





Historic Home

Built at the turn of the century, was marked as a "High Priority" for status as a Historic Landmark as a part of a citywide survey in 1996.



Gardens

Small-scale community and demonstration gardens that showcase organic growing methods for the home gardener.



Natural Habitat

The preservation of wildflower meadows and forested areas for pollinators, wildlife, and ecological balance.



Herff Farm

Boerne, TX - Herff Farm is a gathering place offering public events, community gardens, a weekly Farmers Market and hiking opportunities.

Nash Farm


Grapevine, TX - A historic landmark bringing history to life through exhibits, interpretive programs, and touchable displays. The farm grounds offer self-guided tours.

Heritage Farmstead

Plano, TX - A preserved historic Texas farmstead where people can experience and learn from our agrarian roots with historical collections, live farm animals, and exhibits.

Sauer-Beckmann Farm

Stonewall, TX - A living history farm with costumed interpreters reenacting the tasks of an early 1900s farm family.








Creating an Impact: Wildflower Meadows

Wildflowers attract pollinators such as bees and butterflies, which are responsible for one in every three bites of food we eat, according to the USDA.

The root systems of wildflowers reach deep into the soil, where they store water, nutrients, and most importantly, carbon.



Creating an Impact: Natural Habitat

Creating a natural habitat for wildlife will contribute to Texas's biodiversity and promote ecological balance in the area.

The leading cause of extinction is habitat destruction. Habitats that provide food and cover ensure native plants and animals can thrive.



Creating an Impact: Historic Home

Protecting this historic home and farm preserves our town's culture and connection to the past.

Having a unique space such as this would provide educational and recreational opportunities. It could bring in local visitors and many living outside of Denton as well, benefiting local businesses.



Creating an Impact: Community Garden

Community and demonstration gardens teach people of all ages the skills of food production, nutrition, and the importance of caring for the environment.

Sustainable and organic gardening protects the soil, conserves water, reduces pollution, supports biodiversity, and promotes health through physical activity.







The Evers

The Evers family and their contributions to our town's founding years cannot be understated. They include establishing the first water and electric companies in Denton.¹

The family took over a hardware store on the south side of Denton's square in 1885. The building still bears the family's name and was owned and operated by the family until the late 1990s.²

The Evers Farmhouse


The Evers family purchased the N. Elm property in the early 1900's to serve as their country escape. A place to retreat from the bustle of town. Here they raised livestock and enjoyed a more rural existence.

The family would go on to own hundreds of acres of farm land surrounding Denton, planting over 6,000 pecan trees. By the mid-century, their farms produced 70,000 pounds of pecans in just one year.³




Texas Historical Commission
