

Commissioners wade into library debate

A resolution on the Curry County Board of Commissioners meeting agenda on Wednesday, July 20, had members of the public showing extreme support and extreme opposition.

The resolution was brought up by Commissioner Court Boice requesting that the five Curry County public libraries take precautionary measures to guard youth from premature exposure to sexual material.

Members of public addressed the commissioners prior to their discussion of the resolution. Some expressed concern that local libraries were giving children access to inappropriate material, labeling it “cartoon pornography,” “perverted garbage,” and an “illustrated sex book.”

Other community members

told county commissioners they should be careful about censorship - and that they were trying to make decisions about something that is not within their control.

“I am strongly opposed to our county government becoming involved with determining the content for our children,” said Gold Beach resident Michelle Arnold. “It’s easy and dangerous to confuse government’s responsibilities to children - and those responsibilities of the parents. They are very separate roles.”

Commissioner Boice later said he received letters from community members telling him to “stay in your lane.”

“Are we just glorified ribbon cutters?” he asked.

Boice said he thought the resolution was a “reasonable

COVID steadies, remains high

COVID-19 may be a distant memory to many, but in Oregon it remains a danger. According to the Oregon Health Authority, 21 counties in the state are in the high-transmission level as the Omicron subvariant BA5 becomes the dominant variant in the state.

Dr. Dean Sidelinger, the state epidemiologist, hosted a press briefing Wednesday. He said case counts have leveled to around 1,400 confirmed cases a day, while test positivity rates have climbed to 13.9%.

"We know our reported cases are not capturing the full picture because many people are taking at-home tests and not reporting the results and many others are not testing," Sidelinger said. "Data in Oregon and the Pacific Northwest region indicates there are high levels of transmissions. On July 19, the CDC indicated 21 counties in Oregon are at the CDC high transmission level, indicating high levels of COVID-19 and increased stress on hospitals."

Sidelinger said the Omicron subvariants BA4 and BA5 account for almost all the transmission in the state, with BA5 becoming the dominant strain

While testing is not accurately tracking COVID due to a lack of reporting, Sidelinger said OHA is continuing to work

with OHSU to do wastewater sampling across the state to get a better picture of COVID in Oregon.

"OHA monitors the spread of the virus from samplings collected through the sewage systems," Sidelinger said. "Wastewater monitoring shows high levels of COVID-19 in our communities statewide."

Another area of concern is increased hospitalizations, Sidelinger said, although cases are nowhere near during the peak of Delta or Omicron.

"The number of hospitalized patients with COVID-19 has risen," Sidelinger said. "Hospitals are stressed across the state due to patients with COVID-19 and other diseases. Since our June 17 update, hospitalizations for COVID 19 have gradually risen for 309 patients reported June 17 to 419 reported today."

During the peak of Delta and Omicron, more than 1,200 patients a day were in the hospital due to COVID.

"While we're projecting there is enough hospital beds available across the state, collective efforts taken by all of us will continue to blunt the spread of COVID-19, and they are important," Sidelinger said.

Those steps included getting vaccinated, wearing masks in crowded facilities indoors and staying home when sick.

On the vaccine front, a new vaccine will soon be available

in Oregon, Sidelinger said. The CDC recently approved the Novavax vaccine for use in the United States. The two-dose vaccine is different than any other currently available for COVID. It is not the MRNA vaccine like Pfizer and Moderna and not the vectra vaccine like Johnson and Johnson. Instead, Novavax uses the traditional system where a portion of the actual virus is used to help the body build up immunity. The technology is used in most vaccines worldwide.

Early testing before Omicron showed in was 90% effective in stopping transmission and 100% effective in preventing severe illness.

Sidelinger said it will be arriving in the state soon.

He also said while vaccines have not stopped all prevention of COVID, they remain the best tool in preventing hospitalizations and deaths.

"I want to thank the nearly 7 in 10 Oregonians who have completed the vaccination series," Sidelinger said. "For those who have not gotten up to date on their vaccines, it is still the best tool."

With summer quickly coming to a close, Sidelinger said masking decisions in schools will likely remain a local decision. He said the OHA recommends a layered strategy with things like increased ventilation also recommended.

"Masking still remains a critically important point," Sidelinger said. "OHA recommends universal masking at a time when the community reaches a high level of spread. For now, we're leaving the requirements of masks to local authorities. I don't anticipate in the fall, a requirement of masks at the state level."

Commissioners work to update dangerous dogs ordinance

Curry County Commissioners are working with local public health and law enforcement officers to update their dangerous animal regulations.

"This is timely and it’s important and we feel like the county has an important role," said Commissioner Court Boice at the board meeting July 20.

The commissioners heard from Dr. Ann Kellogg of Coast Community Health and with Curry County code enforcement Director Melvin Trover. Kellogg has experience with victims of dog bites who have been hospitalized, while Trover has dealt with dangerous dogs and their owners.

"We need to shore up these regulations, not only for the citizens of Curry County but also to protect against the risk of litigation," Kellogg suggested.

Kellogg said she has dealt with victims who know the dogs have bitten other people, but it may or may not have been documented.

"During the last couple months, we have had a rash of animal bites where these dogs are offending more than once - sometimes causing pretty significant injuries," Kellogg said.

The doctor reported that a

Merkley, Wyden: Smith River National Recreation Area expansion into Oregon clears key hurdle

Oregon’s U.S. Senators Jeff Merkley and Ron Wyden recently announced the Smith River National Recreation Area Expansion Act (Smith River NRA), legislation to expand the Smith River NRA, cleared a key hurdle by passing out of a Senate committee on a bipartisan vote. Expanding the Smith River NRA by 58,000 acres into Oregon would protect the diverse ecosystems of the rivers, streams, and adjacent lands of the North Fork Smith River watershed, and help boost the local fishing and recreation industries that many Oregonians rely on.

“When we come together to protect our state’s natural wonders, we can create jobs, protect resources, grow our economy, and make sure future generations of Oregonians can enjoy our incredible public lands,” Merkley said. “Expanding the Smith River National Recreation Area is a commonsense win-win-win for our economy, adventurers across the Northwest, and those dedicated to preserving the ecosystems that make Oregon so special. I’m grateful to all of the local leaders, conservationists, and businesses who have been a part of this process so far, and I look forward to continuing to work together to get this bill signed into law.”

"Our legislation has strong bipartisan support at home, and I'm proud to have to shepherded this important legislation, on which Senator Merkley and I partnered, through the Committee today," Wyden said. "The Smith River watershed is home to an incredibly rich array of life and offers exceptional recreational activities. By expanding the Smith River Recreation Area, this bill will protect our state's natural treasures, generate recreation jobs and invest in our local economies for years to come."

In 1990, Congress enacted legislation to establish the Smith River NRA to protect the watershed, but the boundary stopped at the Oregon border, leaving the North Fork of the Smith River and its tribu-

taries unprotected. The Smith River NRA expansion would permanently withdraw the land from new mining claims, helping to protect this sensitive area from proposed nickel strip mines, and protect 75 miles of scenic rivers, including Baldface Creek, Chrome Creek, and nearby streams. Additionally, the legislation would task the Forest Service with the preparation of an updated recreation plan identifying specific plans for the entire National Recreation Area, and produce a special study of streams, fens, wetlands, and potentially unstable and vulnerable aquatic habitat areas.

The bill complements the Southwestern Oregon Watershed and Salmon Protection Act, which was introduced by the Senators earlier this year to protect the North Fork Smith River watershed and other Southwestern Oregon rivers and streams.

“I thank Senator Merkley and support his efforts and legislation to expand the Smith River National Recreation Area in Oregon’s North Fork of the Smith River watershed,” said David Brock Smith, Oregon House Representative HD 01 (R-Port Orford). “The Smith River is an important watershed in Southern Oregon and Northern California, providing critical salmonid habitat, drinking water and recreational opportunities, and I will continue to be a strong state partner in supporting the Smith River, its tributaries and the watersheds of Southwest Oregon.”

“Expanding the Smith River National Recreation Area and protecting the North Fork lands in Oregon is absolutely the right thing to do,” said Susan Jane Brown, Wildlands Program Director with the Western Environmental Law Center. “I’m grateful for Senator Merkley’s leadership and for the cooperation by many interests to advance this critically important legislation for one of our nation’s most spectacular wild rivers.”

“The Oregon Chapter of Backcountry Hunters and

Anglers continues to stand with the sportsmen and women of Oregon for the protection of the wild lands and waters of the State,” said Justin Gindlesperger, SW Regional Director Oregon Chapter of Backcountry Hunters and Anglers. “The expansion of the Smith River National Recreation Area establishes an essential safeguard to the watershed of the Smith River so future generations can experience a remarkable and truly wild landscape here in Southern Oregon. We appreciate and fully support the effort to protect such a valuable resource.”

“I’ve paddled the North Fork of the Smith in Oregon as well as Baldface Creek and can attest to their distinct values,” said Zach Collier, Owner/Outfitter of Northwest Rafting Company. "We fully support any legislation that promotes the permanent protection of these rivers. The North Fork watershed is uniquely special to the world and should be protected as such."

“The Wild Rivers Coast and rivers like the Smith are legendary among anglers for their steelhead and salmon fisheries,” said Dean Finnerty, NW Regional Director, Angler’s Conservation Project, Trout Unlimited. “This region supports a robust sport fishing economy that is vitally important for many rural communities. Sen. Merkley’s bi-partisan Smith River Recreation Area Additions Act is a sensible and timely way to honor the sporting heritage of this region and to conserve the cold, clean, fish-filled waters that are the hallmark of this part of America.”

“The Smith River deserves complete protection because state lines are arbitrary to a river,” said Will Volpert, Indigo Creek Outfitters. “Oregon is lucky to have a piece of the Smith, as it is truly one of the most majestic and beautiful river systems anywhere. It is a place like no other—with canyon colors beyond vibrant and a terrain that begs to be explored yet is rugged enough to hold most adventurers back. Every time I visit the Smith, it feels like I’m the first person to visit the river canyon in all of history—and that’s a pretty special feeling.”

"Oregon's North Fork Smith watershed is a botanical treasure and should have always been a part of the Smith River National Recreation Area," said Joseph Vaile, Climate Director of the Klamath-Siskiyou Wildlands Center. "We thank Senator Merkley for introducing this legislation that will also designate many of the North Fork Smith River's cold-water tributaries as Wild & Scenic. Anyone who has had a chance



to explore the remote, primitive backcountry of Oregon's North Fork Smith headwaters knows that it is one of the most spectacular rivers in the world."

“The upper reaches of the Smith River watershed provide exceptional and unique opportunities for backcountry recreation,” said Thomas O’Keefe, the Pacific Northwest Stewardship Director for American Whitewater. “We appreciate the leadership of Senator Merkley to expand the Smith River National Recreation Area to include the headwaters in Oregon. The area is characterized by rare hydrologic and botanical resources that the legislation appropriately recognizes. “The expansion of the Smith River National Recreation Area completes a conservation effort initiated over thirty years ago,” said Grant Werschkull, Co-Executive Director for Smith River Alliance.

woman was killed in a dog attack in front of her children in neighboring Coos County last year.

“It’s a very traumatic situation obviously for the people involved and it wasn’t the dogs only aggressive behavior,” Kellogg said.

Dog bites or attacks in Port Orford, Flores Lake and Brookings were also mentioned during the discussion.

“There is a problem where we don’t have a clear structure in the regulations about if the dogs should be taken or what should be done with them,” Kellogg said.

Code Enforcement Director Trover told commissioners updating and clarifying dangerous animal regulations will be

one of his priorities in the coming months.

He said the codes are originally from 1968. Although they seem to be on par with neighboring counties, they do need to be updated, he said.

“To say that the dog is the issue – it is,” Trover said. “But when we do these ordinances, we have to go after the owners. Because with a lot of these dog owners if we take the dog and euthanize it, they are just going to go and get another dog. So when we start updating these ordinances, we have to go after them.”

Commissioner Chris Paasch said he has spoken previously with Trover about getting the codes updated and clarified.

“He is all over getting this worked out. So we want to let the public know we are on top of this,” Paasch said.

compromise to bring this community together.”

““We are going to say this is unacceptable for little kids that may not have parents with them, may not be supervised,” he said. “You look at what we are teaching our kids and what they are telling them, we have to accept. Somebody wants to pretend like he’s a woman and we are supposed to pretend with him? It’s breaking down our system.”

The commissioner read the resolution out loud, saying that while the majority of Curry County citizens appreciate the growing and evolving services the five Curry County libraries provide... they do however “disapprove and have legitimate and growing concerns about inappropriate sexual printed and illustrated material essentially being on display.”

The resolution went on to include several more paragraphs. Fellow commissioners Chris Paasch and John Herzog said they would prefer to adopt only the last paragraph of the resolution, which focused on asking the library that certain books be clearly labeled as sex education and be placed behind the counter.

“My personal feelings are that I don’t agree with a lot of things that are happening,” said Commissioner Paasch. “But we don’t have a right as a board to govern what special districts do and we all know that.”

Herzog said he agreed with the resolution. “I think people here know where I am on my walk with my lord and savior,” he said. “We aren’t asking to burn it, or ban it.”

Boice said he was concerned that only concentrating on the last paragraph of the resolution was sending the wrong message, but he eventually agreed.

That motion made it more of a letter of request than a resolution, said Curry County Treasurer David Barnes.

After Commissioner Boice spoke, Nesika Beach resident Nancy Sue Rose said she had to respond to Boice’s comment. “This is bringing the community together.”

“This is divisive. It is not bringing our community together. It is doing the opposite,” Rose said. “This is outside of your lane, these books are not in the children section. If you have a problem with a book about sex, then any citizen can go to the library and fill out a form for anything they disagree with.”

Although she wasn’t present at the meeting, Chetco Library Director Julie Retherferd said she had been listening online to public comments being made at the board of commissioners meeting.

“County commissioners and city councilors are welcome to put in any opinions they want to, and we will take it into consideration just like we would any member of the community,” Retherford said.

The library is classified as a special district and doesn’t fall under jurisdiction of the county govern-

ment, she said.

““We have a very specific policy and our collection is developed using state and national standards,” Retherford said. “Everything we select is in line with that.”

While Commissioner Boice said he didn’t believe he was asking the library to censor any items, Rutherford said censorship isn’t just about the removal of items.

“It is also about making them less accessible. It seems like a reasonable request on its face. However, there is a selection of books in the junior section for ages 10 and older that has been mentioned - a section of books about puberty. That is important for children to access at a certain age,” she said.

“I don’t believe a child is going to come to the front desk to specifically ask to request to get information to learn about her period. Otherwise she may not get that information at all,” Rutherford added.

There is a lot of depth and nuances to the way a library operates, she said.

The library director pointed out it takes a master’s degree to become a librarian in most public, academic and special libraries, and this is their area of expertise.

“Librarians and library boards are consistently looking at policies and updating them, but we have specific standards and professional ethics that we have to meet including patron confidentiality and access to freedom of information,” Retherferd said.

Opinion: Why Congress Should Leave Abortion to the States

Abortion regulation is an intractable problem mainly because no one knows the true nature of reality. Differing opinions about the existence and nature of God, the human soul, objective morality and other “first principles” lead to irreconcilable opinions about abortion.

If Congress, state legislators and judges want to address abortion now that *Roe v. Wade* has been overturned, they will need to address various difficult questions. The primary question is how the government should balance the rights of a pregnant woman with the rights of the preborn developing in her womb when those rights conflict.

Specifically, given that (1) each human being originates at conception and (2) development in the womb is the first stage of each human being’s life, when does each person first acquire rights under the law, including the right to life? At conception? At birth? At some point in-between? Or at some point after birth?

Three possible scenarios might be true, although some people stubbornly refuse to acknowledge all three:

—If a human being does not acquire rights under the law until birth or some point after birth, then the abortion debate is over. That is, unrestricted abortion should always be legal as long

as it is not forced or does not otherwise violate the rights of a pregnant woman.

—If a human being acquires rights under the law after conception but at some point before birth, then abortion should always be legal before that point. However, how such a point could be determined objectively seems highly problematic. Past proposals, such as so-called viability or the first detection of a heartbeat, have been subjective.

Even if such a point could be determined objectively, the government would still need to determine under what circumstances, if any, a pregnant woman’s rights outweigh the right to life of the preborn. For example, abortion might be legal even after the point at which a preborn acquires rights if the pregnancy threatens the pregnant woman’s life.

—If a human being acquires rights under the law at conception, including the right to life, the government will need to determine if there are any circumstances in which a pregnant woman’s rights would outweigh the right to life of the preborn, such as a threat to the pregnant woman’s life.

Is there any way to objectively establish (1) when a human being first acquires legal rights, including the right to life, and (2) under what circumstances, if any, a pregnant woman’s rights would outweigh the right to life of a preborn? These are the fundamental questions lawmakers and judges must answer to determine whether and under what circumstances abortion should be legal or illegal.

The answers depend on which “first principles” are correct. No one knows, however, which “first principles” are correct. That’s partly why abortion is such a heated and contentious issue because it’s ultimately a debate about which religious beliefs are correct. Abortion, therefore, will remain unresolvable until those “first principles” can be established objectively.

Lawmakers and judges are confronted with an impossible but unavoidable task. Some pregnant women are going to seek abortions. How should the government respond?

With ultimate truth so elusive, perhaps it would be best for Congress to leave abortion regulation to the states. At least that would allow Americans with differing opinions to choose among different options rather than force the entire country to abide by a single law that would be as inherently divisive as it would be inherently subjective.
