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## Gold Beach pays tribute to graduates

Last Friday evening Gold Beach Union High School's Colvin Court was filled to near capacity as the town paid tribute to the Panther Class of

2019.

Green, gold, and black balloons framed the stage as black-robed young men locked arms with green-clad young women holding roses. With mortars firmly in place, the pairs then marched together

towards the podium area.

They were there to celebrate, for sure, but also to pause for a few seconds. To briefly look back at their high school years and to the families that brought them to the space they occupied.

A slide show highlighted the 2019 GBHS senior class from infants up to present day. A treasure trove of images flashed on screens drawing wide grins and laughter from family, friends, and the

## Brookings reaches 95 degrees Monday

After a toasty three days that saw some parts of Del Norte County break triple digits, temperatures are expected to drop on both sides of the state line, though it'll still be sunny and warm, according to the National Weather Service.

Gasquet reached 102 degrees on Monday, prompting weather forecasters to issue a heat advisory for the mountain community and other inland areas on the North Coast, said NWS meteorologist Alex Dodd. Though it wasn't warm enough to shatter the June 11 record of 81 degrees set in 1936, Dodd said he expected 75 degrees at the Del Norte County Airport on Tuesday.

North of the Oregon state line, Brookings reached a high of 95 degrees on Monday due to the Chetco effect, said Brian Nieuwenhuis, a meteorologist from the weather service's Medford office. Calling it a mini version of a Southern California Santa Ana wind event, the Chetco effect occurs when offshore winds bring warm inland air to the coast via the Chetco River gorge, Nieuwenhuis said.

## Paasch cleared of alleged ethics violation

Paasch cleared of alleged ethics violation

The Oregon Government Ethics Commission (OGE) has dismissed an alleged violation against Curry County Commission Chair Christopher Paasch May 31.

Lori Gallo-Stoddard alleged in a complaint to OGE April 12 that Paasch, "might have used his official position in a prohibited manner by including a link to an entity with which he is associated on his Commissioner's Page on the county's website," according to OGE documents.

Gallo-Stoddard's complaint pointed to the Dreams Hope and Faith Foundation, a non-profit 501-C3 as the business.

CROWDS GATHERED LAST SATURDAY AT ELMER BANKUS FIELD to celebrate the graduation of the Bruins class of 2019. Several speeches, songs and copious amounts of silly string later, 117 new Bruins alumni walked off the field into the next chapter of their lives.

The ceremony began as the BHHS class of 2019 walked the track before taking the stage for the flag ceremony. Victoria Muro bore the flag on horseback as the senior choral members sang.

Principal Lisa Dion, Superintendent Sean Gallagher and members of the school presented this year's academic awards after welcoming the crowd.

Dion, began the proceedings by pointing out that the Class of 2019 was the largest group to

graduate from the high school in several years. The majority of graduates will be pursuing higher education, with 58 going on to college or university, and five planning to attend a trade school. Military service was chosen by nine, and 20 will immediately enter the workforce. One will be partaking in a religious mission, and one will transition. Twenty-three remain undecided.

Four students met the requirement for valedictorian this year with tied GPA's and taking several advanced classes. The students are Nathaniel Barnard, Jonathan Kleespies, Mayce McCollum, and Kaylee Strain.

This year's salutatorian was Aynika Nelson, who maintained the next highest GPA and completed several college-level classes. "Just as with the salutatorian, a valedictorian is honored each year for the outstanding academic efforts at achieving the highest cumulative grade point average," said Board Chairman Bruce Raleigh. "In addition, the valedictorian must carry a full course load

of six or more classes, have successfully completed five of the nine identified advanced or college level core classes in mathematics, language arts, social studies, and science." Nelson then proceeded with her salutatorian speech, talking about her family and their line of strong, empowering women she hoped she and others could use as an example moving forward "Always advocate for

yourself and others. Respect other's truths and keep your mind on the present, additionally, always remember, you'll be OK and everything will work out," Nelson said. Strain spoke about the paths that brought them to where they are and the community members they met along the way before. Strain finished her speech by giving a special shout-out to history teacher extraordinaire, Kelly Garvin.

Strain concluded, "Lastly, to my best friend Garvin. Thank you for hands down the greatest academic experience of my life." Giving the audience a good chuckle, she added, "Thank you for getting me through history. I cried...like... a lot. No, really, I mean... like a lot. Like three times a week."

Kleespies also gave a touching tribute to his late grandmother, who passed away from Cancer not too long ago. Kleespies gave thanks to God and offered a meaningful verse, Jeremiah 29:11, to help impart wisdom to his peers. He will be attending George Fox University and will study to become a Nurse.

He thanked those people who have supported him, including family and friends, with a special nod to the Fulton family, who have been long-time personal influences and important figures in his life.

McCollum began with a quote from Nelson Mandela, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world."

McCollum was quick to point out that with knowledge, also comes responsibility.

She thanked friends and family, teachers, and classmates before concluding her speech.

"Classmates — Finally, we can be thankful for each other," McCollum said. "The friendships that we have made here will last a lifetime, and in the same way we have supported each other and helped each other succeed throughout these years in Brookings, I hope we will continue to provide support and encouragement for each other in future endeavors with both the power and knowledge we have just received."

Barnard took a more unusual approach to his Valedictory speech. Instead of offering up sage advice about life to his peers, he thought it might be more beneficial to seek out such wisdom in those he felt more qualified to give it.

"Being that I am the same age as you, and have relatively similar amount of life experience, it felt a bit odd to try to come up with some grand wisdom to share with my peers. So I didn't," he said.

"Last week, I went to Seaview retirement home and spoke for a

while with many of the residents, yearning to glean off of them some grand suggestions about life for today's youth. After my discussions with the residence, I pulled away a wealth of information. In general though, I found that one characteristic played a huge role in the advice they gave me to pass on to you: diligence."

He spoke of what he had gleaned from the elders. The importance of persevering and being self-motivated, for example, and of being kind, hardworking and staying on the right path.

He concluded his speech with a tribute to his very patient, loving parents. His sentiments painted a vivid picture of the wonders/horrors involved with raising a gifted child.

"Lastly, I would like to thank my parents, it has been a long and somewhat rocky journey," he smiled with a sigh.

The ceremony followed up with the Staff Member of the Year presentation, after which, Mickey Fulton introduced the keynote speaker — Dave Carroll, former Azalea Middle School math teacher and longtime announcer for Bruins athletic events. With many a Star Wars reference, Carroll offered words of encouragement to the Class of 2019 while admiring how much they'd grown over the years.

The graduates also took time to honor classmate Edgar Omar Canales, who died in 2017 after a battle with brain cancer. The Senior Seabreeze Choir sang before roll call, as the seniors collected their diplomas.

The seniors then flipped their tassels in unison to become graduates, throwing glitter and hats in the air as they sprayed each other down with cans of silly string and left the stage to meet up with families.

Many Brookings students graduated with more than a diploma this year, earning certifications and college credits from the school's dual credit and career training partnership with various Oregon colleges, such as Southwestern Oregon Community College (SOCC), Oregon Institute of Technology, Southern Oregon University.

In recent years, college-level classes have been added for science, technology, engineering, art, and math (STEM), as well as Career Technical Education (CTE). Classes on traditional college writing, history, and advanced math classes have also been made available.

Madison became temporarily overcome with emotion when thanking "my Nanna," her grandmother who had died prior to being able to see Buffington graduate but for whom she says she "could feel

# Suicide prevention donations sought

Curry County is Number 1. Coos and Del Norte County aren't far behind. We're working to change that.

We need your help. The deadline for donations to place a 16-page, four color "Suicide Awareness and Prevention: Finding Hope" magazine (<https://bit.ly/2yLtjyz>) in newspapers that cover 47 percent of the households in Coos, Curry and Del Norte counties is June 28.

It will take 240 donors each giving \$50 or more to make this happen. To date, 22 donors have stepped forward to "Break the Silence" around suicide: Advanced Health, AllCare Health, Alternative Youth Activities, Boys & Girls Club of SW Oregon, Chetco Activity Center, Coos County, Curry Health Network, Elk Valley Rancheria, Gloria Dei Lutheran Church, OSU Extension, and 12 other individuals.

Suicide, in our rural coastal communities, is at record levels. But

because of the stigma and intensely personal pain that a death from suicide can create, suicide is not often discussed in public. The data show just how widespread a problem this is.

Suicides in the U.S. went up 4.7 percent from 2016 to 2017. Oregon is the 26th largest state, yet our suicide rate is 14th highest in the nation (up 6.4 percent) and suicide is the second leading cause of death for our 10 to 34 year olds (up 8.4 percent). One fifth of those who kill themselves are veterans. Research also indicates that almost half of all suicides happen within 10 minutes of a person's first thought of taking their life. Most others have shown warning signs but because of the stigma about asking or talking about suicide, those signs get missed.

This is changing in many Oregon communities which are coming together to Break the Silence around this public health crisis.

The April 14 Oregonian reported "Something amazing happened last week in Oregon: in coffee shops, at the gym, driving carpools, meeting friends — just about everywhere people gather in Oregon, we have been talking about suicide and suicide prevention. Over 30 news organizations across the state teamed up to shine a light on the public health crisis of suicide. Dozens and dozens of news stories (<https://bit.ly/2MbkQhl>) have appeared on our favorite TV stations, in newspapers big and small, on pod casts and on the radio, each article and broadcast telling stories of hope and of healing and of overcoming the risk and pain of suicide."

It is time to Break the Silence in our communities. Awareness about suicide and suicide prevention can afford every Oregonian the opportunity to save the future of a person who would otherwise be lost. It is our intention to

make this happen by inserting the Finding Hope newspaper insert throughout Coos, Curry and Del Norte counties in early September.

It takes a village to prevent suicide attempts and here are some crucial ways how you can do your part to help raise awareness, reduce the stigma about talking about suicide, and actually learn how to recognize family, friends, and community members who might be at risk.

1. Reach out. At [www.ZeroAttempts.org](http://www.ZeroAttempts.org) we have a lot of information to learn what risk factors and warning signs to look for and what to say and not say. Gain the knowledge and then take steps to help a friend or loved one who is struggling and may feel trapped in their own despair by asking these questions (<https://bit.ly/2XeqdNE>).

2. Help get this publication into 22,000 Coos, Curry and Del Norte county households.

## Take care not to kidnap young wildlife

Put it back. That’s the advice you’re likely to hear if you bring a young wild animal home to “take care of it”—and you might get a warning or citation from Oregon State Police, too.

Oregon’s deer and elk give birth from May through July and many other wildlife species also bear their young at this time of year. It’s natural for mother animals to leave their young alone for extended periods of time while they go off to feed, so never assume a young animal is orphaned when you see it alone. The mother will return when it’s safe to do so—when people, pets or predators aren’t around.

Unfortunately, every year around this time, ODFW offices, licensed wildlife rehabilitators and even Oregon State Police are flooded with calls from people who picked up a deer fawn, elk calf, fledgling bird learning to fly, or other young animals they assumed was orphaned because it was alone.

Animals taken away from their natural environment miss the chance to learn important survival skills from their parents like where to feed, what to eat, how to behave as part of a group and how to escape from predators. Usually, this leads to a shortened life span for the animal.

Removing or capturing an animal from the wild is a violation of state law (OAR 635-044-0440 “Wildlife may not be captured from the wild and/or held...”) Doing so is considered a Class A Misdemeanor and a court could impose a maximum fine of \$6,250 fine and/or one year in jail. Last year, Oregon State Police issued several warnings and at least one No Wildlife Holding Permit citation to people who had picked up deer fawns, baby raccoons, coyote pups and other young animals and brought them home.

If you are certain a young animal is orphaned because you saw its mother die, or if you see an injured animal or one in distress, call one of Oregon’s licensed wildlife rehabilitators. Wildlife rehabilitators have the training and facilities to properly care for young wildlife and eventually return them to the wild. You can also call your nearest ODFW office during regular business hours, or Oregon State Police dispatch if an animal is in distress.

Follow these tips if you encounter young animals in the wild: Deer, elk and other mammals: Never assume an animal is orphaned. Don’t remove it from the forest, including your backyard. Female deer and elk and other mammals will often leave their young temporarily for safety reasons or to feed elsewhere. They will return when it is safe to do so (when people, dogs, or predators are not present).

Call your local ODFW office, Oregon State Police office, or a local licensed wildlife rehabilitation center when: 1) you see an animal that you know is orphaned because you observed the dead parent animal, or 2) the parent hasn’t returned for several hours or even up to a day, or 3) if the animal is clearly injured or in distress. Bunnies are rarely orphaned; mother rabbits only visit den sites at dusk and dawn to feed their young. Keep your dog or cat away from young wildlife, especially in the spring. Young marine mammals are also rarely orphaned and it is common to see them alone on the beach in early spring and summer. Marine mammals in distress should be reported to OSP’s hotline at 1-800-452-7888.

**Birds:** Leave fledgling birds alone. It is natural for fledgling (mostly feathered) birds to be awkward while learning how to fly. If you see one on the ground, leave it alone and keep your distance. Bring your pets under control and indoors if possible. The mother bird will feed it for several days on the ground until it “gets its wings.”

Return nestling birds to the nest. Nestlings (baby birds not fully feathered) found on the ground can be gently and quickly returned to the nest. If the nest is out of reach, place the bird on an elevated branch or fence, or in a nest made from a small box, out of the reach of children and pets. Leave the area so the parent birds can return. Bring your pets indoors. Cats are a major cause of injury and death for all birds, killing millions of birds in the US annually. Keep your pets away from fledgling birds learning to fly. Be careful when pruning trees as there may be a birds nest in the branch. Wait until birds are out of the nest. Beware of cavity nesters. Barn owls and other birds could be nesting in hollowed-out trees or logs and

indoors. Cats are a major cause of injury and death for all birds, killing millions of birds in the US annually. Keep your pets away from fledgling birds learning to fly. Be careful when pruning trees as there may be a birds nest in the branch. Wait until birds are out of the nest. Beware of cavity nesters. Barn owls and other birds could be nesting in hollowed-out trees or logs and

in haystacks. What if a bird flies into a window and appears hurt? Birds can be confused by reflective surfaces and mistakenly fly into windows. If you find a bird that has been stunned as a result of a window strike, put the bird in an uncovered box with a towel on the bottom. Keep it in a quiet place away from pets and check back in a couple of hours. If the bird has recovered, it will

have flown off. If not, contact a local ODFW office or your local wildlife rehabilitator. Let turtles cross the road. In May and June, females begin searching for suitable nesting grounds to lay their eggs. If you see a turtle on the ground, the best thing to do is leave it alone and let it continue on its path. It’s fine to move it off a road (if it is safe for you to do so,) but put it on the other side, where it was headed.

# Construction begins on Head Start

Adroit construction began work recently on the Brookings Head Start site on Redwood Spur. Oregon Coast Community Action (ORCCA) Development Director Sara Stephens said the county had been awarded a \$1.6 million Community Development Block Grant earmarked for renovations and remodeling at the Brookings site.

ORCCA manages South Coast Head Start and the Brookings location.

Gold Beach and Brookings Head Start Area Manager Dar Smith said she was happy things were finally moving forward. She said Brookings Head Start was currently housed in the old medical building at 585 Fifth Street.

“I moved back (to Curry County) in 2012,” she said, “and renovations (for the new facility) were in the discussion-stage back then.”

When completed,

the new location will offer two classrooms, one half-time and the other extended or full-day, according to Smith. She said the changes will also allow the Early Head Start program to be based on-site. The program is currently home-based and serves children from birth to three years old.

The home-based service includes weekly 1.5 hour home visits and two family group visits per month.

Smith and Stephens said the new facility will serve 50 children and offer the city a beautiful early-learning center by design instead of a center where staff must adapt to ongoing shortcomings.

Stephens noted, however, that a series of technical disputes and environmental issues had delayed the project and caused changes in the scope of the work to be completed.

A recent fundraising letter written by ORCCA executive Director Mike Lehman and Child and Fam-

ily Services Director Wendi Baird said the grant was approved in 2012, but technical disputes with federal regulatory agencies resulted in extra costs and forced reductions in the project.

“The biggest dispute was that the original design increased the amount of room the building had,” Lehman said. “As a result, we had to be able to ac-

count for the water runoff of the new roof and we encountered piles of state and federal compliance issues we had to meet because we were using federal dollars for the project. We eliminated the extra roof and stayed within the original roof and thereby eliminated the federal requirements.”

The Curry County Board of Commis-

sioners approved the contract for remodeling and improvements at its meeting May 8. The decision was continued from an earlier meeting because the original low bid — by Adroit — exceeded the budget for the work.

County staff negotiated a contract within the budget by reducing costs by \$128,139. The most significant reduction, according to the county and the ORCCA letter, was the elimination of site work to make the playground level and larger.

“Although this seems like a ‘nice to’ and not a ‘need to,’ for Head Start, it is a priority to have a quality playground environment that supports children’s ability to experience a variety of gross motor experiences,” the letter said. “As a result, we must raise \$60,000 to complete the project to the level we had planned.”

ORCCA has raised \$13,000 from the community toward expanding the project back to its original plan, according to

ORCCA officials. They said the project is a result of a partnership including Southwestern Oregon Community College (SWOCC), Curry County and ORCCA.

According to its website, South Coast Head Start is a comprehensive early childhood program serving children and pregnant women at no cost along the southern Oregon coast. The program provides a researched-based curriculum; free and healthy meals; inclusive services for children with disabilities; child development, nutrition, and health screening with follow-up support.

Temperatures in Brookings reached a high of 92 degrees on Sunday, a huge change from Saturday when highs were 76 degrees, Nieuwenhuis said. Much of Curry County experienced highs in the 80s and 90s on Monday. Agness up the Rogue River reached 97, Nieuwenhuis said. Gold Beach reached the upper 80s, he said. And a small fire station at about 3,000 feet in Flynn Prairie, just east of Gold Beach reached 91 degrees, Nieuwenhuis said.

“Today is going to be warm, but it won’t be as warm as yesterday,” he said Tuesday, adding that he expects the winds will change, allowing the marine layer to resume its influence on the coast. “By tomorrow it’ll be warm, but it will be back towards a normal temperature reading.”

A ridge of high pressure brought warm weather to much of Northern California during the last few days, Dodd said. At San Francisco International Airport, temperatures reached 100 degrees, cracking that area’s monthly record, he said. Closer to home temperatures surpassed triple digits in Hoopa, Orleans, Weaverville and Ukiah, Dodd said.

Dodd said the ridge of high pressure has come on a bit stronger than normal for this time of year and is keeping the normal sea breeze on the coast lighter at bay.

“Once that high pressure system moved in it kind of effectively trapped all the relatively drier air down at the surface,” he said. “That hadn’t allowed any low clouds or fog to re-develop and allowed those typically hotter inland temperatures to expand

a little bit more than they normally would back toward the coast. It’s prompted some excessive heat warnings in the Central Valley with triple digit readings there, which is not unheard of, but it’s the first real heat wave of the season.”

In Gasquet, Hoopa, Willow Creek and other inland areas and for parts of Southern Humboldt the heat advisory that was in place through 7 p.m. Tuesday cautioned residents to “slow it down” and drink more water if they’re going to spend an extended period of time outdoors, Dodd said. He also reminded people to make sure not to leave pets, youngsters and the elderly in the car even if temperatures are in the 70s.

“It doesn’t take much,” he said. “The

car will just bake.”

Temperatures will cool off slightly to about the mid-60s on the coast and in the low 90s for Gasquet as Del Norte County heads into Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Dodd said. However, it will still be sunny and warm through the weekend.

“We should start to see more of your typical fog and low clouds and highs will only reach the low 60s at best from the Thursday-Friday timeframe,” Dodd said Tuesday. “We should see some afternoon sun and we may see a little bit more sunshine this weekend with another north wind picking up.”

Since the recent heat wave started, more than 1,110 firefighters in Yolo County are battling a 2,220 acre wildfire that started

Saturday, Newsweek reported Tuesday. The wildfire, which was 50 percent contained as of Tuesday, forced more than 130 people to leave their homes, though mandatory evacuation orders were lifted on Monday, according to Newsweek.com.

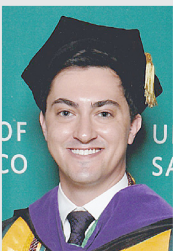

From a broken teddy

success, other California correctional facilities are exploring ways they set up inmate podcasts, Critz said. He noted that many Pelican Bay inmates are involved in some type of “program,” whether its Arts in Corrections or audio journalism or pursuing their GED.

During his first few classes, Critz said he talked about motivations with his students. The goal, he said, is to make those stories public.

“One of the stipulations I had is I wanted to reserve the right to broadcast anything on KFUG,” Critz said. “I think that hasn’t been hammered out.... A big slice of the Del Norte population lives in Pelican Bay and I don’t think a lot of people understand what their life is like. It’s another angle of our local story.”

Unit, according to a press release from DNACA.

According to McNeil, in addition to expanding into the SHU, the Arts in Corrections program is also incorporating a new audio journalism class this year, collaborating with Paul Critz, who operates KFUG radio.

Critz said he started teaching inmates in the prison’s A and B yards in mid-April. His goal and his students’ goal is to start a podcast similar to a popular program through San Quentin State Prison called Ear Hustle. Currently in its third season, Ear Hustle is generated by inmates and chronicles their lives, Critz said.

“It’s really really popular,” Critz said. “It’s been on national TV and in the news.”

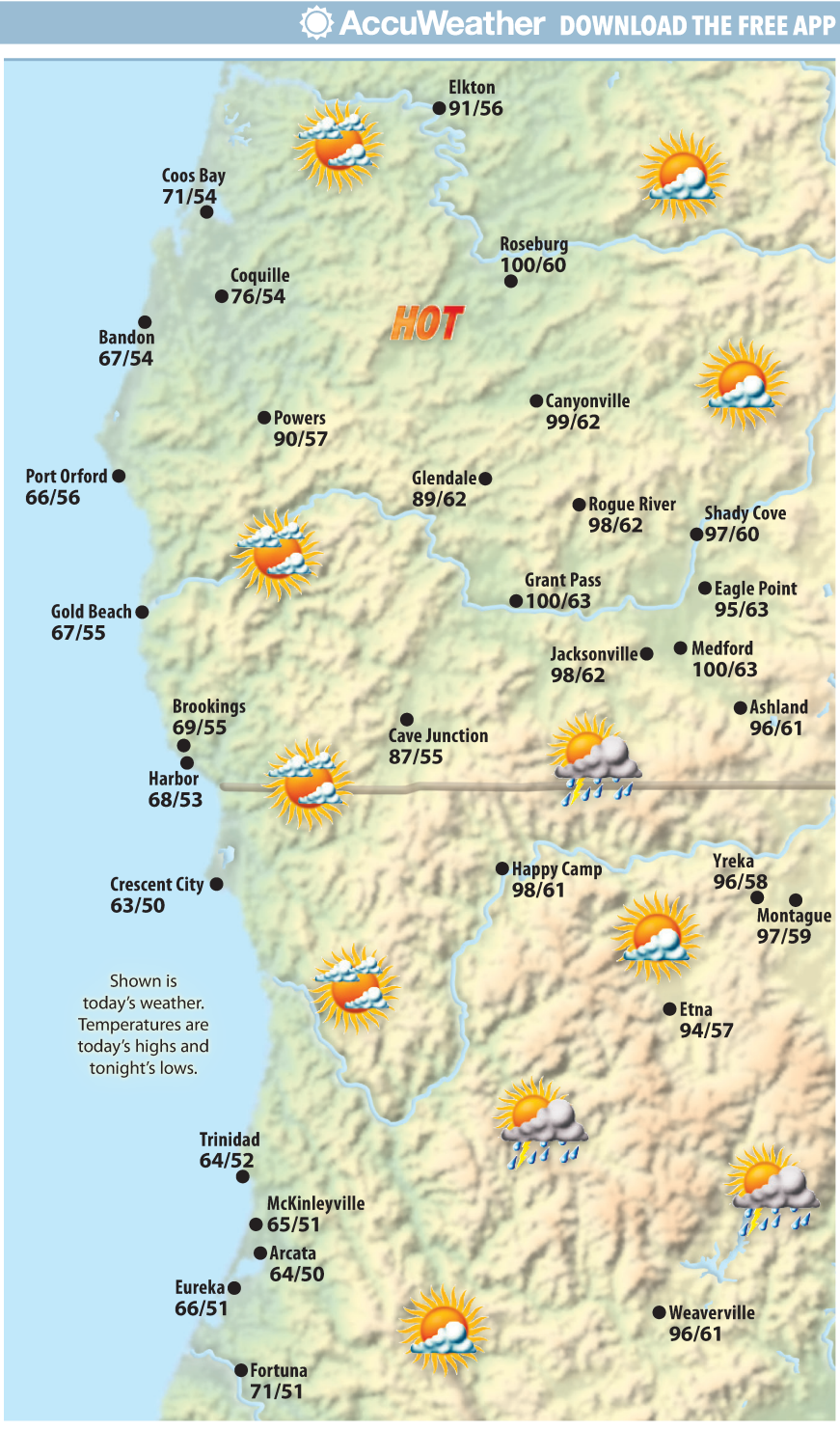

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

“There is little friendship in the world, and least of all between equals.”

This week we are addressing the thorny problem of Restricted Choice in bridge. This dictum says that if (and only if) a player had a choice of equal cards to play, then the probability that he had one of those cards singleton should be compared to half the probability that he had both of those cards — because with the doubleton, he might have played the other card. Granted, this does assume that he was equally likely to play the queen or jack from queen-jack doubleton, but unless you know to the contrary, you should indeed assume that.

A deal may make the point more clearly than words. Declaring four hearts, you win the diamond lead for fear of a club shift, after which the defenders might maneuver a ruff. You cash the heart ace, dropping the 10 from East. Should you now lead a heart to the nine or to the queen?

As indicated above, it is correct to play East for the doubleton K-10 rather than for the J-10 doubleton. That is because, with the former holding, he had no choice but to play the 10 at his first turn, whereas with the J-10 doubleton he might have played either of those cards. Thus, one should not compare the initial probabilities of each doubleton holding, which are equally likely, but instead assume that the K-10 is twice as likely as J-10 doubleton.

How does that relate to the Montv Hall problem? We will find

# MOMENTS IN TIME

\* On June 30, 1859, Emile Blondin becomes the first daredevil to walk across Niagara Falls on a tightrope. The feat was witnessed by some 5,000 spectators. Blondin wore pink tights and a yellow tunic, and carried a balancing pole.

## Help Shaggy Dog Beat Summer Heat

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I recently adopted a big, shaggy mutt named "Dover." I'm pretty new to owning a dog, and I wonder if his thick fur coat will bother him here in the South. What can I do to make sure he's comfortable? -- Gerry in Macon, Georgia

DEAR GERRY: First off, congratulations on your new family member! It sounds like you're already doting on Dover.

Talk to Dover's veterinarian about how he should be groomed for summer. Some long-haired dogs do very well in the summer if they're regularly groomed, their fur is

brushed out and trimmed a bit, and they don't spend a long time outdoors in the heat. Other dogs suffer in their long coats -- they have trouble cooling off, and their skin can get very irritated. I've met more than a few that have their fur shaved very short during the warm months.

A couple of other important notes for summertime dog care: Never leave a dog (or any pet) inside of a car, even for a few minutes, even with the window open a couple of inches. Car interiors can quickly become far too hot for pets and overwhelm their ability to cool off. (Remember, dogs don't sweat like we do to cool off.)

Also, be careful walking your dog on a sidewalk or street in the heat. The pavement can easily burn the treads of their paws, causing pain and sometimes an infection. Opt for a dog-friendly park with lots of green grass instead. Or, put booties on your dog's paws to protect them from burns.
