JULY 4 FESTIVAL NOW IN DOUBT

Dlans for this year's Fourth of July fireworks display and celebration at the Port of Brookings Harbor are at a crossroads, with the popular celebration's future uncertain.

The Family Fun Festival needs a new organizer.

The coordinator for the event, Barbara Ciaramella, announced in a letter to the editor in today's issue of The Pilot that the event's core group of 15 volunteers could no longer handle the Fourth of July event.

"It was fabulous," she said. "I'm so disappointed not being able to do it again.

"We've done it for three years, but last year was the first time it was a day-long event." The first two years, the event covered just the fireworks, which ran about \$20,000 annually. Last year's free event

It included clowns, karaoke, hot-air balloon rides, a pancake breakfast, 5K walk/run, sandcastle contest, live music, bike parade, food trucks, car show, kids' entertainment zone, BBQ, prizes and vendors. On the day of the event, 45 additional volunteers covered other

necessities such as security, parking and transportation shuttles. "Approximately 5,000 people attended last year," Ciaramella said.

We didn't even have to hand out a Band-Aid." Not only did the group put on the event, the volunteers also held

fundraisers to help pay for it.

"We had no problems at the event. Everyone was so polite and good.



Two seafood fests each raised \$5,000. Sponsorships from Lucky 7 Casino and the City of Brookings brought in \$5,000 each. Several \$1,000 donors and other fundraising events filled out the budget.

Year-long fundraising for the event is a big issue. "Our group came to the conclusion that it was just too hard to raise all the funds - a \$30,000 budget - and put on the event," said Ciaramella.

'I run a business, and I can't just leave it to raise funds for the event," she said.

According to her letter to the editor, the group so far has met with the City of Brookings, the Port of Brookings Harbor and other event planners.

Other factors contributing to the group's decision, she said, were the

It's a go for G.O. on Jan. 30

rocery Outlet has announced Uthat the store's new location at 906 Chetco Ave. in Brookings will be open Jan. 30.

The grocer will occupy what had been the first store in the Ray's grocery chain, a building vacant since November 2016, across U.S. Highway 101 from the Fred Meyer

That building has undergone major renovation inside and out over the past several months.

Grocery Outlet currently is in a Harbor shopping center at 16261 U.S. Highway 101. That store will close on Jan. 29.

The relocated Grocery Outlet will occupy about two-thirds of the former Ray's building, although the sales floor will be about the same size as the existing store, according to co-owner Lori Panter. The back room will be slightly larger.

The grocery will be located at the north end of the building, which is on the left side when viewed from the front.

"We're going to start stocking the store on Monday with nonperishable products," Panter said last Friday. The new location will have larger produce and fresh-meat sections, more space for organics and specialty foods, and an expanded beer and wine section."

Panter said better racking will allow for the expansion of select departments without reducing the size of other areas. "It will be the same store, but smarter and newer," she said.

Grocery Outlet has more than 270 independently operated stores in California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Pennsylvania and Washington, according to the company's website.



Settlement reached for Lobster Creek Fire

financial settlement Afor a grass fire that ignited at a youth camp and started the Lobster Creek Fire on July 1, 2018 has been reached regarding costs that had been billed to Curry County, according to a Jan. 10 press release by Curry County Commissioner Court Boice.

The Lobster Creek Fire, which started near the southern edge of the Lobster Creek Youth Camp, quickly spread and aggressively moved south.

The Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) reacted immediately and while the fire grew to 400 acres, Coos-Curry Forest Protective Association personnel fought hard and contained it in less than 28 hours.

The campgrounds were

spared. The fire was determined to

have been started by campers lighting tortilla chips and stamping them out. It was unknown if other items were

being burned by the campers. The sponsors of the camp, Rogue Climate Action, had liability insurance coverage but it was limited to \$2 million. The total cost for the

agencies that extinguished the fire and protected the county and nearby timber lands was \$4.3 million.

The State of Oregon, through ODF, filed a claim against Curry County, seeking the balance of the fire suppression costs the state had incurred.

The \$2.3 million sought

from the county subsequently was negotiated down to \$50,000, to be paid by City-County Insurance Services (CIS) on the county's behalf.

We were well represented at the mediation by CIS and Curry Counsel John Huttl," said Boice.

"This settlement is a huge win for our county. We strongly negotiated and simply asked and reminded our ODF officials to wisely maintain the relational bridges that we've all built in recent years. I'm proud to announce that all parties

ultimately did just that." Added Boise: "We did everything possible to keep this from further litigation, while at the same time being determined to pay very little and to vigorously challenge

our ODF friends. "It is also important to note they were on the fire front lines with us for nearly all of the 2017 and 2018 horrible fire seasons."

Experience matters. When Brookings-Harbor boys' basketball coach Jess Beaman surveyed the roster of Cascade Christian High School, he was keenly aware of one thing: the No.7-ranked Challengers were returning all five of their starters from last season.

That was on full display in

Medford last Friday evening, as the hometown team rolled to a 61-49 victory.

The Bruins, ranked No. 23 in the state, held their own during the first period, grabbing an 18-16 lead in a see-saw contest.

Brookings was getting its buckets the old-school way ... two points at a time. As for Cascade Christian? The Challengers hit three long balls for nine of their 16

As the second quarter got underway, Cascade Christian turned to a speed-demon offense and a suffocating, hand-in-the-face defense that resulted in a 23-8 scoring

That, along with two lateperiod steals, had the home team sitting pretty heading into the locker room at halftime, 39-26.

Cascade Christian maintained a 12- to 13-point advantage for most of the

third period, until Brookings-Harbor got some traction to make it 48-38.

But in the final frame, the Challengers once again relied on their perimeter game, launching three long balls to lead by 15 with three minutes

Brookings answered with its own 3-pointer by Fabian Villa with a minute left in the game, but it was too little. too late.

Cascade Christian, under

coach Brian Morse, moved to 1-0 on the young season, with the Bruins now at 0-1.

Top scorers for Brookings were Evan Fronckowiak (15) and Jason Vanginderen (13).

The Challengers relied on Layne Collum (13) Donminic Lewis (11).

Next up: Brookings-Harbor hosts the Douglas Trojans on Tuesday, a team they defeated 79-59 in pre-

to the road against Sutherlin. Game times are 5:30 p.m.

Meantime, the Brookings JV boys team fell to Cascade Christian 43-47 after rallying back from a 17-point deficit at the end of three.

With the clock winding down, the Bruins purposely fouled Fish and then Neha Joseph. Their 1+1 bonus shots both failed, and Brookings got the ball back with 14 seconds left on the clock.

Following a brief timeout to chat strategy with their coach, the Lady Bruins' in-bound play was foiled by the Challengers, with Fish coming up with the ball and content to run out the clock.

A desperation foul sent Fish to the line, where she added two points for the Challengers, getting the upset win 43-40.

The Lady Bruins now are 0-1 in league play.

Leading the scoring for Brook-

ings-Harbor was Alexander (11). For Cascade Christian, Fish had

A Celebration of Life will be held on Jan. 18, 2020, in Vancouver, Washington at All Country Cremation (360-718-7948).



I was supposed to get an apartment with my father to help him now that he is aging. However, he became violent and threatened to kill me. I moved away and am physically safe now. My problem is, I'm now completely alone and a pariah on both sides of my family.

These lodgings are temporary. I'm afraid they will fall through once family finds out where I am and poisons this very distant relative against me. How am I supposed to survive this? I have a job, but big deal if I have nothing to live for and no purpose.

DEAR ESCAPEE:

Your chances of having a more permanent roof over your head will be better if you tell this relative everything you have told me before someone else gets to him or her. Your father appears to have serious mental problems you are

not equipped to deal with, which may become apparent in the near future when he acts out against someone else. You made the right choice. Your family members may be angry because they are now the ones who have to take care of him, which is why they have started the smear campaign.

People survive situations like yours by performing their jobs well enough to excel and making new friends along the way. It's called "creating a family of choice." Most of the individuals who do it thrive because the relationships are healthy ones. You have much to live for and many happy times ahead. so please remember that and concentrate on a future filled with possibilities. If you do, it is what you will achieve.

DEAR ABBY: My husband and I have been together for 15 years, married for six. We have the best relationship. Everybody tells us how great we are together. We don't fight,

and we support each other 100% with everything. While my husband isn't overweight, he does go back and forth from going to the gym to work out and eating healthy, to stopping and putting the weight right back on. I honestly couldn't

care less about the number on his scale. The problem is, he's a horrible snorer. It's awful! I usually end up moving to the couch in the middle of the night to get some sleep.

DEAR SLEEPING BADLY: If you have observed that your husband snores less when his weight is down, TELL him. It isn't hurtful; it would be helpful. You say he's been to see his doctor. Ask if he's been checked for sleep apnea. If there are long pauses between a sleeping person's breaths or gasping, it could be a symptom of sleep ap-nea, a condition that can be life-threatening. A diagnosis could be a lifesaver.

It's recommended for adults, who can register at currypubliclibrary.net, or by calling 541-247-7246.

On Feb. at 1 p.m. will be Intro to Desktop 3D Printing, on Feb. 8 at 1 p.m. will be Intro to Vinyl Cutting for Accelerating Your Crafts, and on Feb. 15 will be Intro to Laser Cutting and Engraving. These free programs are recommended for seventhgraders through adults.
