# It's true! Grocery Outlet moving

The rumors swirling around social media and on the streets are now confirmed. Grocery Outlet, currently located in Harbor, will be taking over half of the old Ray's Food Place location at 906 Chetco Avenue in Brookings.

"Yes, we are moving," Grocery Outlet coowner Lori Panter said. "We are projected to open in early 2020." She cautioned that construction delays are not uncommon in our area, but the plan is to open at the new location in January 2020. Grocery Outlet is currently located in a Harbor shopping center located at 16261 Highway 101 South.

The Ray's building, which was the location of the original store in that grocery chain, has been vacant since November 2016.

More information will follow when the corporate office issues an official press release making the announcement, Panter said.

# Paying a lot more at the pump

Drivers along the Oregon and California coasts are finding gasoline prices on the rise.

Which is unusual for the fall and winter seasons, when gas prices usually drop a bit from summertime. But according to the Oregon/ Idaho American Automobile Association, the West Coast continues to have the highest pump prices in the nation.

Gasoline prices in the state of California have leaped in the past few days, reaching an average of \$4.05 per gallon - only 7 cents below the highest price paid in five years.

That's according to Gas Buddy, which tracks such things.

And it's even worse in Crescent City, where prices recently have been ranging from \$4.09 to \$4.35.

That's among the highest prices, on average, in the country. The national average is \$2.65 per gallon ... a whopping \$1.70 or so difference.

Why? For one thing, Californians pay a higherthan-usual sales tax, which recently increased to 47.3

cents per gallon.

Lucky for Crescent City residents, they can make the drive to the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation's Lucky 7 Casino in Smith River, where gasoline ranges from \$3.17 to \$3.29 per gallon. "It's likely because the (Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation) is not subject to the same federal and state taxes that California residents pay," said AAA spokesman Devin Gladden.

"While drivers in other states are getting some relief at the pumps, West Coast drivers are paying more," said Oregon/Idaho AAA public affairs director Marie Dodds. "Disruptions at about five refineries in California are causing pump prices to spike - and it's not clear when operations will return to normal."

The AAA's latest pump price report finds California the hardest-hit state, with a week-over-week jump of 32 cents, and an average of \$4.07 a gallon. This is the first week that California has climbed above the \$4-a-gallon mark since July 27, 2014.

And Oregon is one of only seven states in the na-

# Hooskanaden slide still inching along

The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) is monitoring new landslide activity along U.S. Highway 101 at Hooskanaden Creek between Brookings and Gold Beach

ODOT public information officer Dan Latham confirmed reports that the Hooskanaden slide has moved about an inch in the last month, although he added that's fairly typical for this and similar coastal areas.


"The only thing that's different this year is, we're getting rain a little earlier in the season," said Latham. "We usually don't see this amount of rain or ground movement until later in the fall."

He said several locations along the southern Oregon coast typically see ground movement during the fall and winter. "When cracks occur in the road (as a result), we try to patch them as quickly as possible."

The Hookanaden area of U.S. 101 began sliding the week of Feb. 25, closing both lanes of the highway and diverting traffic to Carpenterville Road - the only alternative for motorists. A single lane was built by Tidewater Construction in March and two lanes were opened in May, which sit atop a temporary roadway.

ODOT spent about \$1 million for the temporary repair, which closely bypasses the original slide area.

"It's important to keep in mind that these large slides usually occur every 15 to 20 years," Latham said. "We haven't seen major slides in back-to-back years. That's not to say it can't happen, but it's un-

likely."

Latham said ODOT is continuing to monitor the ground movement. "We have staff working on the south coast who drive through this area daily and they're keeping an eye on the movement. We also send our geologists to these areas at least monthly through the fall and winter

to measure the movement."

Latham said ODOT hasn't done anything new to stabilize the hill-side during the last month, but the agency did drive long steel dowels into the ground over the summer to stabilize the road.

In addition, ODOT is planning to install reflective chevron signs by

early November to guide motorists in navigating the curve at the south end of the slide area.

A plan to restore the highway to three lanes, plus shoulders - as it was before the slide - is under way, but likely won't occur until next year.

# Boat, passengers rescued on Rogue



An 18-foot boat carrying a tractor and three passengers was adrift Sept. 29 and out of control on the Rogue River near Agness. The Gold Beach Fire Department responded.

Areport of a runaway boat, heading into the rapids near Illahe Riffle near Agness at about 11:20 a.m. Sept. 29, brought a call to local emergency responders.

The 18-foot yellow boat was reported to have a woman and dog onboard - "out of control, hitting rocks - while drifting down the river.

The Curry County Sheriff's Office had no one available for a water rescue, so the Gold Beach Fire Department responded. One of its volunteers, also a member of the Search and Rescue team, launched his boat at Quosatana Campground and the rescuers

headed upriver.

It later was learned the boat was carrying a tractor upriver when the boat's motor died and could not be restarted. A passenger jumped overboard with the bow rope, hoping to tow the craft to shore. The rope turned out to be too short.

Meantime, a woman and dog aboard the boat drifted downriver for some distance, said Gold Beach Fire Chief Tyson Krieger. She jumped from the boat before it became hung up at "Old Diggins," atop Wildcat Rapids, he said

The Gold Beach Fire Department crew reached the loose boat, tied it to shore, retrieved the man, woman and dog, and gave them a ride upriver to their cabin.

# There's a definite 'Art Flurry in Curry'

Artist Zach Johnsen of Portland began painting an outside wall at Interior Coverups in Gold Beach last week, and now it's a bright, new Oregon Is Magic mural, completed Sept. 29.

The artwork is right on the city's main street at 29325 Ellensburg Ave. (U.S. Highway

Johnsen originally is from New Hampshire, but he's been in Oregon for the past 10 years. "Gold Beach reminds me of my hometown, with all the trucks going by and people honking and cheering me on," he said.

Johnsen recently completed another mural project, in New Hampshire.

The paints used in the mural are high-quality exterior house paints and spray paints.

"This mural project is a collaboration between Oregon Coast Visitors Association, Travel Oregon and Gold Beach Mainstreet, and is part of the overall 'Art Flurry in Curry' project," said Dave Lacey of the Oregon Coast Visitors Association. Lacey is the visitor association's south coast destination coordinator.

three of Gold Beach Main Street's board officers president Laurie Van Zante, vice president Deb Treinen, and treasurer Cherie McNair — to talk about what they've been doing.

Gold Beach Main Street evolved from the Gold Beach Beautification Committee formed for Make a Difference Day 2015. The Latterangle of land in Wedderburn to create some elevation. The triangle is at the north end of the Patterson Bridge, over the Rogue River as it heads into Gold Beach.

The group organized as a 501(c) 3 nonprofit in 2016, modeled after the national Main Street, and is part of the Oregon Main Street movement.

A series of community meetings and surveys determined that the next beautification and improvement project would be a series of benches throughout town, which would invite people to linger and enjoy the community's ambience.

Their first 13 benches came through an urbanrenewal grant provided by the City of Gold Beach. The benches have been a major labor of love, involving numerous community volunteers doing everything from removing asphalt, to pouring cement pads on which the benches were placed, to landscaping the sites with trees and shrubs.

"The bench projects are actually mini-parks spread throughout the town," said Van Zante. The sturdy castiron benches have a wave pattern theme incorporated into the design.

The group had just finished a conference call with the Oregon Community Foundation about their grant application to put in six more benches. They will find out if they have been given the money sometime in November.

VanZante: "The bench project is sort of a metaphor for community spirit, for momentum, for community buy-in, for hope of restoring our town."

McNair: "I think that was the biggest success, moving the spirit, lifting the spirit of the town up."

the first phase of a three-part grant, dubbed "Art Flurry in Curry," has been completed. The mural was funded by the Oregon Coast Visitors Association and Travel Oregon.

The second part of the project will be creating signs and banners for businesses along main street that coordinate with the wave theme of the benches.

The signs will be funded by the Wild Rivers Coast Alliance, the City of Gold Beach and Travel Oregon.

The group envisions signs bearing the coastal themes of windsurfers, kite boarders, surfers, hikers, fishing — all activities that are available in Gold Beach. The third phase of the

project will be a public-art sculptural installation created from sea debris. The plan is to place it at the Visitor Center.

Wild Rivers is paying for the art; the City of Gold Beach will provide land and labor for the installation.

And that's not all the group has been working on. Members applied and received from Oregon Main Street a Main Street Revitalization Grant of \$166,695.

That's for fixing two historic buildings with new stucco and roofing. The Ace Hardware building in the heart of the downtown district received a new roof and facia boards. It had been the first hospital in Gold Beach.

The other grant recipient, at the north end of the town's main thoroughfare, used to be the Sunset (gas) Station and is owned by Sue Golay. The Golay building has been remodeled to provide live/work space, with living quarters added above the shop space

Providing flexible housing options, funding business finance options, and fostering a bright and vibrant culture are several of the ways the group hopes to bring new residents and new businesses to town.

"I really think what we do for main street is not just for the tourists, it's also for all of us who live here and our kids, and family and friends. We want to be proud of where we live," said McNair.

Added Van Zante, "We will continue to work on ways to attract new residents and new industry."

tion where prices are higher now than a week ago, said Dodds. Nevada's prices are up by 15 cents a gallon, the second-largest jump in the country, and third is Oregon, with an increase of 5 cents per gallon.

Catherine Reheis-Boyd, president of Western States Petroleum, told The Pilot there are a variety of factors influencing movement in the price of gasoline and diesel. "The primary driver is the dynamics of supply and demand of crude oil," she said. "Moreover, unforeseen events - such as storms, outages, etc. - can have significant impacts."

# Officials issue trail safety alerts

State and local officials are issuing safety alerts about the dangers of venturing off marked trails and waysides along U.S. Highway 101.

Those alerts follow two separate cliff rescues northwest of Brookings in the past two weeks. Both involved hikers who ventured onto steep coastal trials from waysides along the highway. (Read those stories online at currypilot.com.)

Officials said they have seen an increase, over the past few years, of people slipping or falling off the trails.

Oregon State Parks Department spokesman Chris Havel said there two reasons people are getting into trouble as they venture from the highway waysides, into the forest and along the often-steep trails.

"Visits are up and that alone means there will be more incidents," he said. As the visitor numbers rise, Havel said, people tend to seek new areas. If they're unfamiliar with a location, they might be less aware of the hazards.

"Some people fall under the spell of all this beauty by photos and videos they see online, and they plunge into

an experience without being as careful as they normally would be," he said. "That's where accidents can happen."

Havel said that over the past three years, the parks department has recorded at least nine instances involving people injured off-trail or while climbing cliffs along the coast.

He said the dangers from going off-trail involve stepping on unstable soil that could give way, falling down steep ravines or off of cliff edges, or becoming lost within the wooded area.

"This area is prone to landslides and erosion, which is why it is very important that visitors stay on trails," he said. "The vast majority of the trail accidents are preventable.'

Curry County Sheriff John Ward said his search and rescue team has responded to as many as a dozen calls for trail or cliff rescues in the past three years. Ward said those calls stem from the increase in nature-seeking enthusiasts.

"People who are traveling through want to go for a quick walk on ocean trails,' said Ward. "(But often, these) people are not prepared for the conditions, trails not being well maintained or with proper signage, and people are taking chances going offtrail to get better looks.'

Havel said the state park's trails are marked and have directional arrows, and there are several courtesy signs within the Samuel H. Boardman corridor specifically stating, "For your safety and to protect vegetation, stay on designed trails."

Within the Boardman corridor, the signs are posted at Lone Ranch, Cape Ferrelo, House Rock, Whaleshead Viewpoint and Beach, Indian Sands and Arch Rock.

The beach access signs contain a group of universal symbols and messages customized to that specific access point. "They don't detail every hazard," Havel said. "They highlight a few of the most-common-encountered ones."

The Oregon State Parks Department has an active project to update coastal trail signs so they are clearer and more visible, said Havel. The department also is redoing the Samuel H. Boardman brochure to alert hikers about steep terrain, trail closures and sections where hikers will need to walk on the highway.

'When we have guided interpretive hikes, we provide a safety message at the beginning and explain the reasons why we ask our visitors to stay on-trail," he said.

## **Special-district** libraries benefit our communities

When you, the voters, rallied to create a special taxing district for your library, you permanently set us up to operate independently, free from oversight of other government agencies.

This is a gift the Chetco Community Public Library board and staff are thankful for, and an arrangement which greatly benefits our community.

While most people are very familiar with public libraries, I think we sometimes forget the immense value they bring to their communities. Not only do we espouse and encourage the ideals of equality, free access to ideas, and privacy, we also play a direct role in enriching the lives of our community

We are partners in educating our youth, we provide lifelong learning and entertainment for free, we provide a warm (or cool) and comfortable place for people of all backgrounds and ages, we provide community gathering spaces, and more.

Neither should we forget that public libraries are the great equalizers of our society. As colleges raise tuition, as schools have their funding cut, as internet access and technology become more essential to life ... the public library provides. We step in where there are gaps, and we are always toiling in the background to keep our communities strong and vibrant.

Some libraries in Oregon operate under county or city management, and those libraries envy the flexibility that special-district libraries have. Our library's independence as a special district allows us to respond quickly to community needs without having to navigate bureaucracy or seek permission from those who may have different priorities. We don't have to fight for funding for new projects or services, because our community has already decided that libraries are a valuable and worthy investment, and that we work best when we can focus our full energy on the library users in our community.

Creating a countywide library district would most certainly limit that ability. The Chetco district is different from the Gold Beach. Langlois, Agness and Port Orford districts. What is good for Agness or Gold Beach may not be good for Chetco, and vice versa ... and if we were forced to operate under one district, our services would become more homogenized and less specialized.

In fact, your Curry County libraries already choose to work together in the areas that benefit you most. We banded together to create the Curry Library Foundation, which allows us to financially work together for specific projects. Just last month, we purchased access to the Chilton Auto Repair and Mango Languages databases for all library users in Curry County. By combining our purchasing power, we were able to save money that can now be used for other services.

Additionally, since 2017 the Curry County library districts have all been a part of the Coastline Libraries Network. This consortium consists of all libraries in Curry and Coos counties, and allows us to share materials and administrative costs.

Your library is organized, fiscally responsible and always looking for the most effective way to spend your tax dollars.

Let's look at how far your tax dollars go. In 1992, our district population was 12,072, and we received \$318,116 in total revenue. With inflation, that equals about \$581,000 in today's

In 2018, the district population had risen to 14,074, and we received \$709,898. That seems like a big increase. But if we break that down to the amount we receive a year per capita, in 1992 it was \$48 per person, and in 2018 it was \$52 per

So, in 27 years our tax income has only increased by the equivalent of \$4 per person. With that extra \$4, your library has done incredible things. In 1992, Chetco Library patrons had access to 28,000 books. Now, Chetco Library patrons have access to 1.1 million books, DVDs, audiobooks and e-books.

In 1992, we had 4.3 FTE employees. Now we have over 9, and each has a specific role in serving the entire district. We have added computers and free internet, meeting room spaces, online resources, a bookstore and so much more.

Let me be clear: the library is not holding your tax dollars back to create a large reserve. We spend your tax dollars on you.

After the Chetco Library was built, we were able to pay off our 15-year debt in 12 years. So, the board wisely decided to take the money allocated in our budget for debt repayment and set it aside for repairs, expansion and upkeep.

That money went into a fund separate from our general operating expenses, called our Library Improvement Fund. But the amount in that fund is not all tax

dollars. Rather, over the years various generous donations and bequeaths have been added to it. This fund has been invested for the 15 years the account has existed, and it has been growing

steadily over that time. Because of the generous donations and our library board's prudent planning and responsible investments, we now have a Library Improvement Fund of \$2,047,000 (not \$2.7 million as has previously been reported). With this fund, we have the financial means necessary to ensure well-maintained and functional facilities that can adapt to evolving community needs.

Our building is now 26 years old and our community is growing. In the coming years, we have major projects that must be done, such as replacing the carpet and the roof, repairing the parking lot, and maintaining or completely replacing a 26-year-old HVAC system that is limping along.

Additionally, our meeting room and event spaces are not sufficient to meet community demand. Our library's large meeting room has a capacity of 81 people, but we frequently have events that require space for many more. Our small conference room is always booked, so we are frequently unable to grant community requests for meeting room space.

If we had a venue that could hold more people, we would be able to offer more programs and more spaces for our community to use. Subsequently, I am exploring expansion options for the board's consideration.

Simply put, it is unreasonable to conclude that because a special district is financially secure, their savings must mean they don't need the money they receive. A well-funded library and a fiscally responsible board of directors is something this community can be proud of, and something it should fight to keep.

I thank you all for your ongoing enthusiastic support. I know the directors of the other Curry County library districts thank you as well. We are grateful because our voters saw how much libraries contribute to the health and vitality of any community, and they used their votes to ensure that we would always be here.

A thriving library reflects a thriving community, and a struggling library reflects a struggling community. Let's continue to let our libraries thrive.

first such emergency resolution, in solidarity with Curry

County's declaration. Each housing emergency declaration adds credibility and demonstrates additional community buy-in to all "upstream government funders' and other major funders

throughout Oregon. This began a number of years ago with League of Women Voters townhalls meant to provide perspective and initiate the narrative around developing homeless resources and affordable

housing. As these townhalls' moderator and one of the event planners who put together three panels - one for each city - it was notable that before he ran for Curry County commissioner, Court Boice attended all three townhalls. Speaking with him after the

first townhall, held in Port Orford, Mr. Boice recognized the journey ahead - making a commitment to develop affordable housing for Curry County - and ran for commissioner to get the job done.

He began working with other leaders, such as Brookings City Councilor Ron Hedenskog, a longtime supporter of affordable housing for veterans.

The county's leadership me from Commission ers Boice and Chris Paasch, providing their leadership in passing the county's housing emergency declaration.

Solidarity between the silos and the county provides the best possible positioning for grant-worthiness, stimulation of developers' interest, and addressing barriers to providing housing for our most in need, alongside our workforce.



# Meetings to focus on living with wildfire

Understanding wildfire behavior could save your life, according to the Wild Rivers Coast Forest Collaborative, a collection of local partners with an interest in forest conservation and wildfire safety.

The group is sponsoring a public presentation Oct. 9 about how communities can live with wildfire from 6:30-8 p.m. at the Chetco Community Library, 405 Alder St. in Brookings, and Oct. 10 at the Port Orford Public Library,

1421 Oregon St. Retired Forest Service employee Rich Fairbanks will be the presenter at both meetings.

In the following conversation, Wild Rivers Coast Forest Collaborative member Teresa Bird, the associate conservation director for the Kalmiopsis Audubon Society, outlines why public awareness of wildfires is essential to our community.

**The Pilot:** Why do this now and what is the importance of this event?

**Bird:** The WRCFC has worked with the USFS on fire-related issues, including providing feedback on Chetco Bar salvage and the Shasta Agness Landscape Restoration Project, which includes increasing forest resiliency to wildfire through some thinning/oak savanna maintenance prescribed burning. We engage in public forest management issues. and one of our goals is to help communities understand and engage in these issues, as well. We did hold a firefocused workshop for Agness residents this summer to help the community learn about fuels management work in the area and the Shasta Agness project, but wanted to hold a more widely applicable fire presentation in easier-to-access locations for Curry County residents. Recent large wildfires in Oregon, and throughout the West, have made all of us more aware of the need to understand wildfire and start

preparing ahead of time. Rich (Fairbanks) also talks about research that fires may be getting worse, and that fire modeling predicts increased fire issues related to climate change.

**The Pilot**: What it is about wildfire behavior that our community needs to know?

**Bird:** Understanding wildfire behavior is essential to knowing how to prepare. This includes the difference between how fires act as ground fires, crown fires, prescribed fires, etc. There are ways to "design" communities to make them easier to protect. The presentations will include some of these designs that are more effective than others.

We also have these recent fires to learn from, so now is the time to assess what happened - what worked and what didn't - so we can be better prepared. On the larger forest scale. Rich wi talk about strategic fuels treatments and how to make them most effective. Also, here on the coast we are vulnerable to wind-driven fires, which act differently from fuels treatments, and is an increased challenge we need to think about.

**The Pilot:** Late fall can still be a dangerous time for wildfires. What's the advice about that danger?

**Bird:** We should still be mindful of fire risk. When we start to get fall rains, often people think less about fire safety. And this is a common time of year for burn piles to escape and get out of control. Even though

Jim F. Blunt Sept. 5, 1944 - Sept. 22, 2019



Jim F. Blunt, passed away on Sun. Sept. 22, 2019 in Portland, Oregon with his wife Donna and daughters Dezi and Sandra by his side. He died from complications following his second cancer surgery in June 2019. Jim was born on Sept. 5,

1944 in Susanville, California to Lois Boling Blunt and Fred Arthur Blunt who divorced when he was two. Jim spent his younger years in Chico, California with his mother and spent his summers in Brookings with his father and stepmother May Blunt. He moved to Brookings permanently when he was 14 and began learning the logging industry with his dad while attending high school. At 16 he began working on a purse seiner in Alaska during the summer, which was the beginning of many years on the ocean.

He married Marvella Murphy of Brookings and during their five years together they had two daughters, Debbie and Dezi. After moving to Springfield he met and married Donna Prociw of Springfield. Six weeks after their marriage he was drafted by the US Army and served his country in Vietnam. Upon his return home he began a drywall business in Brookings and daughter Sandra joined the family. One of his greatest joys during this time was serving as a coach for Pop Warner Football. He eventually returned to commercial fishing and in 1980 he and Donna bought the 75' F/V Ambition and in 1990 the 92' F/V Euroclydon, fishing both vessels from California and Washington. At one time fishing took them to Washington for 13 years, where Jim became involved in the politics of the fishing industry, serving as President of the Washington Drag Fishermen's Association. He

also testified for the industry

before the House Committee and handled negotiations with Fishermen's Marketing Association before returning to Brookings in 1995 when his father Fred died. Jim retired from fishing and took on the business of ranching which he enjoyed until his death.

Jim still enjoyed taking his sport boat out with his friends to catch fresh fish or crab. He loved riding his horse on the ranch with his dogs and having friends come out to help feed cows or to help with round-ups. It wasn't uncommon to see him driving around town with his two border collies in the back of his truck. He was a strong sports enthusiast loving football. baseball and basketball and any other sport if those three weren't available. He was well loved in the recovery community and was always available to anyone who needed help. He had an innate wisdom that seemed to resonate with many people. Jim spent the last few years reading spiritual literature and opening his heart to a closer relationship with our Heavenly Father. He will be missed by many.

Jim was preceded in death by his parents and brother, Jerry Hornbeck of Santa Rosa, California.

He is survived by his wife Donna, passing only four days before their 50th Anniversary. Also surviving are his daughters, Debbie Powell (Mike) of Brookings, Oregon, Dezi Hunt (Charlie) of Springfield, Oregon and Sandra Robinson of Fargo, North Dakota, 8 grandchildren, 11 great-grandchildren, 2 nieces and numerous cousins.

# Vacant port building set for demolition

What has come to be called "the green building." which has been sitting empty on Port of Brookings Harbor property for years, is set to be demolished.

The 22,000-square-foot, two-story building on 2.5 acres at 16320 Lower Harbor Rd. was constructed in May 2003. "The original plan for the green building was for commercial retail on the bottom floor, and offices and a restaurant on the second floor," said port manager Gary Dehlinger.

But those commercial ventures never materialized. The building has been sitting idle for several years, now the target of vandals.

Following the demise of the planned commercial development, discussions by the port and others centered on developing an events center at the building. "The event center idea came in after the building sat for a number of years," Dehlinger said.

put together over the years trying to come up with a plan to finish the building. Nothing ever materialized, for one reason or another."

The port commissioners recently voted to demolish the structure, although the port is still financing it. Dehlinger said the port had received a Special Public Works Fund grant from the State of Oregon for \$672,500 to erect the building. "The port continues to pay this loan," he said, "approximately \$2,000 per month. "This loan, and many

other loans the port had, were restructured under Business Oregon in 2009 and payments will be ending around 2030-31."

Commissioners are taking requests for proposals to demolish the green building, which include three options: demolishing and disposing of all of the building material and slab; demolishing the building to the ground so it would be ready to be loaded into Dumpsters; or

demolishing and disposing of the 10,613 square feet of concrete slab.

Following the demolition, said Dehlinger, the Port Commission does have plans for the site. "The board's direction at this point will be (for) secured outdoor storage for boats and trailers.

"Future plans for the site are still to be determined."

# Anonymous 'Lone Ranger' helps Skeeter

Ruby Roberts said she's eternally grateful to an anonymous donor who helped pay for lifesaving care needed by her dog, Skeeter.

Roberts was introduced to the dog on Oct. 22, 2015 at the Humane Society in Bookings. "When I met him, I didn't think it would be a good match," she said. "I didn't think I would be comfortable carrying him. He was 8 years old and had no

But the Humane Society staff encouraged Roberts to take the small dog into a room and spend a few moments with him. "I still didn't feel there was a match," she said, so Roberts left the Humane Society to go shopping. But something drew her back later that day.

Roberts and Skeeter have

been together since.

About six months ago, Roberts noticed Skeeter had developed a golf-size growth under his left ear. "He was still happy, frisky, ate well and went to the bathroom well," she said. Still, Roberts was concerned.

So, she went to an animal clinic in Brookings for medical advice. In early September, she learned Skeeter had a tumor.

Roberts, a retired barber living on a fixed income, said she couldn't afford the \$670 surgery to have the tumor removed. So she decided to seek public help.

Roberts and Skeeter launched their effort on Sept. 23. "I went down to the entrance of Fred Meyer, where I've seen homeless people holding signs asking for help," she said.

Roberts found a spot on the sidewalk and, with water

and food for Skeeter, held a handmade sign asking for money to help Skeeter. She said a few people stopped to meet her dog and donated for his surgery. A close friend gave \$100.

Than, a stranger ap-

proached Ruby and Skeeter. "He asked where he could go to make a donation," Roberts said. "I told him (the animal clinic), which was holding

we have had some rain, much of the vegetation is still dry from the summer, and we are still experiencing the "summer" drying north winds.

The Pilot: What should residents and business operators be doing now to best prepare for next summer's fire season?

**Bird:** Simple things that everyone can do - like cleaning gutters, sweeping roofs - can make a huge difference for home survival. The presentations will include discussions about developing evacuation routes, and how to start refining wildfire infrastructure, building materials, zoning and building codes. On the large scale, underburning around communities and maintaining fire lines we have already built in the past makes it easier to fend off approaching fire.

**The Pilot:** What is it that you hope attendees take away from these upcoming

community meetings?

**Bird:** Less fear of fire and more confidence in how to prepare for it. Overall, Rich's goal is to help communities become less physically threatened by fire.

# Expo to help with disaster readiness

If a disaster happens, are you ready? Perhaps not - if you don't have everything you need to get by on your own for at least two weeks, said Curry County Emergency Operations Director Jeremy Dumire.

"We've experienced every kind of disaster that can happen in Curry County,' Dumire said. "Fires, floods, flashfloods, hurricanes, landslides and earth flows, sinkholes, tornadoes, earthquakes, tsunamis, even terrorism have all happened

An Emergency Preparedness Expo is scheduled for 9:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Oct. 12 at the Curry County Fairgrounds, 29392 Ellensburg Ave. in Gold Beach.

Curry County Emergency Management will be handing out empty "go bags"

to the first 75 families who enter the event. A variety of vendors and agencies have indicated they'll have preparedness items to add to the bags, such as emergency blankets, basic first-aid kits, pens, whistles and possibly flashlights.

Admission is free.

This year, more than two dozen organizations and vendors will be at the Curry

County Fairgrounds to discuss which systems will be in place and when resources will be available should there be a disaster ... and all of the ways people can and should prepare.

"This will be the big, one-stop event of the year," Dumire said. Six speakers are scheduled to discuss

disaster preparedness in 30to 45-minute presentations beginning at 11 a.m. through 3:30 p.m.

Sheree Ward of Curry Community Public Health will talk about "points of distribution (PODS)." PODS are dedicated, preplanned

locations where residents could find food and medicine if their area is isolated by a major disaster.

Avery Horton is with Southwest Oregon Preppers and will offer a network for people to learn from one another and how to prepare for survival.

Ruth Dixon will present information about the county's Disaster Animal Response Team (DART). She'll describe the group's animal rescue work during the

Chetco Bar Fire, and how pet and livestock owners can prepare for their animals' survival.

Dixon also will have an exhibit at the event for My Youth Preparedness Initiatives (MYPI). Dumire said he's enthusiastic about MYPI, through which young people receive 20 hours of coursework and training covering topics rangine from first aid to preparedness to rescue techniques.

In doing so, said Dumire, younger people become more inclined to join the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) as adults.

volunteers about disaster preparedness and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety,

light search and rescue, team organization and disaster medical operations, according to the ready.gov website. When volunteers are

trained to handle such tasks, professional responders then can focus on more complex assignments during a disaster. CERT will have an exhibit at the Expo. "When I started work here

two years ago, I asked for people to raise their hands if they were CERT volunteers, and it was just six people," Dumire said. "We have 174 people who are trained now."

The National Weather Service of Medford will be on hand for a presentation regarding this winter's weather. Dumire said he believes this winter may be much like last year, which saw major flooding on the

Chetco and Rogue rivers, and Hunter Creek. That, in addition to the slide that took out a section of U.S. Highway 101 between Gold Beach and Brookings.

Frank Burris of the Oregon State University Extension Service will discuss earthquakes and related disasters, from landslides to tsunamis, and their impact on infrastructure.

Josh Stout will introduce Reach Out WorldWide (ROWW), which sends first-responders and other professionals in medical and construction-related fields to assist local experts when natural disasters strike as a way to accelerate relief efforts.

Attendees can learn about using ham radios in a disaster from Port Orford Comms and Pelican Bay Comms. And the Oregon Of-

fice of Emergency Management will demonstrate the Real-Time Assessment and Planning Tool (RAPTOR), a web-mapping application that allows users to display data from various resources onto a single map as events are occurring.

Sol Coast Renewables will offer ways to keep the power on when the grid has gone dark. And there will be representatives from United Way, AllCare Health, David B Allen II - State Farm Agent, the Curry County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue, CERT, American Red Cross, Oregon Office **Emergency Management** GIS and the City of Gold Beach.

Also, the Curry County Road Department, Coos Curry Electric Cooperative, Cal-Ore Life Flight, Curry County Volunteer Fire Departments, the U.S. Forest Service and Coos Forest

The event will have plenty of equipment on hand for kids of all ages to touch and explore. Doggie Style Hotdogs and Nectar of Life will offer food and beverage concessions.

Door prizes and other giveaways, including 50 basic go-bag kits, will round out the event.



the money that was being collected."

As she was loading her van to return home, she called the clinic to check on her donation account there. She was told a recent large donation had been made to pay the entire cost of Skeeter's surgery.

"The clinic told me I had a credit to my account for \$670," she said. "I was extremely grateful.'

Roberts said she believes the donation came from the man she had met outside the store earlier that day.

Roberts give The Pilot the following statement, asking that it be included in the story about Skeeter. In part, her statement reads:

"When I was a lil' girl I would sit on the floor 2-3' from my TV and one of the programs I loved was 'The Lone Ranger.' Always when you thought there's no hope all of a sudden, The Lone Ranger came just in the nick of time... My question is, "who was that masked man?" He will forever be my Lone Ranger."

Town and County Animal Clinic Dr. Jessie Holley said Skeeter's operation was performed Sept. 30. "The tumor was removed and it was a good outcome, but there is a chance that it could return," Holley said. "In many cases, cancer in dogs is not curable.

"Skeeter is such a good dog. We just want to keep him comfortable and we always hope for the best."
