Player of the Year LUKE PRYOR

MIDDLETOWN Senior Pitcher-Infielder
■ Two years after helping Middletown win a state title, Pryor served as a dominant ace on a strong pitching staff that helped lead the Knights to a Class 2A state runner-up finish. Armed with a fastball that sits comfortably in the high 80s along with a curveball and a change-up, Pryor usually had his way with opposing hitters.
■ On the mound, went 9-2 with a 1.17 ERA, striking out 74 batters over a county-best 53 2-3 innings.
■ At the plate, hit for both power and average as Middletown's No. 3 hitter, batting .395 with seven doubles, a home run and 16 RBIs.
■ Will play college baseball at Mount St. Mary's.



JUSTIN ACAL SENIOR INFIELDER TUSCARORA

■ Strong defense at shortstop and consistency at the plate earned Acal a trip to the MSABC Brooks Robinson All-Star game. He led the Titans in batting average (.448), doubles (nine) and runs scored (17) in addition to collecting two triples and driving in 11 runs.



BRETT AHALT JUNIOR INFIELDER WALKERSVILLE

■ Contributed much-needed consistency on a young Walkersville team that suffered heavy losses to graduation. Hit a team-high .386 with a double, a triple, 14 RBIs and 12 stolen bases while playing well defensively at second base.



MASON ALBRIGHT SOPHOMORE PITCHER/INFIELDER CATOCTIN

■ A deep arsenal of pitches with movement and the ability to change speeds made Albright hard to hit last spring. The Virginia Tech commit posted a 0.32 ERA, striking out 41 over 23 innings. At the plate, he hit three home runs.



REECE ANTOGNONI SENIOR INFIELDER OAKDALE

■ Consistently delivering timely hitting as the Bears' No. 3 hitter, Antognoni hit .500 with runners in scoring position for an Oakdale team that advanced to the Class 2A West region final. Batted .434 with six doubles, two home runs, 18 RBIs and 18 runs scored.



SHANE BOWIE JUNIOR PITCHER/OUTFIELDER THOMAS JOHNSON

■ A relief pitcher last season, Bowie suddenly became a workhorse pitcher for a solid pitching staff that carried the Patriots to their second straight Class 3A West region title. Pitched a team-high 46 2-3 innings, going 5-4.



GRAHAM BROWN SENIOR PITCHER/INFIELDER MIDDLETOWN

■ Stellar defense at shortstop along with Brown's ability to excel on the mound as either a starting pitcher or a closer proved invaluable. He led Middletown in doubles (10), home runs (two), RBIs (20) and runs (26). On the mound, went 3-3 with a 2.01 ERA.



MATT CUNNINGHAM SOPHOMORE PITCHER LINGANORE

■ Regularly pitching deep into games, Cunningham played a big role in Linganore surging to a CMC Spires Division title by taking on the role of staff ace. Went 3-2 with a 1.00 ERA, striking out 28 in 40 1-3 innings.



LOGAN DEBORD JUNIOR OUTFIELDER OAKDALE

■ One of the area's best center fielders, DeBord ignited a powerful Oakdale offense by getting on base with regularity at the top of the Bears' lineup. Scored a team-high 24 runs in addition to hitting .392 with three doubles, three triples, 11 RBIs and 11 stolen bases.



JACOB FERENCE SENIOR CATCHER LINGANORE

■ Fiery leader who gave the Lancers an imposing presence in the middle of the lineup, Ference provided power and clutch hitting throughout the season. Led Linganore in batting average (.431) and RBIs (14).



ERIC LONG SENIOR SHORTSTOP MARYLAND SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

■ The National Deaf Interscholastic Athletic Association Player of the Year and a Mid-Atlantic All-Star Game selection, Long made an impact in all areas of the game. He hit .463 with seven doubles, two triples, 18 RBIs and 20 stolen bases. Also went 3-0 on the mound.



JACOB ORR SOPHOMORE INFIELDER THOMAS JOHNSON

■ After helping lead the Patriots to a state title as a freshman, Orr maintained his high level of play as TJ's leadoff man. Maryland commit led his team in batting average (.403), runs (20), hits (29), triples (two) and RBIs (20).



TYLER POLESKY SENIOR PITCHER BRUNSWICK

■ Polesky had a knack for pitching well in big games, throwing a two-hit shutout against Smithsburg while throwing 61-3 shutout innings against Catoctin. Finished 5-2 with a 1.45 ERA, striking out 62 batters over 47 2-3 innings.



MARK ROGERS SENIOR PITCHER/OUTFIELDER CATOCTIN

■ Against the best competition, Rogers was on top of his game as he pitched the Cougars to wins over perennial powers Boonsboro, Middletown and Brunswick. He posted a 7-1 record with a 2.21 ERA, and at the plate, he hit .473 with 19 RBIs.



ROB WACHTER SENIOR CATCHER OAKDALE

■ Wachter dramatically improved from one season to the next, raising his batting by almost 200 points in addition to providing stout defense behind the plate. Hit a team-high .435 with five doubles, two home runs and 15 RBIs. Committed just one error.



JAKE SANTIS SENIOR OUTFIELDER LINGANORE

■ Possessing excellent range in center field and consistency at the plate, Santis sparked the Lancers at the top of the batting order. He hit a team-high .426 for a Linganore team that won a CMC Spires Division championship.



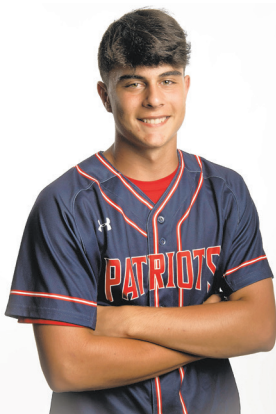
KAMERON WALTERS JUNIOR PITCHER/INFIELDER URBANA

■ In addition to being Urbana's staff ace, Walters displayed valuable versatility, playing three other positions throughout the season. Went 4-3 with a 2.66 ERA, striking out 39 batters over 39 1-3 innings. Also hit .356 with 11 RBIs.



TREVOR YUSKO SOPHOMORE PITCHER/INFIELDER THOMAS JOHNSON

■ Concluding a great season on the mound by throwing a one-hit shutout in the Class 3A West region final, Yusko went 5-0 with a 0.40 ERA, striking out 31 over 35 innings. Also emerged as a power hitter, collecting eight doubles, three home runs and 16 RBIs.

UConn hoops gets probation for NCAA violations under Ollie

HARTFORD, Conn. — UConn's men's basketball program has been placed on probation for two years and former coach Kevin Ollie has been sanctioned individually for violations of NCAA rules during his tenure.

The NCAA Committee on Infractions on Tuesday outlined numerous violations, most occurring between 2013 and 2018, and cited Ollie

for failing to promote an atmosphere of compliance.

The NCAA agreed with penalties UConn self-imposed in January, including the loss of one scholarship for the 2019-20 season, and did not impose any postseason ban.

"As we anticipated, this validates UConn's actions and decision-making in this case from the outset in early 2018 based on our knowledge of NCAA rules and matters of compliance," UConn President

Susan Herbst said. "However, this is a serious matter and nothing about it merits celebration. This is an unfortunate chapter in the history of UConn men's basketball, but it is time to move on. We look forward to the bright future of this program with excitement and optimism."

UConn fired Ollie in March 2018. The school and Ollie are in arbitration regarding more than \$10 million, which the coach says he is owed but the school

says he is not entitled to because the violations occurred under his watch.

In addition to probation, the NCAA issued a three-year show-cause order for the former head coach. That means that any NCAA member school that might hire him must restrict him from any athletically related duties unless it shows why those restrictions should not apply.

Ollie's attorney, Jacques Parenteau said the investigators unfairly sided with

the university's version of events over Ollie's and that he would appeal the sanctions.

"In the final analysis, the NCAA process does not constitute due process," he said. "Coach Ollie remains confident that when the witnesses against him are cross-examined in the arbitration process, the truth will come out."

The Committee on Infractions said the violations mainly stemmed from improper pickup games at

which student managers kept statistics for coaches, the use of a video coordinator as a coach, which resulted in more than the allowable number of coaches, and free training sessions provided to three players by a trainer who was friends with Ollie.

The NCAA says UConn has 45 days to provide an account of all games in which ineligible athletes participated and any wins during that time would be vacated.
