Enterprise native, was selected for the State of Alabama Sports Hall of Fame. McCollough was an Academic All-American center in football at the University of Alabama and was on the Crimson Tide's 1964 national-championship team.

Ted Carstiel Caldwell of Elba was arrested for murder in the shooting death of Marcus Eugene Virghes of Elba. The alleged murder took place in the 1400 block of Shellfield Road in Enterprise.

A historical marker was unveiled in front of the former College Street Elementary School in Enterprise.

Randy Bryant was hired as the new head football coach at Zion Chapel High School.

The Army Aviation Center Federal Credit Union's 33rd annual Car, Truck, Boat and RV Sale opened at the Enterprise Civic Center for the first time.

Daniel Raymond Youngblood of Daleville died two weeks after he had been hit from behind while driving his tractor on Highway 84 near Enterprise.

New Brockton punter Max Weeks signed a letter of intent with Faulkner University.

Rhett Harrelson was hired as the new Enterprise High School head boys basketball coach, and George Scott was hired as the new EHS girls coach.

Scott Rackley resigned as head cross-country coach at Enterprise after four seasons in charge of the program and leading the team to two consecutive 10th-place finishes at the Class 7A state meet.

Retired Col. Teresa Townsend was selected as the Pilot Club Enterprise Woman of the Year, Roger Page Dionne was named the Man of the Year and Sophia Carnazza was picked as the club's Youth of the Year.

MAY

Suzanne Woods was named the new CEO at Medical Center Enterprise, and former CEO J. Heath Phillips took the same position at Flowers Hospital in Dothan.

The Kinston High School softball team set a state record for most runs in a game and tied the mark for most runs in an inning in its 40-0 win over Florala. Kinston scored 23 runs in the first inning and 17 runs in the second inning before ending after three innings because of the mercy rule.

Warren and Hope Mynard were named to the South baseball and softball teams, respectively, for the North-South games in Montgomery.

Kenneth Boswell announced he would step down as mayor of Enterprise to become the new director of the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs. Longtime Councilman Bill Cooper was named to replace Boswell.

Kinston's Dylan Moulton became the first golfer from KHS to qualify for the state meet. Enterprise's Emilia Smith also qualified for the state meet.

The new Clark Cinemas 10 opened on Enterprise's southeast side.

Enterprise's Kelan Leblanc and Bailey Cameron were named to the South soccer boys and girls teams, respectively, for the North-South games.

The Enterprise boys soccer team had its season ended in the Class 7A semifinals with a 2-1 loss in penalty kicks to Davidson.

One person was killed in an alleged drive-by shooting on May 13 in Level Plains. Lisa Griffin was the victim in the incident.

Enterprise's Emilia Smith finished tied for eighth place at the Class 7A girls state golf meet, and Kinston's Dylan Moulton was sixth at the Class 1A-2A boys state meet.

Bill Cooper was sworn in

as Enterprise mayor, making the longtime councilman the city's first African-American mayor.

State Rep. Barry Moore of Enterprise announced he would challenge for the Republican nomination for Alabama's 2nd District seat in the U.S. House of Representatives in 2018. That seat is currently held by Martha Roby.

The Enterprise Board of Education voted to purchase a new videoboard for Wildcat Stadium.

Four Enterprise athletes signed letters of intent: Harrison Hendricks, football, Faulkner University; Jalen Jones, football, Bethany College; Myles Thomas, football, Troy (preferred walk-on); and Jayden Webb, cheerleading, Troy.

Jzurih Khalil Flowers of Enterprise was charged

with capital murder in the death of his grandfather, Ray Flowers.

The Enterprise Public Library had its request for a cargo van approved by the City Council. The van is intended for use as a bookmobile.

Jared Robison was promoted to the head boys basketball coach position at Zion Chapel.

John L. Mitchell was elected as the new chairman of the Enterprise Water Works Board.

About 500 students earned their diplomas during Enterprise High School's graduation ceremony.

Brendan Donovan, a former Enterprise High School baseball player, was named the MVP of the Sun Belt Conference tourney in leading South Alabama to the title.

Longtime Enterprise physician Dr. Joseph Herod died at the age of 81. He practiced in Enterprise for about 45 years.

William "Doug" Holderfield, the longtime owner of local radio stations WELB and WZTZ/WVVL and who was known as the "Voice of the Elba Tigers," died at age 80.

JUNE

The Coffee County Board of Education approved a plan to purchase approximately 47 acres near the south side of the Zion Chapel School campus. No immediate plans for the property were given.

A second pre-kindergarten program was planned for Zion Chapel School after the county's school system received a \$123,000 state grant.

Sonya Wheeler Rich was appointed to the District 1 seat on the Enterprise City Council, making her the first African-American woman ever to serve on the board.

Henry Lewis Eason of Jack was killed in a wreck on June 4 on Coffee County 114.

Zion Chapel School announced it would field its first cross-country team in the fall.

Reid Clark was appointed to the Enterprise

Board of Education for a five-year term.

The Enterprise City Council agreed to cut the cost of animal adoption to nonprofits from \$165 to \$50.

Retired Army SFC Eric Long of Enterprise and his family received a mortgage-free home through the Operation Homefront program. The Longs were presented with the keys onstage during a special presentation in Nashville that featured singer-songwriter RaeLynn.

Caitlyn Nolin of New Brockton was elected the Alabama FFA South District president for 2017-18.

Arista Aviation of Enterprise made its first commercial sale of modified aircraft, selling four UH-60A Black Hawk helicopters to the International Defense and Aerospace Group.

The Enterprise High School FFA chapter was named the state's top chapter during the state conference.

Rob Rhoades was appointed to the Enterprise Industrial Development Board.

The Coffee County Commission voted to approve a contract with CivicPlus for a mass-alert warning system that would be connected to the redesign of the county's website.
