## RIBBON-CUTTING HELD FRIDAY AT BROOKINGS FACILITY

South Coast Head Start showed off its newly remodeled facility in Brookings on Friday afternoon. Nearly 50 people attended the ribbon-cutting in front of the red schoolhouse at 420 Redwood Spur.

Oregon Coast Community Action (ORCCA), a private non-profit organization, operates South Coast Head Start (SCHS). ORCCA Director Mike Lehman thanked everyone for supporting the project over the years.

"What this does is creates a great opportunity for kids in this community," said Lehman, who recently announced he is retiring as director at month's end. "At the same time what it does is it means we will be here."

South Coast Head Start is a comprehensive early childhood program that serves children and pregnant women of income-eligible families throughout the Southern Oregon Coast. The program is funded by both state and federal grants. All services are provided at no cost to the families.

The building used to be a public library and former site of Southwest Oregon Community College. Head Start moved into the Brookings facility in 2012.

The remodeling includes an additional Early Head Start classroom, allowing Head Start to expand and provide a school experience for



children from birth to age 3, and an additional Head Start classroom for ages 3-5.

"Our staff and parents are so excited to have a permanent home in Brookings," Child and Family Services Director Wendi Baird said. "This facility, which has been designed specifically for early childhood classrooms not only provides a safe place to provide quality services but also opportunities to grow and expand. We are so grateful to all our partners who supported this project."

South Coast Head Start is serving eight to 10 children in the home-based program and provides services to 38 families. Since November 2018, the programs have been operated from a temporary site at 525 5th St. in Brookings.

Head Start initially received a \$1.6-million Community Development Block Grant for the project.

He had been editor and general manager of weekly newspapers in Paso Robles and Atascadero since June 2018.

Before that, Williams held news management positions in Porterville, Watsonville and Marysville, Calif., among other locations.

"These are two media veterans with extensive knowledge of southern Oregon and California," said Country Media President Steve Hungerford. "We, and our readers and advertisers, are going to benefit greatly from their sales and reporting experience at newspapers both big and small."

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## BHSD names finalists in superintendent search

After an extensive multi-state search, the Brookings-Harbor School District 17C Board of Directors announced Thursday, Feb. 6, that three finalists have been selected from a field of 17 applicants for further consideration to be the next superintendent of Brookings-Harbor School District.

The board and screening committee thoroughly reviewed the applications and the board conducted initial interviews with several candidates. While two of the three finalists declined to continue, the board has invited David Marshall, to continue in the selection process.

Marshall is currently the assistant superintendent-

human resources director at Hermiston School District in Hermiston. He has 12 years of administrative experience in education including seven years as an assistant superintendent and student services director in the Milton-Free-water school system. His education specialist's degree was earned from Lewis and Clark College.

The school board will begin reference checks and site visits for the finalist over the next several days. After the background checks are completed, the school board will invite the finalist for a "day in the district" on Tuesday, Feb. 18. At that time, school staff and members of the community will have an opportunity

to meet the candidate and provide feedback to the school board. The staff-community forum will start at 6 p.m. in the Azalea Middle School Library.

The Board would like to remind the staff and community that they are committed to finding the best candidate and will use every resource possible to ensure the continued success of each child in the Brookings-Harbor School District.

"If the lone finalist is not the right fit for this superintendent vacancy, the board will immediately reopen the position to seek additional candidates," stated BHSD Board Chair Alan Nidiffer.

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# Deja vu Bulldogs best Bruins 50-34

A week or so ago it was Groundhog Day. The little rodent surrounded by top-hatted men. The varmint checking out the weather forecast for them. In the movie, of the same name, actor Bill Murray’s character rises everyday to the behold the same recurring festivities over and over and over again.

It must have felt a little like that when the Brookings-Harbor boys basketball squad hosted Sutherlin on Friday in their second Farwest League meeting of the year.

To be sure, the Bruins in both games, hung tough with their Bulldogs counterparts for most of these similar games but in the end, Sutherlin vanquished Jess Beaman’s BHHS team by identical 16

point margins — 44-28 back on Jan. 17, and 50-34 on Friday.

First-period action featured a see-saw battle with both clubs exchanging a one-point lead several times before the Bulldogs went on top at the buzzer 11-10.

During the second frame, Brookings-Harbor’s Logan Holler grabbed back the lead with a quick jump shot only to have the stingy Sutherlin’s Kolbi Stinnett can a couple of shots along with teammate, Mason Gill, to outpace the Bruins.

Beaman got good efforts from senior, Cort Morris and Derek Tuttle who kept it close trailing 25-21 at the half.

After the break, Sutherlin quickly capitalized on two technical fouls levied against BHHS contributing four points to put SHS up 29-21.

Holler returned fire for BHHS making it 29-23 but the Bulldogs locked their jaws on the ball and got another five points on a speedy layup and a Collin Bodine three-pointer.

Keeping the contest within striking distance, once again, the Bruins rallied to pull within six, with Sutherlin still on top 34-27 to end the quarter. The Bruins took some comfort in the knowledge that they outscored the valley boys 9-6 in the frame.

It would be the final period, just as before, when these two schools last met, that would be the Bruins’ undoing. BHHS swished the nets early on as the game wound down, but every time Sutherlin answered canning baskets of their own, and gradually pulling away leading by 15 points at one juncture 46-31

with less than two minutes left to go.

Sutherlin coach Greg Stinnett watched as his Bulldogs outscored BHHS 16-7 to get the win 50-34 and stay in the hunt for the league crown.

With the win, O.S.A.A. seventh-ranked Sutherlin is in a three-way tie with Cascade Christian and St. Mary’s Medford, all at 6-2.

The Bruins fall to 3-5 in Farwest League after a close disappointing loss to Douglas Tuesday 67-60, a team that Brookings-Harbor had disposed of earlier in the year 80-53.

Top scorers for BHHS were Holler with 11 and Vandingerin with five.

Tonight, Feb. 11, the Bruins host St. Mary’s before finishing out regular season play on Friday, Feb. 14, traveling to South Umpqua.

# Lady Bruins stumble against No. 2 Sutherlin, 49-33

There is a reason Sutherlin High School girls basketball is ranked second in the 3A Oregon Schools Athletic Association (O.S.A.A) polls.

Because they are that good. Currently sitting pretty atop the 3A-5 Farwest League standings with a perfect 8-0 record, the Lady Bulldogs came to Brookings on Friday and reminded everybody here of that fact.

The Lady Bruins are no slouches mind you. Ranked seventh, holding down the second spot in league with an impressive (5-3) record after a 60-34 defeat of Douglas on Feb. 4, means that even with the misstep to these same Bulldogs — BHHS is poised for a postseason trip.

All that stands in the way of Chris Scofield’s team is icing the two final contests against last-place St. Mary’s (1-7) on Tuesday and South Umpqua (3-5)

on Friday.

The Lady Bruins are the masters of their destiny for now, but dropping either one of those two final games would prime the pump for Cascade Christian (4-4) to tie things up.

The Challengers’ opponents for their close-out performances are against two schools occupying the lower-two rungs of the league ladder. The aforementioned Crusaders of St. Mary’s and struggling Douglas.

In the game against Sutherlin, the Bruins trailed by six points and the end of the first period 16-10.

Things got more interesting in the second period after BHHS senior guard, Avana Pettus, buried a triple to pull her team within three, 16-13.

Sutherlin made a run to the basket for two followed up with a Kiersten Haines trey to put the Lady Bulldogs in front 21-14.

The score dithered there until Brook-

ings’ Sidney Alexander uncorked a long-distance 3-point cannonball to get to within 21-17 at the half.

Third-quarter action saw Sutherlin’s Haines get the hot hand again from out in the twilight zone pumping in two more three-pointers to ignite a 14-point scoring firestorm that had the Lady Bruins licking their wounds with only three points by quarter’s end 35-23.

Brookings-Harbor was down, but not out. Summoning up an impressive offensive show against the state’s second seed in the final period, BHHS knocked down two three-point shots courtesy of Shelby Jirsa and Lexi Schofield, but Sutherlin put the game out of reach contributing 14 points to put an exclamation mark on the win, 49-33.

Top scorers for BHHS were Jirsa with 10, Pettus with nine, Fitzhugh with six. For SHS, Haines led all scorers with 20.

Game times for the final two regular-season games are slated for 5:30 p.m.

I asked my brother to pay half because half the stuff in this unit belongs to him and his family. I've never received a penny. He took it upon himself to go through the stuff and take what he wanted.

I have spent \$900 on this unit. I feel the contents are mine as I have more than paid for it. I'm willing to go through it together, but I feel he was wrong to have done it without me. Am I wrong? Am I overreacting? How do I deal with this without causing problems? I am way beyond upset. --**STUCK WITH STUFF IN MONTANA**

**DEAR STUCK:** You are not wrong. Your brother should not have shouldered you out of the way to have first dibs on the contents in storage, and he should have been paying half the cost of the unit since her death. I am unsure what "problem" you are afraid of causing, because your brother appears to be the one causing

the problem.  
My inclination is to advise you that what is left in the unit is now yours to dispose of as you wish, but before doing that, you would be wise to consult an attorney. You should not be paying a monthly fee that is causing you financial stress.

**DEAR ABBY:** My mother-in-law has sent me a friend request on Facebook. It might sound simple, but we are not friends. We don't hang out. Even though we live in the same city, we see each other only at family events.

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# Best kept secret: builder's thrift shop

If you don't know the store is there, you might just drive right on by the local used building supply and resale shop at 616 Memory Lane. "It's Brookings' best-kept secret," says Jerry Balogh, store manager for Curry Community Cares.

The entrance is unassuming, as you drive in through the open gates into the cyclone-fenced yard to a nondescript metal building. The entrance for customers is around the side. Donations are straight ahead.

It's a treasure hunters' dream come true—and likewise for someone who is trying to downsize their belongings. The store willingly accepts cans of paint as long as the cans are in good condition and in original containers.

Donations come in constantly, as witnessed by the doorbell going off. "The doorbell rings all day long," Balogh said. "It never stops."

The stuff moves in and out of the building as fast as it arrives. In addition to building supplies, they get plenty of furniture, tools, dishware, light fixtures and knick-knacks. Notably, they have an impressive number of cookbooks, going for 40 cents each.

In the back room is a pot-pourri of miscellaneous hardware, from cabinet hinges and doorknobs to electrical boxes and wire and plumbing supplies galore — an entire plumbing store donated its inventory after closing down. Boxes of tile, enough in each lot to do a small job and sometimes a large job, are stacked along the floor. An impressive assortment of doors, from pre-hung to solid wood, to closet doors, bifold,

trifold and louvered, line the back wall.

"You'd be surprised what's in here," Balogh said. "Men love to come in here and search for things for hours."

Outside the back of the store, are stacks of windows leaning against the fence.

"We sell a lot of windows," Balogh said. "Half of them are new; the other half are used. I don't take them unless they can be put back in."

Plus you'll find kitchen sinks, vanity sinks, bathtubs and toilets, plus mailboxes and every kind of pipe you could need: ABS, PVC, PEX and perforated.

"People give us whole houses," he said.

They do have a list of items they don't accept, including fluorescent light or fixtures, chemicals, hazardous materials, garage doors, gas and propane appliances,

mattresses or broken items. Other items are not accepted if they don't sell well in the store or they have a surplus on hand, as is the case currently with toilets.

If you don't find what you are looking for, chances are you just didn't look hard enough or it's already gone. But if you ask, Balogh knows exactly what he has. If it's not there, he'll take down your number because everything shows up, sooner or later.

"All the prices are negotiable," Balogh said. "How can we charge a lot of money for something if we didn't pay anything for it?"

The proceeds go to a unique program that gives grants to seniors and others to make health- and safety-related home repairs they cannot afford. Repairs might be jobs like installing shower bars, building ramps, replacing broken windows, repair-

ing or replacing toilets, fixing steps and repairing leaky roofs. All repairs are made by licensed contractors.

The store is open Wednes-

day through Saturday, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. For more information, contact Jerry Balogh at 541-251-0740.

princesses.'

"I have a lot of history and care about this place," she said. "I'm here raising my family now. I remember the awe that always inspired me with the fair. So I want to be part of turning it back around and making it everything I remember it being — and then some."

"I've got a lot of plans and fun things that we want to make happen, but we know it's going to take time," Coleman said. "There are steps, and we're going to need to remind the community to have patience with us and help us get there. It's not going to be an overnight fix, but we have a lot of hope for this place."

"Some of the things that have been missing, for me, over the last few years, are a sense of community and involvement. When I came last year, especially, it just felt empty and sad. It didn't feel like people had activities to be involved with that made them want to stay and hang out."

"Some of our plans this year are going to be focused on that and bringing back the 'reminiscent' fair — throw-back activities like three-legged races and cook-offs," Coleman said.

They are also planning a dunk tank. She wants to shift the focus from just things you can buy at the fair, to bringing

in educational activities and involvement. Kind of bringing back what "Fair" is.

"Retro-vintage, and with those silly games," Wills said. "That's the best part of my childhood was going to the county fairs. I grew up in a town about the size of this one."

"Fair for me was hanging out all day, every day," Coleman said, "Checking out the animals, doing the activities, the rides, watching the shows, the games, being there, being involved, all the noise, all the excitement, all the craziness, the food."

"Over the last several years, there's been a lot of repetitiveness," she said. "We're going to have more food vendors. While certain things need to be there every year, we totally get that, we can cycle in some new things that haven't been here or we haven't seen in a while."

They are looking into a hypnotist, or family comedy-hypnotist show, and a reptile show with tortoises, snakes and alligators.

Coleman is looking for shows with activities that get people involved "where people don't just sit, but they bring you on the stage and make you think."

Coleman wants to better utilize the community for these activities.

"We've got a lot of amazing people here with different businesses, different knowledge, and we need to make sure they have the accessibility to bring in booths," she said. "I've heard from people

in the past that financially, the prices that were asked for were out of reach for a local small business.

"We want to reach out to those businesses and make the community feel involved again because that's what a county fair is — it's community," Coleman said. "That's important to me."

"My favorite thing I learned about Michelle is she's from a small town," Coleman said. "She understands what community means — that's important for this office. "This whole venue is a community space and about making events and memories for our community."

While the fair is the biggest event of the year, the Event Center will have more community events throughout the year.

"There's a lot of work that needs to happen on the grounds before some of it can happen, including some updates to buildings."

The county and the city are working with the Event Center and "partnering to use some available transient lodging tax (TLT) funds to do some capital improvements on the grounds so we can

bring some of those events," Coleman said. "Our goals eventually are to have at least one decent-sized event a month, supported by smaller community events. I would like to bring at least one really big event each year besides the fair, whether it be music or something else to pull in people statewide and help support tourism."

Coleman is interested in creating more partnerships within the community, like happened last year when Brewfest was tied in with windsurfing events, creating a larger event than the two individual activities.

"I'd like to see things like the circus, music, rodeos, and bring more of that throughout the year," she said. "I want to bring comedy shows. Some of them can be smaller and more local, but it doesn't hurt to bring in a big name once in a while."

Coastal Legends is one big event already in the works, coming up Feb. 28-29. The concert on Feb. 29 is billed as outlaw country music, featuring headliner Benton Blount, who found fame on the show "America's Got Talent."

"Hopefully it will be a great show. I don't know

a whole lot about it, but it seems like good artists and fun activities," Coleman said. "I think it's going to be great for the community. It's an awesome event to bring to the community, and everyone loves music."

Tickets are available at Interior Coversups in Gold Beach and at the Great American Smokehouse in Harbor. Tickets can also be purchased online at <https://wcadventure.com>.

"Our first steps are coming in here, we're brand new, and kind of learning as we go," Coleman said. "We're really dependent on our volunteers that have been here awhile and our maintenance guys who know a lot about the area and our facilities. We are definitely going to be dependent on our community to step up and know that we're making changes and support us in that, whether through volunteering or financial

sponsorships.

"Our budget is not huge but we have big plans. That's going to take partnership throughout the community to make some of these things happen. Change is coming but not overnight."

Coleman has a bachelor's degree in interior design and a master's degree in sports management. Coleman thinks aesthetics are important for people who are thinking about renting spaces for events. Her design background will also help her understand architectural plans for future building projects on the grounds. She will apply her management education, as well, towards organizing events.

Wills has been an administrator and office manager over the majority of her career, "which is going to be really helpful keeping all this organized," Coleman said as she gestured towards shelf after shelf of records.

problems they had included water use, they couldn't do any work on the roof because it would create a water runoff issue and they had parking issues.

"It just kept going on and on," Lehman said.

Curry County stepped up in a big way, Lehman said, specifically Commissioners Court Boice and Sue Gold and County Counsel John Hutt, who spearheaded the project.

"Without them, it would not have gotten done," Lehman said.

Lehman wrapped up by applauding the efforts of everyone that had a hand in the project.

"It has been just an amazing partnership to pull this off," Lehman said. "I don't need to thank you, the kids of this community are going to thank you when they come through those doors."

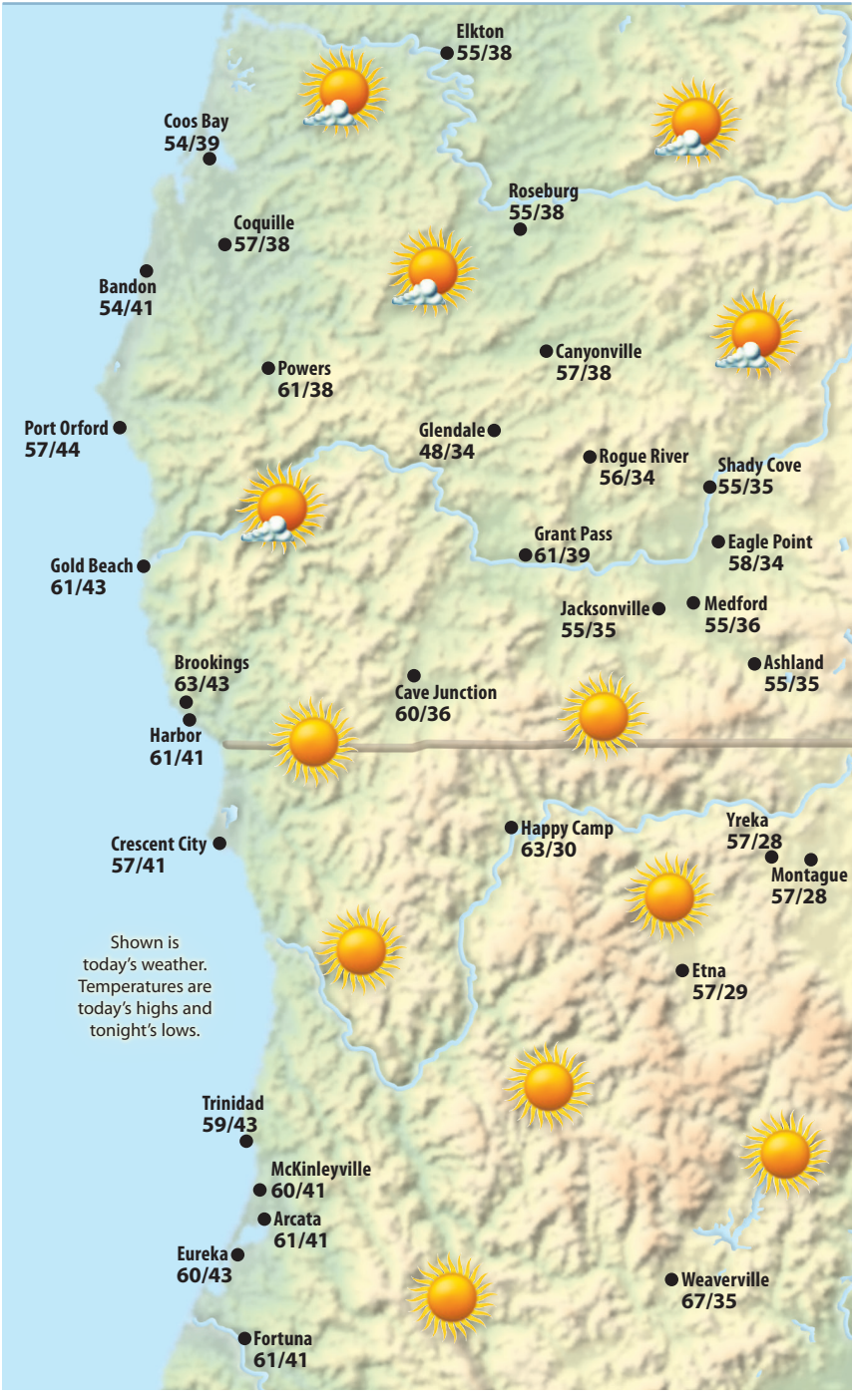
