The reigning Southland Conference champion Southeastern Louisiana University football team's attempt to erase a 20-point halftime deficit came up just short in a 30-24 Southland Conference loss to Lamar on Homecoming Saturday afternoon in Strawberry Stadium.

SLU (0-7, 0-3 SLC) could not overcome four first-half turnovers and a run of 27 straight points by Lamar (4-3, 3-0 SLC) in the first half. Southeastern cut the lead to 30-24 with just over nine minutes left in the contest, but could get no closer.

Zachary Clement (12-for-18, 141 yards, 1 TD) and Eli Sawyer (9-for-16, 210 yards, 1 TD, 2 INT) split time under center for a Lion offense that outgained the visitors, 453-359, but couldn't overcome the minus-4 tally in the turnover margin.

Xavier Hill hauled in four passes for 106 yards to lead

the Lions, while Darius Lewis grabbed four balls for 76 yards and two scores. Clement paced Southeastern with 58 yards on eight carries, while Bauer territory on the ensuing drive. Sharp rushed for his fifth overall touchdown of 2023.

The Lion defense pitched a shutout in the second half, as Ian Conerly-Goodly and Herman Christophe IV each recorded eight tackles apiece. Arlen Williams, Javen Sanchez and Joshua Randall all collected sacks for SLU.

An ordinance supplementing and amending an ordinance adopted on January 14, 2020, authorizing the issuance of Electric Utility Revenue Bonds, Series 2020, of the Town of Vidalia, State of Louisiana; and providing for other matters in connection therewith.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, Louisiana, in regular session duly convened as the governing authority

The proposed Ordinance was previously introduced at the meeting of September 12, 2023; and

After due notice of advertising of this proposed Ordinance in the official journal of this Board on the 27th day of September, 2023, and a public hearing held by the Board on the 10th day of October, 2023, it is hereby ordained and adopted as Ordinance of the Town of Vidalia, Louisiana, that:

WHEREAS, on January 14, 2020, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, State of Louisiana (the "Governing Authority"), the governing authority of the Town of Vidalia, State of Louisiana (the "Issuer"), adopted an ordinance (the "Original Bond Ordinance") authorizing the issuance of \$7,000,000 of Electric Utility Revenue Bonds, Series 2020, of the Issuer (the

WHEREAS, terms used but not otherwise defined herein shall have the meanings given in the Original Bond Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, Concordia Bank & Trust Company (the "Purchaser"), the original purchaser of the Bonds, has heretofore advanced \$4,469,000 of the original principal amount of the Bonds to the Issuer, which amount has been prepaid by the Issuer in accordance with the provisions of the Original Bond

WHEREAS, the Purchaser and the Issuer have agreed to the supplementation and amendment of the Original Bond Ordinance to provide for the manner of advancement and repayment of the remaining \$2,531,000 principal amount of the Bonds which has not heretofore been advanced; and

WHEREAS, this Governing Authority now wishes to supplement and amend the Original Bond Ordinance as set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, State of Louisiana, acting as the governing authority of the Town of Vidalia, State of Louisiana, that:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to the consent of the Purchaser attached hereto as Exhibit A, Bond R-1 of the Bonds, in the original principal amount of \$7,000,000, shall be replaced with Bond R- 2 in the original principal amount of \$2,531,000, which shall be dated the date of delivery thereof. The principal amount of Bond R-2 shall be advanced by the Purchaser to the Issuer on an "as needed" basis at any time until February 1, 2026, for the purposes set forth in the Original Bond Ordinance.

Interest on Bond R-2 will only be payable on the principal amount thereof which shall have been advanced to the Issuer and shall accrue on a particular amount of principal advanced to the Issuer only from the date of its advancement. The unpaid principal of Bond R-2 shall bear interest at the rate

of 3.25% per annum, calculated on the basis of a 360-day year consisting of twelve 30- day months, and shall be payable on each Interest Payment Date, commencing March 1, 2024.

In the event of any such adjustment, the Issuer and the Paying Agent shall agree to a revised maturity schedule of principal installments.

To the extent not previously paid, all principal and interest shall become immediately due and payable by the Issuer to the Owner on the Final

SECTION 2. The following shall be added as defined terms in Section

"Bond Register" means the records kept by the Paying Agent at its designated office in which registration of the Bonds and transfers of the Bonds shall be made as provided herein.

"Outstanding" when used with respect to any Bond or portion thereof means, as of the date of determination, any Bond theretofore issued and delivered under this Ordinance, except:

Any Bond theretofore canceled by the Paying Agent or delivered to the Paying Agent for cancellation;

Any Bond for which payment or redemption sufficient funds or Government Securities, or both, have been theretofore deposited in trust for the owners of such Bond, provided that if such Bond is to be redeemed, irrevocable notice of such redemption has been duly given or provided for pursuant to this Ordinance or waived;

Any Bond in exchange for or in lieu of which another Bond has been registered and delivered pursuant to this Ordinance; and

Any Bond alleged to have been mutilated, destroyed, lost or stolen which has been paid as provided in this Ordinance or by law.

SECTION 3. Section 3 of the Original Bond Ordinance is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

"SECTION 3. Prepayment. Installments of principal of the Bonds shall be callable for prepayment at the option of the Issuer in whole or in part at any time at the principal amount to be prepaid, plus accrued interest on the amount to be prepaid from the most recent Interest Payment Date to which interest has been paid or duly provided for.

The Issuer may designate the principal installments to be prepaid in the event of prepayment of less than all of the outstanding principal of the Bonds.

Any Bond which is to be prepaid only in part shall be surrendered at the designated office of the Paying Agent and such prepayment shall be noted on the prepayment schedule attached thereto. Official notice of such call of any portion of the Bonds for prepayment shall be given by means of firstclass mail, postage prepaid, by notice deposited in the United States mails or via acceptable means of electronic communication not less than five (5) days prior to the prepayment date, addressed to the Owner of such Bond to be prepaid at his address as shown on the Bond Register."

SECTION 4. No Reserve Fund or Contingency Fund shall be required to be maintained with respect to Bond R-2, and accordingly the Original Bond Ordinance is hereby amended to the extent necessary to remove any such

SECTION 5. Upon delivery of Bond R-2, the Paying Agent shall immediately cancel and dispose of Bond R-1. The delivery of Bond R-2 does not constitute a refunding of Bond R-1 but is an amendment to the manner of advancement and repayment of the undrawn principal amount of the Bonds.

SECTION 6. The Executive Officers are hereby empowered, authorized and directed to do any and all things necessary and incidental to carry out all of the provisions of this Ordinance, to cause Bond R-2 to be printed, to issue, execute and seal Bond R-2, and to effect delivery thereof. The proceeds derived from Bond R-2 shall be used only for the purpose for which the Bonds are

SECTION 7. This Ordinance shall be published one time in the official journal of the Issuer; however, it shall not be necessary to publish any exhibits hereto if the same are available for public inspection and such fact is stated in the publication.

SECTION 8. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately and such amendments shall be effective as if initially contained in the Original Bond Ordinance. The provisions of the Original Bond Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect except as specifically supplemented and amended hereby.

During the public hearing Mr. Chad Chandler was asked to come forward to answer questions and address concerns from citizens. Mr. Chandler stated that he owns up to eight (8) lots on North Grove and has invested right at \$600,000.00 in the community, and that the Belle Grove Subdivision is in need of upgrades, and he saw a need for senior housing in the area. Mr. Chandler stated that all of the housing units are IBC Code compliant. President Edwards asked Mr. Chandler if a building inspector determined if the area was prone to flooding or not, Mr. Chandler responded by saying all that he has done was have his engineering firm submit the plans to the sewer, water, and electric companies, and that he was not sure that flooding was applicable to the area because he would not be changing any landscape. President Edwards then asked Mr. Chandler if the Sewer Board had passed a resolution stating if they would connect. Mr. Chandler stated that his engineering firm reached out to the sewer department and they have established when, where, and how to tie into the sewer line. President Edwards then asked if the same study was done with the Water Board, Mr. Chandler stated that they were fine, and they were trying to figure out how what type of meters would be needed. Mr. Chandler stated that he was not aware that he needed an official resolution, and that once he met with the water and sewer districts, they had no issues. Mr. Chandler stated that he has not paid any fees as of now. Water board members were present and stated that they were only presented with plans for only ten (10) housing units, not the additional forty-six (46). Mr. Chandler stated that there were only ten (10) units that he was planning to use for housing. When asked if the units would house immigrants, Mr. Chandler stated that they were for senior citizens, and that they were all code compliant. When concerns arose in reference to the water and sewer lines crossing each other and causing problems with an already overworked system. Mr. Chandler stated that everything was a general layout, and code compliant and that the water and sewer board did not have any issues with his proposed plans. President Edwards stated that without a resolution from the water and sewer boards and an inspection from the State Fire Marshall that the jury could not deny or approve anything at this time. Mr. Chandler stated that this is not an assistant living facility, and that it is strictly for the economic disadvantage elderly people who are having a hard time obtaining affordable, clean, and safe housing.
