Port to install Sporthaven seawall soon

When winter storms send waves crashing onto Sporthaven Beach, saltwater, sand and debris are sometimes carried across the roadway above the beach and into the adjacent RV park.

The result is not only a mess to be cleaned up, but trouble for the sewer system operated by Harbor Sanitary District. Drains at the now-closed shower and toilet facility and sewer connections at the RV sites are vulnerable when high-tide events occur, putting extra strain on the sewage treatment system and creating potential environmental

Sporthaven is managed by the Port of Brookings-Harbor which has long-term plans to expand the RV park and install new restroom facilities in addition to a wooden seawall. But in the meantime, port commissioners agreed at a meeting on June 16 to install a temporary two-foot concrete block seawall this summer.

In a memo to commissioners, Port Manager Gary Dehlinger said the port engineer has provided calculations and comments on a plan to create a seawall using unsecured concrete blocks to withstand a 1-foot breaking wave.

"This wall would certainly impede sand-carrying water, and thus would be effective in protecting sanitary features," Dehlinger said. He said the plan is consistent with a discussion the board and management had at a special meeting June 11 as a solution to the sanitary district's concerns about protecting the sewer system.

Harbormaster Travis Webster said the procurement process for the blocks is underway and installation will be scheduled as soon as possible this summer. When the blocks are available, it will be necessary to close the roadway along Sporthaven Beach for at least a day.

Fire marshal calls for fireworks safety

The sale of Oregon consumer legal fireworks began Tuesday and ends on July 6 at licensed stands and retailers statewide. The Office of the State Fire Marshal encourages residents to keep it legal and keep it safe by practicing the "4 Bs" of safe fireworks use:

- Be prepared before lighting fireworks: keep water available by using a garden hose
- Be safe when lighting fireworks: keep
- children and pets away from fireworks. • Be responsible after lighting fireworks: never relight a dud. Wait 15 to 20 minutes then soak it in a bucket of water before
- disposal. •Be aware: use only legal fireworks and
- use them only in legal places. Th OFSM notes that fireworks used in Oregon are responsible for fires that cause significant property loss, serious personal injury, and in some cases, even the loss of life.

Fire season starts: Restrictions now in place

The Coos Forest Protective Association has announced the official beginning of this year's fire season at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday, June 24. The start of fire season activates restrictions on both public and industrial forest use on all public, private, county, state and Bureau of Land Management lands within CFPA's district boundaries.

This means the end of unreg-

ulated, outside burning for rural Curry, Coos and western Douglas County. The outside burning of debris piles and the use of burn barrels will be prohibited until fire season is terminated.

Residents living within an incorporated city need to contact their local fire department for burning restrictions and permit

Under Oregon law, the use

of tracer ammunition and exploding targets is prohibited during fire season and the use of sky lanterns is prohibited year

Regulated use restrictions will also be implemented, putting restrictions on public activities based on daily fire danger levels for specific activities.

Parks still closed

A \$22 million budget gap is responsible for keeping some state parks in the area closed, according to a release from the Oregon Parks and Recreation Dept.

Although Harris Beach State Park and areas of the popular Samuel H. Bordman Scenic Corridor opened following closure related to the COVID-19 pandemic and restrictions, many other state parks in Curry County remain closed.

Of these, the state agency said that Alfred A. Loeb State Park, campground and day-use, and Cape Blanco State Park, campground and day-use, would remain closed at least through Labor Day.

The rest area at Harris Beach State Park and the visitor center at Crissy Field just north of the Oregon-California border remain closed. Their future was not addressed in the recent release.

Because there are still emerging cases of the virus in many areas, Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) is asking visitors to do their part to help protect themselves and the health of their fellow Oregonians.

The state park system has been slowly reopening since early May, but nearly every park is experiencing reduced levels of service visitors to help get through this unprecedented time.

Many facilities will be closed or have sharply reduced hours. Shower/ restroom facilities, ranger and other places will be page for the park you plan to visit before you leave to learn what's open and arrive at the park, scope out the open facilities.

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

It's time to learn about floating wind

Recently the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) held a webinar regarding Oregon Offshore Wind (OSW). The focus was to discuss approaches for public and stakeholder engagement for potential future development off of our coast. The previous meeting, last September, resulted in gatherings of interested citizens, myself included, to learn more about OSW and how it might impact our coastal communities. It is a complex issue that, like so many others, is further complicated by mis-information.

Oregon Coast Energy Alliance Network (OCEAN) was formed by coastal interests to evaluate the impacts and maximize the benefits to coastal communities of any proposed OSW project. Our members represent coastal tribal, county, labor, environmental, business development, shipping, climate action, energy access advocacy and resilience interests. As a renewable energy praccommunity energy security I've welcomed the opportunity to organize OCEAN's efforts. Here's a bit of what we've learned so far:

· Commercial fishers should be directly engaged in initial planning processes for Oregon ocean energy projects

• Floating wind resides in deeper water than fixed foundations, installed on the East coast, so can be located to minimize fishing and viewshed impacts

• OSW is on track to be affordable for Oregonians in time for West coast development. Today, fixed foundation OSW energy on the East coast is landing on the grid at \$0.05 - \$0.12/ kWh. Boat inspection aims to keep invasive species out

Whether you're out on your boat, kayaking or catching a wave on your surfboard, you can expect a cooldown from summer's approaching heat.

What you might not expect, and in fact not even be able to see, are the little stowaways that might be tagging along with you.

Two of the most notable examples are the quagga and zebra mussels.

Although barely an inch in diameter, these little mussels can not only do a number on boat engines and drainage pipes, but also on the waters they've come to inhabit.

Glenn Dolphin, the invasive species specialist for the Oregon Marine Board, is responsible for the agency's programs throughout Oregon that aim to keep invasive species out of the state's waters, including zebra and quagga mussels. Here's what he has to say about both of these species:

Both hail from the Black and Caspian seas, which are actually freshwater bodies. They're most commonly brought over in the ballast water of boats that's then expelled into North American waters.

Although the adults grow to about the size of a thumbnail, there are often several hundred thousand growing in one square meter, which can cause major structural damage if left untouched.

These mussels are great at reproducing themselves. They group in large colonies and filter a liter of water a day to feed on, starving other aquatic organisms at that level.

Without the disease and predation present in their native environment, the population of these mussels goes unchecked.

The quagga mussel was first spotted in the western United States at Lake Mead in 2006. Since then, eight western states have implemented boat inspec-

Oregon now practices the "Clean Launch Law," which states that you must have a pristine boat to launch.

The program, which began in 2010, involves the inspection of the hulls of boats to detect invasive species such as quagga

and zebra mussels, which attach themselves to any surfaces.

As of Jan. 1, a new state law requires the removal of any standing water in a boat when you take it out of a body of water. The motto that applies is "Clean, Drain, Dry."

And this is exactly what boat owners are expected to do when you leave a body of water — drain all of the standing water within the vessel.

This law also applies to kayaks and canoes, in both salt and freshwater bodies.

For a fishing boat, this means draining water through a plug or valve. For kayaks and canoes, it means turning the vessel upside down in order to dump out any water (some kayaks have drain plugs).

The kayak or canoe also should get a thorough wipe down with a sponge or cloths, especially the areas where one's feet rest, because some invasive species (like the New Zealand mud snails or fragments of invasive plants) - and even what might be considered native plants and animals — can be carried to a new location on the bottoms of boots or

Although drying out will usually kill most invasives, if the weather is damp and cool some zebra mussels have been shown to survive two to three weeks on or in a boat out of water.

Even shells and other organic materials are a problem.

Oregon lakes are monitored by taking water samples to look for "environmental DNA" from potential non-native organisms. It's a very sensitive test that detects very small traces of DNA from an invasive species.

If a false positive occurs because a boater carries even shells, not live animals, into the lake from elsewhere, that will show up in the environment DNA. Additional monitoring may have to be done, involving testing many samples from throughout the lake — at a cost of thousands of dollars.

Boat owners who fail to abide by launch laws and clean their boats may receive tickets of up to \$250 and will be required to clean their boats.

Rick Boatner of the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife supervises the inspectors at the six Oregon inspection stations. These stations are funded by a \$5

permit fee paid by owners who license their boats every two years (including canoes and kayaks that are at least 10-feet long).

Four of the six stations - Brookings, Klamath Falls, Lakeview and Umatilla — are only open seasonally (usually April to September). The Ashland (I-5) and Ontario (I-84 at the eastern border of Oregon) stations are yearround.

Currently, there have been no sightings of the mussels in Oregon, with the exception of a false positive in upper Klamath Lake back in 2012.

Last year, the Brookings inspection station ran from April 16 to after Labor Day, with 2,907 inspections conducted.

The Brookings station has the highest rate of non-compliance of all of the Oregon inspection stations. About 45% of boats being transported by the station are not inspected because their owners (or haulers) do not stop, even though required to do so by law.

Vehicles hauling kayaks and canoes are among the worst offenders, according to Boatner. Apparently, many of those boaters believe the inspection requirement doesn't apply to them.

The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife hires and trains inspectors to staff these stations and perform the inspections.

Generally, these inspectors either have a college bachelor's degree or an associate degree in a field related to ecology or fish and wildlife management, or they may be college students in the same fields.

According to Boatner, the training consists of a week of study about the laws and procedures, then a week of hands-on training at the inspection station.

The program relies heavily on "enforcement through education" to teach boaters about their important role in prevent the spread of invasive species. The fish and wildlife department and the Oregon Marine Board said the use social media, newspaper articles and word of mouth helps alert boaters to the laws.

Writing tickets is usually a last resort, they said.






John Patrick Tiernan passed away on June 17, 2020 at his home in Gold Beach, Oregon, of chronic heart failure at 70 years

If not, he should be encouraged to talk with a licensed mental health professional not only about his depression, but also his glaring lack of self-esteem.

From your description, I would have to say he needs a friend now more than a romance, so take plenty of time if you proceed in this relationship. If he makes progress, see where things lead. If not, then in light of your own history, it might be better for you to find someone who is stronger.

DEAR ABBY: I have been in a six-year relationship. About two years into it, I found out that "Wayne" was separated, but not divorced, from his wife of 20 years. The fact that they are separated is not the issue. They live together and do things as a married couple. The wife and I have met each other several times, and I have gone to his children's graduation parties and family weddings.



Physicians orders are required in order to receive a test, and patients are invited to call 541412-2000 to schedule a telephone consultation or tele-health visit to receive an order. Once a patient has an order, an appointment is made for any one of the three locations, and the patient has their specimen collected by laboratory or nursing staff, conveniently, in their vehicle and without the need to enter a facility. COVID-19 testing is free to the patient (insurance companies will be billed with no payment due from the patient, uninsured will not receive

At this time no pharmacies in Brookings or Gold Beach have set up a COVID-19 testing site.

Library open with limited services in Brookings

I am thrilled to announce reopened on Monday, June 15! Our hours will be Monday through Friday 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., and to start we will only be admitting 25 people at a time. Social distancing is required, so please stay six feet away from staff and other patrons. Wearing masks is strongly encouraged.

We will have a staff person stationed in the lobby. When you come in, stop at the table in the lobby and one of our friendly staff will hand you one of our bright pink laminated capacity cards (sanitized between uses), which are numbered 1 to 25. When you leave, return the card to the staff person. They will sanitize the card and then hand it to the next person waiting. We don't expect long lines, but if you do arrive and need to wait for a card, please remember to maintain six feet of distance while waiting. Once we see how things go with 25 people at a time, we will look at increasing our capacity if we can safely do so.

Additionally, our current method of appointment-based hold pickups

is ending. Just come to the lobby of the library during our open hours to pick up your holds. We'll check your holds out to you there. If you'd like to browse the collection inside before or after checking out your holds, you will need to request a capacity card.

Meeting rooms are still unavailable, and computer use is still by appointment only. Computer appointments are limited to 50 minutes with no extensions. If you'd like to schedule a time to use a computer, call us at 541-469-7738 between 1-6 p.m. on any weekday.

And one final note. Please understand that choosing to visit a public building during this time comes with a certain amount of assumed risk. We are not able to keep every item or every surfaced sanitized throughout the day. We will only be cleaning and sanitizing the restrooms once per day. We will try our best to keep high-touch surfaces sanitized, and to sanitize anything that we check out to you or hand you. But because no system is perfect, we strongly recommend that you wear masks, wash your hands frequently,

only touch items/surfaces that you need to touch, and refrain from touching your

Please do not come to the library if you are ill. Before going into any public place, the Centers for Disease Control

recommends that you ask yourself the following questions:

• In the last 14 days have you come into close contact (within 6 feet) with someone who has received a confirmed COVID-19 diagnosis?

• Do you have a cough, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing?

• Do you have at least two of these symptoms: Fever, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, please do not come to the library. If staff notice you coughing or appearing to be ill, we may provide you a mask or, in extreme circumstances, ask you to leave until you are feeling better.

"I hope she gets a lot of people to buy those shirts. Gina works so hard every year on this. We can't thank her enough," Brussard said.

The two-foot high blocks will be placed about 10 feet back from the existing riprap to create a pathway using the existing concrete and asphalt pavement. Sections of the blocks would be removed

to create access points for pedestrians, including at the seasonal beach ramps. The blocks would be reinstalled during King Tide winter storms.

On the roadway side of the wall, parking stops would be placed two feet back from the blocks to keep vehicles from hitting the wall.

The roadway will be reduced to a single lane with one-way traffic. Following the installation of the wall, the parking area will be restriped and signage installed. Webster said there will be a reduction in parking spaces.

The port also plans to install self-closing sewer caps for all of the full hook-up RV sites.


