



What if Iron Bowl didn't really matter?

The game we can't wait for has become the contest we never anticipated.

Welcome to the 2024 Iron Bowl, which means ... something.

Since shortly after Nick Saban's arrival in Tuscaloosa, the annual bloodletting grudge match has been played with major stakes. We've seen tickets to Atlanta punched, national champions rise and fall, and Heisman Trophy winners crowned.

But this year? Meh.

Just a week ago, this was supposed to be Alabama's final tuneup before heading to Atlanta for a berth in the SEC championship game. A spot in the inaugural 12-team College Football Playoff tournament seemed assured. Then the Crimson Tide headed to Oklahoma for an old-fashioned humiliation.

Conversely, Auburn seemed to have little to play for, destined for another losing season. Then the Tigers wrecked Texas A&M's playoff aspirations on a chilly Saturday night and now need one victory to clinch a bowl bid.

Auburn has the momentum and motivation. Only two things favor Alabama: the game's played in Tuscaloosa and not out of state, where the Crimson Tide turns into a pumpkin. And Auburn isn't a 14-point underdog. That seems to be the magic number for a stunning, who'd-a-thunk-it upset of this Alabama team.

At home, Alabama has resembled the Tide of Saban teams past, bordering on invincible. Only a narrow victory over South Carolina has been less than a blowout.

Auburn has been the more consistent team, competitive in every game, in every situation.

And now, the Tigers are proving they can actually finish with a flourish.

The Texas A&M victory brought everything together — Payton Thorne's leadership, Cam Coleman's playmaking and Jarquez Hunter's crunch-time dominance. The turnovers have ceased, the defense has peaked and transfer KeAndre Lambert-Smith has emerged as Auburn's most valuable player.

Meanwhile, Alabama has become college football's version of the three faces of Eve. There's the dominant Tide

(see Georgia, Missouri, LSU), the notso-terrific Tide (South Carolina and Tennessee) and the I-wanna-be-like Mike (your choice DuBose or Shula) Tide that got left for roadkill in Norman.

At times, quarterback Jalen Milroe looks like the best player in college football. But when he's off, the Tide isn't even competitive. Playmakers appear like apparitions and disappear just as quickly. And a defense that finally seemed to have it all together two weeks ago went AWOL in Oklahoma.

If the game was scheduled for Auburn, we might not hesitate to go with the upset. That Jordan-Hare Stadium voodoo never works better than the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Bryce Young needed overtime to win in 2021 and Milroe needed Isaiah Bond and the gravedigger to pull out a victory last season.

But at Bryant-Denny Stadium, Alabama has dominated. And that's enough to ensure the Crimson Tide's advantage Saturday. Despite all appearances,

Alabama is still the better team. And coming late. while the easy path to the CFP seemingly died on the Oklahoma prairie, there's still a glimmer of hope for the postseason.

So we'll go with this: Alabama 24, Auburn 14, with the knockout punch

The American Athletic Conference is the only Football Bowl Subdivision league whose championship game matchup is set: Army vs. Tulane.

The final week of the regular season will determine pairings for the other eight conferences.

Here's a look at the possible matchups in the Power Four and Group of Five. All championship games are Dec. 7 except in the AAC, Conference USA and Mountain West, which will be played Dec. 6.

- ACC at Charlotte, North Carolina: SMU vs. Miami or Clemson. Miami is in if it beats Syracuse. Clemson is in if Miami loses.
- Big Ten at Indianapolis: Oregon vs. Ohio State, Penn State or Indiana. Ohio State is in if it beats Michigan or if Penn State and Indiana lose this week. Penn State is in if it beats Maryland and Ohio State loses. Indiana is in if it beats Purdue and Ohio State and Penn State lose.

State vs. Iowa State if both win this week. Multiple scenarios including • Big 12 at Arlington, Texas: Arizona BYU, Colorado and other teams exist

• **SEC at Atlanta:** Georgia vs. winner of Texas-Texas A&M game.

- American Athletic at TBD: Army vs. Tulane.
- Conference USA at Jacksonville: Jacksonville State vs. Liberty, Western Kentucky or Sam Houston. Liberty is in with a win over Sam Houston. WKU is in with a win over Jacksonville State and a Liberty loss. Sam Houston is in with a win over Liberty and a Jacksonville State win.
- Mid-American at Detroit: Miami, Bowling Green and Ohio are tied for first place and control their destinies. Miami-Bowling Green winner is in, as is Ohio if it beats Ball State. Other scenarios exist that include those teams and Buffalo.
- Mountain West at Boise, Idaho: Boise State vs. UNLV or Colorado State. If UNLV and CSU both win or lose their final regular-season games, the tie would be broken by either College Football Playoff rankings or resultsbased computer metrics.
- Sun Belt at TBD: Louisiana-Lafayette at Marshall if both win their games this week. Other scenarios exist if one or both lose.

Four-down territory

1. Prepping for the good version: It's been an up-and-down season for Alabama quarterback Jalen Milroe. He's looked stellar against Georgia and LSU and Missouri, but was lackluster against Vanderbilt, Tennessee and Oklahoma last week. So which QB will Auburn see Saturday? "You prepare for the good (version of Milroe)," Auburn coach Hugh Freeze said. "I hope we get the lesserthan version, but he has the right stuff and competes at a high level. I'm confident they will use him as a runner, and we have to plan for that."

2. Tiger hype: The game between Auburn and Texas A&M was one of the most thrilling of the season, and the Tigers needed the win in the worst way. Auburn has momentum and new life as it heads into the Iron Bowl, while Alabama is on a downward spiral after losing its playoff berth in the loss to Oklahoma. The atmosphere at Auburn is one of confidence. "You have zero chance to win if you don't have a belief that you can do it," Freeze said. "Somewhere along the line with these difficult losses, we've started believing more. It's going to take that belief to go into Tuscaloosa."

3. Big plays needed: Creating explosive plays is something Auburn has done well this season. That's a trademark of Freeze's offense. Those big plays will be in high demand this weekend. "It's film study, and you have to have good designs, and they have to be called at the right time with the right defense," Freeze said. "That's hard to do. We will certainly need some of those Saturday."

4. Still stings: The loss in last year's Iron Bowl was tough to handle. Allowing a touchdown on fourth-and-31 in the final minute will do that. It was Freeze's first Iron Bowl experience and he's hoping to make Alabama coach Kalen DeBoer's first Iron Bowl a similar miserable experience. "There's no bigger game on the schedule. To lose one last year the way we did still doesn't sit right," Freeze said. "We have to

find a way to keep ourselves in it and give us a chance to win change that and hopefully make that a regular expectation."

Player of game

Jerrin Thompson, LB

Thompson has had a big impact for the Tigers the last few games with 21 tackles, one interception and a tackle for loss. Auburn will need that same effort from the senior against Alabama. He's second on the team with 60 tackles and has two interceptions with four pass breakups.

Key matchup

Auburn WR Cam Coleman vs. Alabama WR Ryan Williams

Welcome to the Freshman Iron Bowl.

There aren't any high stakes involved with this game, but these two should make it one heck of a show. Coleman is coming off his best game, a 128-yard effort with two touchdowns. Williams has two games this season with more than 100 yards.

By the numbers

4: Auburn is 4-0 this season with an individual 100-yard rusher. Jarquez Hunter rushed for 93 yards against Alabama last season.

4: Cam Coleman, with 30 catches for 520 yards, ranks fourth among Auburn's all-time freshman receivers.

- 1. Deal with it: The loss to Oklahoma crushed Alabama's chance for a playoff spot and a berth in the SEC title game. With no hardware to play for the Crimson Tide has to settle for a meaningless bowl game. It's better than nothing. The question is, how will Alabama respond against Auburn after the crushing loss? It's the Iron Bowl, so that carries some weight. But when your postseason goals go up in smoke, how much will that carry over into the regular-season finale?
- **2. Missing captain:** Defensive leader and team captain Deontae Lawson sustained a season-ending leg injury against Oklahoma. The linebacker is the second-leading tackler and the one who communicates the coverages to the rest of the team. His presence was missed against the Sooners and will be felt against Auburn. Justin Jefferson is the backup for Lawson. "Obviously, we greatly miss what he does on the football field, but love having that guy in the locker room leading our team," DeBoer said.
- 3. Bulletin board material: The Iron Bowl doesn't need any extra hype. The players from both schools know the importance of it. Auburn linebacker Demarcus Riddick opted to throw gasoline on the fire anyway when discussing Tide receiver Ryan Williams. "Yeah, he's electric," Riddick told reporters in Auburn. "Yeah, he's all this and that, but, in my eyes, he ain't really nobody to me. Ryan Williams is himself. He ain't no big-time player to
- **4. Tiger trap:** Under Hugh Freeze, Auburn has had tremendous success running the ball against Alabama. Last year, the Tigers had 244 yards and 318 yards in 2022. The offense seems to turn it up a notch for the Crimson Tide, something that will surely happen again Saturday. "They do a great job of finding ways to establish a run and then using that run game to create explosive plays downfield in the play action game," Alabama defensive coordinator Kane Wommack said.

It's a dilemma Vols coach Josh Heupel is concerned about. "He's a dynamic player and you can't let him sit back in the pocket," he said. "You have to apply pressure, but while you are doing that, you have to maintain your lane integrity and make plays." Pavia leads Vandy with 671 rushing yards and six TDs. He also has 2,029 passing yards and 16 TDs.

Sampson can tie the school mark for career touchdowns (35) with two against Vandy.

Texas won the last meeting 27-25 and, a week later, A&M fired coach Mike Sherman.... Both schools ridicule the other in their own fight songs. The Aggie War Hymn: "Goodbye to Texas University. So long to the Orange and the White." Texas Fight: "And it's goodbye to A&M." ... A&M students used to build an immense on-campus bonfire before each year's game against what they derisively call the "teasippers" to represent their "burning desire to beat the hell outta t.u." (Capital letters not allowed.) The tradition ended when the bonfire collapsed during construction in 1999, killing 12 and injuring 27. ... 
