

Gov. Brown tightens distancing measures

Governor Kate Brown on Monday, March 23, issued Executive Order 20-12, directing everyone in Oregon to stay at home to the maximum extent possible and adding to the list of businesses that will be temporarily closed to stem the spread of COVID-19 in Oregon. The order is effective immediately, and remains in effect until ended by the Governor.

"We are learning more about this virus and how people react to it every day. Not just from a medical standpoint, but from a social and behavioral standpoint.

"I started by asking Oregonians to stay home and practice social distancing. Then I urged the public to follow these recommendations. Instead, thousands

crowded the beaches of our coastal communities, our trails, our parks, and our city streets, potentially spreading COVID-19 and endangering the lives of others across the state. Now, I'm ordering it. To save lives and protect our community.

"Today, I am issuing a new executive order further requiring social distancing measures because we know this is the most effective way to flatten the curve and slow the spread of this virus. I hope everyone in Oregon abides by its core message: stay home unless absolutely necessary.

"Staying home both keeps you safe from infection, and ensures you do not unknowingly infect others.

"We've already put a number of measures forward specifically aimed at increasing hospital capacity, such as

cutting down on non-emergency care so we conserve masks, gloves, and gowns to save the lives of the health care workers who are working so hard to save others. All of these things add up, and by slowing the infection rate, we preserve hospital beds so that there will be one available if and when you need it.

"None of us have ever been through this before, and that means there is no way to know exactly what lies ahead. We don't know yet when this outbreak will end, or what changes this will bring for our state and for our country. But I want to make sure that we've done all we can to end it as quickly as possible."

About the order:

- All non-essential social and recreational gatherings of individuals are prohibited immediately, regardless of size, if a distance of at least six

feet between individuals cannot be maintained. Gatherings of members of the same residential household are permitted.

- It closes and prohibits shopping at specific categories of retail businesses, for which close personal contact is difficult to avoid, such as arcades, barber shops, hair salons, gyms and fitness studios, skating rinks, theaters, and yoga studios.

- It requires businesses not closed by the order to implement social distancing policies in order to remain open, and requires workplaces to implement teleworking and work-at-home options when possible.

- It directs Oregonians to stay home

OPRD closes state parks to camping and day-use

At the direction of Governor Kate Brown, and in keeping with the guidance that all Oregonians should stay home and stay healthy, the Oregon State Park system closed at the end of the day Monday, March 23, including all day-use areas and campgrounds.

The Oregon Parks and Recreation Department previously ordered a campground closure that would have started April 3, and advised travelers to avoid day trips to full parks. With new guidance from the Governor, and clear signs that travelers are not following advice to avoid full parks, a statewide state park closure is necessary. Beaches can be closed by OPRD at their discretion and will be closed if social distancing practices are not followed.

All daytime park services will be closed statewide, including parking areas, picnic areas, natural areas, recreation sites, viewpoints and restrooms. Campers will be refunded for all canceled nights. All travelers are advised to follow the guidance to stay home to stay healthy. City and county parks and other public land managers are open at their discretion, with the recommendation they do so only if they can adhere to social distancing practices.

State parks, natural areas, scenic corridors and recreation sites along the South Coast include Umpqua State Scenic Corridor, Bolon Island Tideways State Scenic Corridor, Golden and Silver Falls State Natural Area, William M. Tugman State Park, Cape Arago State Park, Sunset Bay State Park, Shore Acres State Park, Coquille Myrtle Grove State Natural Area, Hoffman Memorial State Wayside, Seven Devils State Recreation Site, Bullards Beach State Park, Bandon State Natural Area, Cape Blanco State Park, Port Orford Heads State Park, Arizona Beach State Recreation Site, Geisel Monument State Heritage Site, Cape Sebastian State Scenic Corridor, Pistol River State Scenic Viewpoint, Winchuck State Recreation Site, McVay Rock State Recreation Site and Harris Beach State Park.

"We would have preferred an orderly shutdown of the system and to remain open for daytime visits, but our concern for the effects on rural health care systems requires us to move up and expand our plans," says Lisa Sumption, director of the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department. "We know this will cause a disruption, since we're suspending service to everyone, even people who live near a park. Reducing contact between people is more important than recreation at the moment.

"An essential part of operating a park relates to the health and safety of our staff, volunteers, and visitors like you," Sumption added.

The closure will last at least until May 8. OPRD will reevaluate the situation at that time.

On the OPRD home web page, Sumption explained in more detail why OPRD does not see the closure as an overreaction.

"Hardest thing we've ever had to do," She wrote. "We'd hoped people would protect themselves and, more importantly, others by limiting their travel just to short trips to places with space. That didn't happen, and

Local superintendents address remote teaching, food service challenges

School kids are home from school on an extended break that started abruptly the week before Spring Break and will last much longer than originally planned — now at least through April 28 — but it could be extended further or shortened by Governor

nor Kate Brown. The Pilot caught up with Brookings Harbor School District Interim Superintendent Chris Eberhardt and Central Curry School District 1 Superintendent Tim Wilson to discuss what the current strategy involves.

"The plans around the school closure change on almost a daily basis due to the evolving volatility of the crisis," Wilson said.

The first challenge, according to Eberhardt is to not create addi-

tional barriers for some students.

"We need to create learning opportunities that are both fair and are what we can actually pull off. Do we want to provide learning packages for all students? You bet we do," he said. "Our mission statement says we will create learning environments where every student can succeed."

Veterans Home residents dies due to COVID-19-related complications

A resident of the Oregon Veterans' Home in Lebanon passed away Sunday morning, March 22, due to complications related to COVID-19, reported the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs.

"Our hearts are heavy," said ODVA Director Kelly Fitzpatrick. "This resident was a veteran who served our nation with honor and dignity in its hour of need. He was also a beloved member of our Lebanon community, and he will be deeply and truly missed. On behalf of everyone at the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs and the Oregon Veterans' Home, we offer our sincere condolences to his family and loved ones. We grieve with them."

"At the Lebanon Home, staff continue to diligently follow established infectious disease prevention protocols and public health guidelines," Director Fitzpatrick



continued. "We know they are doing everything in their power to stop the spread of coronavirus and keep our community safe. All possible resources are being made avail-

able to support them in their critical work."

Since the opening of the Home in 2014, every veteran resident who has passed away has been honored with the "Walk of Honor"

in recognition of their service to our country. Typically, staff, residents and family would line the halls to salute and pay their last respects.

Sunday, amid the

COVID-19 situation, staff adjusted this long-honored tribute. Outside, staff were invited to line the sidewalks — maintaining appropriate social distancing — while his

body was escorted to the waiting transportation, draped with a burial flag and a hand-made quilt from Quilts of Valor.

Staff fold the burial flag 13 times in accordance with honor guard standards and present it to a family member. Multiple precautionary sterilization measures were taken to protect against the spread of the virus.

"The Walk of Honor is the last form of respect we can offer to honor our veteran and their family," said Fitzpatrick. "In these unprecedented times, traditions are more important than ever. We will continue to ensure our brothers and sisters in arms receive every honor they deserve while following public health guidelines."

Out of consideration for the family and confidentiality required by HIPAA, ODVA will not be releasing the resident's name or other personal information.

County Commissioners hold emergency meeting

Curry County Commissioner Christopher Paasch announced on Sunday evening an emergency meeting of the commissioners, along with city and county officials to be held at 10 a.m. on Monday, March 23.

The meeting was called to address concerns brought up by local government authorities in response to numerous citizen complaints. Over the weekend, Curry County residents and businesses found themselves flooded with tourists, dubbed "virus vacationers" by one city official, for spring break recreation. Lodging facilities were bustling across the region. Residents complained that grocery stores were stripped of essential supplies and food, residents were potentially exposed

to people carrying the virus, and beaches were crowded to the point of making social distancing impossible.

"As you all know, we are facing some extremely challenging times and problems that could affect the health, safety and economy of everyone in our County as well as the state and this nation," Paasch said.

"After learning of recent events and possible actions by the Governor, I think it is necessary to call for an emergency meeting of the Board of Commissioners, Sheriff Ward, Representative David Brock Smith, Emergency Management as well as Public Health and County Parks," he said in a Sunday evening email.

City administrators Jodi Fritts of Gold Beach and Janelle Howard of Brookings were in attendance, as were Josh Hopkins from county parks, Jeremy Dumire from emergency management, Sheriff

John Ward, and Sherri Ward of public health, as well as others.

"The Governor has issued executive orders outlining the need for residents to stay home if possible," he said. "California and Washington have issued similar orders, some more extreme, such as mandating them to stay in their homes. We have seen an influx of people from outside our area coming to the Coast. We need to address this and the impact it will have on our community."

"As you know, we only have sixteen beds in our local Curry General Hospital, and they are needed now more than ever before. With our older population in Curry County that is more susceptible to COVID-19, access to these health services is critical to our residents. We need to discuss alternate possibilities."

"In conversations with Representative David Brock Smith, he relayed to me in

email: 'On my Coastal Caucus call today, I offered a suggestion to my colleagues that we recommend the closure of all transient lodging facilities along the coast to drastically minimize the influx of visitors and protect the health, life and safety of our residents. I recommended some exemptions for truck drivers, victims of domestic violence, transient workers, such as nurses that was suggested by Mayor Pieper, and others that are necessary for essential services. The Coastal Caucus unanimously supports these recommendations and we have requested the Governor include them in her next executive order that will be coming soon. I think we should also discuss the limits we're willing to go at this point.'"

Commissioners unanimously passed a resolution asking Governor Kate Brown to include in her next executive order the

recommendations of the Oregon Legislative Coastal Caucus to "close all transient lodging facilities to stay and purchase to persons of less than 28 days in Curry County, including our coastal counties and their communities, until May 1st, 2020, with limited exceptions to individuals in the trucking industry, victims of domestic violence, health care workers, contract workers and others that may be deemed as essential personnel services."

Brown issued a stronger executive order to mandate better social distancing on Monday, March 23, as the meeting was going on, but the order fell short of closing transient (tourist) lodging facilities.

"I hope this is enough, but it may not be," said Commissioner Boice. "I hope we don't have to come back in a week and do more."

Tillamook County, in response to the flood of tourists this past

week, passed a much stronger resolution on Sunday, March 22 ordering closures of all county, state and federal parks within Tillamook County no later than 1 p.m. Monday, March 23. The closure includes all county parking lots, beach access and parking areas along road rights-of-way. The order further closes all county public boat launches to noncommercial users and closure of all transient lodging facilities including, but not limited to motels, hotels, short-term vacation rentals, bed and breakfasts, RV parks, and campgrounds. The transient lodging closures exempt current users who are registered for longer than 30 days, essential personnel, such as emergency and public safety responders, truck drivers and supply providers, as well as other individuals authorized by the Tillamook County Health Authority.

The schools must work through solving the problems in a way that doesn't widen educational opportunity gaps even further, Eberhardt said. Not all students have the same access to the internet, nor do all students have the capacity for independent study in their home environments.

"A survey of BHHS students found that 17% do not have access to the internet at home. Some students can't even receive a cell phone signal," Eberhardt said. Infrastructure in Curry County creates bigger challenges than in more urban areas of the state.

Gov. Brown's Ex-

ecutive Order No. 20-08 specifies several requirements schools must meet during the closures. Schools must continue delivering supplemental education and learning supports to students to the "extent practical through independent study and other appropriate options."

Guidance from the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) reinforces that replacing a "brick and mortar" school with an online school requires that "ALL students in the school or district have FULL access to the learning, the educators, and required materials (including technology)." That's just the first of a long list of requirements for providing online learning.

"Instructional services at CCSD1 are still in the

discussion stages," Wilson said. "Supplemental learning, as directed by the governor, has to be equitably offered to all students. What that looks like at this time is under development. We will be contacting all families to determine internet access and available devices in the home. More information will be announced as soon as possible."

Eberhardt said one of the highest priorities is to make sure high school seniors have what they need to meet their credit requirements for graduation. When teachers are available after the Spring Break, they will try to ascertain what specific students need and how they can achieve the credits required to graduate. Teachers will need to consider how to deliver what students need.

ODE is working on options, such as prioritizing instruction in

small groups for seniors and high school students or creating temporary rules that would allow students to have a shorter instructional year and still graduate, meet statewide assessments and be eligible to attend college.

Another requirement in Brown's order is to continue providing school meals in non-congregate settings. In a previous story, The Pilot described the first week of school meals, but Eberhardt says that model won't be sustainable going forward.

The new plan for BHSD after Spring Break week is to open the high school cafeteria from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays, where families can walk in one door and food service staff will load a bag for each family as they walk through and leave by another door.

At CCSD1, the food

service program will also change, beginning Monday, March 30.

"Daily service will continue at Riley Creek School from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Monday through Friday," Wilson said. "The lunch will be a warm meal in a grab-and-go pack along with the following day's cold breakfast. Parents are being notified about an opportunity to sign up for door-to-door meal delivery to the student/child home. Meals will be delivered from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays. Parent/guardians will need to complete a form and return it to the district. Both options are free and available to children and currently enrolled students ages 0-18."

Brown's order also requires continuing to regularly pay all employees of public schools. School employees may be re-

quired to report to work to assist with supplemental services, such as answer phones, maintain communications, provide supplemental education and learning supports to students, payroll and business functions, custodial and maintenance work, transportation services and nutrition services. However, each district also needs to be mindful of vulnerable populations.

"School districts have important local policy decisions to make regarding how to handle remote work options, staff requests to take leave or work from a distance, based on exposure, concerns of exposure, childcare needs, or being in the identified population of those most vulnerable to COVID-19," states the ODE guidelines.

Infrastructure in Curry County plays a role, once again, in how teachers can interact with students since not all teachers have access to the internet or cell phone service at their residences, and not all personnel can come to the workplace and remain safe.

School superintendents across the state are meeting in virtual spaces to work on solutions.

"We need to have patience," Eberhardt said. "Stay calm as we work on solving the problems."

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Capella Parking Lot Closed

The Capella parking lot off North Bank Road will be closed from March 9 through May 1 for parking lot improvements. Azalea Park visitors can use the parking lots on Old County Road at the KidTown play area and across from St. Timothy’s Episcopal Church.

Governor gives help to renters

Governor Kate Brown on Sunday, March 22, issued Executive Order 20-11, placing a temporary moratorium on residential evictions for nonpayment in light of the public health emergency caused by the spread of coronavirus in Oregon. The order is effective for 90 days.

“Through no fault of their own, many Oregonians have lost jobs, closed businesses, and found themselves without a source of income to pay rent and other housing costs during this coronavirus outbreak,” said Governor Brown. “The last thing we need to do during this crisis is turn out more Oregonians struggling to make ends meet from their homes and onto the streets.

“This is both a moral and a public health imperative. Keeping people in their homes is the right thing for Oregon families, and for preventing the further spread of COVID-19.”

Under the Governor’s emergency powers, the order places a temporary hold throughout Oregon on law enforcement actions relating to

residential evictions for not paying rent.

Recognizing that landlords and property owners face costs if tenants are not able to pay rent, the Governor and her Coronavirus Economic Advisory Council are engaging lenders to find potential solutions and are exploring various state and federal policy options that might be available to provide assistance to borrowers or other options for relief.

Oregon Housing and Community Services and the Department of Consumer and Business Services are also pursuing relief options at the direction of the Governor.

The order is part of the Governor’s coronavirus housing and homelessness strategy, which includes expanding shelter capacity with social distancing measures in place, identifying emergency COVID-19 shelter options for people experiencing homelessness who must be isolated or quarantined, exploring options for rent assistance, seeking expansion of federal eviction moratoriums, and homeowner foreclosure avoidance.

Every Child and Oregon DHS launch My NeighbOR

Every Child, in direct partnership with the Oregon Department of Human Services, is launching a comprehensive statewide emergency response to the fast-growing needs of children and families in Oregon’s foster care system.

The initiative — My NeighbOR — launched 7 p.m. on Sunday, March 22 and was expected to be fully operational by Monday, March 23 at 9 a.m. Oregonians across all 36 counties are being asked to step forward and meet the tangible needs of foster families and youth in foster care.

Foster families across Oregon have needs due to the consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic. Systems and networks meant to care for those in foster care — and

the foster families who serve them — are being challenged and taxed with growing needs.

School closures, significant economic changes, and a limited pool of foster homes are adding additional strain to the state’s current capacity.

My NeighbOR is a 36-county decentralized community mobilization effort designed to match community goods and services with foster families and youth in foster care who need them.

“Those staying at home in fraying situations are going to need help. We need each neighbor in Oregon to consider how they can step forward safely. My NeighbOR will bring us all together,” said Ben Sand, CEO of The Contingent, Every Child’s

parent organization.

There are more Oregonians on the internet than at any other moment in human history. Leveraging this, My NeighbOR will deploy using a two-pronged approach: 1. Staff will be receiving needs from families and leverage social media, online affinity groups, and targeted ads to invite Oregonians to respond.

2. When goods and services are offered, My NeighbOR will either use pre-screened drivers to deliver or invite community members to drop goods designated “Community Anchor Sites,” which are highly local, public locations where items can be dropped off and picked up.

“The welfare of children, youth,

and families is the responsibility of our entire community. This My NeighbOR collaboration is the perfect demonstration that partnerships, shared resources, and collective efforts are needed to best support children and families. This will be a shining example of how Oregonians support each other when in need,” said Rebecca Jones Gaston, DHS Child Welfare Director.

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CGH makes change to where public can enter

Effective Monday, March 23, 2020, and to further promote the safety of patients, those who come to Curry General Hospital for any reason (emergency room, clinic, lab, imaging, etc.) will enter and be routed to waiting rooms and departments differently, hospital officials announced Friday, March 20..

On Monday at 7 a.m., all patients and visitors entering Curry General Hospital weekdays during the hours of 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. will do so through the main lobby doors on the northeast side of the hospital, and will not be allowed to enter through the Emergency Department entrance.

Each person will still be asked screening questions and those with respiratory or flu-like symptoms will be given a mask to wear. They will be asked to sanitize

their hands.

Those seeking non-respiratory related emergency medical care and those who receive a mask will be immediately routed to the Emergency Department, through closed double-doors separating the main lobby and the ER waiting room.

Those patients visiting for a clinic appointment, imaging service, or other non-emergency services that need to wait in a lobby will do so in the main lobby, separated by double-doors from the ER waiting room.

Ambulances and EMS personnel will continue to have badge access and enter through the Emergency Department.

It is important to remember that those with respiratory symptoms are wearing masks to protect everyone in the room.

However, to reduce potential exposure and

contain viral spread, visitors and those attending patients are being offered the option of waiting in their vehicles, rather than in the lobbies of the hospital.

THINK YOU SHOULD BE TESTED FOR COVID-19?

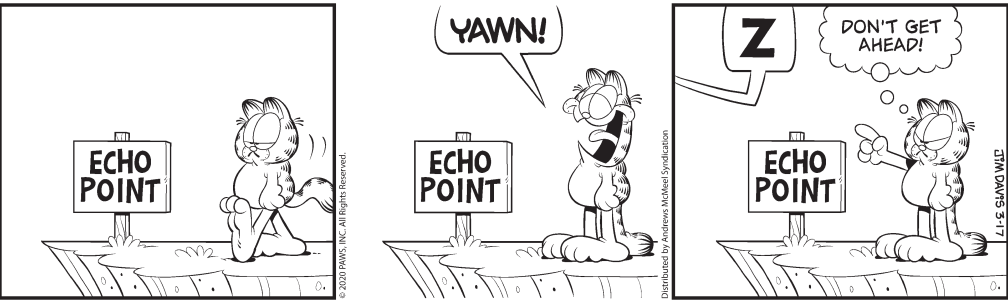

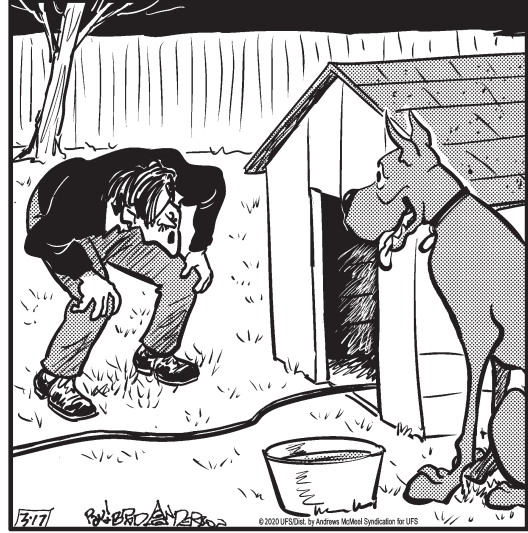

DEAR WORTHLESS: Children develop their feelings of self-worth from their parents. It appears at least one of yours was missing in action from the time you were little.
I don't have a magic wand, and I can't make the negative message your father implanted in your head disappear. On the upside, your upbringing made you independent, if only out of necessity. It may take help from a licensed mental health professional to make the scars from the way your father raised you fade.

whenever possible, while permitting activities outside the home when social distance is maintained.

- It closes playgrounds, sports courts, and skate parks, among other types of outdoor recreation facilities. Those that remain open are required to strictly adhere to social distancing guidelines.

- It outlines new guidelines for child care facilities, setting limits and rules on amounts of children allowed in care, and outlining that child care groups may not change participants.

- Failure to comply with the order will be considered an immediate danger to public health and subject to a Class C misdemeanor.

Following this order will save lives, while still allowing businesses to function if they can

protect employees and customers through social distancing. While many businesses and organizations that are heavily dependent on foot traffic and in-person interactions have already closed or will close under the expanded order, other businesses that make robust plans to meet social distancing requirements— and enforce those requirements— may remain in operation, preserving jobs while ensuring health.

This distinction from closing all businesses except for those categorized as essential as mandated in other states, aims to minimize unintended consequences and add clarity for businesses who can adjust their business models to accommodate vital social distancing measures.

“This order is designed to flatten the curve over the coming weeks, preserving scarce hospital space and equipment. It will also ensure that any place of business

that remains operational does its part to enforce social distancing rules,” said Governor Brown. “It is designed to be more sustainable over time, to allow Oregonians to keep their jobs when their work does not add to the growth of COVID-19 in Oregon.”

Retail businesses closed by Executive Order 20-12 include:

- Shopping: Outdoor and indoor malls and retail complexes, although individual types of businesses not subject to the measures may stay open.

- Fitness: Gyms, sports and fitness centers, health clubs, and exercise studios

- Grooming: Barbershops, beauty and nail salons, and non-medical wellness spas

- Entertainment: Theaters, amusement parks, arcades, bowling alleys, and pool halls

Other retail businesses will not be able to continue to operate unless they can implement strict social distancing measures and designate an employee or officer charged with ensuring compliance. Retail businesses able to adapt to take-out style shopping experiences can also remain open. If businesses can have employees work from home, then they must do so. Many of the businesses outlined in the order have voluntarily closed their doors already, to do their

part to protect Oregon’s communities. In addition, non-retail businesses like manufacturers and the construction industry must ensure that their employees are maintaining social distancing measures.

In addition to businesses, Executive Order 20-12 also orders state executive branch offices and buildings to close to the public and provide public services by phone to the extent possible. When public services require in-person interactions, the order requires social distancing measures to be implemented and enforced. State agencies must also facilitate telework and work-at-home for state employees whenever possible. While the order does not apply to local, federal, or tribal governments, those governments are strongly encouraged to follow these directives.

The order also directs state agencies to close parks and other outdoor spaces where social distancing cannot be maintained — expanding on actions already taken by the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department.

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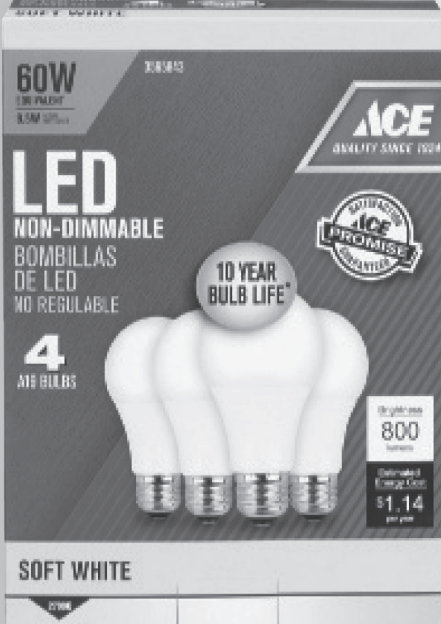

coronavirus, even in communities such as Curry County that have not had a single positive case. At last count, there were 88 confirmed COVID-19 cases and three deaths in Oregon.

Gov. Kate Brown closed schools through April 28. She also ordered restaurants and bars to stop all on-site dining and limit sales to takeout and delivery. As a result, many of those businesses laid off most of if not all of their workforce depending on if they remained open or chose to close temporarily until the order is lifted.

"I have been answering calls all morning,

people are going 'I'm not working right now, because my business I worked for shut down and I don't know what I am going to do. My unemployment has not come in. I don't know what I am going to do,'" Winebarger said. "I just say, 'Do you need a box of food?' And let them know we are going to be here if you do."

The food bank is located at 539 Hemlock St. in Brookings. It is open to the public from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday. Given that they serve at-risk people the maximum allowed in their building at one time is 10.

"Right now we have not been ordered to close down," Winebarger said. "With our volunteers and our warehouse managers, we always have less than

10 people in the building. So, right now we are only allowing in three clients at a time. We have a station where they can use hand sanitizer."

They are considered an emergency food bank and as such they "provide 3-5 days worth of food." The food bank is open to everyone, Winebarger said.

"We use the USDA income guidelines. The guidelines are very generous," she said.

Winebarger said if people are not able to come to the food bank to get food they can make arrangements to have a designated person come in their place. The important thing is for people to call the food bank.

"I've had people that have called me and said 'I'm part of that vulnerable population,

can't come down and get a box, what do I need to do,'" Winebarger said. "I tell them to send somebody down, we will get you a box, we don't want you to go without. I've had people come down for them. There are a lot of people that are willing to do that. We don't want people to go without food."

To meet the demand, Winebarger has been working the phones and computers.

"We are reaching out to partners in the community, partners in the state of Oregon trying to get more food in here," Winebarger said. "Trying to make sure we have plenty of food when people come in."

"We are all trying to be on the same page and doing what we can for our communities, and making sure that our kids are taken care of, making sure those that are vulnerable in our community are taken care of, especially our seniors, and anybody actually — that to us is the most important thing," she added.

The food bank receives food and monetary donations, but "most of our stuff we buy. We do have a lot of people that

donate to us monetarily, and food and things like that and that's wonderful. We can always take fresh produce, fresh vegetables, fruits, and stuff from people's gardens. People can help us in that way. As long as it is not opened we can take it."

we understand why ... people need to get out, and they need a little nature time to make this whole thing bearable.

"But you're more important to us than our mission. Our local neighbors near each park — many of them small, rural — need our support and understanding, but they and their health care systems and grocery stores don't need a few thousand extra people on their doorstep."

Sumption advised people to go out if it's important and take

a walk around their neighborhoods, where it's easier to avoid clumping up.

"We don't recommend you travel to any popular recreation hotspot. You might think, 'Well, if everyone else stays home, that means I can go.' No. That's not what that means."

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U.S. Attorney shares tips for avoiding COVID-19 scams

U.S. Attorney Billy J. Williams warned of several new fraud schemes seeking to exploit the evolving coronavirus public health emergency by targeting vulnerable populations.

Scammers have already devised numerous methods for defrauding people in connection with COVID-19. They are setting up websites, contacting people by phone and email, and posting disinformation on social media platforms. Some examples of scams linked to COVID-19 include:

- **Testing scams:** Scammers are selling fake at-home test kits or going door-to-door performing fake tests for money.
- **Treatment scams:** Scammers are offering to sell fake cures, vaccines, and advice on unproven treatments for COVID-19.
- **Supply scams:** Scammers are creating fake shops, websites, social media accounts, and email addresses claiming to sell medical supplies currently in high demand, such as surgical masks. When consumers attempt to purchase supplies through these channels, fraudsters pocket the money and never provide the promised supplies.
- **Provider scams:** Scammers are contacting people by phone and email, pretending to be doctors and hospitals that have treated a friend or relative for COVID-19, and demanding payment for that treatment.
- **Charity scams:** Scammers are soliciting donations for individuals, groups, and areas affected by COVID-19.
- **Phishing scams:** Scammers posing as national and global health authorities, including the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), are sending phishing emails designed to trick recipients into downloading malware or providing personal identifying and financial information.
- **App scams:** Scammers are creating and manipulating mobile apps designed to track the spread of COVID-19 to insert malware that will compromise users' devices and personal information.
- **Investment scams:** Scammers are offering online promotions on various platforms, including social media, claiming that the products or services of publicly traded companies can prevent, detect, or cure COVID-19, and that the stock of these companies will dramatically increase in value as a result. These promotions are often styled as "research reports," make predictions of a specific "target price," and relate to microcap stocks, or low-priced stocks issued by the smallest of companies with limited publicly available information.

The U.S. Attorney's Office urges Oregonians to take the following precautionary measures to protect themselves from known and emerging scams:

- Independently verify the identity of any company, charity, or individual that contacts you regarding COVID-19.
- Check the websites and email addresses offering information,

products, or services related to COVID-19. Be aware that scammers often employ addresses that differ only slightly from those belonging to the entities they are impersonating. For example, they might use "cdc.com" or "cdc.org" instead of "cdc.gov."

- Be wary of unsolicited emails offering information, supplies, or treatment for COVID-19 or requesting your personal information for medical purposes. Legitimate health authorities will not contact the general public this way.
- Do not click on links or open email attachments from unknown or unverified sources. Doing so could download a virus onto your computer or device.
- Make sure the anti-malware and anti-virus software on your computer is operating and up to date.
- Ignore offers for a COVID-19 vaccine, cure, or treatment. Remember, if there is a medical breakthrough, you won't hear about it for the first time through an email, online ad, or unsolicited sales pitch.
- Check online reviews of any company offering COVID-19 products or supplies. Avoid companies whose customers have complained about not receiving items.
- Research any charities or crowdfunding sites soliciting donations in connection with COVID-19 before giving. Remember, an organization may not be legitimate even if it uses words like "CDC" or "government" in its name or has reputable looking seals or logos on its materials. For online resources on donating wisely, visit the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) website.
- Be wary of any business, charity, or individual requesting payments or donations in cash, by wire transfer, gift card, or through the mail. Don't send money through any of these channels.
- Be cautious of "investment opportunities" tied to COVID-19, especially those based on claims that a small company's products or services can help stop the virus. If you decide to invest, carefully research the investment beforehand. For information on how to avoid investment fraud, visit the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) website.
- For the most up-to-date information on COVID-19, visit the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and World Health Organization (WHO) websites.

On March 19, 2020, U.S. Attorney Williams announced the appointment of a COVID-19 fraud coordinator to lead investigations into known and suspected occurrences of financial fraud related to the nation's ongoing public health emergency.
