

Four-down territory

- 1. Eyes in the sky: The NFL has been using computer tablets and helmet communications during games for years. It's been implemented at the college level. There's been some adjustment, but it's a tool that keeps players and coaches connected to the game plan and they can be on the same page. "We got the iPads now to where, if there is a timeout, I can say (to quarterback Payton Thorne), 'Do you see what I see?" Auburn coach Hugh Freeze said.
- **2. New plan:** The Tigers' game at Cal last year resulted in a 14-10 win, which saw the offense struggle with just 12 first downs and 94 pass yards. Those numbers might improve dramatically this time. "Last year, they were basically saying, 'We're going to make you throw the football and win some one-on-ones, and we struggled to do that," Freeze said." Auburn had six passing plays of over 30 yards last week in the opener, five of which went for touchdowns. "Will they play us the same exact way? I don't know," Freeze said.
- **3. New plan II:** The Cal offense Auburn will see is not the same as last year. The Golden Bears have a new coordinator in Mike Bloesch and the Tigers will see some spread and empty back formations and a quicker tempo. "You only have one game to go on, but we know where (Bloesch) came from," Freeze said. "We are going to have to get used to tempo. They go fast. That creates problems with communication. But they are a different offense."
- **4. Helping hand:** Freeze and his wife, Iill, have a charity foundation that benefits foster children. Freeze said on Monday that Auburn players offered some of their name, image and likeness money to help with the foundation. "That's something I'm really, really proud of. Proud of our kids that said, 'Coach, I want to help and be a part of that," Freeze said. "That's something that I hope continues to grow throughout the year as we continue to meet needs in the state of Alabama for the orphan and foster-care systems."

Texas gives Michigan unusual early showdown

ANN ARBOR, Mich. - Michigan has played in many marquee matchups in recent years.

Only the high-stakes games, including three straight trips to the College Football Playoff, did not happen early in the

Texas is coming to town this week and it doesn't get much bigger than that, or better for college football fans.

The third-ranked Longhorns will provide a tough test on Saturday for the 10th-ranked Wolverines, who had the luxury of tuning up for Big Ten Conference play with soft schedules the last two years.

Michigan will find out quickly if the relatively low expectations for a defending national champion were merited or simply underestimating Sherrone Moore's first team.

"It's exciting for our players, for the program, for the fans," Moore said Monday. "You want these type of games. You want these atmospheres. You want these building blocks to help you mold your team and really get where you need to be."

Texas found out how good it was in Week 2 last season when it beat then-No. 3 Alabama and went on to make the playoffs.

Longhorns coach Steve Sarkisian said 46 current players experienced the victory over the Crimson Tide, showing them what it takes to win away from

"You have to have great poise and composure when you are in these type of road environments," Sarkisian said.

The winner in front of more than 110,000 fans in the stands and millions of people watching on TV will get a boost for its bid to win a national championship while the loser still will have hope thanks to the expanded, 12-team playoff.

"Because of the new format, I like this matchup even more," Sarkisian said.

The victors also will earn some bragging rights for the Southeastern Conference or the Big Ten.

Texas was dominant in its opener, clicking on offense with quarterbacks Quinn Ewers and Arch Manning while swarming on defense in a 52-0 rout of Colorado State.

Michigan, meanwhile, turned a closely contested game into a 30-10 win over Fresno State with an entirely rebuilt offensive line that struggled until late in the game.

A decade go, both schools announced their traditionally powerful programs would have a home-and-home series for the first time.

The first game is this week and the return trip to Austin is scheduled for Sept. 4, 2027. The Vince Young-led Longhorns beat the Wolverines on Jan. 1, 2005, in their only meeting, at the Rose Bowl.

In college football history, Michigan is No. 1 in all-time wins with 1,005 and Texas is No. 4 with 949 victories.

And finally, they're facing off in the regular season.

"I'm super pumped," Sarkisian said. "I love college football. To think these two iconic programs, with those iconic uniforms and iconic helmets meeting for the first time in the Big House ... yeah, that's awesome."

The Wolverines kicked off their 2023 national championship season with mismatches against East Carolina, UNLV and Bowling Green one year after opening with Colorado State, Hawaii and Connecticut.

Oddmakers don't seem to think Michigan is ready for the challenge, making it an underdog by a touchdown, according to BetMGM Sportsbook.

The Wolverines, though, say they will be ready.

"It's going to be like Rose Bowls, Ohio State games," said Michigan's Will Johnson, a preseason All-America cornerback. "Those type of games, I feel like that's when we play our best football."

Four-down territory

1. Sparked by the Bulls: The Crimson Tide had one of its worst efforts last season in a road matchup with South Florida. Alabama came away with a 17-3 win, but the offense was flat. Jalen Milroe was benched for that game after having a poor showing in a loss to Texas the week prior. In hindsight, the benching may have been a blessing for Milroe, who took control of the offense since and hasn't looked back.

2. Short notice: Alabama star left tackle Kadyn Procter didn't play last week due to a shoulder injury. Elijah Pritchett, who plays right tackle, moved to the opposite side of the line to take Proctor's place. The sophomore could start against USF if Proctor still can't go. "Got to give Elijah a lot of credit because he only had a couple of practices at left tackle in camp," Alabama coach Kalen DeBoer said. "He took some pride in trying to have a great game and rise up to the adversity."

3. O Captain, My Captain: The tradition at Alabama is for the team to pick permanent captains at the end of the season. DeBoer changed that by naming the captains before the season. Captains Malachi Moore, Deontae Lawson, Tyler Booker and Milroe all had the letter 'C' sewn onto their jerseys for last week's opener. "That's something we've done in places where I've been," DeBoer said. "It's an honor to be a captain and to have the 'C' on the jersey, I think it's really cool for those guys to wear."

4. Field of champions: Nick Saban will be honored at halftime Saturday. The field at Bryant-Denny Stadium will be named after the Crimson Tide's sixtime national champion coach. He had a 206-29 record in 17 seasons at Alabama. "It's something that I know we have a lot of respect for and going to make sure that we do everything we can to make it our house and protect our field from here on out just like it's been in the 17 years that he was here," DeBoer said.

UA DB Keon Sabb vs. USF WR Sean **Atkins**

Sabb, the Michigan transfer, has

already made big contributions to the Tide with two interceptions in his first game. Atkins had 42 receiving yards in last week's blowout win over Bethune-Cookman. Atkins set program records with 92 receptions for 1,054 yards in 2023.

Player of the week

Ryan Williams, WR

Welcome to college football, Ryan Williams. The 17-year-old's first two career catches resulted in touchdowns last week. Obviously, that success rate won't continue, but there are big-play capabilities whenever he's on the field, and he will be targeted more for sure.

By the numbers

21: Alabama ran 21 offensive plays in the first half last week and scored six touchdowns. That's a rate of one touchdown every 3.5 plays.

1991: The Crimson Tide had two touchdown plays of 80-plus yards in the opener. It was the first time the Crimson Tide did that since Sept. 7, 1991, against Temple.

2: Alabama committed five penalties in the first quarter last week but had just two the rest of the game.

18: There were 18 true freshmen who played in the Crimson Tide opener with two scoring touchdowns (Ryan Williams, Daniel Hill).

Four-down territory

1. Making sure things are level: Both UNA and Illinois State played FBS opponents last week. The Lions were at Memphis. The Redbirds at Iowa. Both went about as expected for money games. Each of the matchups ended 40-0 in favor of the bigger teams (the ones signing the checks). But this week means both UNA and Illinois State are back on more-even playing ground, so to speak. After all, they are both FCS schools.

2. Home sweet home? The Lions opened the season in Montgomery. They played in Memphis last week. Now, UNA is back in the posh confines of Braly Stadium, a place the program has won a little bit over the last few years. The Lions have won four games since the start of the 2022 season. Three have come at home compared to seven losses in that span. Road games have been a bit more challenging. In 14 games away from Braly, UNA is 1-13.

3. Unkind history: Illinois State is ranked 21st in the Stats FCS top 25 poll. That doesn't bode well for the Lions. UNA has never beaten a ranked Division I team - at either the FCS or FBS level. The Lions are 0-15 all-time against ranked FCS schools with just three games being decided by a single score. They're also 0-2 against top-25 FBS teams thanks to the BYU matchup in 2020 and the Florida State game last year.

4. Turnover confidential: Ari Patu has started both of UNA's games at quarterback. It's already the most games he's started during his college career, which began at Stanford. But that isn't the problem. It's giving the ball away. Through two games, the Lions have turned the ball over seven times. Patu is responsible – according to the stat sheet – for six of them. He threw two interceptions and fumbled twice against Southeast Missouri and tossed another two picks at Memphis. It's no secret it's hard to win that way.

Key matchup

Illinois State RB Mason King vs. UNA DL King was named to the Walter Payton time touchdown catch leader considering

Award preseason watch list after rushing for 983 yards and 14 touchdowns last season. The curious part is he only got one carry against Iowa. UNA held Memphis to 64 yards on the ground, a tradeoff for the Tigers throwing for 300-plus yards. But if King does play this week, it should be interesting.

Player of the week

Takairee Kenebrew, WR

Kenebrew's stat line through the first two weeks? Four catches for 4 yards. Why does it matter? Pretty odd for UNA's allhe led the Lions with 669 yards and 10 touchdowns last season and 649 yards and eight scores in 2022. He did have some injuries during training camp, but maybe this will be the week he makes an impact.

Four-down territory

1. Showing some love: The Heisman Trophy race is underway and the while there is a long way to go toward figuring out the finalists, there is no harm in early speculation. Nico Iamaleava's impressive debut earned him SEC Freshman of the Week honors and did enough to get some attention of Fan Duel's Heisman betting odds. Iamaleava's odds jumped from +1,500 to +1,400. It's not much of a jump, but he's on the radar.

2. Pick leaders: The N.C. State defense led the Atlantic Coast Conference with 17 interceptions last season. The Wolfpack lost some key players, but guys like Devan Boykin, Aydan White and Ohio State transfer Ja'Had Carter make N.C. State another solid group. "All three levels of their defense playing together is a big part of the picks. Their zone coverage and dropping out to make the windows tough and their pressure on the quarterback to make it uncomfortable for him." Tennessee coach Josh Heupel said.

3. Carolina on his mind: Tennessee sophomore defensive lineman Daevin Hobbs will have a homecoming of sorts against N.C. State. Hobbs is from Concord, North Carolina, just outside the city limits of Charlotte, site for the showdown with the Wolfpack. "I'm very excited about it," Dobbs said. "I have a lot of friends and coaches from high school who will be there. It's going to fun to be back home in stadium where I always went to with my dad to see Panther games."

4. Building trust: It's important for a quarterback and the receiver group to be familiar with each other. It was obvious in the opener that Nico Iamaleava and the receivers were on the same page to the tune of 314 yards and three touchdowns. "I played quarterback in high school and in college and played receiver at a high level," Tennessee receivers coach Kelsey Pope said. "I've seen a handful of guys receivers want to play for. You can see it and you can sense it. Our guys love playing for that guy. It's infectious in practice. As talented a

player as he is, he's a better teammate and a leader."

Thornton caught three passes for 104 yards with two touchdowns last week. That's nearly double what he had all of last season (224). Concepcion is a preseason All-ACC player who led the Wolfpack with 121 yards in last week's win against Western Carolina.

Player of the week

Dylan Sampson, RB

The Sampson era at running back got off to a fast start. A 124-yard effort with three touchdowns is enough to give

anyone a confidence boost. The Vols will need another strong effort against N.C. State. If the Wolfpack secondary is as good as advertised and shuts down the passing game, it will be up to Sampson to deliver on the ground.





S.C.'s struggles loom entering SEC opener

COLUMBIA, S.C. – South Carolina needs to gets its offense going - and in a hurry.

The Gamecocks emphasized starting faster out of the gate on offense throughout the offseason and figured to have a few bumps minus playmakers like quarterback Spencer Rattler and receiver Xavier Legette.

But things were supposed to be better than what they showed last week in the opener, a 23-19 victory over Old Dominion where the Gamecocks' attack looked like it was playing in quicksand instead.

"No one's happy in this building with the offensive performance at all," coach Shane Beamer said Tuesday.

Especially not after the Monarchs of the Sun Belt Conference held South Carolina to 288 yards, just 114 passing. There were long drives stalled inside Old Dominion's 30 and missed connections between first-time starter LaNorris Sellers and his receivers.

"We all need to be better," Beamer said. "Starting with me."

And things won't get easier as the Gamecocks (1-0) start Southeastern Conference play at Kentucky (1-0) - it's the first league game of the season and the only one being played Saturday.

Even with Rattler, who threw for 3,186 yards, and Legette, who had 1,255 yards to rank second among receivers, the Gamecocks were 12th out of 14 SEC teams in offense last season.

The inexperience showed. Coastal Carolina transfer receiver Jared Brown dropped a sure touchdown pass on a well-thrown ball by Sellers, the secondyear freshman who tutored under Rattler last season.

Sellers, usually sure-handed, fumbled and was sacked four times.

Arkansas transfer Rocket Sanders, brought in to spark the running game, showed some glimpses of his time with the Razorbacks and finished with 88 yards on 24 carries as the offensive line played inconsistently.

It was South Carolina's defense that made the game-changing plays, forcing an Old Dominion fumble near the goal line that Sellers took 6 yards for the goahead score in the fourth quarter.

Georgia Tech transfer Kyle Kennard and South Carolina freshman defensive end Dylan Stewart were co-SEC linemen

of the week. The two combined for four sacks against the Monarchs, and Stewart forced two fumbles, including the one in the fourth quarter that led to the Gamecocks' final touchdown.

"That's the hallmark of what our team's going to be," Kennard said. "There are going to be games where we need to pick it up and our offense is going to walk on ahead. We were able to do that for them this season."

Sellers acknowledged he may have gotten caught up in the moment of his first start in front of some 78,000 people. He felt the nerves, rushed some of his decisions and did not have the usually solid technique he had shown throughout preseason camp.

"It wasn't the best," Sellers said. "I was tentative a little bit, kind of nervous, scared of making a mistake. I've just got to play like myself."

When the game ended, Beamer, offensive coordinator Dowell Loggains and offensive analyst Mike Shula all talked with Sellers about keeping positive and staying within himself.

Beamer told him before the game, "he didn't need to be Superman. We're better with the talent around him than were around Spencer last year."

Beamer was pleased with his offense line, which included starter Josiah Thompson, a 6-7, 300-pound freshman, at left tackle.

"We played really, really hard on the offensive line," Beamer said.

The group will need to up its effort this week against Kentucky, whose defense is led by a 6-6, 345-pound disrupter in tackle Deone Walker.

Walker "can wreck your entire gameplan, not just mess up a play," Beamer said with admiration.

Sellers is confident he and the Gamecocks' offense will correct the issues and play like they know they can.

"I think it was just a first-game thing, with 80,000 people," Sellers said. "Now, that I got that out of the way, I think I'll be good from now on."

'Rat poison': Canes take lesson from Saban

CORAL GABLES, Fla. – Miami coach Mario Cristobal worked at Alabama under Nick Saban, so he's fully aware of what his former boss considers to be one of the biggest threats to a good football team.

Saban called it "rat poison" — his term for praise from the outside world, the type that is so highly heaped it can distract a team from doing its job.

And Cristobal knows it's coming.

Miami (1-0) moved up seven spots to No. 12 in the AP Top 25 on Tuesday, voters obviously having been impressed by the Hurricanes' 41-17 road romp over Florida in the season opener for both teams this past weekend. That win, combined with Florida State's 0-2 start that sent the Seminoles from No. 10 to unranked, left the Hurricanes as the only Top 25 team in the Sunshine State after one full week.

"Miami has gotten off to a good start this season," said Cristobal, who spent four seasons -2013 through 2016 - onSaban's staff at Alabama. "We're 1-0."

He'd like to keep the narrative that simple. He knows that's not going to happen, at least not from the outside world.

And to be fair, there's a ton to like from the Miami perspective. Quarterback Cam Ward, who dazzled with 385 yards - the most by anyone in the country against a Power 4 opponent so far this season – and three touchdown passes in the opener, vaulted deeper into the way-too-early Heisman Trophy conversation. The Hurricanes' biggest rivals in the state, Florida State and Florida, are now a combined 0-3. There were recruits at Florida Field making "The U" with their hands as the Hurricanes were walking into the locker room once the 24-point win was in the books.

"We're nowhere near what we're capable of," Miami receiver Xavier Restrepo said Tuesday. "We did have a decent day on Saturday and it just shows you a little bit of how dangerous we are as an offense. But we're nowhere near where we need to be. ... We have a long way to go."

That's exactly what Cristobal wants the Hurricanes to be saying, thinking and believing.

It's just one game, but the Hurricanes haven't been ranked this highly in the AP poll since reaching No. 9 on Dec. 6, 2020. The trick is staying there: Miami hasn't finished a season ranked 12th or better nationally since 2004.

And on that front, like Restrepo said, there's a long way to go.

"They have an extremely athletic, bigtime offensive line. Very, very good on the defensive line. Obviously very, very good at some of their skill positions," said Florida A&M coach James Colzie, whose Rattlers (2-0) will visit the Hurricanes on Saturday in Miami's home opener. "So, we have our work cut out for us."

Saban's approach and preaching about the perils of rat poison worked wonders for him at Alabama. Miami teams haven't always listened to such talk, and Cristobal said he thinks this year's group understands what he means when he talks about blocking out such noise.

"You go right at it. You don't sugarcoat it," Cristobal said. "The best part about this team is you can look them right in the eve and give it to them, like right between the teeth, man. No holding back and they appreciate that."


