# BOMB CYCLONE PACKS A PUNCH

The clean-up from Tuesday's regional windstorm was underway Wednesday morning, as a path of destruction greeted local residents and visitors.

There had been no reports of injuries following what forecasters called a "historic bomb cyclone weather system" that swept across Curry and Del Norte counties, and south into California.

First-responders and utility crews were kept busy with a flurry of service calls, while drivers and pedestrians dodged a number of downed trees, fallen electrical wires, and other storm debris in roadways and along sidewalks.

Brookings police reported no blocked streets by Wednesday morning after city, county and state works crews removed debris. Motorists were warned that some outlying roadways might still be blocked by

downed trees.

In Crescent City, Russell Kinikin, the Ace Hardware assistant manager, said that at about 1 p.m. Tuesday one of his lumber buildings lost about 7,000 square feet of roof from a 120,000-square-foot facility.

Kinikin said the wind caused no damage to the main store nor to any merchandise or vehicles. Crescent City Ace Hardware was open for regular business on Wednesday.

Crescent City Manager Eric

Wier said the storm kept emergency responders tied up throughout the day Tuesday and into the night. "The major issue with this storm was not major rain, but major wind creating a lot of unusual scenarios and power outages," Wier said.

Emergency calls put a significant demand on the city's response resources, Wier said. He estimated that

## Kids help to light up town

Brookings-Harbor High School juniors have helped spread the spirit of the season by decorating portions of Backus Park and U.S. Highway 101.

The students' efforts came as the Nature's Coastal Holiday Festival of Lights organizers were looking for assistance in decorating the city. "Decorating downtown is new for us this year," spokesperson Leslie Wilkinson said. "We were a bit concerned that there just weren't going to be enough hands."

"Thanks to the efforts of two of our board members, Justin and Hanna Flores, the junior class of Brookings-Harbor High School helped string lights in Bankus Park and along the U.S. Highway 101 frontage area."

The students conducted the light stringing on Friday afternoon, Nov. 22.

The Festival of Lights at Brookings Azalea Park is a month-long tradition that begins Friday. The event started in 1977 with 20,000 lights strung in the bushes along the park's pathways.

This holiday season, the festival is set to decorate with more than 2 million LED lights.

The event is conducted each season by Nature's Coastal Holiday. "We want to really put Azalea Park on the map and make it the best show ever," said Nature's Coastal Holiday secretary Susan Dunn.

On Nov. 2, volunteers gathered in Azalea Park to string the lights in a "String the Joy" project. "There's so much to do and the public is how it gets done," Dunn said.

The Festival of Lights is open from 5-9 p.m. Nov. 29-Dec. 29 at 640 Old County

# Washing dishes – watching bears

Donna Vail was washing dishes in her Smith River home last Saturday when out the kitchen window she spotted a trio of bears.

She and husband Larry have lived in Del Norte County for 10 years, the last three on the Smith River along South Bank Road. They've seen plenty of wildlife, from elk to eagles.

But no bears.

So Donna Vail ran to get her 300mm Nikon camera, then snapped some quick shots of the three bears.

"It was early morning, about 9 a.m. The bears are usually out at night when we're sleeping. We don't normally see them in the daytime," Vail said.

"I captured this big papa standing there. I like to think the other two were mama and

baby. It's fun to think of them as a family."

Vail said her neighbors regularly talk of bears amongst the trees, getting into trash cans. One of her neighbors down South Bank Road even set up a night-vision camera to keep an eye on the four-legged visitors.

Peter Tira, a California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) public information officer, said black bears actually are quite active this

time of year. "You've got to keep in mind that bears have a great sense of smell. They are always looking for food before they hibernate for the winter," Tira said.

"They do slow down and are far less active, but right now, they're out fattening up on the landscape. So, you really need to be vigilant if you live in bear country."

Tira said black bears are very common in the north-west corner of California,

adding that the population is growing statewide. According to the CDFW, California's black bear population has increased over the past 25 years.

In 1982, the statewide bear population was estimated at 10,000 to 15,000. The California black bear population today is conservatively estimated at 30,000 to 40,000.

# New hiking book by local author

Tim Palmer is excited to share his latest book, "America's Great Mountain Trails: 100 Highcountry Hikes of a Lifetime."

The local author has written 28 other books since 1980 about the environment, outdoors and adventure travel. They range from pocket guides to hardbound coffee table books, and cover rafting, kayaking, canoeing, hiking, forests, mountains and rivers.

His latest book is a hardbound, 320-page coffee table volume, lavishly illustrated with 220 color photos taken by Palmer. The book is described by Amazon as a "hiker's inspirational bucket list."

"The idea was to cover all of America's mountain ranges," Palmer said. "There are 11 principle mountain ranges. Mountains and foothills cover 40% of the country."

"I picked 100 trails throughout, with an interest in covering the whole geography and having variety, like short trips and long trips, easy ones and hard ones, focusing on scenery and really notable, memorable experiences."

The book starts with an overview of why mountains are important, plus advice for how to plan for a trip. The 100 trails are divided into regions that include New England, the Central and Southern Appalachians, Rocky Mountains, Desert and Dryland ranges, Sierra Nevada, Cascade Mountains, the Coast Range, the Klamath and Siskiyou ranges, Olympic Mountains, Alaska Ranges and Tropical Islands (Puerto Rico and Hawaii).

Readers in this region don't need to travel far beyond their own backyards to find what Palmer has deemed some of America's "Great Mountain Trails." But perhaps it takes someone else describing places already familiar to realize how special they are.

For readers in Crescent City, Prairie Creek Redwoods to the south of Klamath is described as having "one of the best trails anywhere through groves of redwoods topping 300 feet. A gentle climb over the westernmost Coast Range topography leads to an Edenic canyon bedecked in ferns, favorite pastures of elk and campsites just a stroll from Pacific whitecaps."

For both Crescent City and southern Oregon, two trails in the Kalmiopsis Wilderness make Palmer's top 100 hikes. He describes one of the hikes outside of Cave Junction as "a harsh range of rocky ridgelines, forbidding canyons, and outcrops of colorfully mixed minerals metamorphosed from rock formed undersea and then pushed up by powerful tectonic forces." Palmer does advise, "But let's be clear: this place is not for everyone."

Further north, more local landmarks and trails are in Palmer's top 100 hikes - the Lower Rogue River Trail, located between Agness and Merlin, is described as "the best footpath that transects the apex of the Klamath-Siskiyou Mountains, and for that matter, the entire Coast Range." And Humburg

Mountain, between Gold Beach and Port Orford, as "the tallest summit rising directly from the ocean on the Oregon Coast."

Palmer grew up in the Appalachian foothills of Pennsylvania. "I ran wild in the woods as a little kid and developed this inseparable attachment to the natural world at a young age," he said. As he grew older, he began exploring further afield, and started backpacking in high school, taking every trail he could find. During his freshman year in college, he applied for a laborer's position with the park service and got a job at Crater Lake National Park.

"I hitchhiked out here, and hitchhiked every weekend while I was here, exploring the Northwest, including Mt. Hood, and came down here to the coast. Then, the next summer I got a job with the forest service as a seasonal landscape architect in Idaho, in the Sawtooth National Forest.

"It's been like that ever since."

After receiving a bachelor of science degree in landscape architecture from Pennsylvania State University, Palmer worked for eight years as a planner on land use and environmental topics

from 1971-1980. He started to write full-time in 1980.

After spending 22 years living as a nomad in his van, he and his wife now live in Port Orford.

Palmer has no formal training in photography or writing, but that hasn't stopped him from winning numerous awards for his books, including two National Outdoor Book Awards, Oregon Book Award Finalist, Benjamin Franklin Book Award, and an Indie Silver Award for best Adventure Book.

He has been featured as a public speaker at hundreds of state, national and provincial conferences, conservation gatherings, and at colleges and universities nationwide.

Palmer will share his photos and talk about his newest book at two local events in December. He'll speak at 6 p.m. Dec. 4 at Chetco Community Public Library in Brookings, 405 Alder St.

He'll appear at 5:30 p.m. Dec. 12 at Curry County Public Library in Gold Beach, 94341 3rd St. Both events are free.

# City to review public urination ordinance

Staff Report

The Brookings City Council is set to discuss how to best prohibit public urination and defecation within the city limits.

The council will review the issue during a workshop Dec. 2 at Brookings City Hall.

"Staff was recently made aware of a female transit urinating on the sidewalk in multiple locations downtown," according to a city

council memo in its Dec. 2 workshop packet. "Parks staff has also been called out several times to clean up human feces in Azalea Park, Mill Beach, Access and the bus shelter at Bankus Park."

The memo said staff members are researching options to prohibit such activity,

including a code of conduct, a loitering ordinance and a public urination ordinance. According to the memo, the staff is proposing adding language to the Brookings Municipal Code that would restrict public urination and defecation in public places.

The memo includes

language drafted by several other Oregon cities, including Portland, Medford, Newport, Grants Pass, Astoria and Oregon City.

The workshop memo did not indicate how the city would enforce an ordinance that might be adopted by the city council.

# Trail work ongoing at Natural Bridges viewpoint

The observation deck and trail at Natural Bridges viewpoint north of Brookings are undergoing a makeover.

The platform and a short section of the Oregon Coast Trail are closed, from the parking lot south to milepost 346.1, while the construction work is being done.

The trail and platform is expected to reopen the first week of December.

The short trail takes visitors to a vantage point where they can see the “seven iconic arch rocks and blowholes known as Natural Bridges,” according to the Oregon State Parks website. “It is one of the nicest

views I’ve seen on the Oregon Coast Trail,” said Dani Padilla, park manager for the Harris Beach State Park management unit.

The estimated \$80,000 project will add gravel to the path, stabilize footings for the platform, and replace decking, which has deteriorated due to rot, on the structure that was originally built in the early 1980s, Padilla said.

“The new platform will be 5 feet wider to make it more accessible,” she said. “This allows people with mobility issues to see more.”

Last year, viewshed work was done to provide a better view.

The location of the trail work is near where 28-year-old Callie Ellwood needed

to be rescued from a cliff by search and rescue on Sept. 20 after she left the trail to try to reach the beach.

Padilla emphasized that while the Oregon Coast Trail travels through the platform, no trail goes down to the Natural Bridges. “Pioneer” trails and deer trails are often mistaken for official trails, she said.

Oregon Parks plans to put more signage showing Oregon Coast Trail locations with a kiosk at that location, she said. Because of social media, more visitors are accessing the scenic wonders of the southern Oregon coast, which is causing a rise in mishaps.

Natural Bridges is about 11 miles north of Brookings on U.S. Highway 101.

## Support comes for school welding program

High school welding teacher Chris Thompson, who took over the program this year, said he welcomes suggestions for projects that can be utilized by the community and that students can create in the metals lab. For more information, email Thompson at christ@brookings.k12.or.us.

Meantime, the final phase of installing a new ventilation system was implemented last week in the school's metals lab. Umpqua Sheet Metal of Roseburg has been working with the school district's facilities and maintenance team to complete the installation and wiring.

When complete, students will be able to push a button in individual welding booths to activate strong vents.

Since September, the education foundation has provided more than \$1,900 in grants for Brookings-Harbor School District classrooms and programs. Mini-grants have included robotics kits for Jennifer Bietschek's math classes at Azalea Middle School, tree planting materials for K'la Kennedy and Kelly Margolis' kindergarten classes at Kalmiopsis Elementary School, and prizes and materials for the district-wide Oregon Battle of the Books program coordinated by librarian Patty Clark and her team.
