

Make your holiday shopping count

Shop small, independent businesses in Frederick this holiday season

As the holiday season approaches, consider giftting something unique, meaningful and local. We've curated a list of offthe-beaten-path shops for the curious gift-giver to explore.

Whether you choose an item, an experience, or a gift card, your purchase helps support a small business owner in the Frederick area.

"Every purchase from a small business like ours supports a dream, a family and our local community," said Allie Young, coowner of LiveYoung Candle Co. "When

Young's mother, Tawny Young — half of the powerhouse mother-daughter team that started the business in the basement of

their home — said they opened their shop in Frederick because of its small-town feel and strong sense of community.

Marien Hornyak of The Kitchen-

ette in Frederick

does her own holiday shopping downtown because of the availability of high-quality, one-of-a-kind items.

Nearby towns also offer charming, independent shops worth exploring. In Thurmont, for example, East Main Trains, run by John Hamilton and Jeff Crum, opened just before the 2024 Catoctin Colorfest. The hobby store sells electric model trains,

parts and accessories, and both owners lifelong enthusiasts.

"Most people remember growing up with an electric Lionel model train

set put up at the base of the family Christmas tree, with fond memories

including the familiar sounds and smells of the trains as they ran in circles around the tree," Hamilton said.

BreAnn Fields, owner of **The Turquoise Trailer Boutique** in Middletown, said shopping local is important because "we're the backbone of the community. Each item in our store is handpicked and unique in its own way. Anytime you shop with us, we appreciate it more than you know. Christmas gifts are meant to be unique, thoughtful and sometimes even handmade — it makes it just that much more thoughtful. You'll get just that when you shop small and local."

One perk of shopping in downtown Frederick is the Downtown Frederick Gift Card, which can be purchased at the Frederick Visitor Center seven days a week. The card can be used at several stores and serves as a great alternative to a traditional gift card for one location only. The Downtown Frederick Gift Card is ideal if you're planning on making several stops in town, or it can serve as a gift to a loved one who might want to shop in downtown Frederick and have multiple shops to choose from.

From gift baskets and candles to retro kitchenware and handmade pottery, Frederick offers treasures for every kind of recipient. Plant lovers, rock collectors, art enthusiasts, outdoor adventurers and even stressed-out mystics can all find something special.

Frederick itself looks like a picture-perfect holiday town straight out of a movie, making holiday shopping all the more festive.

"The decorations are great — maybe even a little over the top — but it's all done in a way that feels very Frederick," said Michael Simone, who has lived in Frederick for five years. "The whole town gets into it, and it makes everything feel special. [Shopping] feels really homey and personal."

Resident Lauren Foust loves how Market Street looks during the holidays, with trees lit up and store windows decorated.

"Shoppers can hear local musicians playing Christmas music up and down the street," she said. "It's festive. Frederick at

the holidays is a great atmosphere to experience."

Unlike towns filled with big-box stores and mass-produced products, Frederick is lined with small, independent shops selling handmade, local goods to be treasured.

At **Frederick Made**, owner Miranda Mossburg and her team make around 70% of the store's products.

"Essentially, if it's something we have learned or can learn to make ourselves, we will. We pride ourselves on making quality items and are very proud to have an almost entirely handmade gift shop that is well curated," Mossburg said.

She specializes in handmade jewelry, while team members create art prints, candles, apparel, accessories, keychains, stickers, bookmarks and popular craft kits.

"The shops on Market Street offer more timeless things that you can't find easily elsewhere. I like picking up items that feel one-of-a-kind, not something everyone else will have," said Foust, who also buys her family's Christmas tree from a local farm each year to support small businesses.

Natalia Woods, who recently made Frederick her permanent home, began her holiday shopping downtown last year.

"One place we plan to go back to is the **Shab Row Tea Emporium**," she said. "My mother-in-law loves collecting different teas and teapots, and they have a lot of nice seasonal flavors."

Another consideration is purchasing a gift card from **The Altar Space**, which offers intuitive massage, reiki and other services provided by Jennifer Gamertsfelder.

"When you support a small, womanwowned business like The Altar Space, the value of your gift-giving stays within the community," Gamertsfelder said.

"Your gift goes straight from my hands to your loved one, and it's truly my honor to dedicate a restorative hour or two to their well-being."




