said. "When I played at Ferriday I tried to look off my receiver. If I see a quarterback staring down a receiver before the snap I know where he's going."

The 6-foot-2, 188-pound Williams played in 10 games last year as a freshman, collecting 12 tackles with six assists, recovering a fumble, grabbing an interception and breaking up three passes.

Williams had a team-high three interceptions this pasty season and nine passes broken up to lead a talented defensive secondary.

Williams collected 27 tackles with one tackle for loss.

Williams had a two-interception game against Independence and a huge interception in a 34-27 win at No. 2 Iowa Western on September 7. Williams had a season-high four

passes broken up against Highland on October 5 and he posted a season-high five tackles in the Salt City Bowl victory over Monroe College.

The 2019 Blue Dragons finished the season 10-2 after a Salt City Bowl victory over Monroe College on Saturday and finished No. 3 in Monday's final NJCAA Rankings.

"I would not have been able to tell you that Ronald would have that kind of season," Davis said. "But his demeanor and that Ferriday nastiness paid off for him. He played harder than a lot of kids he faced. He would show up and play hard every time the ball was snapped. He would grind the whole time and that's what has him being recruited to play in places like the SEC."

Williams knows being moved to defensive

back has been a true blessing.

"Being 6-foot-2 at receiver is not that big a deal," Williams said. "Being 6-2 at cornerback is."

Williams said he is taking courses on line.

"It's something I did at Hutchinson, so I was used to it," he said.

And as for working out on his own until the time comes to return to the field?

"It's all about having the right mindset," he said. "It's like the NFL. They have to work out on their own and do what is expected of them."

Williams is grateful he got to meet some of his current teammates before everything was shut down.

"They are my brothers," he said. "I'm looking forward to being with them again."

Peterson, Mathieu on NFL team

Former LSU football greats Patrick Peterson and Tyrann Mathieu have been named to the NFL All-Decade Team for the 2010s.

Peterson and Mathieu, both All-America defensive backs at LSU, were among 52 players along with two head coaches named to the 2010s All-Decade Team.

Peterson, drafted No. 5 overall in the 2011 NFL Draft, has played his entire pro career with the Arizona Cardinals, earning first team All-Pro honors on three occasions and being selected to the Pro Bowl eight times. Peterson has started 138 games in his career, recording 25 interceptions, 438 tackles and 10 tackles for loss. He's also scored five touchdowns, including an NFL-best four in punt returns for scores as a rookie in 2011.

Mathieu, who helped Kansas City win Super Bowl LV in February, had four interceptions and 89 total tackles for the World Champion Chiefs in 2019. During his seven-year NFL career Mathieu has 25 interceptions and 472 tackles.

Mathieu has twice been named first team All-Pro and has made one appearance in the Pro Bowl. Peterson and Mathieu were both national award winners at LSU with Peterson claiming the Bednarik and Thorpe Awards.

Notice is hereby given out of an abundance of caution, pursuant to Article IV, Section 21(D)(1) of the Louisiana Constitution, that on March 26, 2020 Entergy Louisiana, LLC ("ELL"), an electric public utility providing retail electric service to customers in fifty-eight (58) parishes of the State of Louisiana, filed with the Louisiana Public Service Commission ("LPSC"), its Formula Rate Plan Rider Schedule FRP Interim Update and workpapers, including the final estimated first-year revenue requirement for Lake Charles Power Station. The filing reflects the resulting interim Formula Rate Plan ("FRP") factors necessary to recover the revenue requirement associated with the placement in service of Lake Charles Power Station. After accounting for that revenue requirement and other adjustments required by the FRP, the net increase in FRP rates will be \$102.598 million. Except for those rate schedules excluded under ELL Rider Schedule FRP-1, the required interim FRP factor of 48.4307% is to be applied to each of Legacy ELL's rate classes and the required interim FRP factor of 50.5144% is to be applied to each of Legacy EGSL's rate classes, both effective for monthly customer bills rendered on and after the first billing cycle of April 2020.

It is estimated that the adjustment in rates will have the following effects upon applicable Legacy ELL customers' typical monthly bills (based on the Fuel Adjustment Clause and other riders for the month of March 2020): a typical monthly bill for a Residential customer using 1,000 kWh would increase approximately \$3.02, from \$91.79 to \$94.81; a typical monthly bill for a Small General Service customer using 50 kW and 12,500 kWh would increase approximately \$42.69, from \$1,269.34 to \$1,312.03; a typical monthly bill for a Large General Service customer using 1,000 kW and 500,000 kWh would increase approximately \$966.25, from \$32,891.80 to \$33,858.05.

It is estimated that the adjustment in rates will have the following effects upon applicable Legacy EGSL customers' typical monthly bills (based on the Fuel Adjustment Clause and other riders for the month of March 2020): a typical monthly bill for a Residential customer using 1,000 kWh would increase approximately \$3.00, from \$90.91 to \$93.91; a typical monthly bill for a Small General Service customer using 1,500 kWh would increase approximately \$6.22, from \$177.37 to \$183.59; a typical monthly bill for a General Service customer using 500 kW and 255,500 kWh would increase approximately \$459.19, from \$15,957.26 to \$16,416.45.

Invocation by Glenn Womack
Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll Call, Alderwoman Bolyer here, Alderwoman Humphries here, Alderwoman Barrett, here. Mayor we have a quorum.
Public Comments – None

Alderwoman Bolyer made a motion to move Mr. Womack up on the agenda, 2nd by Humphries. Motion passed all in favor.
Mr. Womack discussed the options for emergency connection to Ferriday. Pictures were shown of the plants old equipment. The plant was designed for 150 homes and we have 241. The plant has been limping along. It works today and not tomorrow. There is no consistency in what we have. You can buy chemicals but you can't keep pushing them thru worn out filters. I've just brought some information of figures. Mr. Womack read the different options. See Attachment of options. There is nothing else we can do the plant is worn out. It's not human error and there is not a lot we can do with it. Engineer Keith Capdepon stated LGAP would not reimburse town for monies spent for emergency tie in. Mr. Tony Matlock from USDA stated a loan would have to be taken out for the emergency tie in to Ferriday and that the Village could pay back the loan with the USDA loan grant money. This would be for emergency not all of the work. The line is part of the project. They discussed the rate but it can't be determined without a rate study. Mayor discussed the emergency tie in would cost \$129,000 estimated cost. Mr. Matlock stated that we could borrow the money for a tie in and if we get the LGAP money it could be used to pay it off. Now if you don't get the LGAP grant and use the loan for just a tie in then you would be in trouble. You know that you are going to do the project so I would not use the USDA loan for the emergency tie in. Mayor asked since it's below \$150,000 could it be a quote or bid off. Mr. Matlock said yes it could be a quote but of course the same contract guidelines and standards would be required. The mayor and board discussed all the money spent on the plant and the age of the equipment the maintenance problems and not keeping the maintenance up on the plant. Mayor states that they would discuss it and get back to them about it.

Motion made to approve minutes by made by Humphries, 2nd by Bolyer, nay made by Barrett. Motion passed 2 yeas one nay.

Motion made by Bolyer to approve financials, 2nd by Humphries all in yeas. So passed.

Motion made by Humphries, 2nd by Bolyer, to approve clerks financial all yeas. So passed.

Mayors report – Christmas Caroling. I was contacted by Tab Harris. Tab do you want to tell us how you've got it set up. Tab – What we're going to do is meet at the park and we are going to go caroling with Santa around Ridgcrest. Where you able to find out if we can use the firetruck? Public Comment for agenda items only timed for 3 minutes.
Deb Varnado. Asked about salary ordinance. Mayor explained ordinance. No other questions comment period closed.

Approval of minutes. Motion made by Humphries, 2nd Bolyer. Minutes approved.

Approval of financials for November 2019, Jerri Sue's. Motion by Humphries 2nc by Bolyer. Financials approved.

Approval of clerks financial report for December 2019. Motion made by Bolyer, Humphries ask about outside service. Clerk states that's JCP. 2nd by Humphries motion carries.

Mayors Report – Ditches. In between these 2 big rains the first rain we went in behind it and cleaned some of the culverts and done what we could. It helped but it wasn't enough. I got quotes from 2 different contractors to clean ditches down from Grape St. to bridge and that includes part of Vidalia, part of Ferriday Dr. all of Grape all of Oak and all of Pecan. Quote from Curtis Wrecker Service is \$46,588.88 the 2nd quote came in at from Cameo, Mike Grantham's company came in at \$36,951.70. I would like to take these under advisement right now. Bolyer advise them in the trash. Varnado wanted to know what they were going to do for that amount of money dig it out etc. Mayor-Everything, I knew we could not afford this so I checked on this today. The Mayor of Ferriday has agreed to loan us there culvert cleaner and their backhoe. We will have to pay for the diesel fuel and backhoe operator's salary while he is here. It has to be on a Saturday and Sunday so that it doesn't interrupt their operations. She said she was glad to help the Village of Ridgcrest. Mayor-explained the operation of equipment that would be needed also that we would have to get the major disruptions of water flow then eventually get everybody's culverts. Discussion of previous cleaning of ditches by Police Jury. Money to come out of Public Works.

Agreed to send certified letter to Police Jury about fixing bridge. 3rd letter sending it certified. Bolyer made motion to send certified letter 2nd by Humphries. Motion passed.

Mayor – discussed police computer crashing and getting a new CPU tower for police and getting prices for a new one for water billing. Discussed new camera system to be installed. Discussed the possibility of getting a portable building to store all records in at city hall. 3 prices an 8 X 10 is \$1550 a 10 X 12 is \$2195.00 a 10 X 16 is \$2495. Stop sign on Happy Lane is really, really low I don't know why but it is. The fire hydrants just basically spring cleanup that hasn't been done in a really long time. The ditches a lot of it we'll have to wait and see what goes on with the ditches. Mayor- yes we're going to get as much as we can, the stripping up here Felton is already aware of it he's waiting for the rain to pass. Discussed more about events they want to do and spring cleanup. Make sure the park is cleaned up before Easter. Mayor talks about getting with Fire Chief a painting the fire hydrants and that would help us with our rating.

Mayor pro-tempore elected. Bolyer makes motion for Humphries, Humphries 2nd, motion passes, Humphries mayor pro-tempore for 1 year.

Beer licenses for Sportsman's One Stop. Motion made by Bolyer 2nd by Humphries motion passes.
