

County drops to high risk, reopening restaurants

After just two weeks closed, Curry County dining, recreation and entertainment establishments will be allowed to restart indoor operations Friday.

According to the latest

COVID-19 data from the Oregon Health Authority, the county will move into the high-risk category of the state’s pandemic restrictions — a step below the extreme-risk category where the county has remained since late March.

Oregon Gov. Kate Brown announced the move Tuesday, along-

side a number of other changes for counties across the state. Fourteen of the state’s 36 counties are now in the high-risk level, including six which moved from less-restrictive categories.

“We are at a critical moment in this pandemic as we face more contagious variants of COVID-19

taking hold in our communities,” Brown wrote in a release Tuesday. “Now more than ever it’s imperative that we all continue wearing masks, maintain physical distance, stay home when sick and get the vaccine when it’s available to you.”

The change means indoor dining and recreation will again

be permitted in the county starting Friday, though capacities will still be limited until the county moves into lower categories of restrictions. Among the rules:

- Indoor dining will be limited to 25% capacity, or 50 people, which-

On a hot spring day, vehicles with license plates from states all over the continental U.S. filled the port of Brookings-Harbor parking lot, an indication that it could be a busy summer ahead for local businesses.

Tad Hirabayashi and Kailyn Nguyen were visiting from Cal-

ifornia in their RV. They said Brookings has been everything they need while traveling and working remotely.

“We were going to stay just one week, but the morning after we arrived, we called the park and asked to extend another week,” said Nguyen.

The visitors are welcomed with open arms by local business owners, including Andrew Sale, owner

of Whale’s Tail Candy & Gifts. Sale said he and his family frequently vacationed in Brookings before they moved here six years ago. He and his wife just bought Whale’s Tail last June.

“We couldn’t let it go. My daughter had her first ice cream right there in front of that ice cream cooler,” said Sale.

Despite opening up during a pandemic, Sale said business has

surpassed his expectations.

“It has been busier than what we expected, and I just think it’s going to get better,” said Sale. “There were a couple months during the year where it slowed down quite a bit, but not as near as much as we thought it was going to.”

It’s hard to overstate the economic importance of tourism in

Artists work to create Curry County mural

Taking turns glancing up at the giant, bare wall inside the 4-H Building at the Curry County Fairgrounds, a group of Gold Beach artists and art enthusiasts met last Wednesday to discuss mural designs.

The Circle of Gold group was formed to design and paint a 500-square-foot mural on the north wall of the building, which is used for livestock auctions near fair time, as well as the 4-H archery program and dog obedience classes during other times of the year. At first, Casey was reluctant to change his new camera from automatic to manual mode — which allows a photographer more user control — but when he did, new doors opened up, and he noticed a significant improvement in his work.

Casey said he doesn’t classify himself as one type of photographer because he likes to shoot everything from rusty, old farm equipment to people. However, no matter

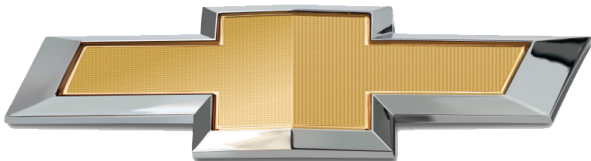

Del Norte County opens vaccine clinic for walk-ins

Walk-ins are now welcome at the mass vaccination site at the Del Norte County Fairgrounds, which is open every Tuesday and Wednesday 10 a.m. to noon on a rolling basis.

Shelby Bodenstab, senior public health nurse for Del Norte County, said they have received an increase in vaccine supply, but demand is lagging behind. She said they are administering an average of 150 shots per day at the fairground site, however, they have the capacity to give out double that amount.

Public Health Authority Dr. Warren Rehwalder announced last week that vaccinators in the county would be allowed to give the Pfizer vaccine to anyone 16 and older, and individuals 18 and older could receive any of the vaccines, as of April 1. Nevertheless, demand for vaccines has remained fairly

flat at the fairgrounds, said Bodenstab.

In an effort to increase ease of access to the shot, the vaccination site at the fairgrounds is now accepting anyone 18 or older, no appointment necessary, said Bodenstab. The site primarily offers the Moderna vaccine, but they are also administering the Johnson and Johnson shot to some at-risk individuals.

“If somebody wants a vaccine, we want there to be not a lot of barriers in the way,” said Bodenstab. “If we have the supply, and we have people that want it, we want them to get it.”

Bodenstab said she thinks demand could be low in-part because people in the community do not know they are eligible for the vaccine.

“People are saying ‘Well, I didn’t think it was my turn yet.’ Everybody is being really deferential and thinking about others,” said Bodenstab. “The reality is now

we are at that point, and the supply has really opened up.”

While supply is high, individuals from neighboring communities, especially Curry and Humboldt counties are traveling to Del Norte to get a shot.

Bodenstab said it’s important to accommodate those individuals, too.

“We have a lot of people that work in our community that live in Oregon...they’re really part of our community because there is so much crossover between our communities,” she said.

Bodenstab added the Del Norte and Curry County public health departments have been working side-by-side throughout the pandemic in case tracking, and now, vaccine distribution.

While an appointment is not necessary, it is still recommended to ensure access to a vaccine.

the towns and cities along the Oregon Coast. In 2018, visitors spent \$2.2 billion in the region, and the tourism industry accounted for 23,460 of its jobs, according to a Travel Oregon economic impact report.

However, revenue from tourism fell 58% statewide from 2019 to 2020, due to the pandemic and subsequent shutdowns. Moreover, the decrease in tourism led to a 20% drop in the coastal region’s tourism-related jobs, according to another Travel Oregon report.

Despite the decrease in overall tourism spending, Captain Andy Martin, owner of Brookings Fishing Charters, said charter fishermen in Brookings had a good year.

“The charter trips for most charters were actually up last

year, after the initial shut-down,” said Martin. “April and May were not very good but looking on to the summer months things were going well.”

Martin said he thinks the charter fishing business remained busy during the pandemic because travelers were hesitant to get on airplanes, but still wanting to travel someplace, they took road trips to quaint, coastal towns like Brookings instead.

Martin said he expects a rebound in tourism this year, meaning it might be an even bigger year for charter fishing, which bodes well for other businesses in the area, such as hotels, restaurants and coffee shops - they are all connected, he said.

“When somebody drives around town in July or August and all the motels are full and a lot of the restaurants are full, a lot of these people are visitors who came over here to fish,” said

Bell and Whistle Coffee House looks out onto the port. New owners Matthew and Anna Powers said they got a boost in business during the latter part of the fishing season last year, and they look forward to the continued relationship between businesses.

“All of the charters leave from this parking lot and go out on boats that are down here. So, we get a lot of traffic, and then that brings families,” said Anna Powers.

Anna Powers said they also see a lot of patrons come in from the local campgrounds, looking to warm up with a hot cup of coffee. Wherever they come from, Powers is glad they are here.

“Curry County, between us and Gold Beach, is heavily reliant on tourism. People love to come visit the ocean and the shops that are down here, and it’s nice to be a welcoming place,”

members of frontline workers, as well as those with a now-wider set of underlying health conditions, will be eligible to receive a shot.

“We know it’s not easy for everyone to find the time and the transportation to get to a vaccination appointment. If you’re a frontline worker making the effort, bring your family members and do it all together,” Brown said.

The new list of eligible underlying health conditions brings the state’s rules in line with federal recommendations, and now includes the following:

- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- Chronic lung conditions including COPD, asthma, cystic fibrosis and pulmonary hypertension
- Down Syndrome
- Dementia or other neurological conditions
- Diabetes, type 1 or 2
- Heart conditions
- HIV infection
- Weakened immune systems
- Liver disease
- Overweight or obesity
- Pregnancy
- Smoking, current or former
- Sickle cell disease
- Solid organ or blood stem cell transplant
- Stroke or other cerebrovascular disease
- Substance use disorder

Brown later said anyone over 16 will be eligible for the vaccine as of April 19.

The change comes as the virus “appears to be rebounding,” according to State Health Officer Dr. Dean Sidelinger.

“We continue to see a general trend of increasing daily cases along with virus-related hospitalizations,” Sidelinger said.

The increases mean some

counties could return to higher levels of virus restrictions in the coming weeks as case rates continue to rise, Sidelinger said.

The health officials Friday said they had no plans to change the current virus restriction framework, despite objections from some that the risk level model is too restrictive on businesses, and objections from others that the state should be enacting more restrictions in the face of increased virus spread.

Instead, Brown, Sidelinger and OHA Director Patrick Allen repeatedly stressed the actions residents can take to slow the spread of the virus, even if they’ve already been fully vaccinated: Wearing face coverings, washing hands, maintaining social distancing and getting vaccinated when possible.

“The good news is, now when we face a surge, we know how to protect ourselves and others, with powerful safety measures like mask wearing and avoiding large social gatherings. And we have three safe and effective vaccines rapidly rolling out,” Brown said.

Still, meeting the state’s original vaccination targets is looking to be less of a possibility, as vaccine manufacturer Johnson & Johnson announced last week a production error could force it to throw out millions of not-yet-distributed doses.

“That shortfall results in about an eight- or nine-day setback in the timeframe when cumulative doses in Oregon would exceed the number of people who are eligible,” Allen said.

In other words, the state’s projection of when it’ll have vaccinated all eligible adults is moving past its previous late-May projection.

“Oregon will not delay our vaccine eligibility timelines despite the disruption in Johnson & Johnson doses,” Allen said. “However, we may need to temper our hopes of having enough doses to vaccinate all Oregonians over 16 by late May,

and bump that expectation back a couple of weeks.”

Allen also said some regions of the state have begun to see a concerning trend of seniors choosing to wait to get the vaccine, instead of getting it as they become eligible.

Seven in 10 seniors have already gotten vaccinated, but Allen said several counties report less than five in 10 have been vaccinated due to low demand, including Douglas, Gillam, Grant, Lake, Malheur, Morrow and Umatilla.

“The serious risk the virus poses to older adults far outweighs the temporary discomfort and disruption you might experience from getting a vaccine,” Allen said, encouraging older adults not to wait to get vaccinated.

And Sidelinger announced Friday the state detected more than 200 previously unreported cases of a California variant of the virus, which the CDC says can spread more quickly and is less susceptible to some treatments and vaccines.

Those variants and the state’s recent increases in cases suggest a continued need to stay vigilant, according to Brown.

“I’m obviously very concerned about the increased spread of the virus throughout Oregon. That’s why we are working hard to get more Oregonians to get vaccinated, particularly our most vulnerable populations,” Brown said.

“I’m asking Oregonians to continue to rely on safety measures.”

ever is smaller. Outdoor dining will be limited to 75 people, and all parties will be limited to six people from two households.

- Indoor entertainment, recreation and fitness establishments will be limited to 25% capacity, or 50 people, whichever is smaller. Indoor full-contact sports remain prohibited, and entertainment venues must close at 11 p.m.
- Outdoor entertainment, recreation and fitness establishments will be limited to a maximum of 15% occupancy and must close at 11 p.m.
- Inside and outside visitation is allowed at long-term care centers.
- Funeral homes, mortuaries and cemeteries will be limited to 25% capacity indoors, or 150 people total, whichever is smaller, and outdoor capacity will be limited to 200 people maximum. Faith institutions are advised to follow the same requirements.
- Indoor and outdoor shopping centers, malls and retail stores will be restricted to 50% capacity, with curbside pick-up encouraged.
- Offices may open, but remote work is recommended if able.
- Social gatherings should be limited to six people from two households indoors, and eight people outdoors.

Monday’s numbers show

the county’s made improvements in its COVID-19 case rates, bringing it under the 60 cases in two weeks and 10% test positivity needed to escape the extreme level.

The numbers show the county had 47 cases and 5.2% test positivity rate for the March 21 through April 3 timeframe.

Still, the figures don’t mean the county is out of the woods yet.

Curry County’s per-person case rate is still the seventh highest of the state’s 36 counties, and another uptick could easily send the county back to the most restrictive category.

Brown also announced a new metric Tuesday, which the state must meet in order for any county to move back to the extreme-risk level: 300 or more COVID-19 positive patients occupying hospital beds statewide, and a 15% increase in the seven-day average hospitalizations over the past week.

As of Tuesday, 177 across the state were hospitalized with the virus.

The state will reevaluate metrics in two weeks and announce new county restriction levels April 20. If the county maintains its current case rates, it’ll stay in the high-risk category.

A decrease in rates below 45 cases in two weeks and 8% test positivity will bring the county to the moderate-risk level, which expands the allowable occupancy of the county’s businesses.

Curry reports ninth death

Curry County also reported its ninth virus-related death over the weekend.

An 87-year-old man who tested positive March 16 died March 21 at his residence, according to OHA. The OHA reported he had underlying conditions.

County officials reported 21 new cases of the virus in the county during the week ending April 5. Eighteen were from the county’s southern region, and three were from the county’s central region, according to Public Health Administrator Sherrié Ward.

A number of other locations in the county are also making vaccination appointments, including Rite Aid, Safeway and Albertsons stores, Fred Meyer, some Health Mart pharmacies, Bi-Mart and Walmart.

A wide section of the population is currently eligible for a vaccine, including

frontline workers and their household families, those 16 and older with underlying conditions, those in multi-generational households, those displaced by wildfires and more.

Brown also announced early Tuesday the state would be expanding vaccine eligibility soon: Starting April 19, anyone in Oregon 16 and older will be eligible to receive a vaccine. A full eligibility schedule is available online at covidvaccine.oregon.gov/.

Five tips for securing your COVID-19 vaccine appointment

In the United States, more than eight in 10 COVID-19 deaths have occurred among those of us aged 65 or above.

This sobering statistic sheds light on just how devastating this pandemic has been for older Americans, and far too many have lost loved ones to this disease.

Thankfully, a post-COVID-19 world is coming into view in the distance. Americans now have access to three safe and extremely effective vaccines, and reports show that cases are declining among nursing home staff and residents.

The arrival of these medical breakthroughs - which are available for free - could very well spell the difference between life and death for many, which is precisely why the CDC recommends that states prioritize older Americans in their vaccine distribution plans.

Most states have heeded this advice and placed seniors at the front of the line.

Unfortunately, though, many older Americans have reported difficulty accessing vaccines. Online scheduling systems are often difficult to navigate, making them inaccessible to the 22 million seniors who lack in-home internet. Many others have struggled to secure rides to distribution sites, and even in Massachusetts, where companion vaccination guidelines were granted, challenges still exist.

But with persistence - and a little help - there is no reason why every eligible American senior shouldn't get their vaccine in the next few months.

Here are five tips to secure a timely COVID-19 vaccine appointment and obtain full vaccination for yourself or an older loved one:

Ask for help: Remember that

you don't have to go it alone. Reach out to friends, family and neighbors for assistance. Many senior centers and local places of worship stand ready to help. If you have specific transportation concerns, plan ahead and ask if someone is willing to give you a ride.

Research your state's distribution plan: Each state has issued its own guidance for vaccine distribution. Visit www.CDC.gov to learn more about the rollout plan in your area.

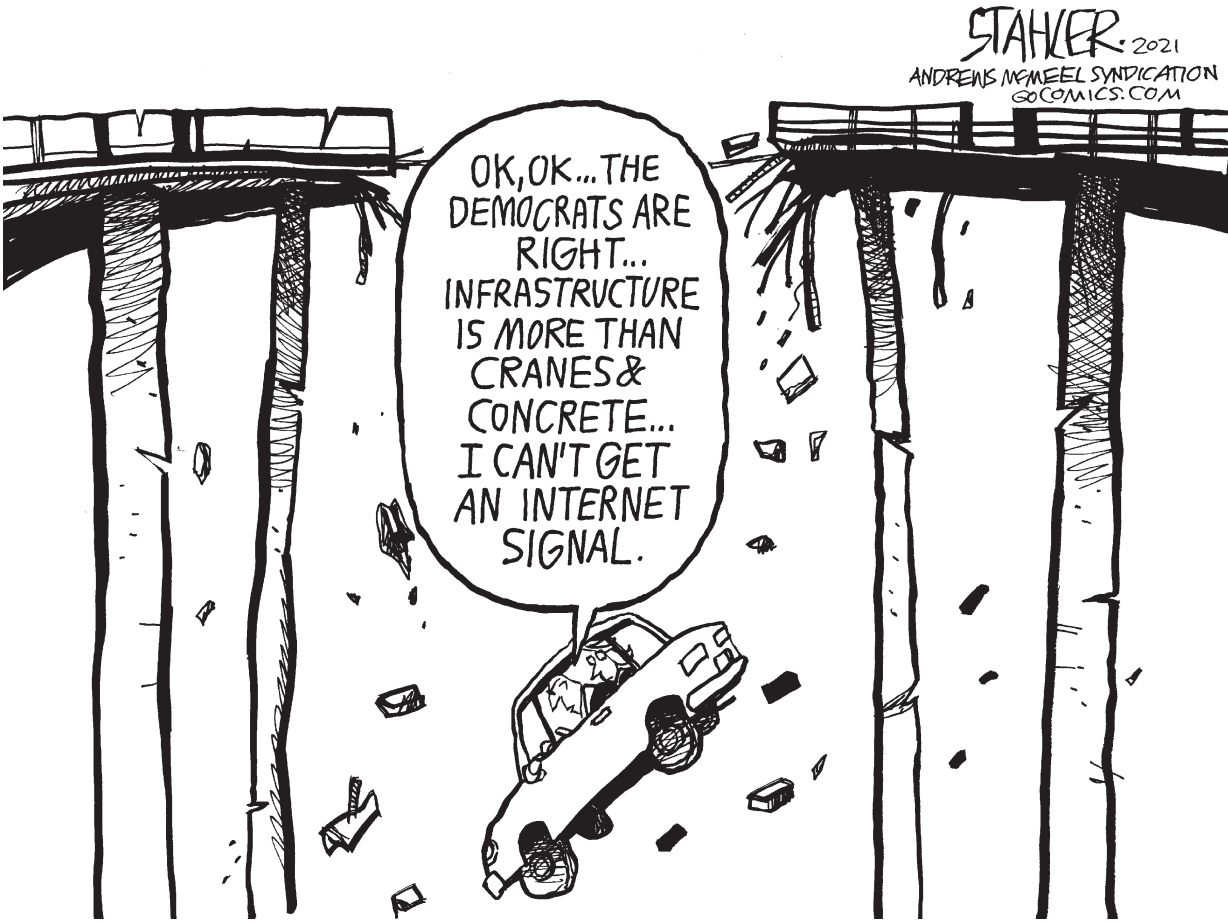
Sign up for appointment alerts: Many state and local governments have automated systems that will alert you when you are eligible and where they are available.

Call your doctor: Many clinics, pharmacies, health systems and community health centers administer - or plan to administer - vaccines. Ask your doctor if they currently offer vaccine appointments and, if so, request notification when one becomes available. Be sure to check with all your doctors, especially if they are in different health systems.

Be persistent: Remember that you might not secure an appointment on your first attempt. That's OK. Go in with the right mindset and the expectation that you (or your loved one who is helping schedule the appointment) might have to try a few times before successfully booking one.

At times, landing a vaccine appointment might feel impossible. But with a determined attitude, a bit of preparation, dogged persistence, increasing supply and some help from those in your circle, what feels impossible can be accomplished.

Urban-rural divide is alive and well

Pushback against a "meatless day" proclaimed by Colorado Gov. Jared Polis last month was predictably vigorous. It was part of the "war on rural Colorado," said a state senator who runs a cattle-feeding operation. Twenty-six of Colorado's 64 counties adopted "meat-in" proclamations. Governors from the adjoining states of Wyoming and Nebraska even gleefully designated an "eat-meat" day.

Afterward, Polis's press aides pointed to the hundreds of do-good proclamations the governor issues each year, and the governor quickly declared his beef brisket the rival of any in Colorado.

But this proclamation differed from those affirming truck drivers, bat awareness and breakfast burritos. It called for broad change. Using the language of a "MeatOut" Day proclamation written by an animal rights group, his statement cited the benefits of a plant-based diet in reducing our carbon footprint, preserving ecosystems and preventing animal cruelty. It also noted the growing alternatives to meat, dairy and eggs.

In the 1880s, when my great-grandparents homesteaded in eastern Colorado, they grazed cattle on the short-grass prairie. Ranchers still do. Once off the range, though, our beef production is best understood as an industrial process. The foundation is grain.

In his book *How to Avoid a Climate Disaster*, Bill Gates explains the modern pyramid of protein: A chicken eats two calories' worth of grain to give us one calorie of poultry.

For cattle, it's six calories of feed to produce one calorie of beef. I've stood in rows of corn tassels 12 feet high at maturity, the growth

boosted by luxuriant applications of fertilizer.

I've pinched my nose while driving past feedlots large enough for 80,000 or more head. I've heard the bellow of cows minutes away from the knife at slaughterhouses.

Denver no longer has slaughterhouses but still prides itself on its livestock heritage. The annual Western Stock Show puts cowboy hats in high-end restaurants and strip joints alike. Cattle represent 50% of Colorado's \$7 billion agriculture economy, and livestock altogether 70%. After Polis's proclamation, livestock producers debated boycotting Denver's Stock Show for other venues — perhaps Oklahoma.

Even a legislator from one of metro Denver's poorer neighborhoods objected to Polis's proclamation, pointing out that nutritious vegetarian options aren't available to many of her constituents.

But it's not just low-income areas that lack meal choices. Fast-food franchises in big cities and small towns all cater to the lowest-common denominator, their high-volume enterprises predicated on cheap meat, especially beef. The consequences are that we now have bulbous bellies and too many heart attacks. We struggle to live with restraint.

The meaty issue here is not about meat vs. no-meat. Rather, it's about scale and processes. What have we sacrificed in pursuit of volume?

Credit the ranchers who graze cattle holistically in an attempt to replicate the once-vast herds of bison. But also note that grass-fed beef needs buyers. Most holistically raised cows get further fattened on grain. That's where the market is.

There's also the looming issue of cows contributing to climate change, as highly polluting methane

comes out of both ends of cattle. Gates, always the technologist, insists that innovation can reduce the carbon output of agriculture by reducing our yen for real beef. He put his money where my mouth is by investing in a vegetarian product called the Impossible Burger. Last week I had one. It fooled me. I thought it was beef.

Meanwhile, the urban-rural divide remains starkly real and evident in voting and development patterns. While cities struggle to contain their growth, many small towns struggle to hang on. Ironically, the economies of most of these at-risk rural towns are premised on industrial-scale agriculture.

Rural Colorado never has liked Polis, a savvy businessman from the exurbs of Boulder who favors market solutions. He had barely warmed his gubernatorial seat when handmade signs began showing up on rural country roads asking "Why does Polis hate..." You fill in the blank.

This meatless proclamation was tone-deaf. It could have narrowly affirmed meatless alternatives rather than decried meat. Denial and anger will not prevail, though. I'm reminded of when coal producers, 10 and 15 years ago, were fighting the future of renewables instead of figuring out their place in the world to come.

Though most of us may continue to eat beef, some of us have already begun to shift away. Polis was perhaps the unwitting messenger of that truth — that cows in the West are no longer sacred.

Wild Rivers Community Foundation, Humboldt Area Foundation give out COVID grants

Wild Rivers Community Foundation and Humboldt Area Foundation recently awarded grants totaling \$62,700 to three Curry County entities — one that is distributing COVID-19 vaccinations, and two that are providing food and services to people affected by the pandemic.

Curry Health Network, the primary vaccine source in Curry County, received \$40,000 to help cover the cost of staffing needed to give up to 1,000 COVID-19 vaccination shots every week from April to July. The network, which sought a \$83,000 grant to cover that time period, is not reimbursed from the state for these services, and is waiting to see how much federal funding it may receive. The network will use the grant funding to cover some of the clinical, logistical and data entry labor costs.

The Brookings Harbor Food Bank received \$17,200, to help serve low-income, youth, veterans and Span-

ish-speaking families in the Brookings area. Some of the funds will be used to expand the “snack pack” program for children ages 2-17, many of whom have not had access to reduced/free lunch programs at schools because of the varied school schedules. The grant will also cover some of the cost of a contract (July through December) for a Spanish language interpreter/ community outreach worker serving about 22 families since January. Many of these residents have had little to no income since March 2020 and have not used food bank services previously due to concerns they were not eligible.

St. Timothy’s Episcopal Church, which serves homeless and low-income residents in Brookings, received \$5,500 for two new ovens, two new water heaters (for dishwasher and showers), counter top and food storage area for meal prep and a shower door for a shower used by those in need. In recent months, the

church has increased its meal preparation, providing 50 to 60 meals a week, and provided shower access and other services to about 60 people a week since the pandemic began.

The COVID-19 Regional Response Fund, launched by HAF and WRCF on March 20, 2020, has distributed \$2.5 million in grants to about 200 organizations in Curry, Del Norte, Humboldt and Trinity counties. The fund has received more than 120 individual contributions and donor pledges ranging from \$20 to \$50,000. Institutions and foundations have also contributed. These include The California Endowment,

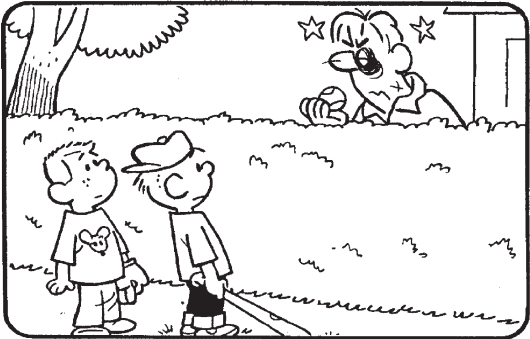
The California Wellness Foundation, Blue Shield of California Foundation, the Gordon Elwood Foundation, Humboldt Health Foundation and Pacific Gas & Electric Foundation.

To encourage giving, HAF and WRCF are taking no administrative fees, with 100 percent of every gift going to grants. 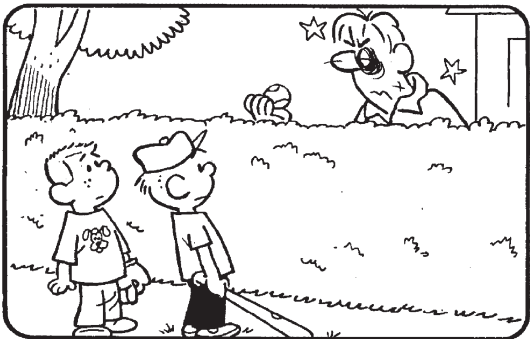

Bring your medications on April 24 for disposal to either the Curry County Sheriff’s Office at 29808 Colvin St, Gold Beach, or to the Coos-Curry Electric Co-Op parking lot at 43050 Hwy 101, Port Orford. (The Curry County Sheriff’s Office & DEA cannot accept liquids, needles or sharps. Only pills and patches.) This service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Due to COVID-19 precautions, the collection at Coos Curry Electric will be drive

up. We are asking that people observe the recommendations from the CDC and Oregon Health Authority by wearing a mask while in the sheriff’s office to drop off unwanted medications.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of poisonings and overdoses.

Sex crime prevention legislation clears Oregon Senate

On Monday, the Senate approved both SB 515 and SB 535 with overwhelming bipartisan support. The measures add more reporting opportunities to help prevent sex crimes in public spaces where traffickers frequent.

Senate Bill 515 requires employees of bars and restaurants to report reasonable belief of suspected human trafficking or unlawful employment of minors.

Senate Bill 535 adds hotel workers to the list of mandatory reporters and requires the immediate reporting of suspected child pornography by computer technicians or processors.

“Republicans are committed to standing up for victims this session,” Senator Fred Girod, chief sponsor of the legislation and Senate Republican Leader, said. “That requires us to give law enforcement the tools to prevent and stop heinous crimes in real-time. SB 515 and 535 also empower our communities to report and stop these crimes. By all of us taking

a little responsibility for the most vulnerable in our communities, we can make a difference.”

Traffickers specialize in keeping victims out of sight by constantly moving around but interact with workers in at hotels and bars. This legislation empowers those workers to be vigilant and partner with law enforcement to save lives.

The United States Department of Defense has identified human trafficking as the fastest growing criminal enterprise in the United States. Portland has been identified as a hotbed of trafficking, with nearly 750 victims from 2018–2019.

“Trafficking and sex crimes are happening in our own backyard, and we need more tools to fight them,” Senator Tim Knopp (R-Bend). “It’s not just Portland. Traffickers use public spaces, like bars, restaurants, and hotels, up and down I-5 and other routes to hide. These employees can play an important role in reporting.”

the mural, ranging from Gold Beach’s Isaac Lee Patterson bridge to Port Orford’s cedar forests.

The meetings have also helped the group decide what materials will be used. Instead of painting directly on the wall, participants will paint individual aluminum panels and then combine those panels to form the larger mural. The aluminum panels will allow for a more durable painting, said participant and experienced muralist Meghan Flanagan.

Participant Lisa Shore said a massive blank canvas like this can be daunting, especially if the group does not work as a team, which can be difficult for artists, she added.

“Artists don’t often work in collaboration. It’s a very

solitary type individual thing, so it ought to be interesting,” said Shore.

Nevertheless, she was optimistic.

“As long as you lay it out in an organized fashion it should go smoothly,” she added.

So far, the group has raised more than \$3,300 from donations from the community, as well as grants from Curry Arts and the Curry County Cultural Coalition.

After the final design is given the green light by the Curry County Fair Board, the project will move into the sketching and painting phase. Community members of all ages are encouraged to participate.
