at his

residence and detained him. Sheriff's detectives gathered evidence at the residence of Phillips and applied for a search warrant for Graziano's residence. During this time, deputies learned that while Cal Ore Life Flight Ambulance was transporting Phillips to the Crescent City Airport to fly him to Medford, they had to detour to Sutter Coast Hospital due to the deteriorating medical condition of Phillips. While at Sutter Coast, Phillips underwent emergency surgery and as of Monday, he was in ICU and in stable condition.

A detective interviewed Graziano while waiting for approval of a search warrant of his residence. The search warrant was granted by a Curry County Circuit Court judge, the residence was searched, and the weapon allegedly used was located and seized.

Graziano was transported to the Curry County Jail where he is being held.

a month ago, and this could have and should have been dealt with in prior meetings, said Paasch. "If you were in disagreement with the budget committee, why weren't all these things brought up in front of the budget commit-

Paasch also disapproved of raises for two elected officials — the assessor and the clerk — which were approved during the budget process.

Additionally, he said the road fund will likely receive additional revenue this year, and could remain near its current value, despite the funds being taken out.

Brad Rueckert, director of operations, aligned with Paasch. "All six members of the

budget committee approved the budget to go before the commissioners today...that time has kind of come and gone for any kind of chang-

Rueckert also said the budget committee had already cut \$600,000, and he did not think any other significant

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cuts could be made without reducing county services. Additionally, he was concerned about the county being able to meet the June 30 deadline to approve the budget, should they postpone the process.

Before a vote could be made, Summer Matteson - economic development coordinator — said the fight over the budget has pitted county departments against each other, and claimed some employees are having health issues as a result of stress.

"These departments fear," said Matteson. "We can't get people to work here because every year, they're afraid they're going to lose their jobs."


Then an initial 2-1 vote blocked the adoption of the county budget, with the lone approval vote from Paasch, and "no" votes from Boice and Herzog.

However, when trying to schedule another public budget meeting, the board determined they would unlikely be able to meet the state required deadline to approve the budget, due to a law which requires governments to publish public meetings in local newspapers 15 days before a meeting.

Following this discovery, Christensen returned to the microphone and recommended the commissioners backtrack and pass the budget. However, he said the commissioners should continue to hunt for additional revenues to pay back the road fund.

With the deadline looming and an OK from Christensen, the board voted on the budget again — after rescinding their previous vote. The secondary vote resulted in a 2-1 vote to approve the budget after all, with "yes" votes from Herzog and Paasch, and a "no" vote from Boice.

"Today, I am embarrassed to be a Curry County commissioner," said Paasch during closing statements, and in an interview with the Pilot after the meeting, "If this continues, I'm going to resign."



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

What do we owe wildland firefighters?

"It's like having gasoline out there," said Brian Stein-hardt, forest fire zone manager for Prescott and Coconino national forests in Arizona, in a recent AP story about the increasingly fire-prone West.

Now something else is happening — and at the worst possible time.

Federal firefighters are leaving the workforce and taking their training and experience with them. The inability of federal agencies to offer competitive pay and benefits is creating hundreds of wildland fire-fighting vacancies.

Vacancies, of course, limit how much federal fire-fighters can do. If Western communities want to be protected, they need to ensure that their firefighters receive better pay and benefits.

In my 11 years of work as a wildland firefighter, I've managed aircraft, trained people and run fires myself, but I also did outreach and recruitment for the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management. I know how hard it is for hiring managers to make 2,000 hours of grueling work, crammed into six exhausting months, sound appealing when the pay is \$13.45/ hour. The pay doesn't come close to matching the true de-mands or everyday dangers of the job.

Federal wildland firefighters, by necessity, are transient workers. During the fire season — now nearly year-round — they must be available to travel anywhere in the United States at any time. And to ad-vance in their career, they have to move to other federal duty stations to gain more qualifications.

Finding affordable housing has always been a problem for career firefighters on a federal salary. To make matters worse, federal agencies revoked the "Transfer of Station" stipend for career employees, which helped offset the cost of moving. Just recently, a national forest supervisor also revoked a "boot sti-pend." It might sound minor, but it isn't: When you're in the firefighting business, boots tough enough to save your life can easily cost you \$500.

Some states aren't relying on the government to act quickly. "We aren't just waiting for the next crisis to hit," said California Gov. Gavin Newsom, in establishing an \$80.74 million Emergency Fund that delivers an additional 1,256 seasonal firefighters to boost CALFIRE's ranks. This Emergency Fund is in addition to the governor's \$1 billion budget request for Cali-fornia's Wildfire and Forest Resilience Action Plan.

In Washington, state legislators

unanimously passed a \$125 million package that will enable the state's Natural Resources Department to hire 100 more firefighters. The legislation furthers the state's efforts to restore forest health and creates a \$25 million fund to ensure community preparedness around the state.

Utah's House Bill 65, recently signed into law, appropriates money to help Utah's communities offset the cost of wildfire suppression. Most importantly, it commissions a study to evaluate the current pay plan for firefighters within Utah's Natural Resources Department.

The bill's sponsor, Rep. Casey Snider, was amazed to learn that frontline wildland firefighters make more money at McDonald's: "These positions are critical," he said. "They are the first ones on fires." This year, Utah has already had five times the number of wild-fires it normally experiences in a year.

And firefighters are organizing and speaking up. The Grassroots Wildland Firefighters is working to halt the exodus of firefighters from federal agencies by advo-cating for pay parity with state and local fire protec-tion agencies. The group also supports initiatives to assist the physical and mental health of firefighters and their families. The statistics they highlight are shocking: Wildland firefighters have a suicide rate 30 times higher than the average. They also experience high incidences of cardiovascular disease and lung cancer.

There is talk on the federal level of creating a permanent, year-round firefighting workforce. I think this is a necessary step, but it won't fix the workforce capacity issue unless increased pay and benefits are used to encourage the recruitment and retention of federal firefighters.

We all know that today's wildfires are longer, more damaging and more frequent than ever before. We also know that men and women are putting their lives on the line for less than they'd earn at a McDonald's.

Our firefighters do all this to protect our lives, our forests and our communities. We owe them at least a living wage and a chance for a healthy life. I hope more states and legislators will start paying attention. This is a debt that needs to be paid.

SB 582 would unjustly disadvantage Oregon's vital newspaper industry

Newspapers and magazines go to every corner of this state. Notwithstanding increased digital access, paper publications are delivered to tens of thousands of homes that lack broadband internet and homes where readers simply are more comfortable with the familiar format of paper or want to save magazines on travel, food, world events or hobbies.

Oregon's newspapers and magazines care deeply about environmental responsibility. Newsprint and magazine stock paper come from certified forests, are fully compostable and biodegrade in a manner of months. Newsprint is so safe that it can be used as vegetable garden mulch. Inks are linseed-oil-based and non-toxic, and adhesives are water-soluble.

A well-intentioned but misguided piece of legislation in the Oregon State Senate, SB-582, would create an extensive Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) system for municipal solid waste. The bill recognizes that magazines and

newspapers are different from other materials by allowing fees to be paid through advertising, but the fees simply should not apply to non-toxic, biodegradable materials – again, newspapers and magazines biodegrade within months.

News is vital to American civic life, and legislation causing financial hardship to newspapers and magazines will erode citizen access to factual and trusted news and information. Newspapers are the sole source of local news for many communities throughout the state. Coverage of town meetings, food pantry locations, classified ads and business news are the lifeblood of community newspapers. Yet this legislation discriminates against news and information published on paper, as opposed to information that is circulated in digital formats.

EPR systems in other jurisdictions have failed to increase recycling rates for paper, which are already much higher than other products. In British Columbia, recycling rates are trending downwards while producer fees have increased markedly. This is not tenable in

Oregon, when economic conditions related to the pandemic have caused significant reduction in advertising revenues for magazines and newspapers. To offset marked increases in cost, the legislation could force publications to eliminate home delivery to rural areas, exacerbating the digital divide, and cut journalism jobs

A recent study by Broadbandnow ranks Oregon 34th among states based on broadband deployment, speeds and access to low-priced plans. Those without broadband depend on paper.

We strongly urge the Oregon State Legislature to consider the impact of this legislation on magazines and newspapers. There are more appropriate ways to reclaim post-consumer waste without disadvantaging the state's vital news and information sources.

Dads make a difference

Father's Day is Sunday, June 20th

Children from fatherless homes account for 90% of all homeless and runaway kids. 71% of high school dropouts, and 63% of youth suicides. (See more at https://bit.ly/3woadKz)

Over 750K divorces and 1.919K out of wedlock births are major contributors to create fatherless households each year. And while joint physical custody started going into effect in the 1980s, it wasn't until 2017 when Nevada finally adopted a presumption of joint physical custody. Between 1960 and 2016, the percent of children with just mothers nearly tripled,

from 8 to 23%. Add to this the fact that 27% of fathers choose to have absolutely no contact with their children.

What makes fathers so crucial? For decades, leading child psychologist Michael E. Lamb reminded us that fathers are the forgotten contributor to child development. Research has found that children with involved fathers have strong cognitive and motor skills, elevated physical and mental health, become better problem solvers and are more competent, curious and empathetic. The data says that fathers are vital and yet laws and society under value their importance making it harder to be in their children's lives. (See https://bit.ly/3wldKt6)

So, what can you do? If you're a father, make the effort to do everything you can to be in your children's daily lives. If you're a mother, encourage and facilitate the relationship between your children and their father.

If you're the child, spend time with your dad. Seek his advice and guidance. If you're an employer, grant them the ability to be at their children's events and take sick days to care for their kids. If you work in the legal field, help improve the laws. The fate (and future) of nearly half of America's children depends on it.

back to. I love Colorado, but I really missed the ocean,"

said Zac. Although he was at Craig for more than six months, Zac initially thought his stay would be short. As their stay was extended through com-



"I don't know the purpose injury, why God is using it, but I know it's not a mistake. How my body is right now, is exactly how God intended it

to be," said Zac. While at Craig, Zac said he also developed lifelong bonds with his therapists and other patients. He said he plans to stay in touch with some of his patient-friends from the hospital through a group chat they dubbed the "Quad Squad." Zac said the word quad has a double-meaning because they are a friend group of four

quadriplegics. "It was an incredible time, made a lot of friends, lifelong friends for sure," said Zac. "A couple of guys have very similar injuries to mine, so it was very easy to relate."

Before leaving, Zac wrote four, one-page letters to his therapists, all without feeling in his fingers.

"Each letter took at least an hour...I spent so much time I actually got this wound on my elbow," said Zac as he pointed to a small open sore on his elbow.

In the letters, Zac expressed his faith in Jesus, which he credits for his

continued recovery.

"[I] just told them how much they blessed me, and really told them [about] #zacsHope and the meaning behind it. My hope is Jesus... I wanted to make certain that I left an impression that that's what they knew about me," said Zac.

#zacsHope is a social media hashtag the family made to support Zac's recovery. It's also the title of their crowdfunding page on givebutter. com.

As they return to their home, Kristi said they are navigating new challenges, such as living in a home with multiple levels. She said they were able to lift Zac to the second floor, where he

has access to his bedroom, a bathroom and their kitchen, but he had not yet gotten up to the living room, one floor higher, and would also need help to exit the house.

Despite layout challenges at his longtime home, Kristi said Zac has remained positive.

"He's joyful, he cracks jokes, and I think he's hopeful, too, and willing to be flexible to figure out how to make this home work for us for this time period," said

Kristi said they are in the process of finding a new home with more accessibility for Zac. She said the support from the community has been overwhelming, and she also

credits God for the continuation of Zac's recovery.

"God has sent us on a surprising journey, but he has not abandoned us, and it's a course we know He's set, and we're not afraid of it, but it takes a strength of heart to move through it," said Abblitt.

Going forward, Zac said he is excited to relearn how to play his bass guitar, but he is mostly eager to attend in-person church services again at Calvary Heritage, where his father is the pastor.

a conversation with a friend who's had a question about vaccines. All these efforts contribute to our success as a state."

Brown also reminded Oregon residents that getting the vaccine is free, and every Oregonian who gets at least one dose will be eligible to win \$1 million. On June 25, the state will announce winners of the vaccine awards, with one person winning \$1 million and one person from every county winning \$10,000.

Brown said one of her big worries right now is coming changes to the

eviction moratorium in the state. A new state law does not allow Brown to extend the moratorium, which ends June 30.

"This means renters must pay their July rent or the landlord can evict them for nonpayment," Brown said. "To the thousands of Oregonians who lost jobs or fell behind on their rent during the pandemic, please apply today for rental assistance to pay your July rent. Under current law, you cannot be evicted until next year for rent owed from April 2020 to June 2021. Rental assistance programs can help you with past rent."

Brown encouraged those struggling with rent to apply at oregonrentalassistance. org to get a share of the federal money sent to the state to help just those people.

Brown also called on landlords in the state to give renters time to pay, especially if they have applied for rental assistance.

"We have made it through the pandemic by watching out for one another," Brown said.

"We have seen Oregon's spirit time and again."

Sidelinger closed the meeting by again encouraging residents to get vaccinated.

He emphasized the vaccine is safe and effective. The key to defeating COVID is simple, the vaccines.

"We are finally gaining the upper hand against the virus," Sidelinger said.

The report also claimed the church has been operating a commercial kitchen without a permit and has allowed houseless individuals to use the church's address to "establish businesses, receive mail, and to facilitate eligibility for social services."

Among other recommendations, city staff suggested the council revisit or rescind a March 2020 temporary city order, which allows up to three car campers at religious institutions in Brookings. A

different rule, passed by the council in December 2020, prohibited car camping within city limits.

Although all 15 Brookings churches were offered the opportunity, only St. Tim's allows overnight car camping in their parking lot.

During the meeting, Father Bernie Lindley of St. Tim's addressed city staff claims and resident concerns.

Lindley called on other churches within the community to assist in providing services, such as allowing car campers and reopening their own community kitchens, in order to ease the burden on St. Tim's and the surrounding

"Wouldn't it be a lot more advantageous for the residents of the city of Brookings, if all the churches participated in the things that we do, so that it would be spread throughout the neighborhoods of Brookings, instead of concentrated on that one corner," said Lindley. "Don't we expect churches to feed the hungry, clothe the naked and welcome the stranger?"

Addressing concerns over the kitchen, Lindley said they have passed recent health inspections by the state health department.

As for the city's claim about physical addresses,

Deacon Linda Lee said the church does allow houseless individuals to list St. Tim's as a mailing address in order to help them enroll in state services and obtain official identification — which is necessary when applying to jobs.

Oregon has a disproportionately large amount of houseless people compared to the rest of the U.S., according to a March 2019 report by the Oregon Community Foundation. While the state's total population represents 1.3% of the national population, Oregon is home to 2.6% of all houseless people in the country. The report blames high rents for the state's crisis.

Beth Barker-Hidalgo, director of the Curry Homeless Coalition, warned the issue

will only get worse when a nationwide eviction moratorium is lifted at the end of June. Hidalgo said the state could see an 11-16% increase in houslessness.

Barker-Hidalgo said many houseless individuals come to the Oregon Coast in the winter because of the temperate weather. She also stressed council members to form a stop-gap plan for services to houseless individuals, should they decide to reduce or ban St. Tim's services.

"There are unintended consequences in serving the population, there are also unintended consequences that you will experience in stopping services," said Barker-Hidalgo.

Despite the challenges of increased homelessness, Lindley said a recent rela-

tionship with the Brookings Community Resource Officer Ray Branion has reduced those unintended consequences in the community, such as emergency calls for service due to substance abuse or mental illness.

When the discussion turned from the public to members of the council, Councilor Ed Schrieber asked how many of the population the church serves are from the community.

Lindley said many of the clients they serve are not transients, but longtime residents of Brookings, even if they don't have a physical address in the city.

In an email to the Pilot, Machell Carroll, community health worker with St. Tim's said they identified 120 homeless individuals in the community during the most recent survey — about 70 of which use services at St.

Tim's. Of those individuals, 40% said they were born and raised in Brookings and an additional 20% said they have lived here for five years

or longer. A lack of county representatives at the meeting surprised Councilor John McKinney. He said the city should work with the county to create some type of shelter, away from a residential subdivision. McKinney pointed to a previous shelter he visited in Medford as an example of what could be

done. Mayor Ron Hedenskog said this issue is "very personal" to him, as he led the community kitchen at the church for 10 years. Hedenskog said he has witnessed the homeless issue in Brookings spiral out of control in recent years. Nevertheless, he said he doesn't want to shut down services at St. Tim's.

"I have no desire whatsoever to shutting down a benevolent kitchen," said Hedenskog. "However, you have a neighborhood of 29 people who have complained that it's getting out of hand."

Ultimately, the council decided to move the issue forward in the planning commission, where they could decide to develop a conditional use permit for St. Tim's, which could impose parking and other restrictions on the church. A conditional use permit allows buildings other than residences, such as churches, to operate in residential zones.

Interestingly, St. Tim's does not currently have a conditional use permit because it is older than the city of Brookings, and consequently older than its municipal codes.





Wild Rivers Coast

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Turning trash into treasure to teach a lesson

A Bandon art gallery with a mission far greater than just art reopened its door this week after being closed for 15 months due to COVID-19.

Washed Ashore opened its gallery at 325 2nd Street SE in downtown Bandon after using the time off to make some improvements to the gallery.

"We're super stoked, super excited for it," gallery Manager Cameron McGrew said last week. "We're getting a few new additions. We're getting the walls painted, and the carpets have already been cleaned. It's exciting to have a fresh start.

Washed Ashore opened in 2010 when Angela Haseltine Pozzi came up with an idea to make art out of trash that washes up on beaches in the area. Pozzi, who also serves as artistic director, joined with artist Steve Wright to create masterpieces that are made almost fully out of

Washed Ashore collects trash that has been removed from beaches through volunteer cleanup efforts as well as trash collected by park rangers. The items are then cleaned and used to make massive sculptures.

"We will definitely pick up whatever they find and turn it into some awesome sea creatures," McGrew said.

And by doing so, Washed Ashore hopes to spread a bigger message about keeping trash out of the ocean.

"We're an education-based nonprofit," McGrew said. "Our goal is to educate the public. We've actually done viewings in Canada. We've been all over the United States. Right now, we're in Norfolk, Virgina, Green Bay, Wisconsin and Turtle Bay in Redding, California."

Washed Ashore also has pieces in the Smithsonian, Florida Aquarium and different aquariums and zoos across Oregon.

But the home base is and has always been in Bandon. It is there where Pozzi and Wright come up with their ideas and it is there where volunteers help put together the sculptures piece by piece.

The end result is larger than life sculptures, all showcasing sea creatures and all made from trash.

"We're cleaning t beaches, we're educating the public and trying to engage the community," McGrew

While most of the sculptures are made of plastic, some include Styrofoam, nets from fishing boats and more. The biggest problem, though, remains plastic. The issue is plastic never fully degrades, so it can remain in the ocean for years and years. And during that time, it can cause havoc on animals that live and rely on the sea. Washed Ashore is trying to spread the message that most plastic use is not necessary. At the gallery, they offer water in biodegradable milk cartons.

"Plastic is necessary to an extent," McGrew said. "But the single-use plastic is what we're trying to avoid, things like single-use soda bottles, plastic wrapping around food that you'll just take off and throw away."

To make the point, McGrew likes showing a sculpture in the museum. Made largely of plastic water bottles, the majority of the bottles came from the Olym-

They washed ashore near Bandon several years later. "Everything you buy is a vote," McGrew said. "So,

pic games in Beijing, China.

if you choose to buy boxed water, for example, you're voting with your wallet every time you make a purchase. If we were to all just stop buying plastic soda bottles, they would get the message."

Instead, McGrew said, buy aluminum, glass and paper products that can be easily recycled.

When visitors come to Washed Ashore, McGrew or other docents will start conversations with visitors to showcase the importance of voting with their wallets.

And, once again, Washed Ashore is opening and spreading that message.

As a nonprofit, the gallery relies on donations, volunteers and grants. It is also now making decent money loaning its finished products to museums and other places around the country.

Inside the gallery is still the best place to get a look at the work. There are over 85 sculptures in the gallery, with the largest probably a parrot fish that is 9-1/2 feet tall, 14 feet long and six feet wide.

The Washed Ashore Gallery will be open from noon




