JJ ADDISON

FREDERICK JUNIOR GUARD/FORWARD

■ Frederick County's most electrifying player lived up to the hype and heightened expectations in his second season with the Cadets. Addison led the region in scoring (24 points per game) and put up jaw-dropping stat lines night after night. He also averaged 7.3 rebounds per game playing as a

- Addison was one of two returning starters from Frederick's 2024 Class 4A state championship team, along with point guard Emonte Hill Jr., and became a key leader with plentiful turnover elsewhere in the lineup. The junior rounded into a complete player on both ends of the floor, helping the Cadets recover from a 3-7 start and lifting them to their third consecutive
- He played his best when the lights were brightest, including a mammoth 32-point, 16-rebound double-double in a regional final victory over arch-rival Thomas Johnson.
- Addison is drawing some interest from Division I colleges.



FIRST TEAM

CHASE BEARD JUNIOR POINT GUARD MIDDLETOWN

■ The sharpshooter helped the Knights return to the Class 2A state semifinals despite turning over much of its squad. Beard was one of the few holdovers, and he flourished as an outside scoring threat (16.2) points, 6.2 rebounds, 3.7 assists).

EZERE BOWIE SENIOR CENTER

THOMAS JOHNSON

One of two players in the county to average a double-double, few teams could contain Bowie. He notched 16.1 points and 10 rebounds per game, giving the Patriots a domineering inside presence as they returned to the Class 4A West region final

KEVIN BUKULA SENIOR GUARD

TUSCARORA

■ In his only year with the Titans, Bukula led the biggest turnaround by any county team this season. His 17.4 points per game ranked second in the region among public school players, and he also averaged 5.9 rebounds and 2.6 steals

EMONTE HILL JR. SENIOR POINT GUARD

FREDERICK

■ Few set the tempo better than Hill, who helped bring the Cadets to their third straight state tourney. The Shippensburg commit became more of a scorer this season (12 points per game) while dishing a county-high seven assists per game.

DYLAN HODGSON SENIOR FORWARD

LINGANORE

■ Hodgson was a handful around the basket as one of two players in the county to average a double-double. His 11.8 rebounds per game led the area's public school players, while he also averaged 15.1 points, 2.5 assists and two blocks.

SEAN PYLES SENIOR GUARD

URBANA

■ Pyles filled the basket at a moment's notice and was particularly lethal from deep. The McDaniel commit averaged 16 points per game while averaging 5 rebounds, 3 assists and 2.5 steals as the Hawks were one of the county's ton teams.

SAN ANTONIO — Dribbles bounced off hips, no-look passes went to no one and Florida's best player couldn't make a basket.

And when the Gators' bench was assessed a technical foul early in the second half, a frustrating night appeared to be hitting its low point.

But then the resilient Gators got going as they fought back from a 12-point deficit in the second half to beat Houston 65-63 in the NCAA title game for the school's third national championship.

A blocked 3-pointer by Thomas Haugh led to his spinning layup, a three-point play and screaming fist pump. Walter Clayton Jr., scoreless in the first half, tied the game three times in the second half.

'I got a little emotional. My team needed a spark," Haugh said of his play that helped the Gators get within 45-42 with about 12 minutes left. "This group," he added, "is just
