

## Commissioners form housing committee

More than a year after declaring a state of emergency due to a lack of housing in Curry County, the board of commissioners took another baby step toward finding a solution last week.

During a regular meeting, the board voted unanimously to create a Housing Committee, with the goal of moving forward with actually getting new housing built and available for people.

"We've talked about having a Housing Committee, we talked about how we would do with all the issues we're facing now with housing," Board Chair Chris Paasch said. "I think we're at the point now with all the changes featured in housing and with all

the homeless issues, especially with COVID going on. I'd like to talk to the board and get the board's thoughts on a housing authority. We did decide on a state of emergency on housing, so I think it's in our best interest to move on this."

Commissioner Court Boice agreed with Paasch, saying it is time to move forward.

"We have all been worried about this for a long time," Boice said. "I like the idea. This is something that's overdue and can maybe get us some resources. We're making a little progress in workforce housing but not much, certainly not much with the homeless. If we have a very cold winter are we going to be able to help people?"

Julie Schmelzer, the director of operations for Curry County,

said having an official county committee could be a big step toward getting funding or other resources. She explained when the county had an ad hoc task force on housing, she filled out a grant application only to find out the county was not eligible because there was no official county committee.

Curry County resident David Barnes talked to commissioners, telling them creating another committee would accomplish little.

"You have a plan already," Barnes said. "There's all kinds of housing and homeless organizations who work on this. This is just another group of people who are going to come together, sit down, talk a lot and write up another plan. You've talked about this enough. The next thing

that needs to happen is someone needs to identify a piece of property to put something on and build a building on it. Why talk about it more?"

Schmelzer said the county has identified some properties, some the county owns and some in private hands. She said even some hotels are on the list, but there is still work to do before the county can act.

"Having a committee where you have people directly impacted by the housing crisis partner with agencies and you have staff there to actually facilitate it and make it happen is really the only thing I can think of to move it along," Schmelzer said. "We've had this emergency declaration for over a year now and literally nothing has happened."

After discussing the issue,

commissioners voted unanimously to form the committee. Applications for members are being accepted now, and Schmelzer said she hopes to get members chosen quickly.

The ordinance approved by the commission shows committee members will consist of a housing coordinator, a business owner, a senior citizen, a resident representing the disabled community, a veteran, a resident that has experienced homelessness, a member of the faith based community, a member from the educational sector, a contractor, a real estate agent and one at-large member each from northern, central and southern Curry County.

Commissioners are expected to pick members at their Dec. 16 meeting.

## Stout Mountain Railway sports linear design

Tony Parrish is back laying track this week for the Stout Mountain Railway Christmas display, a Brookings tradition for 13 years.

This year has provided a few additional challenges to meet social distancing requirements in designing the theme, Playground of Imagination. The model railroads will span across 100 feet of window front in the Brookings-Harbor Shopping Center and will run from 2 to 6 p.m., Dec. 12 through 24.

The first hurdle to overcome was to change the height of all the sawhorses underneath the train tables so they would be level with the window ledges.

"I had to take all of our 24-inch sawhorses and get them to 30 inches," Parrish said. "I had to design it so I could get to it."

Usually the train displays are in the middle of the room, which allows Parrish to walk around the displays to clean the tracks and make adjustments, but that's not the case this year with the model railroads close to the glass with just enough wiggle room for him to get in between if he needs to make any adjustments.

Each of the window displays also needed a mural backdrop to screen the displays from

the wide-open former grocery store back-ground. All the controllers for the different tracks are lined up behind the murals.

"Last year, the murals went around the displays," he said. "This time it's all one-sided."

The displays encompass all the different railway scales. The G-scale railroad has a cable car that climbs up into the Christmas

## Steelhead fin clips tell us a lot

Chetco River steelhead anglers can help the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife by engaging in some citizen science this year.

Annually, ODFW releases up to 50,000 yearling hatchery steelhead into the Chetco River to provide additional angling opportunity for adult hatchery steelhead. Anglers can tell a hatchery steelhead from a wild steelhead by a missing adipose fin. This is the mark most used by fishery managers to identify hatchery fish.

This year, anglers may find some additional fin clip marks. Over the past two years, ODFW has released juvenile hatchery steelhead with these two additional marks: in 2019 a right ventral fin was clipped, and in 2020 a left ventral fin was clipped.

Chetco winter steelhead typically spend two or three years in the ocean prior to returning to spawn, with most returning after two years.

The outcome is a substantial chunk of change raised by the organization: With this round of fundraising, the organization donated over \$16,000 to Santa's Workshop in Crescent City and \$4,000 to the Oasis Shelter in Gold Beach.

In Crescent City, with stacks of gifts beginning to pile up, "it's starting to look like a workshop," said Celia Perez, a licensed social worker who's taken up the lead on Santa's Workshop this year.

The group has been around for at least 20 years, according to Perez. After donating to the program, then spending some holiday seasons volunteering to wrap gifts, she stepped up to lead the effort this year after the organization's previous leader passed away in late October.

That means things have been changing for the program: In addition to the COVID-19 pandemic, the transition in leadership has given organizers a later start than usual. While in previous years organizers have placed mittens on Christmas trees around town, that couldn't happen this year.

"Because we had a late start, this is what we got," Perez said.

Another change this year? The number of families applying for gifts from Santa's Workshop.

Gifts are available to families who meet certain income requirements. While Perez and other organization leaders expected

that number to increase this year as more families find themselves facing unemployment from the pandemic's shutdown, the effect has been the opposite.

"I think that a lot of us were expecting the numbers to be double," Perez said.

Perez says this year Santa's Workshop will see slightly fewer applications than in previous years, since the pandemic has made it more difficult to offer in-person sign up options.

Still though, the program is open to families this year who might be facing unemployment due to pandemic closures, and the chance to give those gifts gives Perez the feeling of "Christmas magic," she said.

"They are genuinely grateful and thankful for the service and receiving the gifts," Perez said of the families who receive gifts from Santa's Workshop.

With the impact of the pandemic in mind, Perez said she's also trying to keep the money she spends on gifts within the community by shopping at small businesses which have struggled during shutdowns and an economic downturn.

"To spend the money locally, for the businesses that are struggling locally, that's a big thing for me," Perez said. "It's going into some of these mom and pop shops."

Santa's Workshop is accepting donations until gifts are delivered on Dec. 18, Perez said. Interested donors can contact Rural Health Services at 707-464-7441 for information.

Up the highway, the Oasis Shelter's Christmas program received just more than \$4,000 from the Pelican Bay group.

The shelter, located in Gold Beach, serves people between Coos Bay and Crescent City who are survivors of domestic abuse or stalking at home, according to Sean Rucker, an advocate with the shelter.

"Sometimes when they are survivors, they leave with little to nothing," Rucker said.

That's where the shelter's Christmas program comes in — individuals and families submit an application for gifts, clothes or food. Shelter staff shop for the individuals, and the goal is to get applicants something they enjoy for the holidays.

"There's not always a lot left at the end of the month for the shiny new pair of shoes," Rucker said.

"We're trying to get them a little something special."

The past few years, the shelter's helped 80 to 90 families, Rucker said. But this year is different — since many places where applications can be picked up are closed during the pandemic, just over 40 people have signed up so far.

"Up until this year, it grew every year," Rucker said. "More and more people are just needing a little bit of a hand-up."

That means the donations from Pelican Bay fill a pretty substantial chunk of the Christmas program's need this year, Rucker said.

Still, the shelter is always accepting donations for its clients fleeing unsafe situations at home. Toys, home products and some clothes, are accepted at its location in Gold Beach. "It all adds up," Rucker said.

# Fire & Rescue dedicates new training facility for Brookings

Center includes multiple options for training by local firefighters

Brookings Fire & Rescue Department held a dedication ceremony Nov. 21, at the new Training Grounds in the Brookings area. The event was attended by fire department members, the Brookings mayor and city council, past and present city managers, the public safety director and a South Coast representative.

The event started with the mayor, council and fire chief doing a ribbon cutting.

The training area has been in the approval and planning stages for about three years and now has an area for doing class A fire burns in CONEX boxes, a wild land firefighting training area and a rescue and ground ladder training facility. Future plans are for a dedicated area for vehicle extrication using the hydraulic rescue tools and equipment.

Firefighters demonstrated the facility by doing a live fire demonstration in the burn facility and a rescue of a firefighter down in the rescue and ladder training facility.

The facility is a great asset for being able to have a dedicated area for training and honing the skills of the firefighters in the varying aspects of the job of firefighting and rescue.

The Brookings Fire & Rescue Department is comprised of only two career firefighters while the rest are dedicated, community volunteers. tree, along with five rows of tracks that wind through a Christmas alpine village that has stores familiar to Brookings residents with piles of brightly wrapped packages under a large tree.

“People keep bringing us collections and things, so we try to add something new each year,” Parrish said.

The next window vignette contains the HO scale model with some old-time downtown buildings, including a butcher shop, and a farm that has a tornado.

The Z scale train model track is set on an island with the Brooklyn Bridge. In another set, a trolley starts at the south shore of Chicago and travels to the other side of the lake.

Next are the Driftwood Mountains that run along the ocean shore with giant starfish and seashells in the sand. Next is the N-scale railroad created with 3-D puzzles that have hundreds of little pieces that go together without glue to create a collection of

national landmarks.

The imagination continues to run wild in the next display.

“It’s the Flintstones meet the Jetsons,” Parrish said.

Dinosaurs wander between rock buildings that were painted by the Tuesday Tolers, a group of painters from back in the early ’90s.

On Wednesday, he still had a few more trees to decorate, more backdrops to install and burlap to drape below the windows.

Then he’s ready to bring the trains and try to hook up some Christmas music to the sound system.

It’s just Parrish putting up the display this year. It will be the 10th year at the shopping center. The owner of the shopping center gave him the section with the most window space to

give enough distance for people to stay apart.

“It’s open air - it won’t be too crowded, and you can actually sit in your car and see it, especially after dark and it’s all lit up,” he said.

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# Curry COVID-19 cases inch upward

COVID-19 cases continue to increase in Curry County, with 26 new cases reported in the last week.

The vast majority of new cases came in over the weekend, with four cases reported Saturday, eight Sunday and four more Monday.

As of Thursday, there were 179 total cases in Curry County since the beginning of the pandemic and 48 active cases.

Curry County Public Health Administrator Sherrie Ward reported two new cases Wednesday night. Both individuals were south Curry County residents. One is at home isolating, while the second in an elderly patient who is hospitalized.

Curry County Public Health is investigating all active cases through contact tracing to identify any possible contacts and exposures and will reach out to anyone suspected of exposure to COVID-19.

Curry County has had two deaths since the pandemic began. Chris Paasch, chair of the county board of supervisors, said one was an elderly patient who was about to enter hospice and the other had “extreme” underlying conditions.

“Please remember, it is important that we all follow the OHA and CDC guidelines and governor’s directives about social distancing, wearing facial coverings in public buildings and protecting yourselves by staying home to slow the spread and save lives,” Ward wrote in a press release. “CCPH will continue to keep the public informed with all the information we can in order to keep our citizens safe.”

Statewide, case numbers continue to soar.

As of Wednesday, Oregon was up to 1,110 total deaths and 88,287 total cases. The state reported 30 deaths Wednesday, a day after reporting a new high of 36.

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# Commissioners send letter to governor

*The Curry County Board of Commissioners voted unanimously to send the following letter to Oregon Gov. Kate Brown.*

Governor Brown,  
Please find this letter of concern on behalf of Curry County. First and foremost, we are Oregonians, we are neighbors, friends, family members. We have been called to serve and voted into office by our constituency. It is in all these roles that we write to share our grave concerns with your extension of your latest Executive Order — the ‘Temporary Freeze.’  
We recognize the threat that

COVID-19 poses to our community and support data driven decisions to limit the spread of this disease, but we do not support the mandate to close gyms, churches, and restaurants as it is not supported by historical data and will only address a small fraction of Oregon’s COVID cases at the cost of thousands of jobs and hundreds of businesses.  
Combined, cases that can be traced back to churches, restaurants and gyms make up less than 1% of all the recorded COVID cases in Oregon. Quite simply, there is no actual evidence that restaurants, gyms or churches are

driving COVID in our community. In fact, because of the adherence to mask wearing and social distancing, these establishments have been some of the safest in the state.  
The closure of these establishments ensures more jobs are lost and Oregonians are left only to rely on a broken unemployment system. Our neighbors and friends won’t be able to pay their mortgages, pay their rent, or buy Christmas presents for their children because of this decision. This is wrong.  
Furthermore, we are concerned with the violation of our privacy as the state police and lo-

cal law enforcement agencies are being ordered to investigate and criminally charge Oregonians based on the number of people they invite into their homes. Legality questions aside, with depression and anxiety levels at an all-time high, creating a new crime to visit your family only hinders those struggling with their mental health.  
Data shows us that COVID has been spreading at private social gatherings, and we call on our fellow citizens to be careful and social distance when gathering over the holidays, but we cannot and will not support any attempt by any police agency

to violate the sacred space of any Oregonian’s home.  
We urge you to stop this mandate that will hinder the working people, families and their loved ones, the well-being of Oregonians, and the state of our economy and communities.  
Thank you for taking this into consideration as we all work together to keep Oregon safe.

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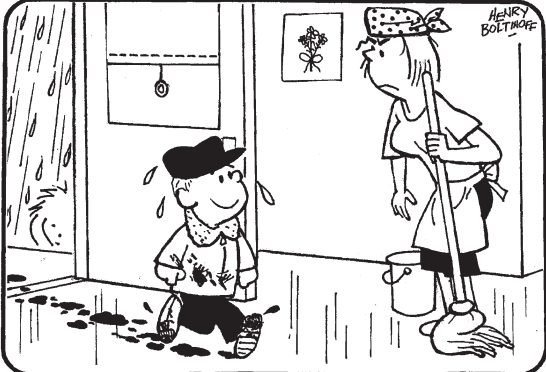

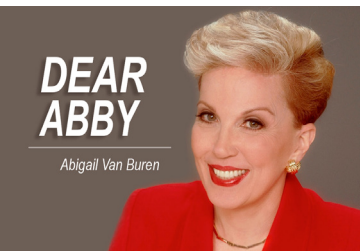


DAUGHTER CLASHES WITH DAD OVER HIS TEENAGE GIRLFRIEND

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Tufted puffins removed from listing as threatened or endangered

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced Wednesday, Dec. 2, that the tufted puffin, a charismatic seabird on the North Pacific Ocean, does not warrant listing as threatened or endangered under the Endangered Species Act.

The tufted puffin is a small black bird with a distinctive white mask, bright orange bill and golden tufts of feathers on either side of its head. According to U.S. Fish and Wildlife, it fishes the deep ocean for much of the year, but in summer months, can be seen nesting in burrows on island and cliffs along the coast.

"The most recent range-wide estimate of the species is approximately 3 million individuals, and about 82 percent of the known population appears to demonstrate stable or increasing trends," U.S. Fish and Wildlife reported.

Climate change and oil spills pose the biggest threats to tufted puffins. The service's status review found tufted puffins are undergoing a range contraction on the southern end of their range, but the species continues to be widely distributed across the northern part of its range and maintains high overall abundance.

"The tufted puffin is an essential member of the coastal and marine ecosystems in which it resides," said Stewart Cogswell, supervisor of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Anchorage Fish and Wildlife Conservation Office, in a press release. "Although the species does not warrant listing under the Endangered Species Act, we will continue to work with others to monitor and conserve this iconic seabird throughout its range."

John Underwood, board member of Friends of Haystack Rock, said because the tufted puffin

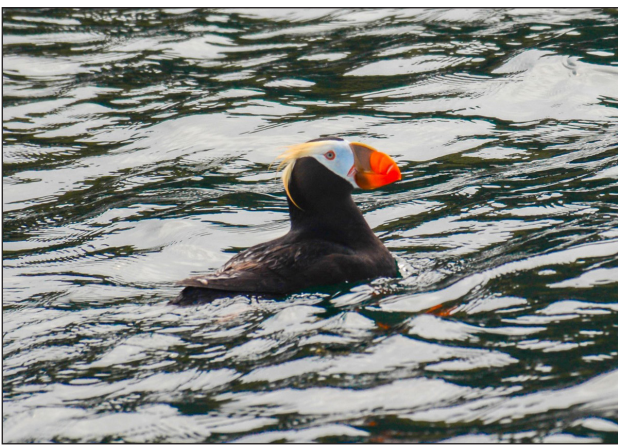

is no longer listed, there is no additional protection or government funding for research. Friends of Haystack Rock fund the research of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Scientists have put together a strategy to identify puffins in the California Current. The research involves trying to determine if the puffins are a distinct population segment. Under the Endangered Species Act, a distinct population segment is a vertebrate population

or groups of populations that is distinct from other populations of the species and significant in relation to the entire species.

"We think they are distinct enough to qualify for this segment," Underwood said.

According to Friends of Haystack Rock, Haystack Rock is home to the largest tufted puffin breeding colony in Oregon. These seabirds show up to the rock in early April and spend about 16 weeks at

the rock.

Underwood said puffin populations are still declining. The population of tufted puffins has decreased dramatically at Haystack Rock and is in significant decline or has disappeared entirely from colonies in California, Oregon, Washington, Japan and the Gulf of Alaska.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife lays out a grid on the rock at Haystack to observe the birds, showing every burrow used, Underwood added. There used to be thousands of puffins at the rock; now there are less than 100. U.S. Fish and Wildlife goes out to the rock 3-4 days a week and monitors when puffins are bringing food back to the burrows.

"They meet at the same location every year," Underwood said of the puffins.

Underwood calls the puffins an icon of Cannon Beach. People come from all over to see the iconic bird. The Great

Puffin Watch, held over the Fourth of July weekend brings hundreds of people. People traveling to the area for the holiday weekend learn about the event from going to the beach and brochures in various hotels.

"We get the opportunity to educate folks about the puffins," Underwood said of the event.

People who attend this event can view the puffins with birding scopes and binoculars. Underwood said this helps people feel like they bond with the birds.

"We can't let these birds disappear," Underwood said.

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

## Commercial crab season set to open Dec 16 on South Coast

Fresh Oregon crab is back on the menu – the commercial Dungeness crab fishery will open on most of Oregon's coast as of Dec. 16. Dungeness crab will be ready to be harvested just in time for the holidays from Cape Falcon south to the California border.

Prior to the opener, crab vessels will set gear from Dec. 13 onwards, using the “pre-soak” period of time to set gear in anticipation of the first pull of ocean crab pots Dec. 16. The recreational crab fishery is already open along the entire Oregon coast.

The area north of Cape Falcon will remain closed to commercial crabbing to coordinate an orderly start with the Washington coastal Dungeness crab fishery. Results from recent domoic acid testing of crab viscera (guts) conducted by the state of Washington were elevated, and Washington delayed their coastal fishery until further testing is conducted.

All crab tested from all Oregon's crab harvest areas have been well below alert levels and all Oregon crab product on the market is safe to eat. The Oregon Department of Agriculture will continue to regularly test crab and shellfish to ensure levels in all areas remain below alert levels.

For information about Oregon's shellfish marine biotoxin monitoring, call ODA's shellfish safety information hotline at (800) 448-2474.

# OSAA pushes start of sports year to February

Traditional winter sports now will be final season

In a much-anticipated move, the Oregon School Activities Association on Monday decided to push back the start of its sports seasons as it continues to navigate the COVID-19 crisis.

The executive board moved to adopt a three-season plan with six-week seasons, starting with fall sports contests March 1 and followed by spring (April 12) and winter (May 17). The seasons include an “opt-in culminating week,” an option for post-season competition.

Fall sports practices are scheduled to begin Feb. 22, except for football, which will start Feb. 8. Spring and winter practices begin April 5 and May 10, respectively.

“It’s a moving target,” OSAA Executive Director Peter Weber said of altering the calendar. “We needed to make a decision. I think the board made the right decision.”

The board voted in August for a plan that

opened with winter sports practices Dec. 28, hopeful that state guidance would allow for schools to return to in-person learning. But virus cases have increased throughout the fall, with 25 of the 36 counties – and all but 42 member schools – currently in the “extreme-risk” category.

“All of our conversations with the Oregon Health Authority, and following the news, it appears that the models are showing that things are going to get worse before they get better,” Weber said. “As we’re looking to provide as much time as possible to lower case counts — and get counties out of the extreme-risk level, if possible — we thought that this timeline made sense.”

Considering many districts end their first semester in early February, Weber said moving the start to late February is potentially a good fit for schools that could return to in-person learning. Also, the weather later in February would better accommodate the outdoor fall sports.

The previous plan had seven-week seasons, plus the culminating week. The new plan calls for six-week seasons that include the culminating week.

“Obviously, they’re shorter seasons, but they also provide three distinct seasons and continue an opportunity for all kids to be involved, hopefully,” Weber said. “It’s shorter than we would like, and not as soon as we would like, but we feel like it’s realistic and something that we can put into place.”

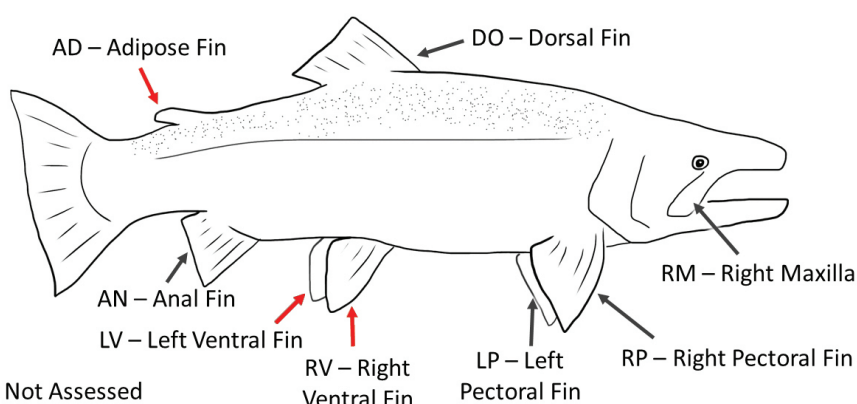
The board also considered a two-season plan with nine-week seasons. In that plan, the first season (February to April) would have included fall sports, golf and swimming, and the second season (April to June) would have had spring sports, basketball and wrestling.

Ultimately, the board believed that stacking sports would have created too much difficulty for smaller schools.

“While there was some support for the idea that there would be longer seasons, and provide some flexibility, in the end, the stacking of sports on top of one another was difficult for the board to move beyond,” Weber said.

The board also approved extending the current Season 1 period, which lifts restrictions for out of season coaching, through Feb. 21.

Unlike salmon, steelhead do not necessarily die after spawning, but repeat spawning is not as common as some might assume. The likelihood in the Chetco River of a steelhead returning is 10 percent to 12 percent or less. Anglers often assume these repeat fish are the big fish they catch, but biologists have learned, based on scales sampled, those bigger fish are steelhead that spent three or four years in the ocean before their first spawning run.

### What can you do?

ODFW would like for anglers to keep a Chetco River hatchery winter steelhead harvest log that notes the date, size of the fish, rough location such as the nearest gravel bar or access point, and the number of hatchery steelhead and their fin marks - adipose, adipose/left ventral, adipose right ventral.

If your steelhead has all of its fins, it’s a native fish. If it’s missing the adipose fin, it is a hatchery steelhead. All Chetco River hatchery steelhead are missing an adipose fin. Once an angler retains a hatchery steelhead, it’s time to check for secondary clips.

### Does it have an adipose fin clip?

If your fish only has an adipose fin clip, it was released in 2018 or earlier. If it is a large steelhead, 12 to 14 pounds, most likely the fish has spent three or more years in the ocean before making its first spawning run. If it is smaller, the steelhead may be on a second spawning run.

### Does it have an adipose fin and right ventral fin clip?

If yes, this steelhead was released in 2019. It

has spent two years in the ocean before spawning. These fish should be around six to eight pounds.

### Does it have an adipose fin and left ventral fin clip?

If yes, this steelhead was released in 2020. It has spent one year in the ocean before returning. These fish may be returning to spawn or are on a false spawning run.

### Why?

For two years, the ODFW has changed release strategies for Chetco River hatchery winter steelhead smolts, varying the location and timing of the release. The additional fin clip and information collected from anglers will

assist ODFW in evaluating whether these new release strategies have the potential to increase angler opportunity.

You can share your harvest log information by either communicating with ODFW staff directly out in the field or turning in your catch information to South Coast Fisherman representative Dave Kuehn at 805-350-0542 or Rod Anderson at 541-254-0065. They are working jointly with ODFW to collect the information.

You can also text 541-678-2616 or call ODFW Gold Beach office at 541-247-7605 with catch information. Drop boxes will also be located at popular access points for anglers to drop off catch information.

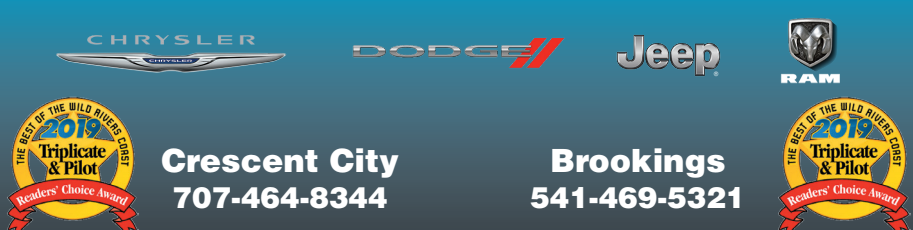

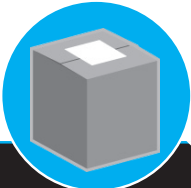

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
