# Brookings home a total loss to nighttime blaze

Pire officials say a blaze that destroyed a Brookings home does not appear to be suspicious in nature but the exact cause remained under investigation.

Following multiple 911 calls shortly before 10 p.m. Oct. 13, Brookings and Harbor Fire & Rescue Department crews were dispatched to 17535 Ross Ln. in the Brookings Rural Fire District.

Callers to the 911 dispatch reported that the structure was fully engulfed in fire.

According to Brookings Fire Department Operations Chief Jim Watson, the first fire unit arrived on-scene at 10:06 p.m. While en route, the crew called the Cape Ferrelo and Winchuck fire departments for water tenders, because the incident is outside of the established fire hydrant system.

Personnel and equipment from the Crescent Fire District, Smith River and Gold Beach were also called in to provide additional manpower.

"There were about 40 firefighters that fought the fire," Watson said. "It was reported that there was a large amount of ammuni-

tion in the residence and early on, as fire units were arriving, the ammunition cooked off, in which the gun powder starts to burn off inside the brass (containers)."

No firefighters or civilians were injured during the fire.

Watson said the structure's resident was the only one there when the fire broke out, was out of the building when fire units arrived and injured.

As the structure fire was winding down at about 3:30 a.m. the following morning, 911 received a call about an unattended fire on Chetco Point. Watson said a fire officer from Brookings Fire & Rescue responded and found the fire to be an abandoned campfire down a steep embankment to the beach, which had spread to a large pile of driftwood.

Fire units from the Ross Lane Fire were sent to combat the Chetco Point blaze. Thirteen firefighters from Brookings, Harbor, Gold Beach and Smith River responded to that blaze, which Watson said took about two hours to extinguish and mop up.

Then, at 4:33 a.m. Monday, 911 dispatch received a call of a possible garage fire on Woodruff Lane. Smith River, Harbor and Brookings units that were clearing the Ross Lane fire responded

and found that it was actually Halloween decorations that were mistaken for a fire.

Watson said it appears that both of the actual fires were caused by untended outside fires.

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

### Bruins to defend unbeaten record against the St. Mary's Crusaders

For The Pilot "It will take us playing a solid four quarters of football to beat them." So says Brookings-Harbor High School football coach Shaun Bavaro about the St. Mary's

Crusaders. The Bruins have come a long way this season. "Undefeated" has a nice ring to it, sure enough. Even if

Brookings didn't win another game, this would still go down as one of the Blue and Gold's most successful seasons in a long time.

But no chest beating just yet. The 3A Bruins know full well that if their schedule were compared to a buffet, BHHS has gotten to eat its dessert first - with heaping helpings of 2A clubs Gold Beach 54-6, Bandon 28-14. Rogue River 42-18, and

Lakeview 38-15. Next came some pleasing 3A Special District 2 South side dishes: South Umpqua 35-14, and Douglas last week 38-25.

It should be noted that Brookings has been notoriously slow out of the gate, often scoring a single (or zero) touchdown in the first quarter of these aforementioned contests. Then, usually after halftime, adjustments are made and Brookings explodes like dynamite, in either the third of fourth quarter, to put up three or four touchdowns and blow close games out of the water.

That has been the history up until now, anyway.

This week's game at St. Mary's takes a decided uptick in the level of competition. While it is true the Bruins occupy the top slot in league at 6-0, as the No. 1-ranked team in the state. St. Mary's third-place position in the standings at 4-2 should offer a cautionary tale.

The Crusaders' only losses came by way of the heavyweight Hidden Valley Mustangs, 26-49, and St. Mary's came within two points of Portland's tough Amity, 32-34, back in the first game of the year.

The idea that St. Mary's was able to hang with these two schools - and given the private schools' athletic tradition of winning - should give the most-ardent Bruins fans reason to put the fantastic wins, as pleasing as they are, to the side.

It's time to find out how good the Bruins really are, and nothing measures that like great competition.

This week, St. Mary's. Then, Cascade Christian. And finally, the big, bad Hidden Valley.

Bavaro knows what he and his team are up against this Friday. "St. Mary's has great team speed, size and playmakers all over the field. We need to have a solid week of practice in preparing for what will be a great high school football game."

In comparison games, both schools beat Gold Beach by exactly the same margin, 54-6, but the scale-tipper might be the Douglas contest. The Crusaders smacked the Trojans 60-20, while the Bruins beat them 38-25. A closer point spread, although BHHS wasn't up to full strength, lacking the services of Tuttle and Zamora, who will both be back in action on Friday when the Bruins bus rolls

into Medford. Brookings has depth and capable quarterbacks at its disposal in Hooper and Holler, each with their own unique skill set. Zamora has been consistent getting real estate from his running back spot, and the Bruins bring enough looks offensively and are stingy on defense to look

competitive here. Another consideration has to be penalties and turnovers. Whoever controls these may very well have the edge in this high-stakes game, which likely has playoff ramifications.

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

College Coos Campus, 1988 Newmark Ave. in Coos Bay.

The Pilot caught up with keynote speaker Michael Mitton, who described the wind farm project as a massive new economic opportunity for the Port of Coos Bay and the region. "Utility-scale solar and wind generation are now less expensive than new coal or gas plants," Mitton

said. In September 2018, California, the world's fifthlargest economy, passed legislation requiring that 100% of its electric power be carbon-free by 2045. "However, land-use restrictions, real estate costs, the increasing scarcity of prime sites and other factors will limit the build-out of California's onshore wind and solar capacity," Mitton said.

"That opens the opportunity for offshore wind generation to fill the need."

Milton explained that unlike offshore wind turbines on the East Coast, wind turbines on the West Coast would need to float and be anchored with a tether because of the ocean's depth.

"The area with the highest energy potential on the entire West Coast is an offshore zone extending from Coos Bay 300 miles south into northern California," Mitton said. Nearly all of the southern California coast is off limits because of Navy requirements and natural resource reserves.

Coos Bay has the largest deep-draft coastal harbor from San Francisco to Puget Sound, which would make it the perfect nucleus for development of the resource, according to Mitton. He described his vision of having jobs that are forever, unlike those that are associated with fossil fuels, which are a finite resource.

"Much of the economic benefit that results from floating offshore wind farms comes from activities that are all done in port: staging turbines and components, assembly, local fabrication of parts, maintenance and operations base," he said.

Mitton said large-scale wind turbine parts are so huge that they actually have to be shipped by sea and cannot be moved by land. Completed turbines would be towed offshore and anchored, and if needed could be towed back to port for major maintenance and upgrades,

He said he sees an urgency about developing the Coos Bay port project because "the first port that starts servicing the industry will have an advantage." He cited Oregon's mature \$15-billion marine construction industry, as well as several international players in offshore wind energy.

Even though Mitton sees wind energy as a "clean" business that he said produces good-paying, sustainable jobs and lowers electricity costs, he acknowledges there are concerns with any new idea. We asked Mitton about some of the objections that could be raised.

• They're ugly. Mitton described one of the first projects on the West Coast that is working through the permitting process for a Bureau of Ocean Energy Management lease. It is about 20 miles offshore of Eureka. Previous offshore wind projects on the East Coast have met with resistance because of ocean views. However, a floating wind farm that's 20 miles offshore would not be visible from shore.

• Underwater high-voltage electrical cables. The idea of high-voltage electrical cables underwater sounds like a bad idea, but "submarine" cables actually have been in use for more than 50 years, Mitton said.

• Damage to ecologically sensitive environments/ marine life. Offshore wind project investments are in the billions of dollars. Investors will need to comply with environmental impact

statements and lengthy permitting processes. Mitton points out that the industry is already a mature industry in Europe, which allows investors here to benefit from research funds spent developing the technology, which also translates into a cost benefit for investors.


 Wind doesn't blow all the time. Wind energy would help balance out other generating sources, such as solar, Mitton said, because wind turbines produce clean energy after dark. Offshore wind turbines actually produce more consistently and operate more smoothly than land-based wind generation.

Mitton said he sees climate disruption as a growing global threat - but a unique opportunity for coastal Oregon to be a significant part of the solution and revitalize its economy in the process.

Now retired, Mitton was a founder and CEO of a biotech company. Over the past 20 years, he has focused on climate-related issues including science, public policy and technology solu-

He has researched and compiled this economic development scenario for Coos Bay because he believes it can bring sustainable economic benefits to the region and help Oregon become a leader in this industry.

The peace, serenity and beauty of the forests in Curry County continue to be challenged by illegal dumping of abandoned vehicles, trash and illegal campsites.

Rogue River Siskiyou National Forest Gold Beach District Park Ranger Wade McMaster said dumping has been an issue for years locally and at national forests across the nation.

"There are many reasons," he said. "It is easier for folks to dump, with our limited law enforcement patrols and our limited resources. Also, it is so remote. When you get out into the forests, there

aren't as many eyes watch-

ing."
Three enforcement officers are employed by the U.S. Forest Service to monitor and take action against such illegal activity across the 1.8 million acres of the Rogue River district.

McMaster said those found to be in violation would be held accountable and could face fines as high as \$5,000 and six months in

McMaster said the impact of the forest dumping is an environmental threat. "Trash of any kind causes damage to the forest," he said. "Hazardous materials, or any oils leaking into the soil, can cause a lot of damage to our resources and threaten public

Volunteer groups, such as the Curry County Trash Dogs, assist the Forest Service in tracking illegal dumping and help to have abandoned and vandalized vehicles and other material removed. "The Trash Dogs have been an excellent partner," McMaster said. "I wish we could clone them.

"These groups are willing to get out there and clean the forest. They really get after it. They are very aggressive. They do a great job.'

Trash Dog spokesman Ed Gross said the volunteer group begain its mission of forest clean up in 2006. Since, the group has conducted nearly 200 cleanup operations, and has assisted

in removing several abandoned vehicles for recycling and disposal.

"The stream of trash has transformed from refrigerators, stoves, deep freezers, tires, batteries and furniture to an increasing abundance of abandoned camp sites, RVs, trucks and cars," Gross recently wrote in a Pilot guest column.

McMaster said that while illegal camping can be challenging, he is encouraged by those who do follow the forest regulations. "There are good tenants who clean up after themselves, and we are good at enforcing the 14-day camping policy, then you have to move on.'

### Lopez sculpture's unveiling is Saturday

### Crabbing industry addresses whale entanglements

Oregon's commercial crabbing industry prides itself on sustainability. Although Dungeness crab has been harvested commercially since the late 1800s, this population is considered to be stable to increasing along the West Coast - thanks to commercial and recreational regulations that protect the breeding population and ensure that the state's official crustacean will be conserved for future generations.

Now, the fishing industry is facing a new environmental challenge - whale entanglements in crabbing gear.

Before 2014, such entanglements were rare, numbering about 10 annually off the entire West Coast. Since then, entanglements have become more common, peaking at 55 in 2015 and numbering 46 off the West Coast last year, according to NOAA.

Forensics of each entanglement tell us that about half of them can be attributed to fishing gear, one-third to Dungeness crab gear. Most of the crabbing gear entanglements are attributed to California fisheries, but Oregon gear has been confirmed in several entanglements over the past few years.

Whales can be disentangled in some cases, and fishermen and other ocean users know to immediately report incidents to a hotline or hail the U.S. Coast Guard to initiate a response from NOAA's disentanglement team.

What's behind the increase since 2014 and how can we prevent entanglements from happening in the first place? Changes in ocean conditions, including climate change and effects from "the blob" (a marine heatwave in the Pacific Ocean), are likely factors in the increase, as they are changing where and when whales migrate and feed off the Oregon coast.

Both questions are ones the industry itself is committed to answering.

First, the commercial crabbing industry via the Oregon Dungeness Crab Commission is helping fund aerial surveys of whales off the Oregon coast. This project is a partnership between ODFW, Oregon Sea Grant and OSU's Marine Mammal Institute, relying on USCG collaboration, to gather information about where and when whales are in Oregon waters and their activities when they are here.

In combination with our knowledge of where and when fishing occurs, these resulting whale maps will help us assess the seasons and areas of greatest risk of interactions that lead to whale entanglement.

Industry members have also been part of the Oregon Sea Grant-led Oregon Whale Entanglement Working Group since its inception in 2017. The working group (which also includes members from ODFW, the Pacific States Marine Fisheries Commission, environmental groups, marine mammal experts and recreationalists) has been critical in raising awareness and understanding of the problem and potential solutions.

It has promoted the "Best

Practices Directive," which describes fishing gear configurations and practices that are thought to decrease the risk of whale entanglements, such as minimizing surface gear, maintaining taut vertical lines that are less likely to entangle marine life, and talking to each other on the water so everyone knows when and where there is whale activity and voluntarily avoids those

The industry is also active in derelict-gear removal, both in-season and post-season, an incentive program that further reduces the risk of entanglements.

While these efforts have led to success, more problemsolving and effort are needed, as entanglements are still happening at an unacceptable level. California's high rate of entanglements recently prompted a lawsuit and settlement that closed California's crabbing season several months early in 2019.

In Oregon, ODFW and the Fish and Wildlife Commission are taking a phased approach to additional regulatory measures, and many of these efforts have widespread industry support from commercial crabbers.

The first phase requires better identification of crabbing gear to more readily track what type of gear whales are getting entangled in. Beginning this season, all commercial ocean and Columbia River crab permit holders must register their buoy color patterns with ODFW. Recreational crabbers will also be required to mark their buoys.

While these first-phase measures are critical for our understanding of entanglements, they will not reduce the risk of entanglement.

Phase-two regulatory measures may involve reducing the amount of vertical lines (such as from crab pots) in the water during certain times of the year. We know there is an increase in entanglements reports along the West Coast starting in the spring, which coincides with when Endangered Species Act-listed humpbacks are most abundant off the Oregon coast.

Exact phase-two measures won't be decided by the commission until spring 2020, but ODFW is hosting public meetings now to get input from the crab fleet. Commercial crabbers and anyone else interested in finding out more can join us in Coos Bay on Oct. 17 at the North Bend Library from 1-4 p.m.

While designing these regulatory changes is expected to be difficult, the crab fishery has faced change before and retained its place as one of Oregon's most sustainable fisheries. This new challenge requires true leadership and innovation, and the crab fleet is up to this challenge.

Her family moved to Southern California when she was 8 years old, and she eventually graduated from Leuzinger High School in Lawndale. After graduation, she worked as a courier at Douglas Aircraft, delivering documents throughout the factory on skates. It was here at Douglas that she met her first husband, Bob Krausse. In 1960, the couple sold their small house in Torrance and moved to Mt. Shasta with their four young daughters. In Mt. Shasta, Elodie finally had the chance to make her dream come true: a house in the country where she could grow her own tood and her kids could play untethered.

During the mid-1960s, after having her fifth child and only son, Elodie transformed into a do-it-all homemaker - installing carpet, upholstering every piece of furniture in the house, sewing drapes and clothes, and effecting nearly all the home repairs. But her days didn't end there: she also served as a troop leader for Girl Scouts and den mother for Cub scouts; directed younger farm hands on the proper husbandry of farm animals; hosted bridge games and teachers' parties; and volunteered with the Children's Home Society and served as a "Rotary Ann."

Elodie and Bob divorced in 1978, and in 1988, Elodie married Ernest Krauss. Ernie and Elodie enjoyed traveling and explored many states throughout the country, eventually buying a second home in Brookings, Oregon. With her children grown, Elodie returned to waitressing in various Mount Shasta City restaurants: the Lamplighter, Railroad Park, Perkos, and the Treehouse. She loved serving the community, and when her adult children would take her out to restaurants after she retired, she would often walk from table to table saying hello to her former customers.

Elodie finally retired from waitressing in 2010. After retirement, she and Ernie split their time between Mt. Shasta and Brookings, while often traveling to visit grand-children and great-grandchildren. Throughout her life, Elodie enjoyed gardening and canned preserves, as well as knitting and crocheting. At 86 she could still play a mean game of scrabble and make a killer blackberry cobbler straight from scratch.

Elodie is survived by her husband, Ernest: daughters Toni (Bill) Bookman, Terri (Ted) Barton, Julie (Greg) Olender, and Jennie Krausse; son Mark (Jennifer) Krausse; grandchildren Brandon (Jessica), Todd, Asher and Talia Krausse; Amber Guembes; Alana and Tess Barton; Natalie, Loni and Jay Olender; and Sophie Marconi; and great-grandchildren Abigail and Charlotte Krausse; and Jayden and Domenic Guembes.

The family will be hosting a Celebration of Life gathering at Elodie's home at 530 Butte Avenue in Mt. Shasta from 1-4 p.m. on Saturday, October 19. 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### Gold Beach awaits new brewery and pizzeria

Jon Hawkins is determined, to say the least.

The original plan for his Gold Beach Brewing Company was to have the doors open in May, then June, then no later than July 4 of this year, according to social media buzz about the new business.

Then, on July 23, coowner Jon Hawkins replied to the growing number of inquiries on social media, "Glad everyone is excited for the opening of GBBC! It's definitely been quite the process getting everything done. We've made good progress on the buildout and are now right down to the wire waiting for delivery of some new kitchen equipment. Once equipment is installed, we can proceed with a final Health Department inspection and start slinging some pies! Hoping we can get opened up within the next couple weeks."

Didn't happen. The 4,071-square-foot building that used to be the Nor'Wester restaurant was built in 1979 and needed major renovations to plumbing and electrical, in addition to fixing some structural problems, including having to replace the entire floor due to settling and rotting.

The floor set them back by a month, Hawkins said. The electrical, which was taken clear back to the breaker box, set them back by a month and a half.

"The biggest hurdle was finding contractors in the area who could come and do the work," he said. "It's pretty hard to find people who can just drop everything and come help." Hawkins and his partner,

Nicole Rush, O.D. (yes, she's the local optometrist), purchased the building, located at the Port of Gold Beach, 10 Harbor Way, last winter from its original owner. They have a 50-year lease on the land it sits on with the port.

After rebuilding and remodeling nearly everything in the building, they plan to be open come Oct. 18.

"It's been a real challenge," Hawkins said, "The building itself is just a typical old remodel. The second you open something up, it leads to something else.

The only thing left to do before opening, when The Pilot dropped by, was to install the permanent taps for serving the 17 different beers, which will range from "pales to IPAs to Heffs and some fun seasonals," and niche selections, like their blueberry sour.

"I really like my chocolate porter and coffee porter," Hawkins said.

All of the remaining equipment is in place to open, although beer brewing onsite won't start until winter, when they will install a 10-barrel brewhouse in the lower level. Two large walkin coolers are downstairs for storing beers. By this time next year, all of the brewing will be done in Gold Beach, Hawkins said.

The restaurant already had a "soft opening" with the Gold Beach Chamber of Commerce, and then provided the beer at Gold Beach Lumber's 60th anniversary party on Oct. 5 at the Curry County Fairgrounds.

Hawkins is not a newbie when it comes to pizza and beer, nor is he new to Gold Beach. Hawkins and Rush started Bandon Brewing Company in Old Town Bandon just over four years ago.

Now, with opening the new brewery and restaurant in Gold Beach, Hawkins is looking forward to com-

ing back to live in the town where his father was the postmaster, and he graduated from high school. He worked as a dishwasher when he was in high school in the restaurant he now owns.

The brewery and pizzeria will closely follow the Bandon restaurant's pub menu, with a selection of traditional and artisanal pizza toppings, plus appetizers and sandwiches. The pizza style is New York, which uses a thinner cracker crust rather than being a deep-dish bread dough pizza that is Chicago's style. The dough is handtossed and never machine or hand-rolled.

The restaurant will also offer a regular dinner menu including steaks, pasta, fish and seafood between the hours of 5 and 10 p.m.

Future construction plans for the restaurant include building out a covered deck area to take further advantage of the expansive views of the harbor and river, and to increase the seating capacity.

The restaurant will offer deliveries within an area that extends out to Kimball Creek on the North Bank Rogue Road and the Old Mill on Jerry's Flat, then north as far as Nesika Beach, and south out to the Hunter Creek area.

The restaurant has its own dock, so in addition to deliveries by car, by next summer they hope to deliver pizzas, prowlers and growlers to fishermen out on the river.

Hawkins says that delivering pizzas and beer on the river will be his job, and he plans to work his way back to the restaurant with a fishing pole in his hand. "That's the goal, anyway," he said.

The restaurant plans to be open seven days a week from 11 a.m.-10 p.m. For more information, call 541-247-0247, or visit goldbeachbrewing.com.


