

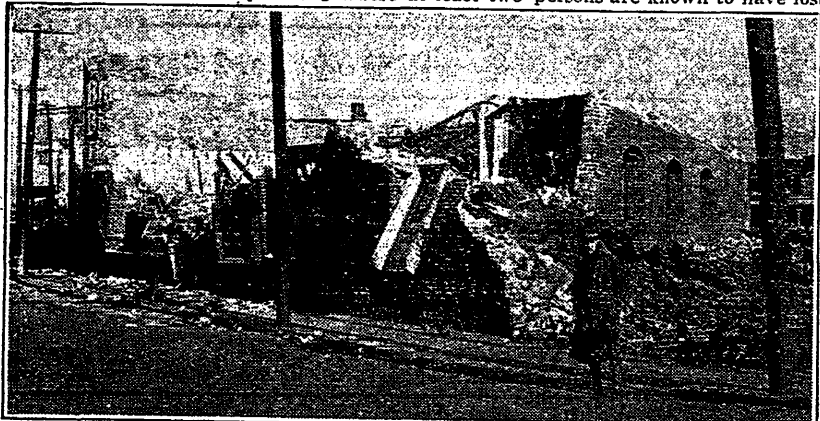
Camera Story Of Greatest Castastrophe In History Of City



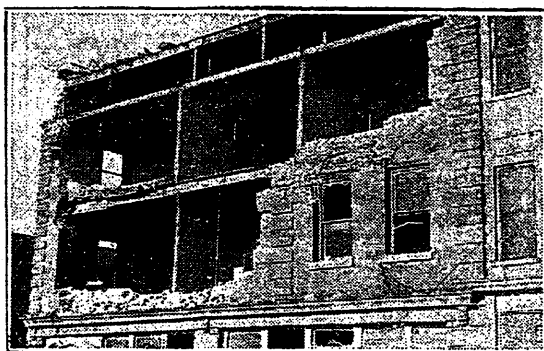
The above picture shows the wreckage of the buildings along Lewis street between South Elm street and Five Points south of the railway tracks where at least two persons are known to have lost their lives.



This picture was taken on McAdee street in the center of the area hardest hit by the tornado and gives a graphic idea of the extent of the damage done. It was at this spot that Mrs. J. B. Ayers and daughter perished.

Scenes on South Elm street near Lewis street.



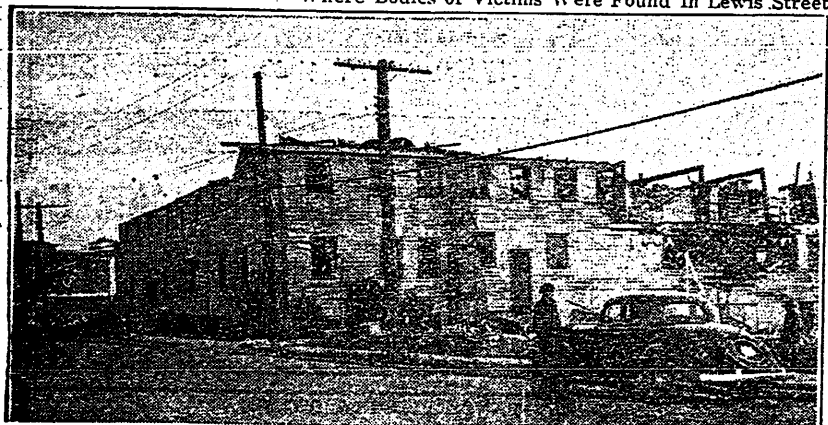
Scene of remains of Sinclair and National Oil company plants on West Lee.



Where Bodies of Victims Were Found In Lewis Street.

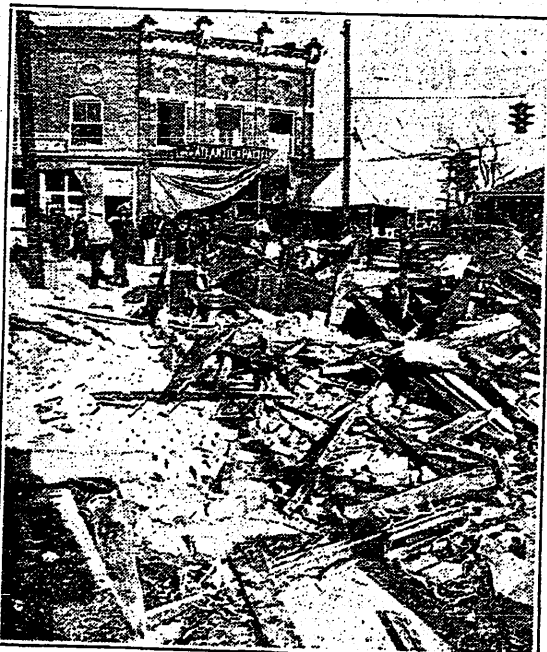
