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Fairfax County launches co-responder team for crisis intervention

Following the recent conclusion of a micro-pilot study, the Fairfax County Police Department and the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board (CSB) launched a limited co-responder program on September 29 that addresses mental health crises in the field and diverts individuals from arrest. The program consists of members from the CSB's Mobile Crisis Unit and FCPD officers, who respond to 911 calls that warrant crisis intervention.

The adoption of the co-responder model is the latest step in the county's Diversion First program, an initiative spearheaded by law enforcement and community leadership that commenced in 2016. The goal of Diversion First is to intervene in the criminal justice process as early as possible to identify individuals who would be better served by mental health and substance abuse treatment instead of incarceration for low-level offenses.

Diversion First was formed after a collaborative process among law enforcement, emergency responders, the judiciary and community services established that a proactive crisis intervention program could offer treatment to vulnerable residents, reduce incarceration, lower costs

In 2020, according to the most recent Diversion First report, FCPD officers responded to 9,989 calls for service that involved a mental illness and law enforcement was involved in 2,165 service encounters with a team from the Merrifield Crisis Response Center.

For the Sheriff's Office alone in fiscal year 2021, deputies conducted 77 long distance transports and free up officers' time on patrol, from the MCRC to mental health a commission to review police

practices, which recommended the creation of a crisis intervention program in 2015. The launch of Diversion First was additionally spurred by the 2015 death of Natasha McKenna, who had previously been diagnosed with schizophrenia and stopped breathing after being tased multiple times by Fairfax Sheriff's deputies who were trying to transfer her to another facility.

The General Assembly also recently passed a law known as the "Marcus Alert" system, named after

Virginia State Police apprehend robbery suspect

At approximately 6:38 p.m. October 4, Virginia State Police was alerted by Prince Georges County, Md. Police of an armed robbery that had just occurred in that jurisdiction and that the suspect's vehicle was being pursued by their officers.

As the pursuit crossed the Woodrow Wilson Bridge into Virginia, a Virginia trooper pulled in behind the suspect vehicle which still refused to stop. The suspect vehicle attempted to make a drastic lane change approaching the Springfield Interchange, the driver lost control, and struck the attenuator in the area that separates I-95 southbound from I-395 and I-495 northbound.

Virginia troopers took the driver, Robert D. Johnson, 46, of Newport News, into custody without further incident. Johnson was the only occupant of the vehicle and was transported to Alexandria Hospital and treated for nonlife threatening injuries sustained in the crash. He was then transported to Fairfax County Adult Detention Center.

Virginia State Police charged Johnson with one felony count of eluding police, one count of reckless driving and for possession of marijuana with intent to distribute. A pellet gun was recovered from the vehicle.

The incident remains under investigation.

Detectives release composite sketches of rape suspects

Detectives from the Fairfax County Police Department Major Crimes Bureau Sex Crimes Squad are asking for the public's help in identifying two men who sexually assaulted a woman October 7 in the 14000 block of Saint Germain Drive in Centreville.

Officers were called to the area around 7:40 a.m. for the report an unconscious person. Officers found the victim who reported the sexual assault which occurred overnight. She was taken to a nearby hospital for injuries not considered life threatening.

Detectives determined the victim was approached by a man who pulled her into a nearby wooded area, where he and another man sexually assaulted her.

The first suspect is described as a Hispanic man between 30 and 40 years of age, approximately 5'8", average build, with dark hair. The second suspect is described as a Hispanic man, between 60 and 70 years of age, approximately 5'8", stocky build, with partially gray hair. The driver of a 2009 Hyundai Santa Fe was traveling southbound on Hunter Mill Road and struck Yazdani, who was laying in the road. The driver of a 2007 Toyota Rav4 was also traveling southbound on Hunter Mill Road and struck Yazdani after the Hyundai. Yazdani was taken to a nearby hospital, where he was pronounced deceased.

Both striking vehicles remained at the scene. Detectives do not believe that speed or alcohol were factors in the crash for the pedestrian or the drivers.

Be aware of the colorless and odorless killer: carbon monoxide

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), each year more than 400 Americans die from unintentional carbon monoxide poisoning not linked to fires, more than 20,000 visit the emergency room, and more than 4,000 are hospitalized. Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless, odorless and tasteless gas.

Early symptoms of exposure are similar to the flu and include headache, fatigue, nausea, and confused thinking (so victims cannot think clearly enough to get assistance). Without treatment, the victim will lose consciousness, and if no help is given will lose their life.

CO is produced by combustion. Common causes are:

Defective gas or oil furnaces and water heaters

Cracked chimney flues

Indoor use of charcoal grills

Use of a gas oven or range to warm a room

Running a car in an enclosed area such as a garage Running of a portable

generator inside, or too close to, the home It is important to have a

working carbon monoxide on every level of your home. Another very important

point to remember is that you still need a working smoke alarm in every bedroom and on every level of your home.

An official ribbon-cutting ceremony and talent show will take place Oct. 21 (an earlier event was postponed as heavy rain flooded parts of the church building).

"We are thrilled to partner with SPARC to help adults with disabilities have a safe space," said Good Shepherd Pastor Eric Song. "Allowing SPARC to use our space is a tremendous blessing to help people in our community."

The church previously provided space in its Fellowship Hall in summer months for the group to hold its day program, where participants take part in ways that are adapted to their abilities. Club members compete in news quizzes, play word games and use their imaginations to express themselves. They cook, paint, build and create in their own way.

Good Shepherd members Mary and Bob Burger got involved with SPARC years ago when their late son used its services. Mary now serves as a SPARC board member.

"SPARC provides an incredible program for these adults who have little or no options for employment, though a few do have some limited work," Mary said. "The program provides these adults with disabilities the opportunity to interact with others, to be stimulated and to feel a part of the community. We know there is a large population out there that needs

this program." Like many organizations, SPARC has been impacted by the pandemic. The SPARC staff set up for club members a virtual/Zoom program that is still available. In July, in-person club meetings resumed at two of SPARC's locations, including at Good Shepherd where meetings are held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. FCPS student uses his skills as a Boy Scout to create an outdoor learning space

On a warm Tuesday

tent, each student scoping out where they'll sit. Normally, these students would be indoors, sitting in plastic chairs, getting ready for their first lesson of the day. But today, their options are a bit more exciting: a tree stump painted bright yellow, a tree stump painted dark blue, or an interesting looking lounge chair constructed from two pieces of wood. As each student finds a seat, their attention turns to the giant white board at the front of the outdoor classroom and the teacher begins her lesson.

This colorful and lively learning area is all thanks to former Ravensworth student Logan Pembleton. Now 15 vears old and a sophomore at Lake Braddock Secondary School, Pembleton got involved in designing the outdoor classroom as part of his Eagle Scouts project. Late last spring, Ravensworth Principal Erika Aspuria put a post in her school's weekly community newsletter, asking for help creating an outdoor classroom under the school's new tent. When Pembleton and his mom saw the post, they knew it was the perfect opportunity to help students learn during

the pandemic. 'Outdoor classrooms are very important this year because the kids have to wear masks, and it gets stuffy," Pembleton said. "So when they go outside they can take them off."

He began by doing research. He found the design for the wooden chairs online. He searched Home Depot for the best deals on lumber. He created a white board design that would be waterproof and mobile. Finally, the plan was ready to go, but he needed help getting it done. So he started sending out emails asking for volunteers.

"When Logan started planning, it was amazing how much enthusiasm and excitement there was from neighbors, friends and schoolmates." Lisa Pembleton said, "Everyone was really willing to pitch in or help out with donations. And the Ravensworth students that showed up were really excited about being able to tell their classmates that they helped with the project."

Pembleton says one special part of the project was connecting with younger Boy Scouts who came out to help.

"You could figure out if they pay attention, and see how well they do, and see what they're capable of and what their limits are," he said. "And then I could give them some advice and help them improve on whatever they're working on."

The project took several hours over two days to complete, with about 14 people working each day. The classroom came together just in time, and was ready for students by the first day of school. Aspuria says she plans to use Pembleton's creations for years to come. She says one of her favorite parts of the project is that it brought people together, after several months of being apart.

"This is a student that has a connection to this school, " she added. "This will always be his elementary school. He was able to leave a lasting impact here. And it's also great he was able to draw in other scouts who are currently students here. It really truly was a community event and will have a community impact."

Resources are not limited to victims. Those who have perpetrated acts of domestic violence can participate in the Anger & Domestic Abuse Prevention & Treatment (ADAPT) Program, which teaches "emotional regulation skills" to people who have abused partners, according to its website.

will open doors of opportunity for our candidates to be hired," she said.

Smith said that another big part of her role is educating businesses about misperceptions that might be had about hiring people with disabilities. She noted that she has seen improvements in those misperceptions in her time with DARS, but her work continues.

"Things are better than they were but there's still - getting our message out and being available to answer those questions and be available to educate and share information is what our staff endeavors to do. And it's just creating those partnerships and you know, supporting the business community and our and our workforce partners and creating a diverse and inclusive workforce," she said.

She first began her work with DARS 22 years ago, when she was staffed as a placement counselor in the Winchester office.

"Basically what I would do is work with the counselors and helping participants to find employment. And a large part of that was going to talk with businesses about our agency, our services and the goal of helping to open doors of opportunity for our candidates to be employed with those businesses,' Smith said.

Smith recognizes that anyone could be put in the position of having a disability - and that all it takes is one accident or event to happen. She also noted those involved with the businesses she has worked with often know someone with an intellectual disability.

"All it takes is one event for any of us to become a person with a disability, you know, that one car accident, that one falling down a flight of steps, that one being witness to a school shooting that, brings on, you know, post traumatic disorder or some other mental health, you know, challenge that one bout of depression or bipolar disorder, whatever it may be," she said.

Faith is something that Smith finds present in her work, saying, "Part of what I see as my Christian value is to give service." She finds it rewarding to help others become gainfully employed.

"Nothing makes me happier than when one of the candidates that our agency has worked with, you know gets that job, whatever that job may be ... it's exciting, it's thrilling. I mean, it's in many ways — it's life changing for a lot of people to be able to be self-sufficient ... And to know that our agency has played a part in helping to facilitate that, for that individual, it's very refreshing and inspiring for us," Smith explained.

Smith graduated from Shenandoah University and has done graduate work at James Madison University and George Washington University," according to her profile on the DARS website.

high school biology teacher Marcus-David Peters who was killed by Richmond police in 2018 when he was experiencing a mental health crisis, to implement crisis intervention around the Commonwealth with the goal that every locality will be served by a crisis intervention program by 2026. Fairfax's co-responder program, known as the "Memphis Model," will meet the new law's criteria.

So far, Diversion First has seen some success. According to the program's most recent annual report, the behavioral health population with misdemeanor charges in the county jail decreased by 28 percent between 2015 and 2020; the number of inmates referred to CSB jail-based services in that same period rose 21percent. Since 2016, annual cases at the Merrifield Crisis Response Center increased by 37 percent.

A recent report in FFXnow revealed that 46 percent of FCPD officers and 30 percent of sheriff's deputies have received Crisis Intervention Team training, which officers undergo to respond to mental health crises. As the story notes, state guidelines discourage 100 percent of officers from receiving CIT training, since it is considered a specialized role analogous to a Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) team, though differences in training can create inconsistent treatment in the field.

If an officer who does not have CIT training believes that an individual may be suffering from a mental health crisis, they are instructed to call for backup that does have that training if timing permits.

Sgt. Ian Yost of FCPD's Public Affairs Bureau wrote in an email that the department's goal is to train more than 40 percent of officers in CIT to achieve 24/7 coverage. Similarly, Ceisler wrote that the sheriff's office goal is to have 25 percent of deputies trained. Both noted that 100 percent of staff have received Mental Health First Aid training. FCPD officers who serve on the co-responder team must have CIT training. The Fairfax co-re-

sponder team currently operates Wednesday-Friday for an eight-hour shift between noon and 8 p.m. The county is exploring ways to expand the program to achieve 24/7 co-responder coverage, including a recent proposal that would use \$4 million in American Rescue Plan funds to hire more staff. Yost noted that "staffing shortages" of CSB clinicians and officers have resulted in the limited co-responder team and that the department "will expand the program as clinicians are hired and trained."

Lisa Flowers, director of communications for the Community Services Board, wrote in an email that "Efforts are underway to start a full program, providing 14-16 hours of coverage, seven days a week to start, with the longer-term goal of 24/7 coverage." She noted that the co-responder teams are new and require additional staff to expand. "Retention, recruitment, and hiring of staff are ongoing priorities for the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board and Fairfax County government," Flowers wrote.

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Costs of road construction continue to rise in Fairfax County and elsewhere

The costs are rising for transportation projects in the Fairfax County area and it's not just because of the Coronavirus pandemic.

A question came up during a meeting of the Fairfax County Legislative Committee regarding the rising costs of transportation projects in the local area which have been estimated to be nearly 40 percent which was confirmed by the Virginia Department of Transportation. The members of the committee pointed to contingencies in the plans of transportation projects as a major factor in those rising costs.

Essentially, contingencies are funds set aside to deal with unexpected costs or potential changes in cost due to changes in the scope of the project. These contingencies are set aside within the budget of the project itself and can be used to offset the potential increases of aspects of the project, for example, if the costs of construction material go up in that time, then the contingency funds will be used to cover that rise in costs.

These costs are nothing new, the rise in the costs of material has been happening for many years now and continue to do so. Some of the more noticeable rises come from the cost of steel and glass as well as the cost of transporting these materials to the construction sites.

According to a January 2020 article from the Financial Express, the rise in the price of steel comes primarily from the increased demand for steel especially in countries such as China. That increase in demand has forced steel-producing mills to have to purchase more material for products such as iron ore and coking coal which has caused production costs to rise.

Another reason for the rising costs of steel has also been the effect of tariffs on the transportation of material such as steel being imported from other countries. According to a May 2021 cost of importing steel rose when then-President Donald Trump imposed a 25 percent tariff on steel being imported from countries such as Canada, Mexico, and the European Union in 2018. This tariff caused a spike in increased costs of steel when compared to the rest of the world, as well as a reduction in steel being imported into the United States.

The tariffs along with other factors such as changing buyclosure of some U.S.-based steel mills, caused those prices to go

And that was before the impact made by the Coronavirus pandemic.

Once the pandemic hit worldwide the production and importation of steel were slowed down due to the imposition of protocols to deal with the virus such as social distancing. The demand for steel actually dropped as well since car production and many construction projects were halted. The prices of raw materials rose as well. According to a May 2020 article in Barron's the price of scrap steel went up because of less production.

So, what does this mean for current and future transportation projects in the Fairfax County area overall?


According to Robin Geiger, head of Communications for the Fairfax County Department of Transportation, the rising costs will continue to affect aspects of projects like contingencies as long as the associated prices such as material and transportation costs continue to rise.

So, then the question becomes, how can those costs be mitigated? What are some possibilities to reduce the costs of these transportation projects going forward?

"For many construction projects (especially large projects), during the design stage a process called "value engineering" is done where the project team attempts to find ways to reduce costs through methods such as making the design more efficient, eliminating superfluous design features, finding more concise ways to phase construction, or other measures. Value engineering is one of the best ways to help reduce construction costs for a project. It is also feasible to simply reduce the overall scope of the project itself to help

reduce costs," said Geiger. As a n example, Fredericksburg recently reopened the Chatham Bridge which is a major throughway from Business Route 3. The post from The Fabricator, the project was originally scheduled to run for 38 months and done piecemeal while allowing traffic to continue to flow. The schedule was reduced to 16 months due to the decision to close the bridge completely which allowed VDOT and the construction crew associated with the bridge's rehabilitation to come in on budget and reopen the bridge 45 days ahead of schedule.

"Today we are overjoyed that, after nearly two years of focused effort, we can stand with PAMCO Care in offering the opportunity of a group home run with excellence and connected to our Christ Church community," said Brooke Varma, director of Christ Church Inclusive Ministry. Varma has been a part of the disability community for decades as both a sibling and a parent. The home is a long-time dream of Pastor John Speight, lead pastor of Christ Church, according to Varma. She said the home was purchased by the foundation for the purpose of it being a group home.

PAMCO Care of Gainesville is a service provider in the developmental disabilities field. They offer services from community engagement to residential services. They partner to provide services to group

homes in Virginia and North Carolina. "The Branches group home is another example of the great work Christ Church does in our community. From their longstanding support of a school for more than 400 students in Kenya to their decades long ministry to engage and welcome those with disabilities, Christ Church practices what they preach," said Springfield District Supervisor Pat Herrity. "This new group home helps meet a critical need in Fairfax County and will allow residents with disabilities to live more productive and independent lives."

Tyler Stillman, a 32-year-old Fairfax Station resident is the first to move into the home. Stillman is a graduate of South County High School and Pulley Career Center. He's been living at home with his parents since April 2020 but had lived in a group home in Woodbridge prior to that, according to his father,

"He loves the church [Christ Church] and is looking forward to a sense of independence," said Pat. "He's excited for the prospect of living with his peers and being a neighbor of Christ Church." The family are members of the church and Tyler has been involved with the Inclusive Ministry for the last four

Tyler participates in, and his parents provide transportation to, the Community Visions Day Program in Woodbridge. Pat said he and his wife, Lori, have been devoted advocates for those with developmental disabilities (DD) for many years. "Lori was involved with DD issues on the state and local levels, serving on the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board for over 12 years," he said.

'Meaningful inclusion is central to, not only the individuals and families who experience disability, but to our community as a whole," said Varma. "This includes our faith communities engaging with the opportunity to support individuals with disabilities throughout the stages of their lives. From supporting children in our inclusive school, Greentree, to adults through supported employment, adapted sermons, or this group home, we want to meet the needs of the community and partner with others to provide meaningful inclusion.'

Four residents total will live in the home according to Varma. "Two will be moving in over the next week," she said. "We are in the process of working with families and support coordinators to fill the remaining openings. Funding for residents typically comes through a Community Living Waiver.

Tyler summed up his feelings about his new home by saying, "Branches ... a great home."

There are approximately 300 group homes in Fairfax County serving individuals with disabilities, according to Lisa Flowers, Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board spokeswoman. 



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The most damaging local issue you may know nothing about

public The sector bargaining collective ordinance expected to pass October 19th in Fairfax County is potentially the most damaging local issue of this term. It will divert millions of dollars to legal administration instead of toward competitive compensation for County employees, while raising your taxes, impacting the quality of public services, and reducing the transparency of your local government.

At the public hearing on October 5th, over 60 people testified, many were union members that are opposed to this ordinance because although they support collective bargaining, the proposed ordinance language provokes serious concerns. I fundamentally do not support collective bargaining, but if the ordinance is going to pass, we need to at least take the time to get it right and listen to our community.

Many County workers shared concern that the process for drafting the ordinance was rushed, non-transparent, and only included the feedback of more powerful (and coincidentally wellfunded) unions. Parameters in the proposed ordinance limit the voices of County employees at the bottom and set no limitations on union outreach to protect worker privacy. Former Supervisor John Cook testified that the ordinance as it stands is subject to legal challenge for breaching Virginia state law. The message was loud and clear at the public hearing; this ordinance will serve only certain unions, not most County employees, and there's still a lot to work out.

This ordinance will require the County to negotiate with public employee unions everything from pay and benefits to discipline and working conditions. While the Board's ordinance does not include teachers, it is likely the School Board will adopt a similar ordinance as it has already included positions for collective bargaining in its 2022 budget. Instead of your elected officials representing you, it will bind their hands for consolidated union interests to drive local policy.

private Unlike collective bargaining, these unions won't be asking for more from a multimillion-dollar company, they'll be asking for it out of your taxes. This could mean an increase of hundreds of dollars on the taxes of the average resident - not to mention increases from rising real estate tax assessments, a declining commercial tax base and the other multimillion-dollar projects the Board has made priorities over the interests of our employees and taxpayers.

To attract the best employees and provide residents the best services, we must offer competitive pay and benefits (we already have an above market pension plan) and we can accomplish that without collective bargaining. I have been advocating for years to raise teacher, not administrator, pay as well

as police pay. We have historically had issues in those pay areas and that translates into retention issues. If competitive pay was a priority for this Board, they would have done it already instead of prioritizing exorbitant new programs.

If this passes, the officials meant to represent you at the bargaining table have an inherent conflict of interest. The current Board (not counting the School Board) has received around half a million dollars in campaign donations from unions. Every Board member except me has received a donation from SEIU, a national union heavily influencing this ordinance.

Smaller unions have largely been ignored in the drafting process. You, the taxpayer, have been left out entirely until the public hearing. Roughly 80 percent of the County workforce is unaffiliated with a union and haven't indicated if this is even something they want. Which begs the question, why are we doing this?

Public collective bargaining is new to Virginia, only recently enabled by the General Assembly without guidance infrastructure or funding to set up the multimillion-dollar team of lawyers and administrators to make sure the process is "fair." But while Virginia is moving full throttle into what legal experts have called "the wild west" of setting up this process, other parts of the country are harrowing examples of how it can wreak havoc on a community.

Wisconsin got rid of public sector collective bargaining back in 2011, recovered from a \$3.6 billion budget deficit and saw a surplus without raising taxes. New York has the highest tax burden in the country - it also has one of the strongest unionized public worker bases and bargaining agreements. Look up the infamous "rubber rooms" they set up because they couldn't get rid of bad teachers. If you're still not convinced, check out

California, Washington, New Jersey, and Michigan to see if those are the kind of public services or taxes you want.

Public collective bargaining, especially as the ordinance stands now, will only serve big unions while you foot their bill and receive less effective government. Make no mistake, these national unions with local chapters are experts in this complex legislation, most locals are not. You can imagine who will get the better deal.

I fundamentally do not support public collective bargaining, but if the ordinance is going to pass, we need to at least take the time to get it right and listen to our employees and community. 

The acclaimed new musical was written by singer-songwriter Anaïs Mitchell and developed with innovative director Rachel Chavkin-both Tony winners for their parts.



Judy Collins has enjoyed quite a storied career over her 60 years in the music biz. She's won a Grammy, charted more than a dozen hit songs, written a novel, was a guest on The Muppet Show and made waves for her "naked" cover sleeve on the 1979 album, "Hard Times for Lovers."

Now 82, and looking as amazing as ever, Collins continues to create new music, perform, and even hosts her own podcast. Still, she considered herself a bit fortunate to have some time off during the past year and a half.

month in touring, includ-Norway, and it was exhausting," Collins said. "I'm very happy that I was able to get through the pandemic and I'm still wearing my mask and keeping a distance and staying safe."

There were a couple of times during her long career where she had long downtimes, including in 1977-78 when a health issue kept her from performing, but mostly she's been on stage for the better part of six decades.

"My work continues to be wonderfully interesting and wonderfully satisfying," Collins said.

Collins will appear at The Birchmere October 17, doing what she does best.

"It will be me singing ing a couple of weeks in a lot of my new songs, and of course there will be about half a dozen of the hits," she said. "I am putting out this new album in February. They are all brand new and were done primarily before and during the pandemic."

The new album is titled, "Girl From Colorado." One of the songs is about Thomas Murton, a penologist best known for his wardenship of the prison farms of Arkansas; another is called "Spellbound," which she wrote in Hawaii; and then there's one she wrote while in Arizona which recounts her life there in 1962.

"The songs are very much reflective of all the things I've been thinking have a bonus track on the album as well-a version of 'The Blizzard,' which I wrote in the late '80s."

Although Collins has always written songs and her 26 albums always have a new song or two, this marks the first time she has completed a full album of new material of her own.

"This is the first time in my career I have done all my own songs and on my own label," she said. "It's a new adventure for me."

Another new adventure for the legendary singer is a podcast that she started during the pandemic.

"It's called 'Since You've Asked,' and I started out with Julia Cameron, who wrote 'The Art-

about," Collins said. "I ist's Way,' and then Jeff Daniels and Ben Harper," Collins said. "Coming up are Clive Davis, Betty Buckley, and Christiane Amanpour. It's been a lot of fun."

Collins' career began when she used to sing on her father's radio show and she further got interested in music by singing in church choirs and performing opera at the local opera house.

"My father was a performer and I was taught at a very young age not to pay attention to the size of the venue or the size of the audience; it doesn't make a difference," she said. "You do the show you want to do and you'll stay in the public eye. That's what I have been doing my whole life."

Collins was an important interpretive singer to emerge from the folk revival of the late '50s and early '60s. By the time she was 22, she was already a force to be reckoned with in the music world, and over the decades she has achieved great success with songs such as "Send in the Clowns," "Both Sides Now," and "Amazing Grace."

Those are songs fans can expect to hear at her upcoming gig and she is so grateful to her audiences who are showing up to see her perform.

"They are going to hear a beautiful show and it's going to be wonderful," Collins said. "I am very much a brand-new girl every day."

on a hell-raising journey to

the underworld and back. "I was a big fan of the show before I was even in it, so when I learned they were launching a national tour back in 2019, I really wanted to be a part of it," Barasch said. "Orpheus is a role I wanted to play since I first saw it on Broadway."

The actor hounded his reps to get him an audition, and it happened in early 2020, right before the pandemic. So, even though he got the role and the show was supposed to launch in the fall of 2020, he's had to wait a year to play this dream part.

"It's been a longtime coming, but I'm really excited to finally be getting to play him," Barasch said. "Orpheus is a unique leading-man role, and I don't feel like a typical leading man anyway. I'm a redhead, more on the sensitive side, and I am not drawn towards the big vibrato. He also sings high in falsetto a lot, and in recent jobs, I've had to do that a lot, so it seemed perfect for me."

Of course, the actor was also drawn to the score and story, and feels audiences will be captivated by the production, just as they have been during the Broadway run.

The actor's other Broadway credits include "The Mystery of Edward Drood" and "She Loves Me," for which earned him a Drama Desk Award, but it was the 2009 revival of "West Side Story" where it all began.

"I was doing community theatre and it was really just a fun activity, and Broadway wasn't anything I ever thought about, I was a kid," Barasch said. "According to my mom, I was the one who pushed to get an agent because that sounded alluring to me. Eventually, I signed with a manager and went out on auditions in New York City, and I landed 'West Side Story,' which was pretty surreal."

He continued to work consistently on stage, with his last Broadway role being in "She Loves Me" as a senior in high school. "Hadestown" marks his first national tour.

The actor noted that while it's very similar to the Broadway production, there have been some changes made to the touring version.

"We have a new set, a new cast, and Rachel Chavkin, our director, is still coming up with new ideas to tell the story in this particular space," Barasch said. "The Kennedy Center is our official opening of the tour and everyone is so excited to get started."

The production also stars Morgan Siobhan Green as Eurydice, Tony Award winner Levi Kreis as Hermes, Kimberly Marable as Persephone, and Olivier Award nominee Kevyn Morrow as Hades.

"What makes the show so fresh and new is that it's basically a folk opera," Barasch said. "It's almost entirely sung through and you have the benefit of these sweeping, huge Broadway numbers, and you get all the wonder visually with the lights and smoke and sets, but you also get a gorgeous score, where at times you feel like you're in a living room somewhere listening to someone play a guitar. It's all encompassing and the story is a timeless love story."

"I'm excited to be opening for Garrison Keillor as I've done shows with him before with my sister," said the Falls Church-based singer. "I'll be doing a 30-minute set and I'll be playing songs from my new CD, which I did during the pandemic."

Smith found herself with some extra time at home, and needed to do something to save her sanity, and knew creating new music was just what she needed.

"I learned how to record on my computer and learned how to do my own instruments," Smith

Some of the people who she pays tribute to, Smith actually ended up performing with in her career, including Doc Watson and Tom Paxton.

"These are all traditional songs, some I learned in elementary school; for instance, one of the first things I started doing was singing patriotic songs, because that's what you did when you were in chorus back then, so I included 'America the Beautiful," Smith said.

Because Keillor's show is going to be about what it's like getting older, Smith felt this was a great compliment.

"This album fits perfectly, because I am looking back," she said.

Some of the songs she'll do are "Polly Von" from Peter, Paul and Mary; "Forever Young," by Bob Dylan "I Was Born in East Virginia," the popular hit by The Carter Family.

"They inspired me early in my career and I was thrilled to have the opportunity to sing with Janette Carter at The Carter Family Fold when I was starting out, and I have always enjoyed performing their legendary songs," Smith said.

Although she's played The Birchmere numerous times, and has been a seasoned performer for decades, Smith admitted she's a little nervous for the gig as it will be her first one back since the pandemic began.

"You can sing in your living room and that's great, but when you can get up and sing in front of people, I just love to sing and see people enjoying it, and sharing that moment together," Smith said. It's pawssible she became pregnant, maybe her humans abandoned her. Or, maybe her humans got too busy to keep her? Paws, or maybe her humans were expecting a new little mini-human and couldn't care for her too. Some humans just abandon their dogs. There are pawlenty of reasons why dogs become part of a pawnderful rescue like HART. Thankfully, mama was rescued by HART while she was pregnant and was allowed to have her puppies. That made her

happy. Mama wanted her babies to be born in a safe environment. Barks! HART took care of her needs, as well as her puppies, since humans who love animals donated financially to help with expenses.

Expenses? Do you wonder how dogs and cats are rescued and end up at pawsome rescues like HART? Paws, a long story short. The rescue is notified by various sources of pawsome dogs needing rescue. WOOFS! HART arranges transportation from their location to the rescue. Transportation costs include operating the vehicle used and the travel expenses of the handler.

Barks, another expense coming to mind is veterinary care. As with mama, if she needed help during the delivery of her babies, she would have been taken to a veterinarian. Paws, dogs and cats, are spayed or neutered, given an overall check-up and necessary preventatives and vaccinations. Special medical attention is provided too. Barks, though veterinarians reduce their fees for rescues, there are expenses that are covered through donations by humans who love animals.

Woofingly, once the dog or cat is ready to begin their journey to finding their "forever homes" they go to a foster home or a pawsome boarding pawlace where they learn to live with humans and await that pawsomely grand day. At the foster's home or the boarding pawlace, the expenses include food, treats, water, toys, leashes, collars, and pawssibly medications. In mama's case, she and her puppies went to a foster home where they were cared for until ready for adoption.




