# LSU hoops sign Thomas

LSU Coach Will Wade an-  
nounced on Monday that the  
LSU Athletics Department has  
received and approved national  
letter-of-intent papers from five-  
star guard Cameron Thomas of  
Chesapeake, Virginia.  
Thomas, a 6-4 guard plays for  
Oak Hill Academy in Mouth of  
Wilson, Virginia. He is listed at  
No. 18 in the ESPN 100 for 2020  
and as the No. 4 shooting guard  
in the country. 247sports has him  
listed at No. 25 in the country and  
the No. 6 shooting guard for  
2020. So far in the 2019-20 sea-  
son, he is averaging 32.5 points a  
game shooting 57.1 percent from  
the floor and 44.2 percent from  
the arc with a high of 45 points  
against Bristol Prep of Tennessee.  
Thomas is averaging 3.7 assists  
and 3.6 steals per game this sea-  
son.  
"Cameron Thomas is the best  
scorer in the country and also has  
a great ability to make plays for  
others on the court," said Coach  
Will Wade.

# Chase earns honor

LSU's record-setting wide re-  
ceiver Ja'Marr Chase has been  
selected as the Southeastern Con-  
ference Offensive Player of the  
Week for his performance in the  
58-37 win over Ole Miss on Sat-  
urday in Oxford, the league of-  
fice announced on Monday.  
Chase, a sophomore from  
Rummel High School in  
Metairie, La., became LSU's sin-  
gle-season leader in touchdown  
receptions on Saturday with 13,  
moving past Dwayne Bowe, who  
had held the previous mark of 12  
since 2006.  
Chase was part of an LSU of-  
fense that racked up 714 total  
yards against the Rebels, which  
is the second-highest total in  
school history and the most ever  
for the Tigers in a conference  
game. The 714 yards also ranks  
as the third-highest total in  
league history in a game featur-  
ing two SEC teams.

# LSU outscores Rebs

Joe Burrow set LSU's single-  
season passing record and tossed  
five touchdowns, as top-ranked  
LSU built a 31-7 halftime lead  
and held off Ole Miss, 58-37, on  
Saturday evening at Vaught-  
Hemingway Stadium.  
Burrow, LSU's senior quarter-  
back, completed 32-of-42 passes  
for a career-best 489 yards to give  
the Tigers a 10th win in 2019. In  
the process, he broke Rohan  
Davey's 2001 yardage record  
(3,347) and stands at 3,687  
through 10 games.  
LSU (10-0, 6-0 SEC) returns  
home to face Arkansas on Nov.  
23 at 6 p.m. with a chance to se-  
cure a berth in the Dec. 7 SEC  
Championship game with a victo-  
ry.  
Burrow, who had the second-  
most yards in game in LSU history,  
saw his favorite targets -  
wide receivers Ja'Marr Chase and  
Justin Jefferson - each eclipse  
1,000 yards on the season during  
the contest. The duo became the  
third in SEC history to reach the  
milestone, joining LSU's Jarvis  
Landry and Odell Beckham Jr. in  
2013, and Florida's Jabar Gaffney  
and Reche Caldwell in 2001.  
Burrow completed a school-  
record 17-straight passes - includ-  
ing his last 16 of the first half - for  
244 yards.  
Chase caught eight passes for  
227 yards - fourth-most in LSU  
history - and became the first  
Tiger to record three-straight 100-  
yard games since Michael Clay-  
ton in 2003. With three  
touchdowns tonight, Chase set  
LSU's single-season record with 13.  
Jefferson had a team-high nine  
catches for 112 yards with two  
touchdowns, while tight end  
Thaddeus Moss added five  
catches for 63 yards.  
Running back Clyde Edwards-  
Helaire added his third-straight  
100-yard game with career-best  
172 yards on 23 carries with a  
touchdown.  
LSU's 714 yards of total of-  
fense is its second-most in pro-  
gram history and most against an  
SEC opponent. The most by LSU  
was 746 against Rice in 1977.  
The teams combined for 1,328  
yards, third most in an SEC game  
in history.  
Ole Miss's John Ryes Plumlee  
had a school quarterback rushing  
record with 212 yards, scoring  
four touchdowns on the ground.  
He finished 9-of-16 passing for  
123 yards with an interception.  
Rebels running back Jerri-  
on Ealy added 141 rushing yards on  
13 carries. Ole Miss' top receiver  
was Elijah Moore who had nine  
catches for 143 yards with a  
touchdown.  
Ole Miss had 614 yards of total  
office, 212 through the air and  
402 on the ground. However, the  
Rebels were only 2-of-11 on third  
down and 1-of-4 on fourth down.  
Ole Miss won the coin toss and  
deferred its decision until the sec-  
ond half. LSU took the opening  
kickoff, defending the north end  
zone.  
After crossing midfield with a  
pair of first downs, Burrow fired  
passes of 13 and 34 yards to

Chase to put the first points on  
the board for LSU. Burrow  
scrambled right, split two rushers  
and hit Chase in stride at the 3-  
yard line to complete a seven-  
play, 75-yard opening scoring  
drive. LSU led 7-0 with 12:56 to  
play in the first quarter.  
A 30-yard pass from Ole Miss  
starting quarterback John Ryes  
Plumlee allowed the Rebels to  
cross midfield, but consecutive  
incomplete passes from the LSU  
21 led to a 38-yard missed field  
goal by Ole Miss' Luke Logan.  
LSU returned the favor on the  
ensuing drive, as Burrow came  
up short on third-and-3, and Cade  
York missed a 48-yard field goal  
just outside the right upright.  
Following an Ole Miss punt  
from midfield, Burrow completed  
all six of his passes for 72 yards,  
breaking the LSU single-season  
passing yards record on an 18-  
yard pass to Chase to the Ole  
Miss 4. Burrow broke Rohan  
Davey's mark of 3,347 set in 2001.  
On the next play, Davis-Price  
ran over left guard for the touch-  
down that put the Tigers ahead  
14-0 with 1:22 left in the quarter.  
Ole Miss punted on the first  
play of the quarter after a three-  
and-out drive that ended the first  
quarter. Burrow needed only two  
passes to Chase to extend the  
Tigers advantage to 21-0. From  
the LSU 49, Burrow again rolled  
to his right to avoid pressure and  
lofted a 51-yard touchdown pass  
to Chase.  
The Rebels punted again from  
inside LSU territory, giving Bur-  
row and the Tigers an opportunity  
for a 28-0 lead. A 32-yard pass to  
tight end Racey McMath along  
with a personal foul on the Ole  
Miss bench put the Tigers at the  
Ole Miss 26. Three plays later,  
Burrow found Jefferson on a  
screen pass to his left, and the  
speedy receiver took it the rest of  
the way for a 12-yard touchdown.  
A 46-yard run by Ole Miss'  
Ealy to the LSU 26 put the Rebels  
in position for its first score. On  
second-and-goal from the 5,  
Plumlee took a quarterback  
keeper to the end zone to cut  
LSU's advantage to 28-7 with  
5:40 left in the quarter.  
The Tigers used almost the en-  
tire duration of the half on a 13-  
play, 63-yard drive, but Burrow  
was sacked on third-and-goal  
from the Ole Miss 6 and LSU left  
with a 33-yard field goal by York.  
LSU led at halftime, 31-7, as  
Burrow was 22-of-24 passing for  
319 yards and three touchdowns.  
Ole Miss used a 29-yard pass to  
tight end Octavious Cooley and a  
46-yard read-option by Plumlee  
to get eight points closer to the  
Tigers only 31 seconds in the sec-  
ond half. Following Plumlee's  
run, the Rebels QB completed a  
two-point conversion pass to cut  
the margin to 31-15 with 14:29  
left in the third quarter.  
LSU answered with a 17-play,  
66-yard drive that took 6:10 off  
the clock. However, the Tigers  
were again forced to accept a  
short field goal by York, whose  
27-yard boot was true. LSU  
pushed its advantage to 34-15.

For the second time in as many  
second-half drives, Ole Miss  
scored in two plays. A 15-yard  
run by Ealy setup a 60-yard  
keeper by Plumlee that cut LSU's  
lead to 34-23 following another  
two-point run by Plumlee.  
LSU used only 56 seconds to  
answer the score, as Edwards-  
Helaire topped 100 rushing yards  
on the evening with a 20-yard run  
to begin the Tigers march. Bur-  
row then connected with Jeffer-  
son for 48 and 7 yards for a  
touchdown, giving LSU a 41-23  
lead with 6:50 left in quarter.  
An interception by LSU safety  
Kary Vincent Jr. was returned 40  
yards to the Ole Miss 24. But a  
sack of Burrow forced LSU to at-  
tempt a 52-yard field goal, and  
York was successful.  
The teams traded turnovers to  
start the quarter, as Ole Miss gave  
it to LSU when a fourth-and-5  
run by Plumlee was stuffed by  
Patrick Queen and Ray Thornton.  
Then, LSU gave it back when  
Burrow threw an interception to  
Keidron Smith along the right  
sideline at the LSU 35.  
On the Rebels' first play, Plum-  
lee scored fourth rushing touch-  
down of the game from 35 yards.  
Following a Burrow intercep-  
tion at the Ole Miss 16, Ole Miss  
entered LSU territory on an off-  
side penalty against LSU line-  
backer K'Lavon Chaisson.

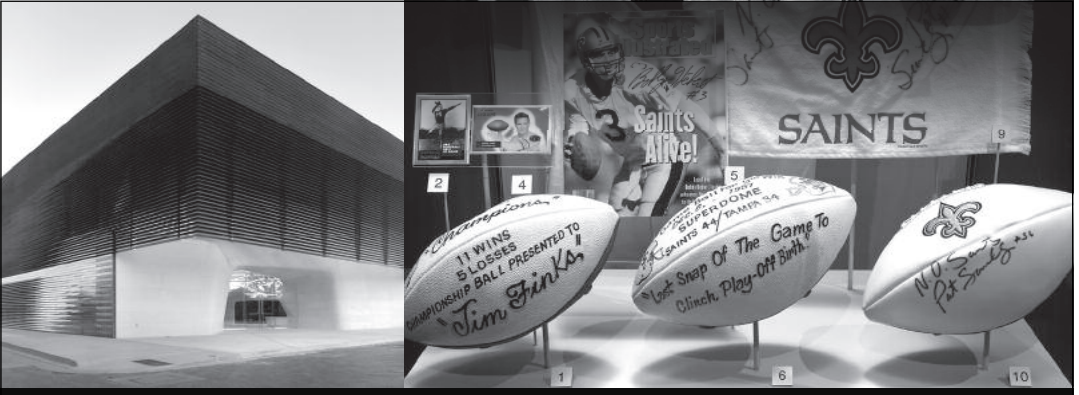


VIDALIA’S DEVIN GREEN runs for yardage against Many

The Police Jury of Concordia Parish met this day in regular session convened. There were present the following members:

1) Invocation, pledge, and roll call of members

2) A motion was made by Mr. Shirley seconded by Mr. Probst to approve the minutes of the regular meeting of October 14, 2019 as mailed. Mo-tion carried.

3) A Finance Committee Meeting was held on October 24, 2019 to re-view the third quarter budget. Modifications were made to adjust for ac-tual expenditures and receivables that have occurred and plan to occur f-or the remainder of the year. A motion was made by Mr. Shirley to adopt the amended budget and approve the transfer of \$250 to the Witness & Juror Fund from the General Fund. The motion was seconded by Mr. Probst and carried unanimously.

4) The Finance Committee had also reviewed a quote needed for additional repairs to the chiller. A motion was made by Mr. Probst seconded by Mr. Parker to approve the quote in the amount of \$3,167.19 to Trane for chiller repairs. Motion carried unanimously.

5) Resolution 19-026 was offered. The resolution supported the coordination of Concordia Parish to work with the Kisatchie Delta Regional Planning District in co-ordination with the Rapides Area Planning Commission as it pertains to Region II of the Watershed Initiative. A motion was made by Mr. Parker and seconded by Mr. Cook to adopt the resolution. Motion carried unanimously. (See addendum for Res-olution 19-026.)

6) Projects of the Parish were next discussed.

Brushy Bayou: The wetland funding from Phase II to Phase I was finally moved by FEMA to move forward with wetland credit mitigation and purchase to ob-tain the 404 permit. Right of ways and easements once again must be revised based on the requirements of the FEMA and GOHSEP office to include permission for EHP review on these sites. A revised CEA with the Fifth Levee District is also being reviewed.

Courtroom Renovations: Courtroom renovations are on schedule. Wilmar Construction has completed demolition and are working on installing the new com-ponents. The project is scheduled to be completed by January 31, 2020.

Washington Heights: The Parish received notice from the Delta Regional Au-thority for the awarding of the DRA-SEDAP funds in which to offset the cost overrun. We are waiting on the notice to proceed from DRA to move forward with the project.

Vidalia Canal: Methods and companies are still being researched to pro-vide both the chemicals and spraying techniques needed to kill the aquatic grass in the canals. A motion was made by Mr. Dunbar, seconded by Mr. Parker to advertise for vegetation management and aquatic grass applying. Motion carried unani-mously.

7) Ordinance Violations of the parish were next discussed. A motion was made by Mr. Shirley seconded by Mr. Parker to cite the following properties: 304 Audubon Acres, the lot adjoining 438 Eagle Road, property on Concordia Park be-longing to Mr. Ben Harris Jr., lot behind trailer bearing an address of 261 Freeman Road. Motion carried unanimously.

8) Under the Secretary/Treasurer's report, Ms. Burley announced that the proposed 2020 budget should be completed soon for the Finance Committee to re-view. Ms. Burley reminded the Jurors that the next meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 11th due to Veteran's Day. During the Finance Committee meeting, roads that were not listed on the Disaster Recovery damages were discussed. Of the four roads reviewed and the allocations needed, the Finance Committee had re-viewed and agreed that Eagle Road be submitted for FP&C grant funding for road rehabilitation.

9) No occupational licenses were submitted for approval.

10) Superintendent's Work Orders were next discussed. Under work orders, a motion was made by Mr. Cook seconded by Mr. Parker and carried unanimously to approve the following:  
Pitrun – 7 yards – Shady Acres; 20 yards Magoun Road  
Maintenance Gravel – 15 yards Sunrise; 15 yards McMillin Road; 30 yards Sanders  
Mr. Probst asked that the bus turnaround on Rokofee be repaired. Mr. Dun-bar asked that the culvert on Freeman Road be looked at and road repairs were needed due to numerous potholes. Rountree needs asphalt repair on the side en-trances where the road is breaking off. Mr. Guillory asked for more limestone to do repair work with the rainy season coming. Mr. Parker asked for limb pickup in the Lake St. John area off of Hwy 568 and Hwy 569; and the Mooselodge area. He also asked for a culvert clean out on Anderson Road, gravel needed on Edmond James, work needed on Vleecama and the ditch behind Jones Street needs to be cleaned out. Motion carried unanimously.

11) Work orders completed since the last meeting were reviewed. No action taken.

12) Under correspondence, Mr. Bill Beasley addressed the Jurors. Mr. Beasley and Mr. Brant Jones with Jordan, Kaiser, and Sessions conducted a survey and study of the rock pile weir on Little Cross Bayou that runs through the Bayou Cocodrie National Wildlife Refuge. Mr. Beasley explained that the weir was placed there by the USACE in the 1950s. In 2015, the Wildlife and Fisheries built up the rock pile an additional 3 feet in which to cross with equipment. After reviewing aerial photo and results from the survey, the rock bed was built up again around 2017. The data on the weir shows that the rock pile should be at 34 feet. Currently the it stands approximately 4 feet higher than designed preventing proper drainage. This canal is responsible for 34% or 110 square miles of parish drainage. A motion was made by Mr. Dunbar seconded by Mr. Parker to send the WLF a letter to reduce the rock pile back to the originally designed 34 feet. Due to the urgency of having this completed before the rainy season, the WLF will have 14 days from the notice to correct the problem. If the problem is not corrected, then the Parish will lower the rock pile and bill the WLF accordingly for all costs incurred. Motion carried unani-mously.
