A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to add Article XI, Section 6 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to generally prohibit the use of funds and resources from a foreign government or a nongovernmental source for the conduct of elections and for the functions and duties established in the election code except under specified circumstances; to provide for submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; and to provide for related matters.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to add Article XI, Section 6 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§6. Use of Monies, Goods, or Services for Conduct of Elections; Prohibitions

Section 6. No funds, goods, or services donated by a foreign government or a nongovernmental source shall be used to conduct elections unless provided for in the election code and subject to restrictions provided by general law.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on October 14, 2023.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to prohibit the use of funds, goods, or services from a foreign government or a nongovernmental source to conduct elections and election functions and duties unless the use is authorized by the secretary of state through policies established in accordance with law? (Adds Article XI, Section 6)

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to add Article XII, Section 17 of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to religious freedom; to provide that the freedom of worship in churches or other places of worship is a fundamental right that is worthy of the highest order of protection; to provide for the highest level of scrutiny by a court; to provide for intent; and to specify an election for submission of the proposition to electors and provide a ballot proposition.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to add Article XII, Section 17 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§17. Freedom of worship in churches or other places of worship

Section 17(A) The freedom to worship in a church or other place of worship is a fundamental right that is worthy of the highest order of protection.

(B) This Section shall not alter or limit Article I, Section 8 of this constitution in any way. The free exercise of religion guaranteed by Article I, Section 8 of this constitution shall not be limited to the fundamental right to worship in a church or other place of worship.

(C) If a state or local governmental body or official acts in a manner that is contrary to the provisions of this Section and a challenge is brought related to that governmental action, the court shall apply strict scrutiny in order to protect the fundamental right to worship in a church or other place of worship, unless there is a higher level of protection or scrutiny recognized and applied by the court.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to provide that the freedom of worship in a church or other place of worship is a fundamental right that is worthy of the highest order of protection? (Adds Const. Article XII, Section 17)

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend Article VII, Section 10(D)(2)(b)(ii) and (iii) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to provide relative to payment of certain state retirement system unfunded accrued liability; to provide for the amount of nonrecurring state revenue that is required to be appropriated to such debt; to repeal provisions relative to the amount and distribution of such payments required in prior fiscal years; to provide for submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; and to provide for related matters.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to amend Article VII, Section 10(D)(2)(b)(ii) and (iii) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§10. Expenditure of State Funds

Section 10.

(D) Appropriations.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in this constitution, the appropriation or allocation of any money designated in the official forecast as nonrecurring shall be made only for the following purposes:

(b)

(i) For Fiscal Years 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 the legislature shall appropriate no less than five percent of any money designated in the official forecast as nonrecurring to the Louisiana State Employees' Retirement System and the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana for application to the balance of the unfunded accrued liability of such systems existing as of June 30, 1988, in proportion to the balance of such unfunded accrued liability of each such system. Any such payments to the public retirement systems shall not be used, directly or indirectly, to fund cost-of-living increases for such systems.

(iii) For Fiscal Year 2015-2016 and every fiscal year thereafter through Fiscal Year 2023-2024, the legislature shall appropriate no less than ten percent of any money designated in the official forecast as nonrecurring to the Louisiana State Employees' Retirement System and the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana for application to the balance of the unfunded accrued liability of such systems existing as of June 30, 1988, in proportion to the balance of such unfunded accrued liability of each such system. Any such payments to the public retirement systems shall not be used, directly or indirectly, to fund cost-of-living increases for such systems.

(ii) For Fiscal Year 2024-2025 and each fiscal year thereafter, the legislature shall appropriate no less than twenty-five percent of any money designated in the official forecast as nonrecurring to the state retirement systems for application to their unfunded accrued liability. Money appropriated pursuant to this item shall be applied by the receiving system to its outstanding positive amortization bases in the order in which they were created, from oldest to newest. The legislature may provide by law for a formula to distribute the nonrecurring money between those state retirement systems that have unfunded accrued liability. If the legislature has not provided by law for a distribution formula, nonrecurring money shall be appropriated pursuant to this item to each system in the proportion that the system's total unfunded accrued liability bears to the total of all state system unfunded accrued liability, using the most recent system valuations adopted by the Public Retirement Systems' Actuarial Committee or its successor. Any payment to a state retirement system made pursuant to the provisions of this item shall not be used, directly or indirectly, to fund cost-of-living increases for such system.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on October 14, 2023.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to require that a minimum of twenty-five percent of any money designated as nonrecurring state revenue be applied toward the balance of the unfunded accrued liability of the state retirement systems? (Amends Article VII, Section 10(D)(2)(b)(ii) and (iii))

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend Article VII, Section 21(B) of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to ad valorem tax exemptions; to provide for eligibility of certain nonprofit organizations for such exemptions; to prohibit the exemption from ad valorem taxation of certain residential property owned by a nonprofit corporation or association based upon the condition of the property; to provide for determinations by local governing authorities with respect to the condition of certain

property owned by a nonprofit corporation or association and leased as housing; to authorize the issuance or reinstatement of a property tax exemption to a nonprofit corporation or association in certain circumstances; to make technical changes and corrections; to provide for applicability; to provide for submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; and to provide for related matters.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to amend Article VII, Section 21(B) of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:

§21. Other Property Exemptions

Section 21. In addition to the homestead exemption provided for in Section 20 of this Article, the following property and no other shall be exempt from ad valorem taxation:

(B)(1)(a)(i) Property owned by a nonprofit corporation or association organized and operated exclusively for religious, dedicated places of burial, charitable, health, welfare, fraternal, or educational purposes, no part of the net earnings of which inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or member thereof and which that is declared to be exempt from federal or state income tax; and

(ii) medical Medical equipment leased for a term exceeding five years to such a nonprofit corporation or association which that owns or operates a small, rural hospital and which that uses the equipment solely for health care purposes at the hospital, provided that the property shall be exempt only during the term of the lease to such corporation or association, and further provided that "small, rural hospital" shall mean a hospital which meets all of the following criteria:

(aa) It has less than fifty Medicare-licensed acute care beds.

(bb) It is located in a municipality with a population of less than ten thousand which that has been classified as an area with a shortage of health manpower by the United States Health Service; and

(b) property Property leased to such a nonprofit corporation or association for use solely as housing for homeless persons, as defined by regulation adopted by the tax commission or its successor provided that the term of such lease shall be for at least five years, that as a condition of entering into the lease the property be in compliance with all applicable health and sanitation codes for use as housing for homeless persons, that the lease shall provide that compensation to be paid the lessor shall not exceed one dollar per year, and that such contract of lease shall recite that the property shall be used exclusively for the purpose of housing the homeless, and further provided that at such time as the property is no longer used solely as housing for homeless persons, the property shall no longer be exempt from taxation;

(2) property Property of a bona fide labor organization representing its members or affiliates in collective bargaining efforts; and

(3) property Property of an organization such as a lodge or club organized for charitable and fraternal purposes and practicing the same, and property of a nonprofit corporation devoted to promoting trade, travel, and commerce, and also property of a trade, business, industry or professional society or association, if that property is owned by a nonprofit corporation or association organized under the laws of this state for such purposes.

(4)(a) None of the property listed in this Paragraph (B) shall be exempt if owned, operated, leased, or used for commercial purposes unrelated to the exempt purposes of the corporation or association.

(b)(i) None of the property listed in this Paragraph shall be exempt if the property is owned by a nonprofit corporation or association and the governing authority of the municipality or parish in which the property is located determines all of the following:

(aa) The property is leased as housing, is in a state of disrepair, and manifests conditions which endanger the health or safety of the public.

(bb) The owner of the property habitually neglects maintenance of the property as evidenced by three or more sustained code enforcement violations issued for the property in the prior twelve months for matters that endanger the health or safety of residents of the property or of persons in the area surrounding the property. For purposes of this item, matters deemed to endanger health or safety include structural instability due to deterioration; injurious or toxic ventilation; contaminated or inoperable water supply; holes, breaks, rotting materials, or mold in walls; roof defects that admit rain; unsecured overhang extensions in danger of collapse; a hazardous electrical system; improper connection of fuel-burning appliances or equipment; an inactive or inoperable fire detection system; an unsecured or contaminated swimming pool; or any combination of these.

(ii) An ad valorem tax exemption denied or revoked pursuant to the provisions of item (i) of this Subsubparagraph may be issued or reinstated if the governing authority of the municipality or parish in which the property is located determines that the conditions enumerated in item (i) of this Subsubparagraph no longer exist.

Section 2. Be it further resolved that the provisions of the amendment contained in this Joint Resolution shall be applicable to all tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2024.

Section 3. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on October 14, 2023.

Section 4. Be it further resolved that on the official ballot to be used at the election, there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted to vote YES or NO, to amend the Constitution of Louisiana, which proposition shall read as follows:

Do you support an amendment to deny a property tax exemption to a nonprofit corporation or association that owns residential property in such a state of disrepair that it endangers public health or safety? (Amends Article VII, Section 21(B))

PY 2022/2023

Franklin Parish Head Start serves low income children and families from all over the parish on the campus of Winnboro Elementary School. This federally funded program began its operation in the parish under the supervision of Franklin Parish School Board in the fall of 2002, and has consistently met its 136 funded enrollments in each of the following 20 years until the past three years. During the third year of the COVID pandemic, enrollment averaged 110 in-person students. Program operations for the 2022/2023 school year were \$1,131,459 with training and technical assistance adding \$16,982. A 2.28 percent cost of living adjustment which totaled \$25,797, supplemental quality increase of \$10,000, American Rescue Plan funds carryover which totaled \$110,597 and an unspent carryover balance from the 2019/2020 year in the amount of \$25,308 was finally approved for carryover to the

2022/2023 year giving a total funding balance of \$1,320,143.

Federally funded programs are required to match 20 percent of the total funding balance. Salaries and benefits of 25 full-time employees was how the majority of the budget was expended with staff development, insurance, student transportation, and supplies being other major expenditures. Use of cafeteria and playground space supplied by the grantee (School Board) and goods and services supplied by community partners, grantee personnel, and parents comprised the majority of the non-federal match requirement. The program was able to meet the match requirements, but sources of in-kind are becoming more difficult.

A well-rounded experience was provided for the 110, three and four-year-old children who attended the program. Social, educational, and emotional needs were addressed in this comprehensive child development program every day in new and creative ways. Average attendance for the 2022/2023 program year was 82 percent.

Federal monitors as well as the same independent state auditors who audited the parish school system examined Franklin Parish Head Start. No official finding for the program year has been noted.

Before educational, social, and emotional needs could be addressed and met, health needs and issues were identified and corrected, if possible. Therefore, health was and always will be, a priority. According to federal regulations, each child must have a primary care physician, a physical and dental examination, and must be current on immunizations. All 110 children received the required initial medical, dental, and developmental screening meeting the federal requirement of 100 percent. Speech was identified as the most needed special service. Twenty-five of the children were identified with a chronic medical condition such as autism/1, vision/8, heart murmur/4, asthma/2, anemia/5, kidney disease/1 and eczema/4. Federal regulations require 10 percent of a program's actual enrollment to be filled with children with disabilities. This requirement was met and exceeded with nineteen enrolled children being diagnosed with a special need and having an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) in place by year's end.

Kindergarten readiness was another priority of Franklin Parish Head Start. Children were exposed to academic and social activities and experiences daily, guided by the Frog Street Curriculum (same curriculum used by parish preschool programs). An abundance of materials and supplies encouraging creativity and discovery filled each of the eight classrooms. Backpack logs and educational materials were sent home with the students weekly. Teachers contacted parents weekly to discuss any concerns. Two qualified adults, a lead teacher and an assistant, were in each of the eight classrooms. Five of the teachers had at least a four-year degree and the other three had two-year degrees in early childhood and are working toward a four-year degree. Eight assistants had a Child Development Associates (CDA) and one is working toward that credential.

Teaching Strategies GOLD (TSGOLD) was the assessment tool used to determine child progress throughout the year. This assessment is administered at October, February and May checkpoints. Students showed progress in all areas at the second and third checkpoints. Results were shared with parents and governing boards. Individualization and lesson plans were written with these results in mind.

Another area of utmost importance to this program was staff development. Many opportunities were provided for staff to improve performance, effectiveness, and efficiency. College classes, workshops, in-services, and conferences were available and staff were encouraged to attend. Tuition assistance was and will continue to be provided for two teachers that are working towards advanced degrees in education as well as two paraprofessionals that are working toward teacher certification.

Parent involvement and engagement was also a priority. In the post COVID world, participation improved once local, state and federal regulations were lifted. This program solicited and encouraged parent input and participation in all areas of the program. Parents were allowed inside the building this year, a federally mandated change from last year, as we continued all forms of parent communications in the form of phone calls, notes, newsletters, text messages and social media engagement were practiced throughout the school year. Opportunities afforded to parents included training and in-service on topics such as home safety, healthcare services as well as nutrition, mental health, parenting, school readiness, assistance in continuing education and improving job skills. Several events were planned throughout the school year for parents to participate with the students. Such activities included: Painting with Pops, Moms / Dads Day Out, Muffins with Mom, field trips, photo booth, Father-Daughter, Mother-Son Banquet and our annual Head Start end of year celebration.

Please find below the approved budget for fiscal year 2023-2024 including a 5.6 percent COLA increase in the amount of \$65,366 which allowed a 7 percent salary increase for all employees. In addition, a program quality increase in the amount of \$38,491 for a budget increase of \$103,857. The total 2023/2024 funding equals \$1,288,095.

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to Article IV, Section 21(D)(1) of the Louisiana Constitution, that on August 30, 2023, Entergy Louisiana, LLC ("ELL" or "the Company"), an electric public utility providing retail electric service to customers in fifty-eight (58) parishes of the State of Louisiana, filed with the Louisiana Public Service Commission ("LPSC" or "Commission"), pursuant to Article IV, Section 21(D)(3) of the Louisiana Constitution and Title 45, Section 1163.1 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes, its Application for Approval of Regulatory Blueprint Necessary for Company to Strengthen the Electric Grid for State of Louisiana. This filing is herein referred to as the "Application."

The purpose of the Company's Application is to position the Company to continue the work that it has been doing to upgrade and strengthen the electric grid so that it can provide resilient, reliable, sustainable, and affordable service to customers into the future. The Application introduces a regulatory blueprint necessary to support the most comprehensive grid strengthening efforts in Louisiana history. In it, ELL lays out what it is doing to improve reliability, make the grid more resilient in the face of extreme weather, and add clean, affordable sources of energy.

In its Application, ELL has prepared and submitted a Cost of Service study ("COS") as required by the Commission's Order No. U-35565. The COS is based on the test year period of January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022, and reflects a request for a specific Return on Equity, certain pro forma adjustments to reflect capital additions to rate base, updated depreciation rates and other known and measurable changes through August 31, 2024. ELL has included a class cost of service in the COS; however, this study is only being provided as information to the Commission and the Company is not recommending that the Commission implement the COS-supported rates. The Company is instead recommending that its Rate Mitigation Proposal be implemented as a more customer-centric alternative in lieu of the COS-based results. The Rate Mitigation Proposal allows ELL to continue building for the future by presenting a regulatory blueprint that is more affordable for ELL's customers and provides more accountability to stakeholders and the Commission through annual rate reviews. The Rate Mitigation Proposal is designed to achieve an outcome for customers that maintains ELL's low rates while also maintaining the Company's financial health and good credit ratings and enabling the significant grid investments needed to power Louisiana's economy into the future.

Under ELL's Rate Mitigation Proposal, ELL is requesting authorization to implement an extended Formula Rate Plan ("FRP") for re-establishing rates on an annual

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basis that includes limited but necessary modifications. ELL estimates that its Rate Mitigation Proposal will result in a change in revenue requirement of less than half of the increase supported by the COS study. In addition to amending the FRP, ELL is proposing to reduce late, connection and reconnection fees currently assessed to customers, to reduce additional facilities charge rates, and to provide eligible low-income seniors with monthly discounts on their electric bill.

The Company also seeks to combine, modify, and/or withdraw certain rate schedules, and also proposes certain new rate class combinations and cost allocations. In particular, ELL proposes a new residential rate schedule, which is a combination of the legacy residential rate schedules.

Based on the COS, ELL's revenue requirement would increase by \$430 million. This would have the following estimated effect on typical monthly customer bills: an annualized typical monthly bill for Residential Service for a Legacy ELL customer for 1,000 kWh would increase roughly \$13.92 from \$126.02 to \$139.94 while an annualized typical monthly bill for Residential Service for a Legacy EGSL customer for 1,000 kWh would increase approximately \$20.28 from \$118.77 to \$139.05. An annualized typical monthly bill for Small General Service for a Legacy ELL customer for 1,500 kWh would decrease approximately \$3.10 from \$315.97 to \$312.87 while an annualized typical bill for Small General Service for a Legacy EGSL customer for 1,500 kWh would increase roughly \$0.85 from \$232.92 to \$233.77. A typical monthly bill for Large General Service for a Legacy ELL customer for 500 kW and 225,000 kWh would increase approximately \$1,007.35 from \$20,569.99 to \$21,577.34. A typical monthly bill for General Service for a Legacy EGSL customer for 500 kW and 255,500 kWh would increase approximately \$1,489.97 from \$20,152.55 to \$21,642.52.

As previously noted, the Company is not recommending the results of the COS study be implemented. ELL estimates its Rate Mitigation Proposal, if implemented as ELL recommends, would result in less than 50% of the change in rates resulting from the COS study. The Company proposes to accept lower rates, including a lower return on equity for its owners, in order to achieve an outcome for its customers that maintains ELL's low rates. The Rate Mitigation Proposal aims to keep residential rates below the national average during grid strengthening projects. ELL also is proposing to adhere to the most stringent reliability standards of any power provider in Louisiana, with financial penalties and customer credits for failing to meet predetermined reliability goals. By assuring a more resilient, reliable and sustainable grid while maintaining affordability, the regulatory blueprint will boost economic development, creating jobs, investment and increased tax base for the benefit of customers, communities and the entire State of Louisiana.

If accepted by the Commission, the Company's blueprint will reduce the time and expense of a traditional rate case; keep in place an efficient FRP mechanism and improve it in ways that support ELL's effort to build a stronger, more reliable grid; and provide rate mitigation for customers.
