# **Bulldog legacy etched in Steele**

You don't have to be on nerve pill medicine to be a diehard fan of Louisiana Tech's 2022 baseball team, but it would probably help.

The Bulldogs lost more on Friday nights this spring than a shy sophomore at a sock hop, then bounced back to own the weekend time after time. They went 5-4 against last year's Conference USA NCAA Tournament qualifiers, all on the road. Morning box scores that looked like pillow fights hid the bare-knuckled brawl that went on the night before.

"This year we've got the same number of wins as last year (when Tech hosted an NCAA Regional)," said Tech rightfielder and 3-hole hitter Steele Netterville, "but it seems like none of them have been easy. Everything's been a battle."

So of course this is how the Bulldogs had to win the CUSA Tournament in Hattiesburg, Miss., this weekend, with walk-off wins Saturday and Sunday after no walkoffs at all on their way to a 42-19 record and an automatic bid into an NCAA Regional.

They saved the best for last — or the worst, depending on your mental state. And it was Netterville who slapped a high

fastball the other way and tucked it just inside the first base bag to chase home the game- and tournament-winning run to end a 4:11 hours, back-and-forth, 9-8 winnertake-all dogfight against UTSA in the tournament's championship game Sunday in Pete Taylor Park.

As the ball cleared the bag and UTSA's diving first baseman Ryan Flores, who'd tied the game up 8-8 in the top of the ninth with a homer off Tech's ace closer Kyle Crigger, Netterville's hands rose in the air and he danced more than ran to first, touched the bag, and joined the party of red-jerseyed champions piling onto each other in the infield.

A solid defensive team all season, Tech had made 11 errors in five tournament games. Their all-league closer had given up three homers.

And yet ... the conference championship trophy was riding on the bus back to Ruston, same as the four-hour-old postgame pizza, the exhausted players, the beginnings of memories that will last a lifetime. The Bulldogs did it.

It's the program's first conference baseball tournament title since 1987, when Tech was in the Southland Conference, Reagan was president, the Minnesota

Twins were World Series champs, there were only three Star Wars films, and milk was \$1.07 a gallon.

"We don't do anything easy," said Tech coach Lane Burroughs, now a father of three who, the last time Tech won a baseball title, was the scrappy Little League leadoff hitter and catcher for Rexall Drug of Point, Miss., the ol' Orange and Black.

"We gotta do it the hard way." He is not understating.

To the great unwashed, Tech's 4-0 victory over Charlotte Wednesday and 7-2 win over Old Dominion Thursday in the Bulldogs' first two tournament games would seem appropriate for a No. 2 seed. Of course, the old hands knew what was coming: trouble. (The only weather delay in the tournament came in that Thursday shutout of Charlotte; it lasted nearly six hours and was an omen of things to come.)

The Bulldogs earned Friday off, then lost Saturday to Old Dominion, 9-6, in 13 innings. A win would have vaulted Tech into Sunday's title game. Instead, Tech had to face ODU in an elimination game Saturday

Tech won that one, 8-7, when Tulane transfer Walker Birchfield rapped the first pitch into left center to score two runs.

# LSU announces TV games

on Saturday, Sept. 10 will kickoff at 6:30 p.m. and televised on the SEC Network, the league office announced on Thursday.

Game times and television network designations were announced for the first month of the season Thursday. Kickoff times and television plans for the remainder of LSU's 2022 schedule – as well as the rest of the SEC – will be announced as the season progresses.

LSU's matchup against Southern, the first-ever meeting between the two schools, will also serve as the first game in Tiger Stadium for head coach Brian Kelly. Kelly takes over at LSU after becoming the winningest coach in Notre Dame history and with more wins than any active FBS head coach.

The league had previously announced LSU's season-opener against Florida State on Sunday, Sept. 4 in the Allstate Louisiana Kickoff Game at Caesars Superdome will start at 6:30 p.m. and will be televised on ABC.

The Southern game will feature former Ferriday standout Kobe Dillon at running back for the Jaguars.

Dillon transferred to Southern last season from Hinds Community College.

Dillon is a 3-star recruit by 247Sports. In his senior year at Ferriday, Dillon was 120-of-199 for 2,112 yards and 23 touchdowns with only four interceptions..

LSU's historic home opener against Southern and 21 TDs. Dillon led Ferriday to the LHSAA Class 2A State Championship with a win over Many HS 56-17, where he was named Most Outstanding Player

> Dillon finished the game with 225 yards and four touchdowns, was 8-of-12 for 174 yards and two touchdowns and rushed 12 times for 51 yards and two TDs.

Dillon held offers from Lamar, South Alabama and Grambling State

The LSU-Southern game in Tiger Stadium will also feature two of the nation's most popular bands - the Golden Band from Tigerland along with the Human Jukebox. The Human Jukebox will perform in Tiger Stadium for the first time and its pre-game and halftime shows have been featured at six Super Bowls as well as many other national events.

LSU's conference opener against Mississippi State on Sept. 17 in Tiger Stadium will be televised on ESPN and starts at 5 p.m. Last year, LSU posted a 28-25 win over the Bulldogs in Starkville.

The following week against New Mexico, the Tigers host the Lobos for a 6:30 p.m. kickoff in a game that will be streamed on ESPN+ and SEC Network+. It will be the first meeting between

Florida State's season opener against Duquesne on Aug. 27 will kick off at 5 p.m. and air on the ACC Network, and the Sept. 16 contest at Louisville will be a 7 p.m. start on ESPN.

A) Mr. Edwards opened the Public Hearing for Ordinance 2022-04 Re-districting

B) Under Public Comments, Mr. Kevin Friloux stated he disagreed with the way the districts were drawn. If the Parish was going to maintain 9 Jurors, then there should be 9 districts. He supported his statement by each Juror could save money

- C) There being no further comments for the ordinance, Mr. Edwards closed the Public Hearing.
- 1) The meeting was called to order by Mr. Edwards. Ms. Burley conducted the roll call and a quorum was declared present.
- 2) A motion was made by Mr. Probst seconded by Mr. Yearby to approve the minutes of the April 25, 2022 meeting as distributed. Motion carried unanimously.
- 3) Mr. Edwards gave Mr. Bryant Killen the floor to discuss updates on the development of the railroad commission. Mr. Killen stated Madison and Tensas Parishes have passed ordinances to develop the commission. Mr. Neal asked about the propensity for taxation and where match monies would come from. Mr. Killen stated that the residents of the parishes would probably not support an additional tax. Like the ports, state and federal programs would be leveraged.

Mr. Bachus asked what was the worst-case scenario of pursuing bringing the rail-road back to the parishes. Mr. Killen stated that even if the railroad development failed, there would be no money out of the pockets of the residents. The burden of the tracks through the parishes would be on the railroad district and ports. The railroad commission would operate as a public entity, not privately owned.

With no further questions, Mr. Parker asked for the ordinance to be placed on the next agenda. A motion was made by Mr. Yearby seconded by Mr. Probst to re-advertise for a public hearing to consider the ordinance at the next regular meeting.

4) Ms. Yates was not present and had asked to be placed on next meeting's agenda.

5) A motion was made by Mr. Yearby seconded by Mr. Bachus to adopt Ordinance 2022-04 – Redistricting Plans for Concordia Parish Police Jury. There were no further comments. Motion carried unanimously. (See Addendum for Ordinance 2022-04.)

6) Resolution 22-012 – LGAP Resolution of Support was offered for review and approval. The Parish applies for LGAP funding to help fund major equipment purchases. A motion was made by Mr. Parker seconded by Mr. Yearby to approve the resolution. Motion carried unanimously. (See Addendum for Resolution 22-012.)

7) Resolution 22-013 – CWEF Resolution of Support was offered for review and approval. The water districts of the parish – Concordia Waterworks and Lake St. John Waterworks rely on these funding projects for improvements to their systems. A motion was made by Mr. Parker seconded by Mr. Probst to approve the resolution. Motion carried unanimously. (See Addendum for Resolution 22-013.)

8) Resolution 22-014 — Naming the Concordia Sentinel as the Parish's Official Journal was offered for review and approval. The Parish is required each year to name its official journal for publications. The Concordia Sentinel being located and distributed in Concordia Parish upholds the requirements to be named as the official journal. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, Louisiana, met, in regular session, in the Town Hall Meeting Room on Tuesday, May 10, 2022, at 6:00 p.m.

There were present: Mayor Buz Craft, Aldermen Jon Betts, Tommy Probst, Robert Gardner, Brent Smith, and Alderwoman Rosa I. Demby.

There was absent: NONE.

There were also present: Piara Wilson, Municipal Clerk; Debra Moak, Municipal Accountant; George C. Murray, Jr., Municipal Attorney; Jay LaSyone, Municipal Manager; and members of the press.

The meeting was opened by the Mayor and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited by those present, followed by the invocation given by Alderman Betts.

A quorum being present, the Mayor declared the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, Louisiana, to be duly convened, in regular session, as the governing authority of said municipality, and opened the meeting for the conduct of business.

After being reviewed, the typed minutes of the regular meeting of April 12, 2022, were approved with no changes. The motion for approval of the minutes was made by Alderman Betts, seconded by Alderman Gardner, and unanimously carried.

Following the approval of the prior minutes, the Mayor advised the Board that the current agenda items no. 7 and no. 8 need to be corrected as they contain the wrong information. The Mayor then asked for a motion to correct Agenda Item No. 7 to read as follows: "BOARD DISCUSSION AND VOTE ON APPROVAL OF A RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT OF THE COMMUNITY WATER ENRICHMENT FUND FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023". Following the Mayor's request, a motion to correct Agenda Item No. 7 to read as just stated by the Mayor was made by Alderman Smith, seconded by Alderman Probst, and unanimously carried. The Mayor then stated that Agenda Item No. 8 should read "BOARD DISCUSSION AND VOTE ON APPROVAL OF A RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM 2022-2023 GRANT APPLICATION". The Mayor then asked for a motion to correct Agenda Item No. 8 to read as he just stated. Alderman Betts made the motion to correct Agenda Item No. 8 to read as the Mayor stated, which motion was seconded by Alderman Smith, and unanimously carried. The Mayor then opened the floor for public comments on current agenda items. There followed the following public comments: First, Sabrina Dore' commented on Item No. 10, pertaining to the introduction of the Operating Budget Ordinance. Ms. Dore' reminded the Board that she had approached them previously about increasing the budget for the fireworks displays from \$10,000.00 per year to \$20,000.00 per year. She was asking that those increased funds be included in the current proposed budget. The Mayor responded that he thought that had been done and then asked her had not she set up a separate entity over the fireworks displays. She advised that she has created a 501-C for the fireworks. After further discussion, the Mayor advised that the requested funds would be in the budget. Next, Linda Bell made comments on behalf of her mother, who is a long time Town of Vidalia resident, on Agenda Item No. 4, concerning the appointment of Mayor Pro Tem. There followed an extended discussion of the position of Mayor Pro Tem. Ms. Bell went on to explain that she is here in support of retaining Alderman Gardner as Mayor Pro Tem and her reasons for doing so. Next, Ruby Woodfork spoke to the Board stating that she is a long time resident of Vidalia and that while she does not live in Robert's district, she has had dealings with him and spoke in support of him. Next, Thomasina Hill made her comments on the issue of Mayor Pro Tem. She first had questions about the term of Mayor Pro Tem and, after the Mayor's response, there was a series of questions about why the matter was being placed on the agenda. There being no further comments, the Mayor closed the floor for public comments.

Agenda Item No. 1 was the presentation of the financial statement for March, 2022. The Mayor called on the Municipal Accountant, Debra Moak, CPA, who presented the financial statement. As customary, she began by explaining the various fund balances, which summaries included a comparison of actual expenses to budget expenses. The summary sheets, previously given to the Aldermen, were reviewed in detail, and she reported on the various positive and negative fund balances and indicated the net changes in the various funds through March 31, 2022. She then reminded the Aldermen that those statements were provided to them in their meeting packet. Mrs. Moak then advised that the Town revenues are under budget but that the Sales Tax collections remain higher and are over budget and she advised that the Town is still working with FEMA to recover emergency work and debris removal costs caused by the 2021 Winter Storm. She concluded by telling the Board that the Town continues working on the budget for FY 2022-2023, which budget is not included in the packet but will be sent to the members for their review and public inspections next week. There being no questions or comments, the Mayor thanked Mrs. Moak for her usual thorough presentation.

Agenda Item No. 2 was Board discussion and vote on approval of occupational license applications. The only application was by Samantha Pruitt for "VIDALIA PAWN, LLC" for change of ownership at 1624 Carter Street. There being no questions or comments, on motion for approval by Alderman Smith, seconded by Alderman Betts, and unanimously carried, the application was approved.

Agenda Item No. 3 was Board discussion and vote on approval of sign applications. The only application was by Dennis Cooper for "DC AG LLC" at 903 Carter Street, for a sign to advertise "DC AG LLC" at 903 Carter Street in accordance with the attached illustrations. The sign will be lighted. There being no questions or comments, on motion for approval by Alderman Probst, seconded by Alderman Betts, and unanimously carried, the application was approved.

Agenda Item No. 4 was Board discussion and vote on appointment of Mayor Pro Tempore for Town of Vidalia, Louisiana. The Mayor, after advising the Board of the purpose of Agenda Item 4, he turned the meeting over to Alderman Smith, who had requested that the item be on the agenda. Alderman Smith then spoke to the Board and told them of his reasons for wanting to change the Mayor Pro Tem and wanting to nominate Jon Betts. He further explained that he felt that Mr. Betts is best qualified to be in charge of the Town should the Mayor be absent and that in light of recent events, Alderman Gardner might not be who we need to run the Town. Following his presentation, Alderman Smith made a motion that Alderman Betts be Mayor Pro Tem. The motion was seconded by Alderman Betts. A roll call vote was called and the roll call vote was as follows: FOR: Aldermen Betts, Smith and Alderwoman Demby. NO: Aldermen Gardner and Probst. The vote was 3 FOR and 2 NO and the motion carried.

Agenda Item No. 5 was Board discussion and vote on approval of funding for 2022 Summer Youth Program (Greater Mt. Carmel Missionary Baptist Church, Pastor Raymond Riley). The Mayor began by giving an overview of the past funding for the Summer Youth Program, indicating that because of COVID the last year's monies were not spent. Alderman Gardner stated that he believed that the Board had already voted on this program and should not have to be voted on each year. Following a short discussion, the Mayor asked for a motion approving the funding. Following his explanation, it was moved by Alderman Betts to keep the amount in reserve at 2.3 million, which motion was seconded by Alderman Probst and unanimously carried.

Agenda Item No. 13 was Board discussion regarding American Cruise Line – update. The Mayor explained that he was giving them an update to keep them up to date on the cruise line construction of the dock. The Mayor stated that everything was in place to build the dock with the Coast Guard and other entities and then the Cruise Line has had complaints from the Tow Boat Operator's Union that the proposed dock is too far out in the river for safe navigation. This is being negotiated at this time, he just wanted to let the Board know that the Cruise Line may need a shorter dock or they may have to move the dock to South of the bridge. He emphasized that this in no way is going to stop the project from being completed.

Agenda Item No. 14 was Board discussion regarding update on current projections for energy costs during summer and fall. Mayor Craft began his update by saying he wished he had good news and went on to explain how the cost of natural gas has gone up which in turn has caused the cost of electricity per mega watt to triple, as has natural gas prices. Further that the agency that controls the distribution of electricity has indicated that at the present time they cannot project sufficient electricity production for this summer's demand, and so we may expect some rolling blackouts or other measures. He stated that the good news was that the Town's consumers will get back 50% of whatever they pay for electricity this summer. He also indicated that the other good news is that with the situation as it exists, LEPA No. 1, which everyone has heard about, will be producing electricity and that should help offset other factors.

Agenda Item No. 15 was adjournment. Following the Mayor's update on current projections for energy costs, the Mayor noted that there were no further agenda items and asked for a motion to adjourn. A motion to adjourn was made by Alderman Betts, seconded by Alderwoman Demby, and unanimously carried. As the motion passed, the meeting was adjourned.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. LAKE ST JOHN WATERWORKS DISTRICT 1 is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <a href="https://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead">https://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead</a>.

The Louisiana Department of Health routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The tables that follow show the results of our monitoring during the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2021. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk.

In the tables below, you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms, we've provided the following definitions:

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/L) – one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (up/L) — one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Treatment Technique [TI] – an enforceable procedure or level of technological performance which public water systems must follow to encontrol of a contaminant.

Action level [AL] — the concentration of a contaminant that, if exceeded, trisgers treatment or other requirements that a water system must

follow.

<u>Maximum contaminant level (MCL)</u>—the "Maximum Allowed" MCL is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water.

Meaning consuming the property of the MCCS as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum contaminant level goal [MCCS] - the "Goal" is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to human health. MCCS allow for a margin of safety.

expected risk to human health. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum residual disinfectant level (MRDL) – The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence the

Maximum residual disinfectant level goal (MRDLG) – The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

<u>Level 1 assessment</u> — A study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine (if possible) why total coliform bacteria habeen found in our water system.

Level 2 <u>Assessment</u> – A very detailed study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine (if possible) why an E. coli N violation has occurred and/or why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system on multiple occasions.
