The winners will be honored Thursday, May 21st at 4 pm, during a virtual ceremony.

LOOKING BACK, FILLED WITH GRATITUDE

Michael Guthrie, CEO and managing broker at Roy Wheeler Realty Co. in Charlottesville, had a "very interesting school experience," looking back to his K-12 education. It involved going to school shoeless for several years, his experience has a link to former President Obama and he was able to cultivate friendships that endure to this day.

"Looking back, I'm filled with gratitude," Guthrie said. "I had wonderful teachers and learned valuable lessons. I know many kids have struggles, or experience bullying or feel left out. I was fortunate and experienced none of these things. I'm grateful for that."

The Annandale native went to kindergarten in his hometown, and even though he was young, there's one thing he vividly remembers.

"The preschool and kindergarten kids at that school were able to play a part in the Thanksgiving play and I remember that being a cool experience," Guthrie said.

Soon after, Guthrie left Annandale behind and embarked on an adventure with his family.

"My dad was in the Army and he got stationed in Hawaii," Guthrie said.

"So we packed up everything and left for Honolulu."

Guthrie was first enrolled in a public elementary school on the Army base, but soon after enrolled at Punahou School, a private school in the biggest city of Hawaii.

"That was a wonderful experience," he recalled. "I remember living there and not wearing shoes at all, even in school. I was at Punahou for fourth, fifth and sixth grade and never wore any shoes. It's pretty remarkable."

Later, Guthrie learned the school would enroll a very famous student: Barack Obama.


"It's my claim to fame," Guthrie laughed. "I went to the same school as President Obama."

Guthrie was there during the '60s, and one day, sitting in class, an announcement was made over the school's intercom system.

"It was the day President Kennedy was assassinated. That was absolutely terrible and I remember to this day hearing that message."

Being a left-handed writer, Guthrie needed some extra help with his writing, and credits Ms. Matthews and Ms. Bythiner with helping him with that.

Guthrie's dad's next assignment was at the Pentagon, and during middle school and high school, Guthrie found himself back in Annandale.

"I went to Edger Allan Poe Middle School," Guthrie said. "There's one teacher that made a big impression on me, even though I forgot his name. He was our PE teacher. I remember his brother was a professional baseball player for the Yankees. He was someone I looked up to and who inspired ma as an eighth-grader. One day I came home from school and told my mom: 'I want to be a PE teacher when I grow up."

Guthrie would later enroll at Annandale High School, home of the

"I was very involved in sports and politics," he said. "High school for me felt as a safe place where I made lots of friends. I felt comfortable in my own skin and was able to grow as a student. To this day, our high school reunions every five years are very well attended. I was able to make friends for life there."

His father was later stationed in Korea for a year, but the family was able to stay in Virginia. "Being the son of an Army dad, it's pretty special that I was able to stay in the same house between seventh and 12th grade and even through my first two years of college. My dad was later stationed in Hawaii again, and I spent two holiday breaks as a college student there. You can't ask for more. All in all, I am very grateful for the experiences I was able to have."

HEAD OF SCHOOL AT TANDEM FRIENDS SCHOOL

QUAKER VALUES INSTILLED AT EARLY AGE

t's safe to say that for Whitney Thompson, head of school at Tandem Friends School in Albemarle County, school experiences during her formative years shaped her into the adult she is today, and set her on her current career path.

"There's no doubt about that," Thompson said.

After attending a Jewish nursery school in St. Louis, she had a "typical suburban kindergarten experience" in that city. But around the time she was ready to enter first grade, the family moved to New York City.

That change of scenery wasn't that big of a change, remembered Thompson.

"We moved to Riverdale, a residential neighborhood of the Bronx, which had a suburban feel to it. Even though we were in Ney York City, people still had gardens with their houses."

She enrolled at PS 24, The Spuyten Duyvil School.

"That was an interesting and also unique experience for me," Thompson said. "There was a large group of Asian students at that school, most of them from Japan. It exposed me to a culture I wasn't familiar with and I enjoyed that."

By third grade Thompson realized that her school life with her peers was fascinating, but she didn't feel engaged with schoolwork. "My mom noticed that, and she got concerned. It was time for a change."

Although she couldn't have known it at the time, what happened next would change Thompson's life

forever; she enrolled at the Brooklyn Friends School.

"Within two weeks I was a completely different student and person," she recalled. "School was structured differently than I was used to, I was challenged and encouraged. We called teachers by their first names, and during lunch they would sit with us and we would have discussions about many different topics, like favorite books or movies. It was a great experience."

The collaborative environment during upper elementary and middle school was important for another reason, Thompson said.

"Adolescents normally have very strong feelings about a lot of different things. As a school, you can choose to contain or overpower these feelings, or you can try to channel them into something productive. The latter was the case at Brooklyn Friends School. We were all confident enough to disagree with a teacher about something, and an honest discussion in class would follow. For adolescents with strong feelings and emotions, that is a big thing."

Thompson experienced a "noticeable change" when she went to Trinity School, an Episcopal high school in Manhattan.

"It was a much more traditional experience. The school was highly regarded, but it didn't have the same Quaker values I was used to at Brooklyn Friends School. The headmaster, for instance, was Welsh and he had a very dry sense of humor. He would say things like:



'I don't talk to freshmen because they don't have anything good to say'. He meant it as a joke, but it was such a noticeable difference from the collaborative environment at Brooklyn Friends School."

Although she learned a lot in high school, and was often intellectually challenged, it's her time at Brooklyn Friends School that made Thompson the person she is today. So much so that after college, she returned there to teach.

"It felt like coming full circle. I looked at many other schools for a job after college, but I never felt the connection I felt with Brooklyn Friends School."

There's one teacher that was a big influence on her while in Brooklyn, Thompson said.

"Her name was Mary Doty and she taught health class," Thompson said. "That was a safe place for us to talk about the tricky stuff teenagers go through that you would feel uncomfortable discussing with your parents. She was a great teacher and an inspiration."

Her own experiences in that class made her adamant she would teach health class herself. "And I did for many years. Even when I was assistant headmaster. I would still make time to teach that class."

Thompson is now in her third year as headmaster at Tandem Friends School, "When it comes to the Friends School community, Tandem Friends is even more unique. There's a great energy to this school and I'm very excited to be here."
