The Franklin Parish Police Jury met in Regular Session on Thursday, October 14, 2021 at 5:00 P.M. in the Police Jury Meeting Room, Courthouse Building, located at 6558 Main Street, Winnsboro, LA 71295 with the following present: President James Harris, Vice President Leodis Norman, Chaplain Gary Peters, Juror Ricky Campbell, and Juror David DeBlieux. Juror Keiona Wesby and Juror Rawhide Robinson were unable to attend.

President Harris called the meeting to order, followed by roll call. Juror Peters led the assembly in prayer and the pledge of allegiance. The motion to approve the agenda (omitting item 3 – Executive Session: Discuss the vacant jury seat) and the supplemental agenda (adding agenda item 2 – Blake Kramer FMC Update), was offered by Campbell, seconded by Peters and was passed. The motion to approve both the September 9, 2021 regular meeting and September 23, 2021 special meeting minutes was offered by Norman, seconded by Peters and was passed. President Harris called for nominations to fill the vacant jury seat left by the untimely passing of Juror Rawhide Robinson. Campbell made the nomination of Mr. Howie Robinson. Peters seconded the nomination. Mr. Howie Robinson was unanimously approved for the appointment to the vacant seat for District 6. Ms. Kelly Lafferty provided the jury with the monthly LSU Ag Center update, including the Franklin Parish Quarterly Report. Mr. McManus discussed the Act 119 \$200,000 award through legislation for Dummy Line and WPA roads and the scheduling of the work to be performed. In an attempt to continue the progress of the Capital Improvement roads the jury discussed contracting the hauling of materials. However, that would result in the jury having to rent additional equipment to compete the project due to the equipment the jury is currently leasing and renting is being utilized by the capital improvement crew.

This would result in a reduction of man power for capital improvement crew also. With the end of the year approaching, the equipment rental budget is at the maximum. It was suggested to use cold mix, since the cooler weather doesn't affect the stabilization. The work could be scheduled after the capital improvement projects are complete; without causing extra expense, a reduction of man power and delays of completing scheduled work. Mr. McManus took a moment to commend the capital improvement crew on the astounding job they are doing. At this time, President Harris moved to agenda item 2 of the supplemental agenda. Mr. Blake Kramer provided the jury with an update of what is new and going on at the Franklin Medical Center. FMC is still seeing quite a few cases of COVID-19, but nowhere near the amount as there were weeks ago. The medical center treated it's first dialysis patient. There is a new partnership between FMC and Ochsner for telehealth. Mr. Jimbo Donell was in attendance to ask the jury for assistance in funding (GUM-BO and/or ARPA) for fiber optic cable and the expansion of broadband service for the residents of Franklin Parish. Peters offered the motion to table a decision regarding ARPA fund allocations. Campbell seconded with all voting in agreement. Peters offered the motion to advertise for a program manager to administer the ARPA funds/allocations. Norman seconded with all voting in agreement. Due to Veteran's Day being on the same day as the FPPJ regular November meeting (11/11/2021), Campbell offered the motion to reschedule the November regular meeting to November 15, 2021 at 5:00 p.m. DeBlieux seconded. The motion passed. The employee work schedule for the holidays was voted on as follows: Peters offered the motion to approve employees working till noon on November 23rd and returning on November 29th in observance of Thanksgiving. Campbell seconded with all voting in agreement. Per the suggestion of President Harris, Campbell offered the motion to approve employees working till noon on November 11th and returning on November 15th for observance of Veteran's Day. Peters seconded with all voting in agreement. Campbell offered the motion to approve employees working till noon on December 17th and returning January 3rd in observance of the Christmas and New Year holidays. Peters seconded with all voting in agreement. The jury was advised the Franklin Parish School Board is in favor of redistricting districts 2 and 7 by moving the district line located at Polk Street from district 2 to district 7. Currently the Police Jury and School Board districts are the same and the jury would like to continue the continuity. Campbell offered the motion to follow the Franklin Parish School Board and redistrict the district line between 2 and 7 as discussed. DeBlieux seconded. The motion passed. Agenda item 14 – Beverly Stewart – Courthouse Rd. drainage issue was not discussed. Ms. Stewart contacted the jury office earlier in the day to be removed from the agenda. Agenda item 15 – Rebel Hester – Broken vehicle window, was not discussed due to Ms. Hester not being in attendance. Mr. Joshua Roberts was in attendance to ask the jury to extend the end of Truly Mulkey Rd. 300 ft. Per Mr. Roberts, the road at one time continued straight for an additional 300 feet. The records obtained from E-911 reflect that when the system was established, the road actually curved past address 163 to address 171 which was removed in 2006. Therefore, per their records, the portion discussed is not in their system. The Parish has not been maintaining the road way past 163 Truly Mulkey since 2006. Per parish ordinance, prior to the jury considering to take a road or additional footage of a road into the parish road system, the property owner must make the proposed roadway meet the road criteria as outlined in the Parish Code of Ordinances and a public hearing must be held. Campbell offered the motion to approve holding a public hearing and for the superintendent to go out, take pictures, get an estimate of what improvements need to be made, and let Mr. Roberts know. DeBlieux seconded. The motion passed. Agenda item 17 – Anitria Lawrence – Condition of Bush Rd. and Doyle Rd. was skipped due to Ms. Lawrence not being in attendance. Agenda item 18 – Amber Bordelon – Condition of Robinson Dairy Rd. was not discussed due to Ms. Bordelon not being in attendance. Campbell offered the motion to approve Resolution 752, confirming the election date change from October 9th to November 13th. Peters seconded. The motion passed. The motion to approve Resolution 753 – Looney Canal – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023, was offered by Peters, seconded by Campbell and passed. The motion to approve Resolution 754 – Dr. Rogers Rd. Improvements – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023, was offered by Campbell, seconded by DeBlieux and passed. The motion to approve Resolution 755 – Riley Rd. Improvements – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023, was offered by DeBlieux, seconded by Peters and passed. The motion to approve Resolution 756 – L.D. Knox Rd. Improvements – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023, was offered by Campbell, seconded by DeBlieux and passed. Peters offered the motion to approve Resolution 757 – WPA Rd. Improvements – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023, Campbell seconded with all voting in agreement. Campbell offered the motion to approve Resolution 758 – Dummy Line Rd. Improvements – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023, Peters seconded with all voting in agreement. Campbell offered the motion to approve Resolution 759 – Bayou Macon Cut-Off No. 3 (L.D. Knox) Drainage Improvements FY 2022-2023, Peters seconded. The resolution passed. DeBlieux offered the motion to approve Resolution 760 – Union Church Rd. Improvements – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023, Peters seconded. The motion passed. The motion to approve Resolution 761 – Activity Center – Capital Outlay FY 2022-2023 was offered by Campbell, seconded by Peters and was passed. Campbell offered the motion to approve Resolution 762 – Authorizing Franklin Parish to join the LA Opioid Litigation Memorandum of Understanding, Peters seconded with all voting in agreement. DeBlieux offered the motion to approve Ordinance 3475 – Bridge Load Limits and Closures 2021. Peters seconded the motion. The motion passed. The motion to reappoint Mr. John Guice to another 5-year term on the Franklin Parish Library Board of Control was offered by Campbell, seconded by Peters and was unanimously approved. The motion to reappoint Ms. Jan Hicks and Mr. Paul Price to another 6-year term on the Franklin Parish Medical Center Board was offered by Campbell, seconded by Peters and unanimously passed. Campbell offered the motion to approve the Beer Permit for Jonesy's Track pending payment receipt. DeBlieux seconded. The motion passed. Peters offered the motion to approve submitting to Atty. Kramer the non-responsive nuisance property recipients owning 101 Teats Street, 298 Mock Street and 308 Mock St. for enforcement of penalties and fees for non-compliance. Norman seconded with all voting in agreement. Peters offered the motion to approve the superintendent attending the LPES Fall Conference. Norman seconded. The motion passed. Campbell offered the motion to approve the 6% employer contribution of the superintendent's social security payment to towards a qualified 457 retirement plan. Peters seconded with all voting in agreement. The jury discussed the scheduling of committee meeting during office hours or after hours. Norman offered the motion to continue with scheduling committees on which he and Juror Wesby are members, after hours as to not cause them to miss work. Peters seconded with all voting in agreement. DeBlieux offered the motion to approve Howie Robinson taking Rawhide Robinson's place on committees of which Rawhide was a member. Campbell seconded with all voting in agreement. DeBlieux offered the motion to approve Mr. Aaron White returning to his position on the one-man pothole patcher with his current position as the lowboy driver. There is no rate of pay change associated with this position change. Campbell seconded with all voting in agreement. Campbell offered the motion to approve advertising for a lowboy operator. Peters seconded the motion. The motion passed. Campbell offered the motion to approve the Superintendent's Report, including the Monthly Works Schedule, Work Schedule for Capital Improvement, Monthly Drainage Reports and the Capital Improvement 3-year plan. DeBlieux seconded. The Superintendent's Report was approved. Campbell offered the motion to approve the \$800.00 price increase to the cost of materials. Cost to parish now \$4,113.92. DeBlieux seconded with all voting in agreement. Campbell offered the motion to deny Mr. Ricky Allen's request for road construction in exchange for 4 acres of land. The estimated cost comparison of the cost to construct the road and the value of the property to be donated is as follows: Land = \$30,000.00 / Roadway Construction = \$180,000.00 The cost is not equitable therefore; the jury cannot not approve this proposed request. The cost estimate for the Mercer Street crossing, as approved during the special meeting on September 23rd, is \$11,655.64. DeBlieux offered the motion to send a letter to the Town of Wisner to pay 50% of the total cost. Campbell seconded the motion with all voting in agreement. Peters offered the motion to approve the garbage truck to turnaround at Mr. Steven Reeves home provided that he makes the necessary improvements to the drive for the garbage truck and signs an agreement that any and all maintenance and repairs will be his sole responsibility and will hold harmless the Franklin Parish Police Jury and Waste Connections of any liability for the use of the driveway as a turnaround for the garbage truck. Campbell seconded with all voting in agreement. Norman offered the motion to not consider the adoption of an ordinance which would fine individuals found to have dumped/abandoned live animals (dogs and cats). Peters seconded the motion with all voting in agreement. President Harris provided pictures and spoke to the jury regarding the conditions of George Carroll Rd. "The road is falling part and there are holes everywhere" Harris stated. Harris reported the issue 7 weeks ago, but noting has been done. There is a stretch where the sides are totally gone. Campbell asked how far down is it on the list. The superintendent advised that he could have a crew out to fix the road the next morning and that the guys are working that way. President Harris stated that when an issue is reported that could cause a hazard to the public, he feels those issues should be address immediately and then go back to the normal work schedule. Campbell pointed out that Robinson Dairy Rd. is in just as bad condition and the

members of the road crew are working on it now. Harris agreed that it would be fine if the crew finishes on Robinson Dairy Rd., then move to George Carroll Rd. Harris then spoke to the jury about the condition of Beeler Lake Rd. Three years ago, a pipeline company caused a lot of damage to the road, but never paid the parish the cost for repairing it. Harris and several jurors agreed that getting the repair cost from the pipeline is not going to happen. There are three spots Harris asks to have 610 placed on after the Capital Improvement roads for this year are completed. Peters offered the motion to approve that the superintendent have both George Carroll Rd. and Beeler Lake Road repaired and passable prior to winter. Norman seconded the motion with all voting in agreement. Norman offered the motion to approve asking the Sheriff for additional inmates to help the public works department with mowing and picking up of debris on parish property that are considered nuisance properties, if needed. Peters seconded the motion with all voting in agreement. The motion to approve advertising for the January-June 2022 Material Bids was offered by Campbell, seconded by Peters and passed. Campbell offered the motion to table a decision for the purchase of speed humps to be used in the Abe Lincoln Subdivision until Juror Wesby has a chance to discuss it with the Finance Committee, and to have the asst. secretary/treasurer ask Sheriff Cobb about placing a radar speed sign in the subdivision for the time being. Peters seconded the motion with all voting in agreement. Campbell offered the motion to table a decision on the installation of a security light and possibly light pole on Mary Street / Delta Street until a cost estimate can be obtained from Entergy. DeBlieux second the motion. The motion passed. Covington Sales quoted the parish a price to repair the one-man pothole patcher which was approved by the jury several months ago. Several times during the last few months, parish employees called Covington inquiring as to when the machine would be repaired and if there were additional cost. As of two weeks ago, the verification was made that the quote was an accurate quote and the machine would be ready soon. Upon receiving notice that the machine was ready, the bill exceeded the quote by more than six thousand dollars. Norman offered the motion to send a letter to Covington Sales advising that the parish will only pay for the unauthorized parts since they were actually put on the machine, but will not pay the additional labor. Peters seconded with all voting in agreement. The motion to table selecting a new drainage foreman was offered by Campbell, seconded by Peters and was passed. The motion to re-advertise for an excavator operator was offered by Campbell, seconded by Peters and passed. The motion to make a decision on how much longer the seasonal employee, who is operating a bush hog, will be needed was offered by Peters, seconded by Campbell and was passed. The jury will revisit this during the November regular meeting. Campbell offered the motion to approve Mr. Jake Freeman to a recent vacancy on the courthouse maintenance crew. DeBlieux seconded the motion with all voting in agreement. The treasurer provided the jury with the budget vs actual budgets for all accounts along with several proposed budget amendment. Peters offered the motion to approve the Treasurer's Report as presented and all proposed budget amendments. Norman seconded with all voting in agreement. The following was included in the juror meeting packages under "Letters of Interest": Thankyou letter from Ms. Pleasant for the work done on Lena Rd., Region 5 Police Jury Association Meeting Invitation, Waste Connections projected CPI (Consumer Price Index) going into effect November 1, 2021, and Sanctuary Parish Resolution samples. Campbell offered the motion to adjourn. DeBlieux seconded with all voting in agreement. Campbell withdrew his motion due to one item on the supplemental agenda not having been discussed. Campbell offered the motion to approve advertising for engineering services related to ARPA funds. DeBlieux seconded. The motion passed. With there being no further business to address, Campbell offered the motion to adjourn. DeBlieux seconded. The meeting was adjourned.

The Franklin Parish Police Jury met in Special Session on Thursday, October 21, 2021 at 6:00 P.M. in the Police Jury Meeting Room, Courthouse Building, located at 6558 Main Street, Winnsboro, LA 71295 with the following present: President James Harris, Vice President Leodis Norman, Chaplin Gary Peters, Juror Keiona Wesby (6:06), Juror Howie Robinson, and Juror David DeBlieux. Juror Ricky Campbell was unable to attend.

President Harris called the meeting to order, followed by roll call. Chaplin Gary Peters led the assembly in prayer and the pledge of allegiance. The motion to approve the agenda was offered by DeBlieux, seconded by Peters with all voting in acclamation. President Harris asked to skip to agenda item 4 – Road and Bridge Budget. President Harris called for short recess. President Harris resumed the meeting. The Secretary Treasurer discussed the need for real numbers for all materials needed and projects the jury intends to complete this year. As well as, their plans for 2022, so budgets can be completed and approved at the November meeting. Budget amendments were needed for maintenance gravel and # 57 rock. After a brief discussion, Superintendent Thornton advised the jury that the majority of the remaining work for the remaining of the year could be done with 610 instead of #57 rock. Peters offered the motion to remove \$10,000 from Materials and Supplies (4200300), add \$7,000 to Reg. Maintenance Gravel (4200431), and add \$3,000 to Reg. Maintenance 610 (4200428). Norman seconded the motion with all voting in agreement. Juror Norman discussed the sewage conditions of the Washington Park Subdivision and the communities need for the Greater Washington Sewer to be rehabilitated. The system services 40 homes and the Nolan Norman Park. The jury agrees that the system is in need of upgrading. Juror Norman will be working with the owner(s) of the sewer system to make the system applicable for the remaining \$951,539.00 American Rescue Plan Act year one funding. The motion to approve the allocations of the ARPA funds allocated to Franklin Parish in the following manner was offered by Wesby, seconded by Peters and was unanimously approved.

Early Notice and Public Review of a Proposed Activity in a 100-Year Floodplain or Wetland

To: All interested Agencies, Groups and Individuals

This is to give notice that Louisiana Office of Community Development (LA OCD) under Part 58 has determined that the following proposed action under Statewide Federal Assistance for Homeowner Recovery Programs may be located in the 100-year floodplain and or wetland, and LA OCD will be identifying and evaluating practicable alternatives to locating the action in the floodplain/wetland and the potential impacts on the floodplain/wetland from the proposed action, as required by Executive Order 11988 and/ or 11990, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands. The LA OCD is proposing to implement programs to assist homeowners and rental unit owners and tenants that have been and continue to be affected by disasters. These applicants and intended recipients of current or upcoming programs are homeowners and rental unit owners/tenants who are at various stages of rehabilitating residences in existing locations or relocating. These grants provide for construction financing activities in addition to any previous federal loans or funds received in order to provide assistance to eligible homeowners to rebuild and re-occupy their homes and rental units or participate in buyout and relocation programs with the goals of rebuilding neighborhoods, reducing blight, mitigating against future storms and increasing overall resiliency. For consideration, the scope of the proposed construction-related activities will consist of either major or minor rehabilitation, reconstruction, elevation or demolition within the original footprint of each damaged structure or developed lot. Under the buyout option, properties with pre-existing structures may be retained as greenspace following demolition with homeowners relocated to more resilient areas. In some cases, new construction or elevation may be required with potential expansion beyond or outside of the footprint of the original structure and utilities. The proposed project is located across various residential properties in up to all 64 parishes of Louisiana.

In accordance with Executive Order 11988, LA OCD has determined that the pro-
