## UMB first at Chamber

The United Mississippi Bank team of Josh Wilson, Andrew Moroney and Chris Hutchins captured the Concordia Parish Chamber of Commerce Golf Tournament Thursday at Pano-la Woods.

The UMB team shot a 59. "It was just one of those days where we couldn't miss a put," Wilson said.

Finishing second, one stroke behind were Jordan Farmer State Farm team of Jordan Farmer, Henry Farmer and Mitch Ashmore.

Lispey Law Firm and Farm Bureau Graham Roberts placed second and third, respectively at 68.

Closest to the hole winners were Andrew Moroney and Ryan Crum.

Crum also had the longest drive.

## ULM upsets Liberty

MONROE, La. – During a preseason chat, a reporter presented first-year ULM coordinator Zac Alley with a possible nickname for his defense – if it played well.

Alley listened and laughed but agreed it would be best to hold off on giving an untested unit a catchy moniker.

But after ULM's resilient performance in a stunning 31-28 win over Liberty on Saturday night, it's time to call it what it is – Zac's "Back Alley" Defense.

"We try to play relentless," Alley said Sunday afternoon after team meetings. "I tell our guys that all the time. Relentless defense, relentless effort, relentless pursuit to the football, relentless pursuit of greatness every day. That's the message they hear from us and that's what we want we really want them to be.

"We never go away. There's never an opportunity when we'll stand down. We'll always stay and fight."

Against Liberty, the Warhawks made two fourth-down stops, including a bold goal-line stand that came after ULM allowed a blocked field goal and long return. The defense collected three interceptions off the arm of NFL prospect Malik Willis, including a win-preserving pick late by Mark Williams that pointed ULM toward the victory formation. ULM also registered four sacks, with one coming on the first play of Liberty's final offensive series.

The defense stacked up its share of big plays to help make ULM (3-3) a winner at Malone Stadium for the third time in four home games.

"I am proud of them," Alley said. "We had three turnovers, two fourth-down stops. Obviously, the goal line-stand was huge early in the game. We've got a lot to fix and a lot to clean up still. But as a whole, the thing you want to see is improvement over time."

Coming off back-to-back losses to Coastal Carolina and Georgia State where the opponent topped 50 points, it was easy to doubt ULM's

chances against Liberty (5-2) as a 32-point underdog. But Alley's defense helped write the narrative early and held the rope until the ULM offense could find the end zone in a 28-point third quarter that overcame a 14-0 halftime deficit.

"The defense has had some good games," ULM coach Terry Bowden said. "Last two weeks, we've struggled. We struggled with the triple option. We did know that this offense wasn't that style, and that style we may still have to work on because we got hit pretty hard at Coastal and Georgia State. But Liberty is a scheme we seem to handle a little bit better."

While ULM's defense remains a work in progress, it has been a major contributor in all three of the 2021 wins while allowing the team to stand at plus-six in turnover margin (11 take-aways, five turnovers).

The Warhawks forced three turnovers and limited Jackson State to 269 total yards with just 26 rushing in a 12-7 win on Sept. 18.

In the 29-16 victory over Troy on Sept. 25, defensive end Ty Shelby's end zone sack was good for a ULM safety and linebacker Ja'Cquez Williams scored off a +96-yard interception return that extended ULM's lead to 29-10. The play came on first-and-goal from the ULM 6 with the Warhawks protecting a 22-10 and ended Troy's hope of a potential comeback.

"Similar to the offense, we have a lot of new guys who got here in July," Alley said. They're learning the defense and they're learning the way we play. I expect us to get better week in and week out and continue to rise."

Willis rushed for 157 yards and two touchdowns and completed 16-of 23 passes for 135 yards and a score but ULM defenders Williams, Tre Odom and Josh Newton all intercepted the talented quarterback. After collecting the three interceptions, ULM ranks fourth in the Sun Belt Conference with five through six games.

"When you turn the ball over, you kill possessions," Willis said.

## LSU upsets Florida

Tyrion Davis-Price set a single-game LSU Football rushing record with 287 yards, as the Tigers outscored No. 20 Florida, 49-42, on a Homecoming Saturday afternoon in Tiger Stadium.

Davis-Price, a junior from Baton Rouge, thrilled the home crowd with 36 carries including touchdown runs of 18, 40 and 25 yards. The previous LSU single-game rushing record was 285 yards, set in 2016 against Texas A&M.

On a blue-sky but windy fall morning kickoff, LSU (4-3, 2-2 SEC) leaned on Davis-Price and the Tigers' offensive line down the stretch, running the ball on 23 of its final

25 offensive snaps. LSU often employed a six-man front along with first-time-starting tight end Jack Mashburn to create running lanes in the Gators' front seven.

LSU quarterback Max Johnson battled the wind to connect with junior wide receiver Jaray Jenkins for three more touchdowns including a 1-yard score on fourth-and-goal with 3:30 remaining in the contest that gave LSU its final margin. The TD was Johnson's only pass attempt in the fourth quarter.

The sophomore signal caller finished 14-of-24 passing for 133 yards with three touchdowns. He was sacked only

once.

In a final defensive stand, LSU senior linebacker Damone Clark intercepted Florida's Anthony Richardson at the LSU 30-yard line, allowing Davis-Price and the Tigers offense to run out the clock.

Earlier in the contest, sophomore cornerback Dwight McGlothery – who started for the second time in his LSU career – returned an interception 37 yards for a touchdown to put LSU ahead 28-13 only 48 seconds in the second half.

Clark led LSU with 11 tackles, while linebacker Micah Baskerville, safety Cameron Lewis and defensive end BJ Ojulari each had nine.

## LSU, Orgeron part ways

LSU and head football coach Ed Orgeron will part ways at the conclusion of the 2021 season, LSU Director of Athletics Scott Woodward announced on Sunday.

Orgeron, who is in his sixth season as the Tigers' head coach, will coach for the remainder of the 2021 schedule. Since leading LSU to the 2019 national title, Orgeron and the Tigers have gone 9-8, including a 4-3 mark in 2021. Last year, LSU went 5-5, the school's first non-winning season since 1999.

"We have very high standards for all of our sports programs at LSU, and we will stand proudly behind our expectations of competing for SEC and national championships year in and year out," Woodward said. "Our last two

seasons have simply not met that standard, and based on our on-field results and our evaluation of the potential for future immediate success, it is time for a new direction."

Since taking over as head coach of the Tigers four games into the 2016 season, Orgeron has led LSU to a 49-17 mark, with 20 of those victories coming against teams ranked in the Top 25. LSU has beaten 13 Top 10 teams under Orgeron, the second-most of any coach in school history.

Orgeron is the fourth-winningest coach in LSU history trailing only Charles McClendon (137 wins in 18 years), Les Miles (114 wins in 12 years) and Bernie Moore (83 wins in 13 years).
