# Fire chief quits under pressure

Robert Larson has submitted his resignation as Harbor **Rural Fire Protection District** chief effective Aug. 31. At the same time, Larson reportedly has filed an intent to sue

### the district.

In court documents reviewed by The Pilot, Larson stated in a letter addressed to the Harbor rural fire district's board chairman, Sam Alaimo:

"The current makeup of the HRFPD Board, with its two new board members, has unfairly

undermined my authority and my effectiveness to do my job as Harbor Fire Chief. At this time. I believe that the health and safety of the Harbor Fire District's residents is at risk. Therefore, I am tendering my resignation effective August 31, 2019."

Larson's resignation follows on

the heels of a petition submitted earlier this month to the district board, signed by all but one of the active volunteer firefighters, which indicated no confidence in his ability as chief.

That petition was presented prior to the fire district's Aug. 14 board meeting.

The board is scheduled to meet again at 7 p.m. Sept. 11.

The Pilot requested a statement from the Harbor fire board regarding Larson's resignation and his pending lawsuit. No response had been received as of press time.

# LOCAL ROASTERS The latest from a trio of coffee purveyors



Chetco Coffee in Brookings began as an experiment

in July 2013 when Todd Pearson wanted to try roasting his own coffee beans. He put together a roaster he made out of a steel pot, spoons he used for blades, and a small motor to power those blades. Then he created a stand for his heat gun, which added the heat necessary to roast the beans while they turned.

Pearson successfully roasted about one pound of beans at a time. He was so excited, he told his coworkers and friends about it, and soon was roasting coffee to share with them.

"In August 2013, we decided to make our little coffee roasting experiment a business, since word of mouth was keeping Todd very busy," said co-owner Kathleen Pearson.


Not long after, demand was getting to be more than Todd Pearson could manage by using his one-pound bean-roasting method. So he constructed a rotisseriestyle roasting method using a barbecue and a steel perforated drum that rotated over the heat, again propelled by a small motor.

This method served him for several years, although he now has an official hot-air coffee roaster.


Pearson roasts in small, 3-pound batches to maintain consistent quality, on average roasting about 50 pounds of coffee a week.

"We typically roast to order, which means our coffee

School's head football coach was in a good mood Thursday.

For the last two months, Kevin Swift hadn't had much to smile about. The number of athletes who had said they'd come out for the varsity team had dwindled from 20 in May to just five by July. It appeared the Panthers would not be able to field a football team for the first time in school history.

Then, when all seemed lost, things got much better. Swift had spent a week

ringing up Division 1A high schools in a last-ditch effort to arrange for six games of eightman football. But that was an exercise in futility, which resulted in one lone game. Everyone had booked their opponents long ago.

Then, smiled Swift, "A miracle happened." One by one, the Gold Beach players who earlier had expressed interest all said they'd come back.

"I want to thank The Pilot

for bringing awareness to our plight," Swift said. "I think it helped." He said the timing of a front-page story that appeared in the region's newspaper seemed to motivate the town and the students.

"I said to (the students), 'Do you want to be the first class not to have football here?"

Swift's challenge resonated.

Ultimately, 22 players showed up to play. Addressing them in the high school's weight room, the long-time coach didn't cut them any slack. "Where's my winless baseball players?" asked Swift, who doubles as the school's athletic director.

A few hesitant hands went up.

# Sheriff adds new K9 units

"We are going to literately take a bite out of crime," said Curry County Sheriff John Ward, as he outlined the effectiveness of his office's two new K9 officers.

"The K9 program is a benefit not only to law enforcement and our agency in handling calls in the community, but it is an officersafety element," he said. "These dogs are tools for the officers."

Deputy Joshua Teter handles K9 Axel. The dog is a breed of Belgian Shepard known as a Belgian Malinois, Teter received the dog June 15, following its \$11,500 purchase by the Curry County Sheriff's Office from a company that trains K9s.

Teter has been conducting what officials call critical bonding with the K9 since June. "He just went everywhere with me," Teter said. "For the first couple of weeks, he didn't leave my side. He sat with me on the couch and was always giving me hugs and love."

Teter said he feels confident Axel will be an effective law-enforcement officer by helping deputies with enhanced responses to crimes.

Meantime, Deputy David Vershall is the handler for Stryker, a black Labrador, which will concentrate on narcotic investigations and search and rescues, a critical component, according to Curry County Sheriff's Reserve Officer and K9 Unit Supervisor Brad Alcorn.

"If we have a tsunami, a flood, or a building collapsed

and we have a situation where we are waiting for other resources and rescue components coming from outside the area, we now have a resource to put ahead of that," Alcorn said.

"And waiting for other resources for hours could mean lives," Vershall said. "Stryker has the ability to go out immediately and locate people who are alive, trapped or hidden in rubble, the woods, or wherever the incident might be. We can start saving lives, instead of waiting for someone else to come help us."

Ward said Vershall was hired more than a year ago as a Curry County sheriff's deputy at a time when the office did not have a K9 program. "Once I decided to start a program, Deputy Vershall approached me about a dog (Stryker) that he used to work with that was FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) trained in search and rescue," Ward said.

"Deputy Vershall said he would purchase the dog if he could work with him. I figured it was a win-win situation and good for our K-9 program, so I agreed. Deputy Vershall purchased Stryker and we had him trained in narcotics detection."

A key advantage of the K9s, said Vershall, is their much stronger sense of smell. "These dogs are able to smell minute amounts of the odors that they are trained to smell," Vershall said. "That is something that we could never do and there isn't any equipment that is made right now that is as effective as the

dog's nose."

He said K9 Stryker will also be a critical help in easing the serious drug problem in Curry County.

Alcorn said the flow of illegal drugs into and out of the county is directly related to many of the local crimes. "There is clearly evidence between criminal behavior and drug trafficking," he said. "Now, we have a resource in place that can have a direct impact on narcotics trafficking and that is huge to other crimes, such as property crimes, violent crimes.

"So, as the K9 units bear down on the drug trafficking, other crimes will be solved and that will result in more criminal-suspect arrests.

He said the K9s also will be used to assist the U.S. Coast Guard in apprehending illegal drug shipments at Curry County ports.

Both the dogs and the handlers have received certification training. The K9s are called dual-purpose dogs. Axel is not only trained to find narcotics, but also trained as a protection dog, which Ward and Alcorn said gives deputies an added layer of protection.

"He can do captures," Ward said, "he can be used as a use of force to protect officers. If someone is resisting officers and not complying after being told to do so, Ward said, the K9 can be used to subdue the suspect.

Alcorn said Curry County is geographically challenged, making it dangerous for deputies during investigations. "We have officers in isolated areas and remote areas who may be waiting for backup,

which could be up to an hour, so now we have a resource in place that is a layer of protection to the primary deputy and to the other deputies," Alcorn said.

"And we have a tool that will go in and search and tell the deputies where that suspect is hiding, so he can't ambush them."

Acorn said that once the suspect is located by the K9, deputies can pull the dog back and give directions and commands to the suspect to demand compliance. "It is in a much more controlled manner," he said. "The police dog will likely reduce the need to use deadly force." Ward estimated the cost of the K9 project to be \$35,000 to \$40,000, which includes the special equipment needed for the dogs and the vehicles they ride in, such as bite suits and cages.

"The county preloaded \$50,000 for us to get started sooner than what I expected we would," he said. "We were going to try to fund this program through donations, and once the dogs are started we would get some asset forfeitures in drug cases and things, plus the funding from donations.

"I don't think we will use the commissioners' \$50,000. By the time this year is over, I suspect that the program will be paying for itself."


Ward credits Brookings businessman Dick Wilson for donating \$14,000 to the K9 program. "They are worth every penny," Wilson said. "They are worth two cops, if they use them right."

Ward said he'll closely monitor the K9 unit this year. "I would like to get two more dogs for this program," he said, "because it comes back to officer safety. And it is going to help with our fight against drugs and crime in our county."

Previously, he was principal of two high schools in Colorado from 2013-2018.


From 2010-2013, he was an assistant high school principal, and from 2000-2010 the director of alternative education, both positions in Nebraska. Eberhardt's undergradu-

targeted players.

is always very fresh," he said. "It does not sit around in bags on a shelf for months.

"We use top-quality bags with one-way valves, which allow the coffee gas to escape but no air to come in."

Chetco offers customized roasting and custom blends for its customers, in a variety of coffee bags that range from 5 pounds down to 2 ounces.

And they guarantee the freshness of their coffee. "Our goal is to deliver an excellent-quality product with the best customer service," said Kathleen Pearson.

Chetco Coffee buys organic, Fair Trade, green coffee beans in 150-pound burlap bags.

"We pride ourselves on having top-quality Arabica coffee beans, which are mountain-grown and handpicked," said Pearson. "We buy from companies that offer their workers fair wages."

Chetco Coffee does not have its own storefront, although customers can find the company's whole coffee beans or ground coffee in a variety of locations.

And customers can call the company directly to get coffee, and to place custom orders for local delivery or to have it shipped. Or they can use the website to place orders.

Chetco's fresh-roasted coffee is served at the Farmer's Market, Bell &

are getting paid a fair wage. The Jennings use a custom-made roaster that's technically a drum roaster but has sophisticated air controls that make it similar to an air roaster.

"The roaster can do about 200 pounds an hour, but we don't do that much right now," Martin Jennings said. In summer, they are roasting 300 to 350 pounds per week, whereas in winter they might roast up to 1,000 pounds a week. "We have a lot of reserve capacity," he noted.

The roaster allows Jennings to precisely control the heat and roasting process for both the lighter and darker roasts. (Lighter roasts are "bright and sweet," because he runs more air in the roasting process.)

Green coffee beans are hard like rocks, and relatively tiny, when they arrive in giant gunnysacks to the facility adjacent to the Jennings' home.

The beans go through two processes during roasting. The "first crack" is when the water vapor comes out of the coffee and starts to break down the cell walls. The "second crack" is when the roasting process begins breaking down the organic acids.

"Our French roast is about as done as coffee can get." Martin said. "The beans actually double in size during a French roast."

Nectar of Life fresh-roasts all of its coffees as they are

ordered. Local customers generally receive their coffee within two to three days of roasting.

"After you roast coffee, it puts off carbon dioxide for 10 to 12 hours," Martin Jennings said. They immediately package the coffee in bags that have one-way de-gassing valves, to keep the coffee fresh for up to six months

"First Rise Bakery in Brookings uses our coffee in their store," Hannah Jen-nings said. "OxenFrē uses it, too, and at the table does fresh grinding. Semi-Aquatic art studio carries our lighterroasted coffees and often serves the coffee during the 'Art Walk.' McKay's Market sells our coffee in Gold Beach."

Nectar of Life also is available on the company's website. If you use the coupon code "Curry25," you can receive a locals-only discount of 25% for your first two orders of coffee from the website.

# Wild Rivers Coffee

In Crescent City, Wild Rivers Coffee is a smallbatch roaster dedicated to using only organic, Fair Trade coffee.


Norris Harper, Jr. became interested in roasting coffee in 2012. "I was looking for a new business venture, and all the research I did made me believe that coffee roasting was the next big thing," Harper said.

In August 2013, he joined a week-long class in Idaho where he learned the basics of roasting, how to create a flavor profile so he could duplicate the roasts, and the different stages of the roast that can be used to manipulate the flavor of the coffee bean. The class was offered by Stephen Diedrich at his Diedrich Roasters manufacturing facility near Sandpoint.

Harper opened Wild Rivers Coffee in June 2015 and began selling at the Crescent City farmers markets. His coffee is available in Crescent City at Wild Rivers Market, The Mail Room, Del Norte Office Supply and the Rumiano Cheese Store.

Enotica, Mystic Bean and Java Hut Express in Wal-Mart serve his coffee.

"As far as I know, I'm the only roaster in the region that roasts coffee on a fluid-bed



roaster," Harper said. "My coffee is suspended on hot air and roasted very similarly to the way a hot-air popcorn popper works.

"This process blows any smoke, chaff and soot out of the roaster and away from the coffee bean, which produces a very clean cup of coffee without the smoky or burnt flavors typically associated with coffee."

Wild Rivers roasts coffee to order, usually producing from 15 to 30 pounds per

week. Harper said he has the capacity to roast 100 pounds of coffee per day using his commercial roaster. "I have plenty of room to grow," he said.

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Whistle Coffee House, Vista Pub Restaurant, Black Trumpet Bistro, Ambiance by the Sea and at the Coffee Cave at Brookings-Harbor High School (if you're a student or teacher at the school).

'We've kept our prices low, despite the rising cost of freight and product, because our desire is to bring an excellent product to Brookings without breaking our community members' pocketbooks," said Kathleen Pearson.

# **Nectar of Life Coffee**

Martin and Hannah Jennings founded Nectar of Life Coffee Co. in January 2003 in Sandpoint, Idaho, starting part-time with a small Diedrich Roaster. They moved their business to Pistol River in 2018.

They said they roast only the finest gourmet Arabica coffees, and only coffees that are certified as both organic and Fair Trade.

Using certified, organic and Fair Trade coffees is important to the Jennings, who go to great lengths to maintain the proper certifications.

"They use a lot of pesticides in conventionally grown coffee," Martin Jen-nings said. "It's really bad for us, bad for the environment and bad for the farmers. I personally wouldn't drink coffee that isn't organic."

Nectar of Life deals only with Fairtrade Labelling Organizations International (FLO) Certified Fair Trade coffees. FLO represents only small family farms, not estate-grown coffees, said Jennings. By joining co-ops, small farmers don't fall prey to "coyotes" who would buy the coffee cheaply and send it out to be roasted.


The co-ops have their own mills, he said, so they can get more money for their coffee because they can bypass the middlemen. With estategrown coffees, there is no guarantee that the workers

# **Rebuttal to** climate change letter needed

The third false statement is that we are betting our grandkids' future on climate change. The truth is, the "New Green Deal" proposed by Congresswoman Ocasio-Cortez is projected to have a cost of \$93 trillion and would bankrupt the U.S.

The fourth false statement is that global warming is not a partisan issue. The "Green New Deal" is not just a climate-change proposal; it is a forced reinvention of society. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez is a Democratic socialist who rejects capitalism.

The Democratic Party has

been taken over by extreme socialists, who are expected to do poorly in the 2020 general election.

# Climate change makes sense economically

# Dear Editor:

"Climate change certainly isn't 'false news"" (Aug 17) offers plenty of sciencebased proof of that. I'd like to focus on the economics of our situation. Polls consistently show Americans overwhelmingly support our government doing something big about climate change. They just don't want to pay for it.

Now they don't have to. Solar and wind power now cost less than any fossil fuel and their prices drop substantially every year. Battery prices, too (forbes. com, lazard.com). If we scale them up nationally, they'll be "effectively free" by 2030 (Financial Times, UBS, Aug 2018).

What's keeping that from happening? Corporate greed and political corruption. This country's biggest fossil fuel corporations give members of Congress tens of millions annually (opensecrets.org). In return, those members of Congress give fossil fuels tens of billions annually in totally unnecessary subsidies (oilchangeinternational.org), they deny climate science, and they block clean energy.

What we, the taxpayers and consumers, get is carbon pollution that kills over 200,000 Americans annually (MIT.edu) and costs us over \$800 billion annually (forbes.com). And climate change disasters that have cost American taxpayers over \$1.6 trillion so far, and are now regularly costing us hundreds of billions annually as global warming accelerates (NOAA.gov).

Without massive greenhouse gas emissions cuts

starting now, future climate disasters will cost the U.S. economy over \$160 trillion (Forbes, April 2019). Just a half-degree increase in global temperatures will cost the U.S. \$13 trillion, and we're already locked into at least a 1.5C increase and heading for a 3C to 4C increase (National Academy of Sciences). A report in the Washington

Post this month shows that global temperatures in areas of the U.S. have already reached average increases of 2C. That's 80 years ahead of projections (NOAA.gov).

So, fossil fuels costing us trillions while literally killing us, versus clean energy that will be "essentially free" within a decade.

Add to that a new version of the "Green New Deal's" energy plan that shows it will more than pay for itself, with two-thirds of the cost being paid by private enterprise (vox.com May 18, 2019).

Studies also show that a clean-energy economy will add \$500 billion annually to U.S. GDP (IPCC) and create over 8 million high-wage, local, permanent (40-year) careers in the U.S. - over 35,000 of them in Oregon (Stanford University's solutionsproject.org, Google "50 states, 50 plans").

It's important we all make what individual changes in our lives we can to fight climate change. But the international scientific community has made it very clear that these actions will be virtually meaningless unless we also get at least close to net-zero emissions by 2030 (IPCC).

That's why the most important thing any of us can do is to work to get a president and a Congress elected in 2020 that will get "Green New Deal"-scale emissions cuts started in January 2021. We're already way behind schedule.



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# Teachers rally to resume negotiations

Members of the Brookings-Harbor Education Association joined more than 200 teachers from California at the Del Norte Unified School District Board meeting on Aug. 22 to make a unified, emotional plea to resume contact negotiations.

Brookings Harbor Education Association President Dane Tippman lead the support for the Del Norte Teachers Association from north of the border.

"I'm a proud product of Smith River Elementary School, and 2005 DNHS grad," he said. "I brought a couple of people with me because we heard our brothers and sisters could possibly use our support. My message for you five people today, in addition to the messages that you have heard and will continue to hear, is that this is something that you can fix. You have the power to make a change here.

Wearing red t-shirts with the message, #RedforEd, speaker after speaker shared personal stories of why they became educators and that they deserved more from the district for their efforts.

After six months of negotiations and seven meetings, the Del Norte Unified School District remains at a one percent increase to the salary schedule. Del Norte Teachers Association members feel their negotiators meanwhile have tried to compromise several times to no avail, leading to both sides to agree to an impasse June 28.

Patsy Shelton, 7th grade english teacher at Crescent Elk Middle School, said her 22-year-old son Wyatt is an entry level firefighter for CalFire (California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection) working seasonal and he will make more money than she does this year.

"When I told him what I was doing this afternoon, he told me, 'Mom, if they don't think you're valuable enough for a raise, they must not know what you do.' And I think he's right, because he has come to my classroom and spent a whole day there," Shelton said.

"I put out more fires than he ever will. I learn the names, the personalities, the needs, the hopes and the dreams of a 180 students. And I leave the classroom every day kicking myself when I didn't meet the needs of a particular student. I carry that burden on my shoulders every day of my life."

Miriam Wilson, English teacher, yearbook advisor and English Language Development teacher at Del Norte High School, put her feelings succinctly.

"Think about this — 40-plus freshman, imagine it. And I'm worth one percent? That's cruel," Wilson said.

Music teacher Dan Sedgwick said they've all put in long hours and sacrificed much.

"Every teacher in this district works really hard. More than we're expected to. I spend so many hours at school, my family rails at me, am I coming home for dinner soon? But nothing hurt my soul more than when I had to shut down my classroom at lunch time. That hurt, but when my union asked me to do that for two weeks, I did it, because this is worth it. We're worth it," Sedgwick said.

Board President Frank Magarino, said afterwards that it was frustrating having to listen to the teachers without being able to have a conversation.

'It's like listening to a one-sided argument," Magarino said. "But it violates law, and we don't want to give the

impression of negotiating in public. We can fall into Brown Act violations if we're not careful."

Marshall Jones, DNTA president, ran into the same predicament when he pleaded with the board members to help settle the contract impasse by directing the district's team to return to negotiations.

"You have the power. They work for you. You don't work for them. Don't be swayed by fear tactics that a recession is looming," Jones said. "Your bargaining team has not budged from one percent in six months. We've offered four compromises, but your bargaining team has offered one over and over and over again," Jones said. "So let's have an action, right now. We're all here. Do I hear a motion to direct the district to go back to the table?"

When his call for a motion went unanswered, Superintendent Jeff Harris explained the conflict with the Brown Act.

"You guys understand they legally can't? That's against the Brown Act. Even if they took a vote, it would be challenged in court," Harris said.

Harris later explained no one can ask the school board to add and agenda item without a 72-hour advance notice which assures the public knows what's going to be discuss and come prepared if wanting to add comment.

"If action is taken without that 72-hour notice, the legal remedy is potentially nullification of any actions took," Harris said. "We want to be careful and transparent, ensuring the public knows what's going on.'

The next phase in negotiation is fact finding, where both sides elect a representative to represent their case to a neutral third party.

Colleen Parker, district director of human resources, said

after the fact-finding process, the third party abritor can make recommendations. "They're not binding, but it allows both sides to return to the table and negotiate around the recommendation," Parker said. "If they still don't have an agreement, the union can vote to strike if they choose. The district would then unilaterally implement its last offer."

Paige Thompson, lead negotiator for DNTA, said time is not on the district's side with its cost it will have on students.

"Six of the bargaining sessions happened last school year. There are five negotiators, six sessions, that's 30 days that you had teachers out of their classrooms, and 12 days had high school administrators out of their schools to be on district team. How many more days out of the classroom are you all willing to sign off on to get this contract settled? Keep in mind even after we settle this, and we will, after this fall, this coming spring with this same class of students we will be out of our classrooms even more days to bargain for next year's contract," Thompson said.



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The tantalizing scent of barbecue smoke wafts through the streets of Gold Beach early in the morning. Who's barbecuing at this hour?

The smoker and grill in the parking lot at Wild Oaks Grill, 29545 Ellensburg Ave., is packed with tri-tips, ribs, pastrami, chicken, hamburgers, beef briskets and pork at 7 a.m. Even the mac and cheese, not to mention the backyard chili with beans, go into the smoker.

Robin Dunn said he originally began cooking tri-tips in his food cart on a street corner in Humboldt County, California. That's where he perfected his recipe.

After 13 years, he decided to open a brick-and-mortar store in Port Orford, "which did okay," he said. "It had great reviews, but Port Orford was just too small of a town for us.'

Then, Leonard and Diane Phillips came along.

"They appreciated what I do," Dunn said. "They traveled for a little bit and tried barbecue in other places and came back and said, 'We have to find a better place for you.'"

So they created a partnership and opened mid-April in Gold Beach.

"Grilling and smoking are two different styles of barbecue," Dunn said. Santa Maria barbecue style originated in the central California coastal town of Santa Maria, which is where Dunn lived early on. Santa Maria style always utilizes an open-fire grill.

Smoked meats are a Texasstyle barbecue technique, which the restaurant also serves.

The other two styles of barbecue, which are NOT found at Wild Oaks Grill, are Carolina style, which uses a vinegar sauce on pork; and Kansas City barbecue, which is neither grilled nor smoked, but rather smothered in barbecue sauce.

"Tri-tips are part of the

sirloin," Phillips said, starting to flavor a large tub of tri-tips with their special blend of seasonings. "And what a tri-tip is, and how it became famous, is a triangular piece on the end. It wasn't used a lot and it was usually ground into hamburger.

'The people around Santa Maria were mostly Hispanic and didn't have a lot of options," he said. "They started using it and roasting it whole. It's actually developed into a barbecue style."

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# 'Slam'n Salmon Derby' on tap again

After a two-year hiatus, Crissy Cooper, owner and director of West Coast Adventures, is reviving an ocean salmon fishing derby that began in 2003.

The event will be held over Labor Day weekend, Aug. 29 through Sept. 1, at the Port of Brookings Harbor.

The first Brookings-based ocean salmon fishing derby, in 2003, was the brainchild of Leroy Blodgett, former Brookings city manager, and Jim Relaford, former Port of Brookings Harbor commissioner.

Originally called the "Wild Rivers Coast Salmon Derby," the event drew 113 fishermen, with 200 salmon barbecue dinners prepared.

The event continued through 2016 with great success. In 2017, the derby fell to the wayside when the "bubble season" for salmon fishing over Labor Day was cancelled.

After 2017 - and the lack of a salmon season - Cooper started crunching the numbers. "The revitalization of the derby would be advantageous for marketing the area as a travel destination," she determined

Her vision was to "do one big community event in a great big collaboration between businesses, community members, entertainment groups and lots of nonprofit organizations, and bring it all to the boardwalk on that weekend.'

This year's revived derby offers the chance to win up

to \$5,000 for those who enter. The grand prize, awarded on Sunday, will be for the largest Chinook salmon caught during the entire derby.

Daily prizes for largest fish of the day will be awarded on Friday and Saturday. A consolation prize will be awarded for the smallest salmon caught in the derby.

In addition to the fishing derby, youngsters can participate in the Smolt School and Scavenger Hunt.

South Coast Tours will be offering guided kayak tours all three days of the event, with a special "Kids and Kayaks" event set for Saturday at 4 p.m. Derby organizers said kids ages 9 to 18 are invited to try kayaking and learn all about the water sport, and how to paddle responsibly.

The Curry County Emergency team will be hosting a variety of adventure and disaster-preparation workshops. Joining them will be the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary team for boating safety.

The Smith River Mountain Men (and women) will let people try their hand at axe and hatchet throwing, archery, basket weaving and fishing pole construction.

Fishing Veterans of America will also be on hand. You'll be able to ask about their upcoming surfing, kayaking and other "extreme sporting events," and even sign up to take a military veteran fishing.

"To keep the momentum going, the (derby) event will feature live music, vendors and a store that sells Slam'n Salmon logo items," Cooper

# said.

"On Sunday, the event wraps up with a 'shore dinner' prepared by our community.'

As the former subcontracted event coordinator for the Port of Brookings Harbor, Cooper is using her experience to ensure a smooth-running derby and family-friendly event.

Transportation passes may be purchased for the local trolley (pet-friendly) to give options other than parking at the port, because there will be a boat show by Y Marina boats in progress. The trolley will stop at several places throughout the Brookings and Harbor area.

Parking areas for passenger vehicles and boats, boat-launching areas, volunteers to help manage the area, vendor applications and locations, and event area maps are organized and displayed on the event's website. A detailed schedule, derby rules and applicable fishing regulations also are available.

'One of the missions of the event is to bring nonprofits together to create a community event," Cooper said. "Another mission is to educate our youth about how to adventure safely and learn about our local habitat.

"Funds raised will be used to help restock fish to create sustainability. "Finally, we will be

highlighting our tourist economy."

panded from tri-tips to other meats because he wanted to enter competitions. So he learned how to cook ribs, briskets, chicken and pork. Dunn compares his pastrami to Katz's Delicatessen in New York.

For Dunn and Phillips, it's all about the meat. "We don't put sauce on anything," Dunn said. They provide sauces on their customers' tables "but we always recommend that customers try their meat first.'

At the grill, Dunn showed off a motorized grate, which

can be raised or lowered to regulate the temperature for the grilled meats over the live fire. "The smoke goes up and gets trapped in the chambers, where it rolls over the food," Phillips said. "We have two chambers, with the chickens, ribs and everything in there." Meantime, "We have a

couple of different things we do here. We have our POW



chair and the Missing Man table, where we pay deference to our POWs," Phillips said, as he showed a place setting on a table with a sign saying 'Reserved.'

Phillips also pointed out their world map on the wall, which has different monies displayed with their locations. "We are world famous because we've got people from all over the world who have traveled through here," Dunn said with a grin. "To a person, they love our food."

# Does High Potassium Mean No Bananas?

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 75-year-old man in excellent overall health. Routine bloodwork recently showed an elevated potassium level of 5.6. For the most part, I follow a vegetarian diet, which includes a number of very healthy foods that also happen to be high in potassium. I exercise regularly. Two years ago, my level was 4.9. My cardiologist stopped my metoprolol, as he said that could have pushed up the potassium, and he felt that based on my routine tests it was safe to stop it. I also stopped the 500-mg turmeric supplement I was taking, as a precaution. I take no other drugs.

I'd hate to have to give up bananas and the other fruits that contain potassium, which I eat in moderation as part of my regular diet. Do you think the 5.6 level is cause for concern, and could you make a recommendation? -- V.D.

ANSWER: A potassium level of 5.6 is still in the normal range in my hospital's

laboratory. Although metoprolol can raise potassium, it's not one of the medicines that is very likely to do so, such as an ACE inhibitor or spironolactone. Some people just have a high normal potassium. Turmeric, on the other hand, has lots of potassium, so stopping that

was reasonable. I would recommend that you not worry too much about the potassium and keep up your diet, including fruits in moderation. In addition to avoiding turmeric, I would recommend that you avoid salt substitutes, since they have very high amounts of potassium.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am fortunate enough to be a healthy and well 81-year-old woman. I take vitamin D, and exercise daily with walking and yoga. My recent bone density test showed my T-score for the hip at -2.2 and spine at -3.2. My primary doctor insists that I take Prolia or Boniva. I am reluctant to do this, as I am aware of the side effects and don't trust the ultimate results of the medication. Nutrition calcium supplements. Your help would be greatly appreciated. -- L.B. ANSWER: Anyone can get an estimate of his or her risk for fracture using the FRAX calculation tool at www. sheffield.ac.uk/FRAX. I made a few assumptions with the information you gave me and estimated your risk of a hip fracture in the next 10 years as 6%, and any major osteoporotic fracture as 17%. A medication like Boniva would be expected to reduce your risk to something like 4% and 14%. Prolia has been shown to reduce risk of vertebral and hip fractures, and the decreased risk of vertebral fracture might be even greater with this drug (perhaps 4% hip and 8% total), although Prolia and Boniva have not been directly compared. Guidelines would clearly recommend medication for you. Calcium alone is unlikely to significantly reduce your risk of fracture.

"Insist" is a strong word, but given the reduction in your relatively high fracture risk, I would suggest that you reconsider. Boniva is given once monthly and Prolia twice yearly. The side effects are mild for most people. Taking the medication for three to five years is very reasonable, after which you'd re-evaluate. I hope this information makes it easier for you to make the right decision for yourself.

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




