

Four-down territory

1. New direction, for now: The Hank Brown era at quarterback began last week with positive results. The redshirt freshman is not the clear-cut starter moving forward. Despite Brown throwing four TDs last week, the expectations have been made clear by head coach Hugh Freeze. "I'm not much on (giving slack). He's got to get it done," Freeze said. "You have to execute at a high level at quarterback to win games or you have to find one that will."

2. Go bigger: The Tigers will be without tight end Brandon Frazier for quite some time. He had surgery on his foot this week. There are other tight ends in the rotation: Rivaldo Fairweather, Luke Deal and Micah Riley. They are used in a variety of different ways, but Auburn needs a big body to replace Frazier. "We are going to move someone else in that room," Freeze said. "We really want to go big at tight end. We need someone with build to put on the jersey that resembles a tight end."

3. Freeze is hot: One thing that can drive a head coach crazy is special teams miscues. Freeze is no different. Auburn had some penalties and a muffed punt last week. There have been a couple of instances with muffed punts this season. "The most important dadgum thing after a special teams play is that we have the ball. That's something that's becoming frustrating," Freeze said. Defensive back Keionte Scott has been the punt returner, but Freeze said he's looking to find someone who can "secure the ball."

4. Scary hogs: Arkansas' Ja'Quinden Jackson leads the SEC with 397 rushing yards while quarterback Taylen Green leads the league with 1,051 total yards (806 pass, 245 rush). Throw into the mix Andrew Armstrong, who is second in the SEC with 301 receiving yards. Sounds like typical numbers in a Bobby Petrino offense. "If you can line up in 12 personnel and be effective at running the ball and take (deep passing) shots out of it, that's a scary world to live in," Freeze said. The Auburn defense hasn't exactly been the

best at stopping the pass. The Tigers have allowed the most yards (728) in the SEC.

Key matchup

Auburn LB Jalen McLeod vs. Arkansas LB **Xavian Sorev**

McLeod has been a nice transfer pickup for Auburn. The former Appalachian State player has one sack with 13 tackles and leads the team with 4.5 tackles for loss. Sorey is the top tackler for the Razorbacks with 23. He has one sack with three tackles for loss. Big plays by these linebackers will be the key to victory.

Player of the week

Towns McGough, K

In big games, special teams usually play a big part in the outcome. McGough has

hit just two field goals in three attempts so far, but Auburn hasn't needed had to utilize him in the nonconference schedule. The freshman will be asked to come through in clutch moments Saturday.

Longhorns enjoy return to No. 1

AUSTIN, Texas - The Texas Longhorns returned to class Monday as the No. 1 team in the country for the first time in 16 years and with college football buzzing about hotshot backup quarterback Arch Manning, who could very well be leading the team for another game or

And while several Longhorns noted that national championships are won in January and not September, the older players admit they like seeing that No. 1 next to the iconic Longhorn logo.

It was just four seasons ago Texas was 5-7.

"It's huge for people who grew up Texas fans," senior tight end Gunnar Helm said. "To be the team to bring us back to No. 1 is an honor."

There have been some struggles getting there.

Texas (3-0) was last ranked No. 1 over a three-week stretch of the 2008 season. The Longhorns were No. 2 in 2009 after losing that season's the national championship game. Those two years ended a decade-long stretch of 10-win seasons that included the 2005 national title.

Then came five losing seasons, and eight more with four or more losses. "Texas is back!" memes mocked the Longhorns on social media. Texas did not win another Big 12 title until 2023, its last season in the league.

And that 5-7 finish season in 2021, coach Steve Sarkisian's first in Austin, is still raw for the many on the current

Being No. 1 "means a good bit to me because I've been 5-7," senior center Jake Majors said. "I've been through that hardship."

Sarkisian has been an assistant at two TD run in a 56-7 rout. programs that were No. 1 at USC and Alabama. He'll take the No. 1 ranking, but immediately pointed Monday to the bigger picture in the new era of the College Football Playoff.

Texas earned its first berth in the CFP last season and lost to Washington in the national semifinals.

"Back in the day, the polls were huge because the polls dictated who got to play for, and also who won a national cares about Quinn."

championship. Nowadays, you have to go earn it," Sarkisian said. "I think it's good to show what we're capable of, but we're going to have to go earn this thing. The mission is far, far from over."

Junior safety Michael Taaffe insisted the Longhorns are focused on the finish, not the ranking in late September after three games. The goal is to be like the Texas undisputed national champions of 1963, 1969 and 2005.

"If we just settle right now, we're not going to be legendary," Taaffe said. "Our goal is to be legendary."

The other buzz about Texas is all about Manning, who replaced starting quarterback Ouinn Ewers last week against UTSA after Ewers suffered a non-contact abdominal strain. Manning delivered four passing touchdowns and a 67-yard

Manning would seem likely to get his first career start this week against Louisiana-Monroe (2-0) but Sarkisian would only call Ewers "questionable" for the game.

"Arch is just another guy on our team," Sarkisian said. "And the reason I'm able to do that is because that's who Arch is every day. Arch is a selfless teammate. He cares about the guys on the team,

Four-down territory

- 1. Hey, quarterback: The big question of the week (at the time of writing this): Who is going to start at OB for UNA with Ari Patu hurt? Could it be DC Tabscott or Ben Harris or TJ Smith? All three played to some varying degree in last week's loss at UT Martin. Tabscott got the start and finished 6-of-13 passing for 149 and two touchdowns, but was benched in favor of Harris after turning the ball over three times in a four-drive span. Harris was 7-of-19 for 81 yards and a pick-6. Smith completed his one pass. So, decisions, decisions.
- **2. Conference call:** The good news for UNA? Its nonconference schedule is officially over. The (potential) bad news? Things aren't likely to get much easier now that United Athletic Conference play begins and will feature eight straight league matchups. The Lions went 1-5 against UAC opponents a season ago. That includes a 52-31 loss at Tarleton State, also both teams' conference opener.
- **3. Rechecking history:** Broke this out two weeks ago, so it's worth mentioning again with some updated numbers and opponent. Tarleton State is ranked No. 16 in the Stats FCS top 25 poll. UNA has never beaten a ranked Division I team -FCS or FBS. The Lions are 0-16 all-time against ranked FCS schools with four games decided by a single score. They're also 0-2 against top-25 FBS teams thanks to the BYU matchup in 2020 and the Florida State game last year.
- 4. White-Schultz is back: UNA safety Edwin White-Schultz was named the UAC preseason defensive player of the year. Saturday will be his first game after serving a four-game academic suspension. In his absence, the Lions have given up at least 37 points and 170 yards rushing to two of their three FCS opponents. Perhaps having him back will help quell some of those numbers.

Tarleton State RB Kayvon Britten vs. White-Schultz

Britten was named the UAC's

1. Stormin' Norman: Tennessee coach Josh Heupel returns to Norman, where he was a Heisman Trophy runner-up for the Sooners in 2000 and led the team to a national championship. It's going to be a unique experience for Heupel to stand on the other side of the field. "I have teammates and friends back there," he said. "They hit me up a little bit early. They were starting last week already. It will be unique going back into that stadium. It's going to be a (different) viewpoint. I am not sure I spent a day on the opposing sideline inside the stadium - not even for scrimmage."

2. Pressure situation: Vols quarterback Nico Iamaleava has looked very comfortable in the pocket through three games (698 yards, six TDs). Saturday at Oklahoma will be his first big test. "I think his personality will translate extremely well." Heupel said. "It wasn't a true road game, but being over in Charlotte and the crowd being divided in half is a part of preparing (not only) him but our entire football team for this, too."

3. Numbers game: The Sooners will be the best defense Tennessee has faced. The Sooners allow just over 11 points per game. The Vols haven't scored under 50 points through three games and lead the nation with 24 offensive touchdowns. Something has to give Saturday. "They play really assignment sound," Heupel said. "They understand where they're supposed to be and recognizing patterns and getting into windows. They tie all

the defense in extremely well."

4. Stoops factor: Heupel played for the Sooners under Bob Stoops while current OU coach Brent Venables was Stoops' defensive coordinator for Stoops from 1999-2011. It made sense that Stoops was inundated with interview requests this week. He declined them, saying he wants the focus to be on the two coaches and not him. He did say, "I'm grateful for their great work here at OU; Brent as a coach here for 13 years including our national championship in 2000 and Josh as our 2000 national championship OB and coach for 10 years. I've often said he is the MVP of all my recruits because he was the catalyst that got us started in '99."

Key matchup

Tennessee OB Nico Iamaleava vs. Oklahoma QB Jackson Arnold

Iamaleava continues to prosper and actually prefers to play road games. The redshirt freshman was an efficient 10-of-16 last week for 173 yards and a touchdown and has nearly 700 passing yards this season. Arnold doesn't have as impressive numbers (484 yards), but he is dangerous out of the pocket with 159 rushing yards and two TDs.


Cooper Mays, C



Before bye, Georgia was on defensive roll

LEXINGTON, Ky. - Georgia knows an opponent inevitably will score a touchdown because that's football, and no defense is perfect despite the No. 2 Bulldogs looking impermeable right now.

Georgia (3-0, 1-0 Southeastern Conference) expects plenty of shots from No. 4 Alabama and dual-threat quarterback Jalen Milroe when it visits Tuscaloosa on Sept. 28 after a bye week.

The 'Dawgs entered their down time one spot lower in the AP Top 25 but feeling good about allowing just seven field goals over the past four games dating to

"Our defense takes a lot of pride in how they play, our defensive staff does an incredible job," Georgia coach Kirby Smart said, noting his team's red-zone defense and limiting explosive plays as keys to their success.

"They work really hard on game planning for people. We're going to play better and better offenses, (so) we've got to get better and better. But it's pretty hard to do. I don't know if anybody in college football has been able to sustain it. It's just pretty hard to do."

Georgia's impressive run began with a 63-3 throttling of Florida State in last season's Orange Bowl, which spoke volumes about the Bulldogs' frustration over being excluded from the College Football Playoff and denying their quest for an unprecedented third consecutive national championship.

They held then-No. 14 Clemson to just 188 yards and a second-half field goal in a 34-3 opening-game rout. Georgia nearly shut out Tennessee Tech before the Golden Eagles made a last-second field goal in a 48-3 blowout.

Smart was especially proud of last weekend's 13-12 victory over Kentucky because of Georgia's resilience on both sides of the ball but particularly on defense. Linemen Mykel Williams, Jordan Hall and Warren Brinson were out and cornerback Daniel Harris did not play though dressed, two days after being arrested for allegedly driving 106 mph in Athens, Georgia. (Smart said not playing Harris was a coach's decision.)

That forced a lot of personnel shifts, but Georgia still limited the scoringchallenged Wildcats to four field goals, sacked ex-Bulldogs backup quarterback

Brock Vandagriff three times and forced him into five hurries. Linebacker Damon Wilson II also recovered a second-quarter fumble after Raylen Wilson stripped Vandagriff on a sack, setting up a gametying field goal in the second quarter.

The effort kept Kentucky at bay long enough for Georgia's offense to snap out of its own fog and score the go-ahead touchdown early in the fourth quarter and hold on in the defensive slugfest.

"Some games, the defense is down and

the offense will pick us up, and sometimes the offense is down and the defense picks it up," defensive back Julian Humphrey said. "It's like vice versa. We've got their back."

None of this is surprising for a defense that has produced 23 NFL draft picks the past four seasons, with eight first-round selections. Georgia entered the season with seven starters back from a unit that allowed just 15.6 points per game last season.

The Bulldogs currently rank fourth in scoring defense (6.0 points per game) and eighth overall (202 yards), two signs that they're developing a meaner edge.

"It was unbelievable, especially with guys down," quarterback Carson Beck said. "You look at the D-line, there's freshmen stepping up, you got freshmen all over the field. Guys getting put in places, fighting through injuries and all of the above. Super proud of them and the way they were able to play."

Winless Seminoles kings of disappointment

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Few expected Florida State to run the table again in the Atlantic Coast Conference and coast into the expanded, 12-team College Football Playoff. Not after losing quarterback Jordan Travis, running back Trey Benson, receivers Keon Coleman and Johnny Wilson, and a handful of standout defenders.

However, no one could have seen this coming.

The Seminoles are winless after three games, the result of an erratic passing attack, a sluggish ground game and a defense that can't seem to stop the run and can't get consistent pressure on quarterbacks.

And now FSU, which was ranked No. 10 to start the season, is without question the most disappointing team in college football. And with all due respect to Clemson, Florida and Kansas, it's not even close.

"I know that it's a frustrating thing to sit there and look at, and it's frustrating for everybody involved, for those guvs that are out there playing," Florida State coach Mike Norvell said Monday. "They want more. They want to be better. They're working hard at it. But it's some of those little things that we have to improve on and just the consistency of it."

The only thing Florida State has done consistently this season is lose - twice as a double-digit favorite (Georgia Tech and Boston College) and again as a 6 ½-point choice against Memphis. The Tigers got a victory against their former coach and a \$1.3 million payday.

How the 'Noles got here is as easier to explain than how they might get out.

Some wonder whether last year's CFP snub is having a greater impact on the team than anyone could have imagined. But those inside the building insist it's more about execution

and chemistry than psyche and history.

Florida State lost 10 players to the NFL draft, including five selected in the first 64 picks. Norvell turned to the transfer portal for help - a place that was so kind to him while building last year's team that went 13-0 in the regular season but former Oregon State and Clemson starting quarterback DJ Uiagalelei has fallen well short of expectations.

Uiagalelei has been so inconsistent – he's completing 56.6% of his passes with one touchdown – that the FSU faithful have started chanting for backup Brock Glenn.

And those preseason discussions about whether Florida State would make the playoff have turned to whether the Seminoles will become bowl eligible. Six wins are difficult to find on the schedule, which continues Saturday as California (3-0) travels cross-country for its ACC debut.

Florida State became the first team in college football history to start the season inside the top 10 and lose its first three games to unranked opponents. The slide has stirred speculation about Norvell's future in Tallahassee.

Norvell would be owed roughly \$65 million (85% of his remaining contract that runs through 2031) if FSU decided to fire him. It's an unlikely path, especially for a program already spending considerably resources in hopes of escaping the ACC and potentially joining a league that would provide more longterm financial stability.

So the Seminoles might have to power through a slumping season and hope for brighter days ahead and a reboot in 2025.

Florida State is 124th in scoring offense at 15.3 points a game. The run game, viewed as a strength going into 2024, is downright dysfunctional at 2.2 yards a carry and 52 yards a

And the defense is allowing 24 points a game, which ranks 83rd in the Football Bowl Subdivision.

Linebacker Justin Cryer admitted to feeling hurt after Saturday's latest loss but remains hopeful the team can get things turned around.

"I believe in us," Cryer said. "There's no doubt about it. I'm the biggest supporter of us that we have. I'm fully committed, I'm fully bought into what we have. ... Things aren't clicking right now. We're going to figure it out."

Miami's Ward approaching major milestone

Miami quarterback Cam Ward spent some time in offensive coordinator Shannon Dawson's office this week, going over the Hurricanes' passing game and how things have worked through three

They talked about plenty. They didn't talk about 15,000 yards – a milestone Ward is on the brink of reaching.

"I'd be surprised if he even knew, to be honest with you," Dawson said.

Whether Ward is aware or not, he's on the verge of joining a very small club. The NCAA says only 12 players at any of its levels – FBS, FCS, Division II, Division III or any combination thereof — have passed for 15,000 yards in a career. Ward is 89 yards shy of that mark, and he could get there as early as Saturday when the eighth-ranked Hurricanes (3-0) visit South Florida (2-1).

"Offensively, the quarterback is making it really go," USF coach Alex Golesh said on Tuesday of Ward. "He's really special. I mean, man, can make every throw on the field. Moves around in the pocket extremely well. Really confident. You watch all three games and it's a really, really confident young man. Without knowing him, it looks like he has incredible command of the offense."


The numbers back that up.

Ward is the first Miami quarterback to throw for at least 300 yards in each of his first three games as a Hurricane. He's up to 1,035 so far this season and that's with taking most of the second half off in each of Miami's last two games. The only FBS quarterback with more yards so far this season is Ole Miss' Jaxson Dart, who has passed for 1,172.

Ward's 11 touchdown passes so far lead the nation and he's firmly among the frontrunners in the way-too-early Heisman Trophy prognostications.

"The guy is restless," Miami coach Mario Cristobal said. "If it doesn't have much to do with us winning and getting better, I don't think he has any interest in it, frankly. And it's the right mentality. It's the right thing to do. He's got this window to play college football, and he came to Miami for a lot of reasons. One of them is winning — and proving also that he can help a program be a winner."

So far, so good. Very good, in fact.

41-17 (Florida), 56-9 (Florida A&M) and 62-0 (Ball State). The 159 points through three games is a school record, and last weekend's 750 yards of offense against Ball State was another record.

Ward already has 24 completions of 20 yards or more this season — in just 89 attempts. And he's still demanding more, both from himself and his team.

"We have to be more consistent." Ward said. "We can't have lulls on one play. Every play has to be a statement."

He's made plenty of statements through these first three games, with Miami has posted wins by scores of the Hurricanes looking very much like

Atlantic Coast Conference favorites.

The only active quarterback with more than 15,000 passing yards is Oregon's Dillon Gabriel, whose career total is up to 15,779 in 53 games so far at three different schools. He spent parts of three seasons at UCF and the last two years at Oklahoma.

Ward has played in 47 games after spending his first two years at FCS Incarnate Word (throwing for 6,908 yards there) and the last two years at Washington State (throwing for 6,968 yards there). The 1,035 so far at Miami has pushed that career total to 14,911.

At their current paces, both Gabriel and Ward could end this season with more passing yards than almost anyone in college football history. They're still a long way from Houston's Case Keenum - he's recognized as the NCAA's all-time leader with 19,217 yards - but realistically could catch Hawaii's Timmy Chang, whose 17,072 yards is No. 2 on the NCAA list.

"He's got blinders on, and he thinks about the next play and thinks about the next game when that one's over with," Dawson said. "He's one of those guys that are resilient. He tends not to care about those things."


