Pizza Sloppy Joe Sliders

INGREDIENTS

- 1 16oz pack of ground Italian sausage
- 1 13-14oz jar of pizza sauce
- 1 cup mini pepperoni slices
- 1 12-18oz pack of dinner rolls
- 1 8oz pack of slice mozzarella cheese

DIRECTIONS:

Heat oven to 350 F. Lightly spray baking sheet or 9 inch by 13 inch with nonstick cooking spray. Set aside. In a large skillet brown sausage until cooked thoroughly. Drain the excess grease. Mix pizza sauce and pepperoni. Split rolls in half - separate each individual roll. Place the bottom half of the rolls in the prepared pan. Spread sausage mixture over rolls. Top with mozzarella cheese slices, then cover the top half of the rolls. In a small bowl, whisk together the melted butter, Parmesan cheese, Italian seasoning and garlic powder. Brush the butter mixture over the top of the rolls. Bake uncovered for 10 minutes, or until heated through and the cheese has melted. Serve and enjoy.



Four-down territory

1. Can't stop it: Alabama's defense has been exploited several times, particularly with the shovel pass. Vanderbilt ran it twice and resulted in explosive plays.

South Carolina did the same last week. Alabama has no answer for it. "We're looking at the different ways they can do those plays and run those things so we can be prepared," Alabama defensive

coordinator Kane Wommack said. "Nobody is going to do it exactly the same way necessarily, but they're going

to have their own nuance. It's a hard play that we've got to get prepared for."

2. Slow running: Except for the season opener (334 yards), the Tide's run game hasn't been very explosive. Alabama has 189 yards over the last two games and just once has the offense gone over 200 yards. The trio of Jalen Milroe, Jam Miller and Justice Haynes have combined for 167 attempts for 928 yards. The run game could take another hit against a Vols defense that gives up about 80 yards per game.

3. Scoring machines: It may not feel like it, but Alabama has one of the top scoring offenses in the country. The Crimson Tide is second in the SEC with 35 touchdowns, just one behind Ole Miss. Alabama is No. 10 in the nation in scoring offense, while Tennessee is one slot ahead at No. 9. The Vols have scored 31 touchdowns with 11 field goals. Alabama is 20-of-24 in red-zone scoring with 19 touchdowns while the Vols are 27-of-30 in the red zone with 14 TDs.

4. Streaky: The Alabama-Tennessee series is one of streaks. Four times in the rivalry Alabama has won seven straight or more games, including 15 in a row in the Nick Saban era. Tennessee has won four straight on four different occasions and had a seven-game win streak. "I've been told it's a big deal," first-year Alabama head coach Kalen DeBoer said. "I know it's a big deal. You see it from afar. I certainly understand the significance of the rivalry and the guys are going to be very

motivated to go out and do their best and prepare well and be great on Saturday."

Key matchup

Alabama TE CJ Dippire vs. Tennessee TE Miles Kitselman

It's the small things that the big men will do in this game that will make the difference. Dippire is a solid blocker and has 10 catches for 121 yards. The Vols have three solid tight ends, but Kitselman can make an impact. His six catches for 78 yards and two touchdowns lead the position group.

Player of the week

Germie Bernard, WR

The Washington transfer had his best game last week with four catches for 89 yards and a touchdown. He's become a solid No. 2 receiver and has come up with timely catches every week.


By the numbers

1: Miami of Ohio transfer and Lou Groza Award winner Graham Nicholson has attempted just two field goals this season with one make.

12: The Tide has forced 12 turnovers (six fumbles, six interceptions) in its first six games, the second-most in the SEC.

86: Alabama has an 86-80-1 all-time record against teams ranked in The Associated Press top 10 poll. Since Tennessee dropped from No. 8 to No. 11 due to needing overtime to beat Florida last week, that record faces no change this week.

1931: DeBoer is the first Alabama coach since Frank Thomas in 1931 to win five of his first six games in his inaugural season. Thomas' loss in that stretch was

Prediction

Tennessee 24, Alabama 17

Alabama's expectations are always high, but it hasn't lived up to them this season. The offense is not consistent and

the defense has more holes than a fishing net. Facing a rival on the road is not the test you want given these team issues. If Alabama can't establish a run game, Tennessee will bring constant QB pressure and that doesn't bode well for Alabama.

Four-down territory

1. Flush it: The past two games have not been the best for Vols QB Nico Iamaleava. In a losing effort to Arkansas, he was 16-of-28 passing for 156

yards. In an overtime win against Florida, he was 16-of-26 for 169 yards and an interception. He's thrown one touchdown pass in his last three games. "You have to play the next

play independently. You have to play the next week independently," Tennessee coach Josh Heupel said. "He

hasn't played his best football the past few weeks. We have to prepare him to play the next play, the next game with an aggressive mentality."

2. It worked before: The Vols had lost 15 straight games to Alabama since 2007. Until 2022. That's the year Tennessee had an "Orange Out," with fans wearing all orange for the game. The Vols won with a field goal as time expired. The Vols are bringing back the "Orange Out" for this weekend's game. This will be the first "Orange Out" since the 2022 game with Alabama.

3. New tradition: A staple at the end of the third quarter in Neyland Stadium was the playing of Friends in Low Places by Garth Brooks. That changed last week against Florida with the introduction of "The Way I Talk" by Morgan Wallen. According to knoxnews.com, the plan was in the works since the summer. Wallen grew up near Knoxville and is a big Tennessee football fan.

4. Transplanted Southerners: Heupel and Alabama coach Kalen DeBoer share a common trait, other than being SEC coaches. Both are from South Dakota. Heupel was born in Aberdeen while DeBoer hails from Milbank. The two towns are about 100 miles apart. "There's not a lot of us from South Dakota," Heupel said. "Through his career, I've kept in contact with him and I have great respect for him and how he handles himself."

Key matchup

Alabama TE CJ Dippire vs. Tennessee TE Miles Kitselman

It's the small things that the big men will do in this game that will make the difference. Dippire is a solid blocker and has 10 catches for 121 yards. The Vols have three solid tight ends, but Kitselman can make an impact. His six catches for 78 yards and two touchdowns lead the position group.

Player of game

Squirrel White, WR

White was a big leader last week with five catches for 71 yards. In last year's game with Alabama, White led the Vols with 10 catches for 111 yards, including a 39-yard touchdown. He'll be needed for more big plays this time, too.

By the numbers

2: Opponents are averaging 2.24 yards per rush against Tennessee, which is second in the nation.

3: The Alabama series is the third-longest in Tennessee history (106 games) behind Kentucky (119) and Vanderbilt (117).

4: Tennessee has lost just four times at Neyland Stadium under Heupel (24-4). The Vols lost to Georgia last year, and to Pittsburgh, Ole Miss and Georgia in 2021.

64: Tennessee has allowed 64 points, the fewest point total through the first six games of a UT season since 64 in 1972. The Vols' sixth game that season was a 17-10 home loss to Alabama. Tennessee didn't lose again, using a six-game winning streak, capped by an Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl victory over LSU, to finish 10-2.

Prediction

Tennessee 24, Alabama 17

Tennessee and Alabama have mirrored each other the last two weeks. Both lost games they should have won and both rallied past another team it shouldn't have struggled against. Tennessee looks to be the more consistent

team when it comes to defense, which is what this game will come down to in the end. Tennessee has issues on offense, but can work out the kinks against an Alabama defense that has no identity.

Auburn at Missouri

When: 11 a.m. Saturday
TV/radio: ESPN/FM-94.9
Records: Auburn (2-4, 0-3 SEC), No. 19
 Missouri (5-1, 1-1)
The series: Auburn leads 3-1.

Four-down territory

1. A good bye: After three straight losses, the bye week was a welcome sight for Auburn. The Tigers used the extra week to try and patch the leaks of a ship that's taking on a lot of water. "We spent a lot of time last week looking at what we think needs to be done in order for us to (get better) because we've got a very difficult schedule ahead," coach Hugh Freeze said. "Two games on the road at two teams that are playing really, really good football. That starts at Missouri."

2. Failure to finish: In the last three games, Auburn averaged 16 points and was outscored 37-17 in the fourth quarter. That's hardly winning football. Overall, Auburn has been outscored 45-40 in the final quarter. Auburn was much better in nonconference play (28-13) but has been dreadful in league games. It might not get better against Missouri, which has given up just two touchdowns in the fourth quarter in six games.

3. Not friendly: The price of having to play five straight home games to open the season is playing three straight on the road. Auburn is in the middle of that brutal road stretch and faces a Missouri team that's unbeaten at home and has outscored opponents 146-48. Missouri is the fourth-best scoring defense in the SEC, allowing 15 points per game.

4. Give him the ball: Jarquez Hunter has 528 yards rushing with three touchdowns. He's averaging 88 yards per game, which is more than what he averaged last season (79). Still, Freeze sees a need to give Hunter more touches. He's got 78 carries but had just 13 against Georgia. "We need to get it to him more," Freeze said. "The frustrating thing is on our short-yardage plays, they were not executed to where he touches it. We have to get that corrected."

Key matchup

Auburn LB Jalen McLeod vs. Missouri LB Khalil Jacobs

Getting pressure on the QB has to

be a priority for both teams. The more uncomfortable they are in the pocket, the better the chances of victory. McLeod leads Auburn with five sacks and has 25 tackles. Jacobs has a pair of sacks with 14 overall tackles and two QB hurries.

Player of the week

Keldric Faulk, DE

The sophomore is 14th in the nation with five sacks, is seventh in the SEC with seven tackles for loss and has 26 tackles overall. He's the player who kick-starts the Auburn defense and will

be called on early to ignite the Tigers.

By the numbers

1: Auburn leads the SEC and ranks fourth nationally in yards per completion (15.79).

10: Malcolm Simmons' 18 receptions for 260 yards ranks 10th among Auburn's all-time freshmen in receiving yardage.

13: Auburn is 13th nationally in red-zone defense (.700).

148: Auburn has scored in 148 consecutive games, the second-longest streak in school history. The record is 149.

Prediction

Missouri 28, Auburn 21

The Auburn program is not in a good space right now. It's so bad that the Tigers are down there with Mississippi State. A win goes a long way to stop the bleeding, but a fourth straight loss sends this team into a tailspin. There are no easy answers, and while the bye week was needed, it won't help Auburn fix most of the issues. Consistency has to be the norm for Auburn and silly miscues can't be tolerated anymore.

Records: South Carolina (3-3, 1-3 SEC), Oklahoma (4-2, 1-2)

The series: First meeting.

The lowdown: Carolina has lost three of its last four after last week's 27-25 loss at Alabama. ... The Sooners, after last week's 34-3 humbling at the hands of Texas, fell out of the AP Top 25 for the first time in 23 polls. ... OU, which lost its last home game 25-15 to Tennessee, has dropped consecutive home games just once over the last 25 years. In 2014, No. 14 Kansas State won 31-30 and No. 10 Baylor 48-14. ... Starting in 1999, Oklahoma is 24-1 in games immediately following their rivalry showdown with Texas. ... Though the Sooners have never met the Gamecocks, OU coach Brent Venables went 7-2 against them as Clemson's defensive coordinator. ... Carolina coach Shane Beamer was Oklahoma's assistant head coach 2018-20, helping the Sooners go 33-6 with three Big 12 titles and two playoff berths. ... However, this is the second time South Carolina has played in the state of Oklahoma. The Gamecocks won 27-7 at Tulsa in 1948.

The lowdown: UAB, already with one of the most atrocious rushing defenses in the land, showed it in last week's 44-10 loss at Army. The Black Knights trampled the Blazers to the tune of 413 yards rushing with five touchdowns. ... The Blazers "fell" 18 yards short of a school record for rushing defense futility. It was the second time Army has rushed for 400 this season. ... USF is celebrating homecoming after moving last week's "home" game to Orlando due to Hurricane Ian. ... The Bulls lost 21-3 to Memphis, scoring on Nico Gramatica's 52-yard field goal to end the first half. ... USF is no Army. The Bulls ran for 24 yards against Memphis and had 258 yards offense. ... South Florida ranks 104th in the 133-team FBS in total offense. UAB has the No. 95 defense. ... The Blazers are down to 132nd in rushing defense. They

The lowdown: Mississippi State is playing its third straight top-15 opponent. The Bulldogs have lost five straight, including to No. 1 Texas 35-13 and No. 5 Georgia 41-31 in its last two outings. ... Conner Weigman, after missing three games with a shoulder injury, was 18-of-22 passing for 276 yards in A&M's 41-10 roasting of Missouri two weeks ago. ... A&M kicker Randy Bond, after an 11-point day against Missouri, has scored 54 points this year, making 11 field goals. ... Mississippi State's 31 points at Georgia marked the first time since 2016 that Georgia had given up 30 at home. ... MSU true freshman Michael Van Buren, in his second career start, threw for 306 yards and three touchdowns at Georgia. ... The

The series: LSU leads 44-23-2.

The lowdown: The last four LSU-Arkansas games were each decided by three points, including overtime in 2021. ... The Tigers have won seven of the last eight meetings, losing only in 2021. ... Arkansas, after beating then-No. 4 Tennessee 19-14 in its last game, is hosting a second straight top-10 foe for the first time in school history. ... Texas' dominant defense faces big test

AUSTIN, Texas — By any measure, from the official statistics to the informal eye test, top-ranked Texas' defense has been dominant.

The Longhorns rank No. 1 in total defense and scoring defense. They are top 10 in first downs allowed, tackles for loss and passing yards. Much of that is built against opponents starting former walk-on quarterbacks (Michigan) and freshmen (Mississippi State and Oklahoma).

But the level of quarterback play Texas will face, in both talent and experience, is about to get much better over the second half of the season.

Texas hosts No. 5 Georgia on Saturday night in the first matchup of top-five teams in Austin since 2006, before playing the next week at Vanderbilt. Bulldogs senior Carson Beck was a preseason first-team Associated Press All-America pick, and standout Vanderbilt transfer Diego Pavia has carried the Commodores to a surprising 4-2 start, including a historic win over then-No. 1 Alabama.

Quite simply, Texas hasn't defended this caliber of quarterback all season.

Beck is a player on the doorstep of the NFL, Texas coach Steve Sarkisian said.

"There's nothing in the throw game (Beck) can't do," Sarkisian said. "He's played enough football now, too. It's kind of hard to confuse guys when they've played that much football."

Texas (6-0, 2-0 SEC) has allowed just one team to pass for more than 200 yards this season. Beck passed for 459 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions last week in a 41-31 win over Mississippi State. His 36 completions tied a Georgia record.

Even when Beck struggled early in Georgia's loss to Alabama, he rallied the Bulldogs to a late fourth-quarter lead. He finished with 439 yards in the loss where Georgia's rally ended with an Alabama interception in the end zone in the final minute.

Sarkisian recruited Beck when the Texas coach was an assistant at Alabama. Beck had initially committed to the Crimson Tide before switching to Georgia.

Beck is 18-2 in his career as a starter, and 6-2 against top-20 opponents.

The Bulldogs (5-1, 3-1) will need another exceptional game from him Saturday. A second SEC loss could threaten any chance of playing for the SEC championship and raise the alarms on the College Football Playoff as well.

Texas has all but overwhelmed opposing quarterbacks so far.

In last week's 34-3 thrashing of rival Oklahoma, the Longhorns sacked Sooners freshman quarterback Michael Hawkins Jr. five times and held him to 27 yards on 20 carries. Texas allowed just 225 total yards.

Hawkins was the first Sooners freshman to start at quarterback against the Longhorns in the 120-year history of the rivalry and was quickly swallowed up by a relentless pass rush.

By the numbers, the Longhorns

program is on pace for a historic season. Sarkisian has said his favorite stat is points allowed, which is not many.

Texas has surrendered only three touchdowns all season. Opponents have snatched four turnovers inside Texas territory, but none have produced points.

That ability to snuff momentum can drain an opponent, Sarkisian said.

"We're so composed as a defense," Texas safety Michael Taaffe said. "We're so confident, that no matter what happens, everything is going to be all right."

The only time Texas has trailed this season was a 3-0 early deficit against Oklahoma. Several Longhorns starters were still on the field when the Sooners' final drive stalled at the Texas 6-yard-line as the game ended.

The stars emerging for the Longhorns

have been second-year linebacker Anthony Hill Jr. and freshman edge rusher Colin Simmons.

Hill leads the team in total tackles (42), sacks (4 1/2) and tackles for loss (8 1/2). His sideline-to-sideline speed and move this season from the edge to the middle of the Texas defense has drawn comparisons to former Longhorns All-American Derrick Johnson 20 years ago.

Simmons has four sacks and 7 1/2 tackles for loss, second on the team in both categories.

"Size, speed," Georgia coach Kirby Smart said in summing up the Texas defense.

"They're the complete package on defense," Smart said. "The consistency you watch them play with, it reminds me of some of our best teams here."

Longhorns focusing on bigger trophies

DALLAS — The Texas Longhorns are perfect halfway through their first season in the Southeastern Conference and have plans for that coveted trophy they got back with another rout over their Red River rival that switched leagues with them.

"Two years ago when we won the Golden Hat, you might have thought we won the Super Bowl," fourth-year Longhorns coach Steve Sarkisian said after a 34-3 win Saturday over now-unranked Oklahoma.

"This year was like, OK, we got the Golden Hat back, but let's put it in the trophy case and let's keep grinding, let's keep going. So I think that's the mentality of our team."

At 6-0 for the first time since 2009, when finishing as the national runner-up, No. 1 Texas has itself on track for even bigger trophies a year after making the College Football Playoff for the first time as the Big 12 champion.

These Longhorns already have a win this season at defending national champion Michigan. They went home from the State Fair of Texas for next Saturday's game against No. 5 Georgia (5-1, 3-1 SEC), the back-to-back champs before the Wolverines took the crown.

"The journey is far from over," said Sarkisian, whose teams have won 18 of 20 games since going 13-12 his first two seasons.

Receiving 56 of 62 first-place votes Sunday, Texas strengthened its hold on No. 1 in The Associated Press college football poll. That was four more first-place votes than last week and their most since being the unanimous No. 1 in October 2008.

"The first half of the season, I don't see a lot teams that have played as well in all three phases as they have," Oklahoma coach Brent Venables said when asked about the Longhorns as a No. 1 team. He was part of national titles as defensive coordinator with the Sooners and Clemson.

"They've got a good team and they're good in the right places: quarterback, offensive line and they've got explosive playmakers. They've got a really good defense, and they've got good experience," he said. "So a veteran team

that's got good players."

This is their fourth poll this season on top, the most for the Longhorns in a single season since 1977, when they were undefeated for the final six polls of the regular season before a loss to Joe Montana-led Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl.

Texas has allowed only 38 points, the fewest through six games since 30 during the 1964 season, when the only loss was to national champion Alabama in the Orange Bowl. Two of the three touchdowns against the Longhorns have come late in games that were already decided.

Quarterback Quinn Ewers was back

from an abdomen strain after standout redshirt freshman Arch Manning won both of his starts. After the Longhorns had 13 yards on 10 plays without a first down in the first quarter against Oklahoma, they finished with 406 total yards. Ewers threw for 199 yards with the go-ahead touchdown and had a 1-yard scoring run.

The Longhorns' plus-221 points differential is their highest through six games since 1915. They have trailed only once this season, for less than four minutes before Ewers' 7-yard TD to tight end Gunnar Helm on the drive after Oklahoma's field goal for a 3-0 lead.

As for the defense, Sarkisian said it has "assumed a real kind of swagger" and confidence. And it's a unit that doesn't seem satisfied even when leading the nation, allowing only 6.3 points and 229.7 total yards per game.

"Our best ball is yet to come," junior cornerback Michael Taaffe said confidently after the 120th Red River game. "Everybody around outside the locker room might say, 'Wow, this is such a complete defense.' But everybody in the locker room knows that the offense gets after our butt a lot during the week of practice. ... That gives us the confidence, the preparation."




