

## Fairfax County votes to adopt FY2023 budget

arlier this week the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors voted 9-1 to adopt a \$4.8 billion FY2023 budget. Springfield District Supervisor Pat Herrity voted against

Although the board lowered the county's tax rate for homes from \$1.14 to \$1.11 per \$100 of assessed value, homeowners will end up paying an average of \$465 more per year. The budget includes \$10 million for more affordable housing and an additional \$6.1 million to increase pay for public safety workers. Additionally, to help soften the blow for county residents, personal property taxes on automobiles will be based on a reduced 85 percent of a vehicle's assessed value.

Other budget initiatives included Diversion First, opioid use prevention efforts, public safety staffing, and the new language access program.

Herrity said that he opposed the budget because it did not address the concerns of many taxpayers who testified during public hearings and budget town halls. He also asked the board to form a Citizen Task Force on Tax Revenue and Expenditures that would provide year-round input on the budget. Such a task force would be similar to citizen budget review boards established by past chairmen of both parties. The board did not raises. support the motion.



on average is a huge disappointment for our residents, particularly those on fixed incomes, as we are facing record inflation and record gas prices," said Herrity. "With over \$1 billion in federal stimulus and COVID funding between the County and schools, make no mistake, we had the flexibility to make this a true flat tax rate for our residents."

Fairfax County Taxpayers Alliance President Arthur Purves said that Chairman Jeff McKay misled county residents by saying that the real estate tax rate was reduced by 3 cents and that employees were given 4 percent

that would have prevented a tax hike not as high as they wanted. due to assessments," said Purves. "Also county and school employees are getting 6 percent raises, not 4 percent raises. Except for the police, the chairman provided no evidence of a retention and recruitment problem that necessitated 6 percent raises. A more likely reason is payback to unions, who were the top donors to Chairman tenant level and this was addressed McKay's election campaign and gave him more than \$100,000."

The McLean Citizens Association (MCA) had a mixed reaction to the final budget outcome. President Scott Spitzer said that while they were glad that the rate was lowered from \$1.14 to \$1.11, which they'd specifically

"We also advocated for including full funding of the Fairfax County Park Authority's Natural Resource Management request which was also included in the adopted budget," he said. "MCA had urged salary increases for recruitment and retention of our police officers up to the second lieuwith a more modest increase than we had hoped."

Braddock District Supervisor James Walkinshaw called the adopted budget balanced "both literally and figuratively," and said that with the passage of the budget "the long-overdue renovation of the Audrey Moore Rec Center will remain on schedule."

## Youngkin and Guidera meet with local Asian American leaders

fter Saigon fell to Communist forces in April 1975, Hung Cao's family fled to nearby Reston, to make a new home for themselves in a low-income apartment housing complex, Cao, then a toddler, later learned English by watching the "A-Team."

This week, Cao joined about 100 local Asian American business and education leaders who packed Cafe V, a local Korean coffee shop off Little River Turnpike, for a conversation with Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin and Education Secretary Aimee Guidera.

Cao, a retired Navy captain and graduate of the

first class of Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology, the Class of 1989, offered Youngkin solutions for building new vocational schools in the state and bringing back merit-based admissions to the school, where a new admissions policy was just deemed anti-Asian and discriminatory by federal Judge Claude Hilton.

"It was surreal," said Cao afterward, "offering solutions to the governor for a school system from which I benefited.'

In that room were not only immigrants with powerful stories of migration, leaving their families, home countries, and comfort zones to forge a

#### D.C. woman arrested for possessing stolen property

Fairfax County Police officers located a 1995 Nissan Altima in the 6100 block of Richmond Hwy. at 12:38 p.m. April 30. The vehicle had been reported stolen from a neighboring jurisdiction.

While investigating, Ranada Humble, 47, of Washington, D.C., returned to the vehicle. She was arrested and charged with possession of stolen property.

#### Jury convicts men for gang-related multistate drug trafficking rink and murder

A federal jury convicted four defendants on numerous charges relating to a murder, a violent gang enterprise, and a drug trafficking conspiracy operating in Virginia, California, and several other states.

According to court records and evidence presented at trial, Peter Le, 24, of Dunn Loring, Young Yoo, 26, of Centreville, Joseph Lamborn, 28, and Tony Le, 28, both of California, were members of a violent Northern Virginia Street gang called the Reccless Tigers, which was affiliated with a California gang called the West Side Asian Boyz. The gang, which originated in Centreville in 2011, distributed thousands of pounds of marijuana as well as other THC products, cocaine, ecstasy, and prescription drugs. Many of the gang's customers were middle and high school students in Northern Virginia and college students at a number of Virginia universities.

According to court records, victim Brandon White, owed Yoo approximately \$10,000 for marijuana he had obtained from Yoo. In August 2018, White was severely beaten by a Reccless Tigers gang member, David Nguyen, because of this debt. Nguyen was arrested by Fairfax County Police and charged with robbery and malicious wounding. The gang was aware that White had been subpoenaed to testify against Nguyen at a preliminary hearing and attempted to pay him if he would refuse to testify. White was threatened that he would be killed if he testified. White refused the to keep their currency when

against Nguyen on Nov. 19,

On Jan. 31, 2019, and continuing into the early morning hours of February 1, 2019, White was abducted at a shopping mall in Fairfax County and then killed two hours later in a wooded area of Richmond by Peter Le, Yoo, and Lamborn.

The evidence at trial indicated that the gang also engaged in persistent pattern of intimidation and retaliation against individuals who did not pay their drug debts and anyone who were believed to have cooperated with law enforcement. Homes in Fairfax, Stafford, and Prince William counties were attacked with Molotov cocktails and vandalized on numerous occasions, forcing homeowners in some instances to move.

Peter Le was convicted of conspiracy to engage in racketeering, narcotics trafficking and related narcotics offenses, kidnapping, murder, and money laundering. Lamborn was convicted of conspiracy to engage in racketeering, narcotics trafficking, kidnapping, and murder. Yoo was convicted of conspiracy to engage in racketeering, narcotics trafficking, kidnapping, and murder. Tony Le was convicted of conspiracy to engage in racketeering and narcotics trafficking.

Peter Le, Young Yoo, Joseph Lamborn face mandatory life sentences when sentenced on September 9. Tony Le faces a mandatory minimum sentence of 10 years in prison and a maximum sentence of life imprisonment when he is sentenced of September 9.

Twenty-four other persons have been charged in connection with the investigation of the Reccless Tigers. Sixteen defendants point enough, travelers can have pleaded guilty to federal charges and have been sentenced. Nine defendants, five who pleaded guilty earlier in addition to the four convicted today, are pending sentencing. Three defendants are fugitives.

**Dulles CBP officers** seize \$46K in unreported currency

The best way for travelers

all of it to a U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officer during inspection. CBP has repeated that advice for years, yet officers still encounter travelers at Washington Dulles International Airport who ignore that simple advice.

For example, CBP officers at Dulles airport recently seized more than \$46,000 combined during two separate currency seizures from travelers departing the United States.

U.S. Customs Border Protection officers at Washington Dulles International Airport seized \$46,447 in unreported currency from Ghana-bound and Egyptbound travelers recently. CBP urges travelers to truthfully comply with U.S. currency reporting laws or they may face severe consequences including criminal prosecution.

In the most recent case on May 1, CBP officers inspected a U.S. citizen destined to Ghana. The man initially reported, both verbally and in writing, that he possessed \$14,000. However, officers discovered a total of \$19,904 in his carry-on bag, and an additional \$500 in his backpack for a total of \$20,404. Officers seized the currency, returned \$404 to the man as humanitarian relief, and released him to continue his travel.

Earlier, on April 26, a CBP currency detector dog alerted to a couple's carry-on bags and the couple, who were destined to Egypt, reported that they possessed \$15,000. During an examination, CBP officers discovered additional currency in the woman's purse and even more concealed inside a suitcase liner for a total of \$26,043. CBP officers seized the currency, then returned \$1,043 as a humanitarian relief and released the couple to continue their travel.

"We cannot make this carry all the currency they want to and from the United States, but U.S. federal law requires them to make a formal report on amounts of \$10,000 or greater. It's that simple," said Daniel Escobedo, CBP's Area Port Director for the Area Port of Washington, D.C. "The consequences for violating US currency reporting laws are severe - from missing a flight and interrupting vacation plans, to seeing all their currency seized by a Customs and Border Protection officer, and to even facing criminal prosecution for bulk currency smuggling. It's too easy to just be truthful.'

CBP is not releasing any of the travelers' names because none were criminally charged.

There is no limit to how much currency or other monetary instruments that travelers may bring to or take out of the United States. However, federal law [31 USC 5316] requires travelers to report all currency of \$10,000 or greater to a CBP officer and travelers will need to complete U.S.

> CBP seized about \$342,000 in unreported or illicit currency every day along our nation's borders last year.

CBP officers have observed that smuggled bulk currency is generally the proceeds of illicit activity, such as from the sales of dangerous drugs or revenue from financial crimes. CBP officers work hard to hit back at those transnational criminal organizations by seizing their smuggled currency.

#### **FCPD** seeks assistance identifying thieves in smash-and-grab

Fairfax County Police detectives are investigating a smashand-grab larceny that occurred at My Eye Dr, 6307 Richmond Highway in Alexandria.

Officers responded at 6:22 p.m. on April 19 four males entered the business: damaged the glass display cases; and stole more than \$20,000 worth of eyeglass frames. Surveillance video captured the suspects, described as four black males, 17 to 23 years old, wearing gloves, masks, and hoods or hats to cover their hair. A fifth male was waiting in an older-model black Toyota Camry with tinted windows and black hubcaps.

"Detectives are following up on leads and are aware of similar incidents throughout the National Capital Region," said Capt, Frederick Chambers. commander of the Criminal Investigations Division. "Detectives continue to work with our law enforcement partners in the region to identify the suspects involved in this incident and are closely examining others that fit this same troubling pattern. We are asking for information from our community and reminding them they can remain anonymous through our Crime Solvers tip line."

#### Undercover operation nabs two armed robbers

Detectives from the Fairfax County Police Department Major Crimes Bureau began investigating a robbery that occurred prior to noon on May 7 in the parking lot of 6600 Springfield Mall. The victim arranged to meet the suspect through an online marketplace to purchase a tablet computer. When the victim arrived, the suspect entered the victim's vehicle, displayed a firearm, and took cash.

A second robbery occurred on May 9 in the 7500

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block of Poinsettia Drive in the Alexandria section of Fairfax County. The victim arranged to purchase a cell phone through the same online marketplace. The victim met the man at 3:45 p.m. in a parking lot. The suspect attempted to enter the victim's vehicle, but he was denied access. The victim got out of his car to conduct the sale. The suspect then displayed a firearm and took cash. He tried to steal the victim's car by entering the running vehicle. For unknown reasons, the suspect left the victim's car, got into an awaiting Toyota Prius, and left the area with a driver.

Detectives from the Major Crimes Bureau and Organized Crime and Intelligence Bureau (OCIB) established a coordinated response and were able to link the two social media accounts utilized in both robberies. Through those accounts, they were able to contact the offender and arrange an undercover purchase.

Yesterday, when the two suspects arrived at the predetermined location, OCIB detectives took Donavan Rice 29 of Washington, D.C., and Ronnell Delonte Garris, 28, of Maryland into custody. Rice was found in possession of a stolen firearm. Preliminarily, detectives believe Garris drove Rice to both robberies.

Rice was charged with two counts of robbery with a firearm, two counts of use of a firearm in the commission of a felony, carjacking, and felon in possession of a firearm. Garris was charged with two counts of robbery with a firearm. The men were taken to the Adult Detention Center and held without bond.

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

## Jim Myles will face **Gerry Connolly for** 11th District seat

R epublican Jim Myles was nominated by voters in the 11th District to face Congressman Gerry Connolly in the general election in November.

The former Air Force pilot and retired federal judge defeated four other candidates for Congress in the Republican Party's firehouse primary using the ranked choice voting system. He won on the fourth ballot with 59.20 percent of the vote.

"Jim Myles has spent his entire life in public service, from defending the nation in the Air Force to adjudicating cases as an administrative law judge," said Mike Ginsberg, 11th District Committee chairman. "Now he is stepping up to serve again at a critical time in our nation's and district's history. Many 11th District residents are veterans or federal employees, and Jim is uniquely positioned to speak to the issues facing them at a time of rising inflation and economic insecurity. And as a parent of a Fairfax County Public School student, he understands the need for quality schools focusing on education, not ideological indoctrination."

Myles said he believes some of the most important issues in the district are inflation and the threat to economic security, physical safety in the community and the protection of children from political indoctrination and sexualization at school.

"Parents have a fundamental right to have oversight of their children's education, and the school board and administrators answer to parents," he said. "People of all political persuasions can see the dangerous direction the far left is taking the Democrats as a pilot in the Air Force before entering and how harmful those policies are to all Americans.

Myles said he frequently attends school board meetings and that he looks forward to hearing from parents in the district. "I will be your strong ally and reliable advocate to ensure parent's fundamental right to have a say in their children's education is respect-




Kristin remembers their meeting fondly.

"Our mentoring programs are important to try to get underserved kids in better situations [and] teach them," Williams said.

Chapter Reporter James Cherry is chair of the Youth Mentoring Program they sponsor at John Lewis and Mount Vernon high schools. They hope to expand to West Potomac High School this fall. They've worked with hundreds of kids across the vears through the program.

The chapter educates kids on STEM, trade work, and the military-opening students' eyes to areas of work where they can support themselves once they graduate. "We were able to sponsor kids [for] their flying hours to be pilots coming out of high school," Williams added.

At a given moment they will donate books to elementary schools, hold golf tournaments, honor community partners, host Thanksgiving dinners, and help fight hypothermia for people experiencing

Psi Alpha Alpha has plenty of affiliate organizations in the area that they partner with to supply manpower or funds. "A lot of these things brothers joined themselves and brought the chapter along with them. We've been longtime volunteers at a lot of our affiliate organizations based on those relationships that were built by members," said Cherry.

Engagement outreach often involves members going out into the neighborhoods and simply talking to people. "Wherever we can help, we're trying to be there," Williams said.

## Amazon commits \$55 million to create pathway for more affordable housing in Tysons

he Fairfax County ■ Board of Supervisors, the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority (FCRHA), Amazon, APAH and Virginia Housing joined May 3 to announce the commitment of \$55 million from the Amazon Housing Equity Fund to support the Dominion Square apartment community slated for development in Tysons.

The Amazon funding paves the way for the simultaneous construction of two buildings on the site, boosting the number of units delivered from 175 to more than 500 with the addition of a community center co-located on the site. These additional units will make Dominion Square the largest fully committed affordable housing development in Tysons.

Fairfax County's affordable housing goal targets the delivery of homes affordable to households with incomes at 60 percent of Area Median Income (AMI) - approximately \$85,000 a year for a family of four - and below. The development of public-private partnerships, such as those with APAH and Amazon, have been instrumental in the county's

recent success in growing the affordable housing development.

"The creation of affordable housing is a communitywide affair, and a critical component to our success has been the development of strong relationships with partners who share our vision to create opportunities for affordable housing in communities across the county," said Melissa McKenna, chairman of the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority. "We are proud and grateful to receive Amazon's commitment to the Dominion Square development. It is another example of how collaborative partnerships can deliver high-quality, well-connected, long-term affordable housing opportu-

The North and South buildings of the Dominion Square development will reside just a few blocks away from the Spring Hill Metro station which offers a range of connectivity to opportunities and experiences throughout the Washington Metropolitan area. The 2-acre parcel where the development will be constructed will be purchased by the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority (FCRHA) which will lease the property to APAH for the development, construction, ownership, and



housing community.

The two buildings will contain more than 500 units of affordable housing with a mix of one-, two- and three-bedroom apartments. The development will feature common areas and resident amenities including community rooms, leasing and resident services offices, outdoor landscaped areas, and a central courtyard.

new life in America, but also immigrants who have embarked on unexpected political journeys as largely Dem-

ocratic voters who have found resonance with the Youn-

gkin administration. Local businessman Himanshu Verma, an immigrant from India, asked Youngkin about his plans for investing in innovation by state businesses. "Innovation is the key to growth," Youngkin responded. Local mother Ying Julia McCaskill, an immigrant from China, expressed support for the governor's first executive order, barring "divisive" ideas born out of the controversial ideology of "critical race theory," which demands that societal issues - and people - be examined through the lens of race.

"I oppose CRT," McCaskill said, asking how Guidera would be educating parents to recognize "CRT in disguise."

Guidera responded that the Virginia Department of Education is looking at issues of diversity through the lens of "opportunity," "excellence" and "achievement." "We are going to see people as people," Guidera

said. Attendees nodded their heads in agreement.

This political shift is a fascinating phenomenon that the national media is reluctantly acknowledging, as about seven of 10 voters in mostly liberal San Francisco recalled three Democratic school board members whom the Asian Americans cast as so far "hard-left" they had lost their trust.

As Youngkin greeted the crowd, they gave him a standing ovation, many of them beaming with wide

"Our job is to listen to you," said Youngkin. "Virginia brings together cultures and people from all over the world, and it makes us better. It makes our community richer, and we have to celebrate that."

On their policy changes in education, from returning advanced math programs to the administration's curriculum plans for K-12 education and replacing the concept of "equity" with a mission to creating "opportunity," Youngkin said, "The cornerstone of this is recognizing the absolute rights of parents to make decisions in their children's education, and we will never deviate from that commitment."

"We're working to raise expectations and standards in schools. We should be a commonwealth of excellence and recognizing that we need to raise both the floor and the ceiling, not lower the ceiling," Youngkin said. He noted that Guidera's Department of Education identified that 42 percent of second graders in Virginia - or almost one of two second graders - do not read at grade level, and thus Youngkin just signed a literacy bill into law, allocating resources for new reading programs.

Guidera added, "We need to start thinking differently about how we approach education and training. This is a lifelong piece that we're all going to have to get upscaling

at points." For many in the audience, this was a rare opportunity to present their issues directly to Youngkin and Guidera. A local mother informed Youngkin and Guidera that the Fairfax County School Board had shirked its responsibility to create a Regional Governing Board to oversee Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology as a Governor's School, after voting to do so in late 2020. State regulations state that Governor's Schools should be overseen by Regional Governing Boards, not local school boards.



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## Extend the Child Tax Credit now

Dear Editor,

Many Virginia families are faced with the fact that life is getting harder to afford without the expanded Child Tax Credit (CTC).

Through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, Congress broadened the CTC to include all families with low incomes and allowed the credit to be received through monthly, fully refundable payments. In Virginia, with a total of \$388.1 million going to families every month, the payments reached 1.56 million children. Most of these families spent the CTC on food, rent, and clothing.

But these payments no longer exist. Some lawmakers stopped an extension of the CTC payments at the end of last year. Thousands of Virginia families immediately lost income while inflation increased. This loss of payments means an increase in poverty levels back to the rates seen prior to the CTC expansion. In the 8th, 10th, and 11th Districts of Fairfax County, 11.4%, 4.6%, and 7.8%, respectively, of children were already living under the poverty level according to the 2020 census figures.

To offset the impact of rising inflation, the

CTC should be extended by Congress with full refundability and monthly payments. In Virginia, the \$388.1 million that families received was estimated to generate \$485.1 million in spending in local economies monthly. Not extending the CTC is not only a reflection of our nation's morals but a decision that withholds billions of crucial dollars from our economy. I call on our members of Congress to extend the CTC with permanent full refundability and resume the monthly

payments now.



W ith 16 Grammy Award wins to his name, it's safe to say that David Foster is one of the most prolific songwriters in history, and the legendary writer has been responsible for some of the most familiar and beloved songs over the last 50 years.

Foster has penned nearly 100 hit singles and dozens of film scores, receiving three Academy Award nominations for Best Original Song over his career. His songs have been turned into hits by a who's who of singers, including Madonna, Whitney Houston, Céline Dion, Barbra Streisand, Kenny Rogers, Josh Groban, and many more.

Foster will be appearing on May 17 at The Birchmere as part of the Hitman Tour, with some great singers by his side, singing the songs that made him famous. Songs like "Man in Motion" from "St. Elmo's Fire"; "Wildflower" by Skylark; "After the Love is Gone," by Earth, Wind and Fire.

"We always try to do something different," Foster said. "One of the great things we do is I love to go out to the audience and get people to sing. Word has kind of gotten out that I do that, and every once in a while we get this great singer hoping he or she will be picked, and that's always a fun moment."

Of course, if the singer isn't that good, Foster laughs that that's always a fun moment as well.

"I usually go for the person who sings the loudest," Foster

Throughout the evening, Foster will also provide stories from his multi-decade career, and he might even phone in a special guest to take part. For instance, at a recent concert, he Facetimed Michael Bublé to sing a song.

Making the night even more special is Foster will be joined on stage by his wife, former "American Idol" standout and star of TV's "Smash," Katharine McPhee.

"People really go crazy when she walks on out," Foster said. "She's a triple threat and has it all. She's a superstar."

During the pandemic, Foster and McPhee stayed connected with fans online doing what they termed, "The Kat and Dave Show," which USA Today ranked at the No. 1 streaming show of the

"It was fun, but it was hard work," Foster said. "We were doing everything ourselves and had crazy costumers, and both our phones capturing everything. Now, starting in November, Kat and I will take a version of that show on the road."

There's even hope that the show will get a residency in Las Vegas or maybe even a home in New York. The couple is already playing the legendary Carlyle later this summer.

At the Birchmere concert, McPhee will sing some of Foster's classic songs, but also might surprise with songs she is known for-whether from "Smash" or her run in Broadway's "Waitress."

"We have some great singers on stage with us, but depending on who is there, sometimes I may need to leave out certain songs, and other nights, different songs,"

Foster said. "We have Pia Toscano with us, she's an 'American Idol' alum, and is just amazing. Then there's Fernando Varela, who is from Puerto Rico, and covers a lot of ground vocally. Between them and Kat, we're covered."

Foster also sings a bit himself, as anyone who watched "The Masked Singer" last season knows, but he knows that people aren't usually coming to the shows to hear him sing, and he's fine with that.

He knew early on that songwriting was something he was good at and his parents encouraged him to play piano and follow his dream.

"Although we didn't have any money, they found the resources to get me piano lessons, and I just knew I wanted to be a writer at age 10," Foster said. "It has led me to some incredible places now."

And after spending decades in the studio making music for other people, Foster finally is touring himself, and loves seeing the audience and hearing their feedback, and looks forward to playing in front of the Birchmere crowd again.

T nto the Woods", written in 1986 by the legendary playwright Stephen Sondheim, reintroduces the viewer to iconic fairy tale stories with a shifted characterization to match a darker -- more foreboding -- tone. The story follows The Baker and his wife as they venture into the woods to locate "a cow as white as milk, a cloak as red as blood, the hair as yellow as corn, and a slipper as pure as gold," at the request of a witch, to lift their curse. ## Expert tips for welcoming a kitten

Fostering kittens and cats has risen in popularity during these unprecedented times, and many pet lovers are becoming fosters to help overcrowded animal shelters. Fostering a kitten can be a fun and exciting time, but it may also come with a learning curve.

Whether you're fostering or adopting a kitten, learn how to give your kitten proper care during her first weeks and months with you with this advice from the experts at Royal

#### **Arriving home**

The new sights, sounds and smells in your home, and the separation from her mother, may make your kitten feel stressed. Keeping the environment calm and quiet can ease the transition.

As your kitten gains confidence in its new surroundings, she will want to explore more. Make sure the environment is prepared with electrical wires and outlets covered; windows, balconies and stairs secured; and small or sharp objects put away so she can safely explore with your supervision. If there are possible hazards, a designated room with windows and plenty of social contact for the first few weeks may be better.

#### Creating a safe place

Kittens can tire easily. After a little exploration time, give your kitten access to a bed in a cozy, quiet place with access to water, food and a litter box. Turning out the light helps establish sleep patterns, but on the first night you might want to leave a night light on to help with the adjustment.

Provide somewhere quiet to eat. This should be somewhere your kitten feels secure, away from where you and any other pets eat. Cats don't like to eat too near their litter boxes and should always have fresh water available.

As kittens grow rapidly, their digestive and immune systems develop slowly and they have specific nutritional needs that are different from adult cats. Any sudden changes in your kitten's diet can cause digestive trouble, so for the first few days, keep the same feeding routine as the previous caretaker. You can slowly switch to a different routine, if you choose, and transition to kitten food suitable for the appropriate growth stage.

#### Ongoing care

Your kitten should see a veterinarian as soon as possible. In addition to a general health check, your vet can help you create a vaccination schedule and give advice on deworming, nutrition and more. Always use a carrier to transport your kitten safely while in the car and into the vet's office.

Gradually introducing your kitten to new experiences can help with socialization. New sounds can startle a kitten, so be ready to offer plenty of reassurance. You may also need to introduce new terrain like stairs or unfamiliar surfaces. Gentle play and careful handling can help your kitten become more comfortable with being touched.

## Fairfax County Health among recipients of **NACCHO** funding

he Fairfax County Health Department is one of the recipients across the nation receiving funding from the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO). NA-CCHO is the voice of the country's nearly 3,000 local health departments, and with support from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Division of Healthcare Quality and Promotion, has awarded a total of more than \$2 million to 24 local health departments through the Building Local Operational Capacity for COVID-19, Healthcare-Associated Infections, and Antimicrobial Resistance (BLOC COVID-19 +) project.

The project continues and expands upon the first year of the BLOC COVID-19 Demonstration Site project by allowing local health departments to go beyond COVID-19 response and address other healthcare-associated infections and antimicrobial resistant pathogens. Healthcare-associated infections are among the leading causes of preventable deaths in the United States and the pandemic heightened public awareness of the importance of infectious disease prevention and control in healthcare settings. The CDC estimates that one in 31 hospital patients are infected with at least one healthcare-associated infection, which to HAIs in 2015.

#### The goals of the project are to:

a. Strengthen relationships between local health departments and July 2023.


b. Enhance local health department capacity and confidence in assessing and supporting infection prevention and control practices in high-risk facilities; and

c. Improve implementation of infection prevention and control in high-risk facilities; and decrease rates of and negative outcomes associated with COVID-19, healthcare-associated infections, and antimicrobial resistant pathogens in those settings.

m or\,}$  several weeks, cases and outbreaks of COVID-19 have continued to increase in Fairfax County and across Northern Virginia. Several jurisdictions in the region have transitioned from low to medium COVID-19 Community Level, as defined by CDC, including Fairfax County.

Staying up to date with vaccination, and continuing to practice layered prevention strategies remain critical to stem the spread of COVID-19 illness in our communities. Vaccination not only prevents COVID-19 but also makes illness less severe if you do become infected.

But what if you have chosen not to get vaccinated or still get sick even after receiving vaccine, and are at increased risk because you are older or have a chronic medical condition? This is where treatment can be important.

#### Effective treatment is available

very sick from COVID-19, effective treatment is now available that can prevent illness from becoming worse leading to hoswho are more likely to get very sick include older adults, people with chronic medical conditions or a weakened immune system, those who are overweight, and women who are pregnant.


