INGREDIENTS

1 large egg, slightly beaten 1/2 cup Panko Japanese style bread crumbs

- 4 slices American cheese slices

Spray grill with cooking spray. Preheat grill to medium high heat. In a bowl, stir together beef, cumin, mashed beans, tomatoes, egg, and bread crumbs. Divide mixture into 4 portions and shape into patties. Let patties cook 5 minutes before trying to turn them over. Grill until a meat thermometer registers 160 degrees. Top each patty with one slice of cheese and remove from grill. Grill buns until toasted, 1-2 minutes per side. Yield: 4 servings.

Note: Must use Glory Goods northern beans.

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

Missouri at Alabama

Four-down territory

- **1. Own worst enemy:** Penalties continue to be an issue. Alabama was flagged 15 times against Tennessee for 115 yards, including a 15-yard personal foul call on Kendrick Law that turned a makable fourth down in the closing minutes into a fourth-and-22, which failed. That's on par for the Crimson Tide, ranked 129th of 133 FBS teams in most penalties. Overall, Alabama has been hit with 62 penalties for a whopping 548 yards, which translates to about nine flags per game for 78 yards.
- 2. Running to a standstill: The running game has taken a step back of late. Through the last three games, Alabama has 257 yards, 200 of which are from running backs Jam Miller and Justice Haynes. There haven't been any explosive runs in that span. Once a staple of Alabama's offense, the run game has suddenly vanished. That was evident against Tennessee, which saw Jalen Milroe attempt 45 passes. His previous career high was 33.
- **3. Comeback kid:** Missouri is coming off a wild win against Auburn. Ouarterback Brady Cook left with a first-half injury and was taken to the hospital. He returned in the fourth quarter and led two touchdown drives, including the game-winner with under a minute to play. "The dude is an extremely tough player," Alabama defensive coordinator Kane Wommack said. "I thought it was really impressive coming off of an injury. We'll certainly have a tremendous challenge that we're working very hard to make sure we maximize our opportunities."
- **4. That's concerning:** Alabama was abysmal on third down against Tennessee last week (3-of-14). That stands to reason since the Vols are No. 2 in the country on third-down defense. The big issue this week is Missouri is No. 9 (28%, 26 of 93). Something has to change this week if Alabama expects to win. Overall, the Crimson Tide has converted 40% on third down (35 of 83). That's not bad, but the offense can't afford three-andouts, and has to sustain drives on a solid

Missouri defense.

Key matchup

Alabama QB Jalen Milroe vs. Missouri **QB Brady Cook**

Both of these players are the heart and soul of the offense. The success lives and dies with their performances. Milroe is coming off a rough game, where accuracy was a major problem and the result was a loss. On the flip side, a gutsy Cookled the Tigers to a comeback win while hampered with an injury.

Player of the week

Jam Miller, RB

The struggling run game has to hit the

reset button and needs Miller to break loose for some momentum-changing plays. He leads the team with 402 rushing yards but has struggled lately. He's got to get back on track to give the offense some balance.

Alabama on brink of playoff elimination

Alabama looked every bit the Nick Saban-style juggernaut through the first 15 minutes against fellow Southeastern Conference power Georgia.

Kalen DeBoer's 15th-ranked Crimson Tide team has looked downright mortal, perhaps even mediocre, since then during a sputtering run that has included costly penalties, errant passes from quarterback Jalen Milroe and a too often vulnerable

The latest blow was last weekend's 24-17 loss to No. 7 Tennessee. It leaves Alabama (5-2, 2-2 SEC) with multiple losses before November for the first time since Saban's debut season in 2007 - and No. 21 Missouri (6-1, 2-1) visits on Saturday.

The ranking is Alabama's lowest since 2010, the only season in a 16-year span the Tide has lost as many as three times. Another loss would almost certainly eliminate DeBoer's team from even the new 12-team playoff field.

"We've got to have a starving mindset," Milroe told reporters after Saturday's loss. "To want to get better, want to grind, want to be the best version of ourselves, want to be the best offense in the country. And a lot is still out there with the right mindset."

Alabama has been outscored 123-92 since racing to a 28-0 lead over No. 2 Georgia. The Tide went on to win that game 41-34 with a late 75-yard bomb to freshman wide receiver Ryan Williams, followed by an interception in the end zone from fellow freshman Zabien Brown.

That vaulted Alabama to No. 1. albeit only briefly. A 40-35 loss to Vanderbilt followed.

"You can't have the mistakes, you can't have the penalties, got to have better execution," DeBoer said on Monday. "All those things that put you behind the eight-ball throughout the course of the game. Here in the SEC there's such a fine line between winning and losing and that's how you get beat. That's on all of us."

Making matters tougher, cornerback Keon Sabb is hurt with what DeBoer described as "a lower extremity injury."

"We're still gathering information here, but we do expect him to be down for a while," he said. "That could be an extended amount of time, and we'll just continue to evaluate that."

A snapshot of the Tide's woes:

- Alabama committed 15 penalties for 115 yards against Tennessee. The backbreaker was Kendrick Law's 15-yard personal foul to force the Tide into a fourth-and-22 situation in the final minutes. It fell short.
- Milroe looked like a legitimate Heisman Trophy candidate after the Georgia win. In the three games since, he has three touchdown passes and five interceptions while netting only 57 rushing yards after
- The Tide offense needs to get the ball to playmakers beyond Williams. He was targeted 18 times against Tennessee and had eight catches for 73 yards. Germi Bernard caught five passes for 72 yards on five targets. Law was the only other wide receiver credited with a target on a non-penalty play.

Four-down territory

1. Same old story: Twice this season Auburn has given away the lead in the fourth quarter (Oklahoma and Missouri). It all comes down to finishing, something the Tigers haven't done this season. In SEC games, the Tigers have been outscored 52-17. "It feels like a repeated topic," Auburn coach Hugh Freeze said. "We've got to figure out a way to finish. It's incredibly frustrating."

2. Vote of confidence: Freeze has been doing a lot of politicking this season, for himself, his staff and the players. It's been hard to spin the positives after four straight losses. Freeze remains resolute the Tigers can finish the season strong. "I've said it before: I remain confident in the staff and our players, and continue to trust the process," he said. "Hopefully the results will start to come sooner rather than later."


3. Wildcat surprise: You never know which Kentucky team will show up each week. Maybe Auburn gets the team that went toe-to-toe with Georgia in a onepoint loss or handed Ole Miss its only loss. Auburn might see a Wildcat team that got scorched by South Carolina and Florida. The difference in the games with Ole Miss and Georgia was the run defense. Kentucky held Ole Miss to 92 yards and Georgia to 102. Florida ran for 197 in its romp of the Wildcats last week.

4. Time to change: Auburn made a switch at left tackle during last week's game with Missouri. Dillon Wade took over for Percy Lewis. Auburn ran for 110 yards last week. The move may not be permanent. "We'll continue to look at that this week," Freeze said. "The movement stuff that has started to happen against us because we were really good at getting into correct runs against fronts for several games. Everybody is trying to pattern what others have done, and Percy struggled with it in all reality."

Auburn LB Dorian Mausi vs. Kentucky LB D'Eryk Jackson

The run defense for both teams will be

The senior has become a big leader on defense. He had six tackles last week and is tied for the team lead with five sacks. He has to set the tone early and rally the a deciding factor. Mausi leads the Tigers defense when things get out of control.

Four-down territory

1. Back at it: UNA should be wellenough rested for this matchup. After playing eight straight weeks, the Lions were able to take a break last week. It was the first of their two scheduled byes with the second one set to take place Nov. 16. The question is will it dampen any of their momentum after winning their last three games. Central Arkansas is also coming off a bye week.

2. Going for another: UNA finally snapped its 19-game losing streak against ranked Division I foes when it topped then-No. 10 Abilene Christian 47-34 two weeks ago. So, can the Lions do it again? Central Arkansas is ranked 12th in the Stats FCS top 25. The last time UNA beat two ranked opponents in the same season was 2016, the program's penultimate year in Division II. The Lions went 4-2 against ranked teams that season with one of the losses coming to a then-FCS No. 3 Jacksonville State. The last time UNA beat ranked opponents in consecutive games was 2013. The Lions beat Division II No. 11 Valdosta State 57-7 on Oct. 26 and topped No. 20 West Alabama 30-27 in overtime a week later.

3. ShunDerrick, take two: Central Arkansas (and former UNA) running back ShunDerrick Powell made his return to Braly Stadium last season. But Lions' single-season rushing yards leader was hampered by a foot injury and rushed for only 23 yards on seven carries. He'll get another shot at the Lions in Conway. And he appears healthy, too. Powell ranks second in the FCS with 1,107 rushing yards on 130 carries. His season low is 126 yards against Lindenwood. He also ranks first with 13 rushing touchdowns. Powell has 16 overall.

4. How the turntables: There have been some notable changes during UNA's win streak, and for the better. The Lions are scoring points. After averaging fewer than 15 points during its five-game losing streak, UNA has averaged 44 over its last three games. Perhaps just as notable? The Lions aren't giving the ball to the other team. After having 17 during its room.

Player of the week **ShunDerrick Powell, RB**

Don't think much needs to be said here. He's likely going to be the most talented running back the Lions will see/ have seen this season if he's healthy.

1. Capturing vs. sustaining the magic: The Magic City Classic has gone in Alabama State's favor as of late. Since 2000. the Hornets had only managed to win back-to-back games in the series once (2010-13). That was until last season. Alabama State won 31-16 to follow the 24-17 victory in 2022. Alabama A&M, however, holds a 16-8 advantage in the 21st century, which included a fourgame win streak from 2018-2021.

- 2. Mission Control, there is a QB: Repeat. There is a quarterback. The Bulldogs played five quarterbacks in its first five games with three getting the majority of the reps, but it appears to be Xavier Lankford's show now. The junior was 21-for-42 passing for 245 yards and three touchdowns against Jackson State and followed that with a 15-for-24 showing for 315 yards, one touchdown and an interception against Bethune-Cookman. Lankford was the starter for the Magic City Classic last season. He threw for 231 yards, a TD and INT in the
- **3. Trying to put a stop to it:** Alabama State isn't wowing anyone with its offense. The Hornets are averaging fewer than 25 points per game. Their defense, on the other hand, is fairly stout. Alabama State is allowing a little more than 252 yards per game which ranks fourth in the FCS behind Dayton (222), Butler (237) and Mercer (250). It's allowing 18.7 points per game which ranks 12th in the FCS. Both categories are the best among SWAC schools. Alabama A&M is averaging 31 points per contest.
- 4. A little prep time: Both Alabama A&M and Alabama State enter the annual matchup with an extra week of preparation. Both are also coming off rather lopsided wins. The Bulldogs beat Bethune-Cookman 56-12 and had a 300-yard passer, a 100-yard rusher (Donvan Eaglin, 125 yards) and a 100yard receiver (Keenan Hambrick, 111 yards). The Hornets rolled through straight?

Miami not taking 1-win FSU lightly

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - The way Miami wide receiver Xavier Restrepo was talking Tuesday, it would seem as if the sixth-ranked Hurricanes are getting ready for a Top 25 matchup this weekend against a fellow undefeated team.

He certainly didn't sound like Miami (7-0, 3-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) was prepping for a Florida State team that - at 1-6 overall and 1-5 in ACC play — is already teetering on the brink of being assured of a losing season.

"You know, we have tons of respect for those guys, defending ACC champions, a really, really talented football team," Restrepo said. "You watch their defense, all five DBs can line up in your face and play man, they run around, have great ball skills. The D-line gets pressure, their linebackers play really solid and defend the pass very well as well. ... We have to be as prepared as we can be."

Translation: No, Miami is not taking Florida State lightly going into their Saturday night matchup at Miami Gardens. In this rivalry, that would be a bad idea.

Consider last season, when Miami was somewhere between a 14- and 17-point underdog when it went to Tallahassee to take on the then-undefeated Seminoles. The Hurricanes had the ball with a chance to tie in the final minutes, before losing 27-20 in a game that was much closer than oddsmakers expected.

This year, it's Miami that BetMGM Sportsbook has listed as a 21-point favorite.

With quarterback Cam Ward looking like a potential Heisman candidate, the Hurricanes are off to their first 7-0 start since 2017. He has thrown for at least 300 yards in every game and leads the nation with 2,538 passing yards. Ward threw for 319 yards and four touchdowns in a 52-45 win at Louisville last weekend.

Meanwhile, FSU has struggled. The Seminoles began the season ranked No. 10 and lost three straight. After beating Cal 14-9 at home, they've lost three more, including 23-16 last weekend at Duke.

"Obviously, this is a huge week for our football program," Florida State coach Mike Norvell said. "I mean, this game is a game that we have an emphasis on 365 days a year because we're fortunate to be at a place that you get two rivalry games

every single year that mean a ton to our football program."

Florida State plays its other in-state rival, Florida, on Nov. 30 in its regularseason finale.

The last time there was something this close to a disparity among records between the teams going into a Florida

State-Miami game was 1974, when the Seminoles were 0-8 and the Hurricanes were 5-2. Florida State won 21-14 to snap a 20-game losing streak - doing so in Miami, on the Hurricanes' homecoming weekend.

It's a reminder of why records don't matter much in this rivalry.

"As a player, we never looked at the record of anyone we're playing against," Miami coach Mario Cristobal said. "Whatever the record of any team is in this rivalry, you're going to get the best version of them and they're going to get the best version of you. And that's what makes this game so incredibly intense."

Clemson surging, has playoff hopes

CLEMSON, S.C. – A year ago, Dabo Swinney was sparring with a radio caller asking why he's paid so much at Clemson for mid-level results.

Hardly anyone's questioning Swinney this season with the ninth-ranked Tigers surging back into contention for an Atlantic Coast Conference championship and a return to the College Football Playoffs. The Tigers (6-1, 5-0) have this week off before starting the final stretch at home against Louisville.

"We've got a long ways to go, but we do have an opportunity to earn it," Swinney said Monday. "And it is exciting."

The defending ACC champs had expectations in 2023, but were out of the race by late October. The Tigers lost their opener at unranked Duke, were beaten at home by eventual league winner Florida State and lost consecutive games to Miami and N.C. State to fall to 4-4.

Then came the infamous, at least to Clemson backers, words on Swinney's radio call-in show from "Tyler from Spartanburg," who pointedly challenged Swinney: "Why are we paying you \$11.5 million to go 4-4?"

Swinney got fiery, telling Tyler he'd never let outside narratives about his program change his approach.

"You ain't going to talk to me like I'm 12 years old," Swinney answered back.

The radio exchange lit a fire under Swinney - and his team.

The Tigers finished with five straight victories last season including wins over ranked opponents in Notre Dame and North Carolina. The good feelings fueled Clemson throughout the offseason and, even after a disappointing 34-3 loss to No. 2 Georgia in the opener, have continued this season.

The Tigers have gone 11-1 since Tyler's angry call, showing the brand of dominating offense and suffocating defense they displayed during Clemson's run of success from 2015-2020 when it won six ACC titles and national championship after the 2016 and 2018 seasons.

Clemson quarterback Cade Klubnik has made significant forward strides in his second season as a starter. Too frequently in the first eight games of 2023, Klubnik struggled with accuracy and decision making at critical times.

That's changed dramatically this season. Klubnik has thrown 20 touchdowns, more than the 19 he had all last year. He's had just three interceptions in seven games this season, down from the nine he threw last year.

Klubnik has benefitted from a deep group of receivers. Wide out Antonio Williams, slowed by injuries last year, has come back in a big way with 28 catches and a team-leading five touchdowns.

Freshmen receivers Bryant Wesco Jr. and T.J. Moore helped stretch the field like the Tigers had not done since the CFP run ended four years ago. Westco leads the team with 23.8 yards per catch with Moore in second (16.8).

"Of course, we still have a long way to go," linebacker Barrett Carter said. "It's super exciting knowing we have all our goals in front of us and we still have a chance to fight for a spot to win this league. Whatever comes after that we'll see. But it's certainly exciting."

Swinney's not ready for a victory lap, not this soon anyway. He didn't enter coaching to be proven right, he said, but to lead players into success both on and off the field.

Swinney recalled the mistakes of early last season and never wavered about how close he felt the team was to a breakthrough while losing more games in a season than they had since 2010.

"I could see our quarterback getting better, I could see a lot of good things and a lot of areas that not everybody else sees," Swinney said. "I just really feel like we had a chance to be a really good team."

And maybe one that once more plays for a championship.

In order for that to happen, the Tigers must pay attention to the little things, Swinney said. In the joyful aftermath of Clemson's 31-23 win over Notre Dame, a smiling Swinney shouted it was time to buy stock in the rising Tigers.

His opinion hasn't changed in the year since. "Hey, I need to buy some more," he said.

Backup gets his chance with Hoosiers

INDIANAPOLIS - Indiana quarterback Tayven Jackson seemingly spent his entire life preparing for Saturday – leading his home state team onto the field for one of the biggest games in program history.

All he has to do now is help the 13thranked Hoosiers beat Washington.

Indiana coach Curt Cignetti named Jackson the starter Monday, two days after Kurtis Rourke injured his right thumb during the first half of last weekend's 56-7 rout over Nebraska that will keep him on the sideline indefinitely.

"Kurtis Rourke will not play this week. We do expect him to return during the regular season with a thumb injury, that's all I'll say about the injury," Cignetti said during his weekly news conference. "We have 100% confidence, the team has 100% confidence, I have confidence, the staff has confidence in Tayven Jackson. I thought he played really well in the second half."

Cignetti provided no additional details about Rourke's injury, which appeared to occur when his throwing hand inadvertently struck the helmet of a Cornhuskers pass rusher late in the first half. He threw for 189 yards and one score as the Hoosiers (7-0, 4-0 Big Ten) built a 28-7 halftime lead, but he spent the second half watching from the sideline in street clothes.

Jackson looked good in another relief appearance, going 7-of-8 with 91 yards, two scores and a quarterback rating of 99.9 — even better than Rourke's rating of 89.8.

Jackson also rushed twice for 21 yards while leading to another 28 points over the final 30 minutes and has grown accustomed to living life in the limelight.

His father, Ray, played on Washington State's 1998 Rose Bowl team and three years in the NFL. His older brother, Trayce Jackson-Davis, was an All-American basketball player with the Hoosiers. And the third-year quarterback led prep powerhouse Center Grove High School to 28 consecutive wins during his junior and senior seasons before initially starting his college career at Tennessee.

So when Jackson opted to transfer to Indiana following the 2022 season, many Hoosiers fans expected him to earn the starting job almost by acclamation.

Instead, Jackson found himself locked into a season-long battle for playing time with Brendan Sorsby.

But when the Hoosiers fired coach Tom Allen, Sorsby entered the transfer portal. Jackson opted to stick around even after Cignetti got the commitment from Rourke, the 2022 Mid-American Conference MVP.

Cignetti has no doubt Jackson will be ready to face the Huskies (4-3, 2-2), last season's national runner-up who had a bye last week, or beyond.

"I thought he (Jackson) came in, did a nice job in the second half. Now he'll get more repetitions, which will help him prepare for the game on Saturday," Cignetti said. "He's a guy that's extremely capable, extremely capable. I'm sure he'll rise to the occasion."

Still, it won't be easy replacing Rourke, whose leads the Big Ten with a quarterback rating of 188.7, shares the league lead with 15 TD passes and is second among conference quarterbacks in completion percentage (74.6%).

Rourke has played so well, he's in the discussion for Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year and even a potential Heisman Trophy contender.

Now, though, Jackson needs to be more than Indiana's quarterback of the future. He's being asked to keep the Hoosiers' magical season on track, now.

"Everybody's here for a reason, right?" Cignetti said. "In this sport, you're going to have injuries at every single position. It's a lot different when you're the starter, right? I'm sure he's excited about it."

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
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
