



## Miami still ahead of Ohio St. in BCS

BUCKEYES ASSURED  
OF AT LEAST SECOND-PLACE  
IN FINAL BCS POLL

Ohio State may be headed for the BCS national title game in the Fiesta Bowl, but Miami still sits atop the Bowl Championship Series standings.

The defending national champion Hurricanes increased their lead over the Buckeyes to 1.32 points Monday from the slimmest margin of 0.01 points last week when they moved ahead of Ohio State for the first time.

Miami, ranked No. 1 in the AP media and coaches' polls, has 2.89 points, 0.80 points better

than last week's total. Ohio State has 4.21 points, with Oklahoma moving up to third with 9.09 points.

The Buckeyes (13-0) completed their regular season with a 14-9 victory over Michigan on Saturday. As one of only two unbeaten teams remaining — Miami (10-0) is the other — Ohio State assured itself of at least a second-place finish when the final BCS standings are released Dec. 8.

The top two teams in the final rankings head to Tempe, Ariz., for the Fiesta Bowl on Jan. 3.

If the Hurricanes win their final games against Syracuse (4-7) on Saturday and Virginia Tech (8-3) on Dec. 7, they will play the Buckeyes for the national championship.

A loss by Miami, and Oklahoma (10-1) stands

the best chance of the one-loss teams to move into the title game. The Sooners, who beat Texas Tech 60-15, benefited most by Washington State's 29-26 triple overtime loss to Washington. The Cougars tumbled to eighth from third in the latest BCS standings.

Ohio State dropped farther behind Miami primarily because of Washington State's loss. The Buckeyes only received a 0.3 bonus-point deduction for an earlier win over the Cougars. Last week, the deduction was 0.8.

Miami, after a 28-21 win over Pittsburgh on Thursday night, was first in five of the seven computer polls and its computer average dropped to 1.17 from 1.33. The Hurricanes also saw their strength of schedule rank improve — to 0.72 from 1.36.

The BCS formula uses the AP media and coach-

es' polls, computer polls, strength of schedule, won-loss record and a bonus-point system.

Miami has 2.89 points — 1 for poll average, 1.17 for computer-rank average, 0.72 for strength of schedule, zero for losses and no bonus-point deduction.

Ohio State has 4.21 points — 2 for poll average, 1.67 for computer-rank average, 0.84 for strength of schedule and a 0.3 bonus-point deduction.

While the Sooners are next in line to move up, other teams looking for help are No. 4 Georgia (10.07), No. 5 Iowa (12.43), No. 6 USC (13.37) and No. 7 Notre Dame (13.83).

The Fighting Irish (10-1) are guaranteed a spot in a BCS bowl if they finish in the top six of the final BCS standings. Notre Dame is at USC (9-2) on Saturday.

## Nebraska kicker arrested

**OMAHA** — Nebraska place-kicker Josh Brown has been arrested on suspicion of driving under the influence.

Brown was stopped at 1:12 a.m. CST Sunday morning on the west side of Omaha, Nebraska State Patrol spokeswoman Terri Teuber said Monday. She had no additional information.

Nebraska coach Frank Solich was looking into the matter and had not decided whether to take disciplinary action against Brown, sports information director Chris Anderson said.

Backup place-kicker Sandro DeAngelis is out for the season with a foot injury, meaning junior walk-on Dale Endorf likely would handle the kicking duties if Brown is suspended.

Brown was suspended at the start of last season after he was convicted of misdemeanor assault after fighting with another student who was out with his ex-girlfriend.

In the final game of the 2000 season, Brown kicked a 29-yard field goal as the clock ran out to lift Nebraska to a 34-32 win over Colorado.

The Cornhuskers finish the regular season Friday with a home game against No. 13 Colorado.

## Huskers hold 'solid' practice

**LINCOLN** — The Nebraska football team began game-week preparations for Colorado with a two-hour practice in full pads Monday afternoon.

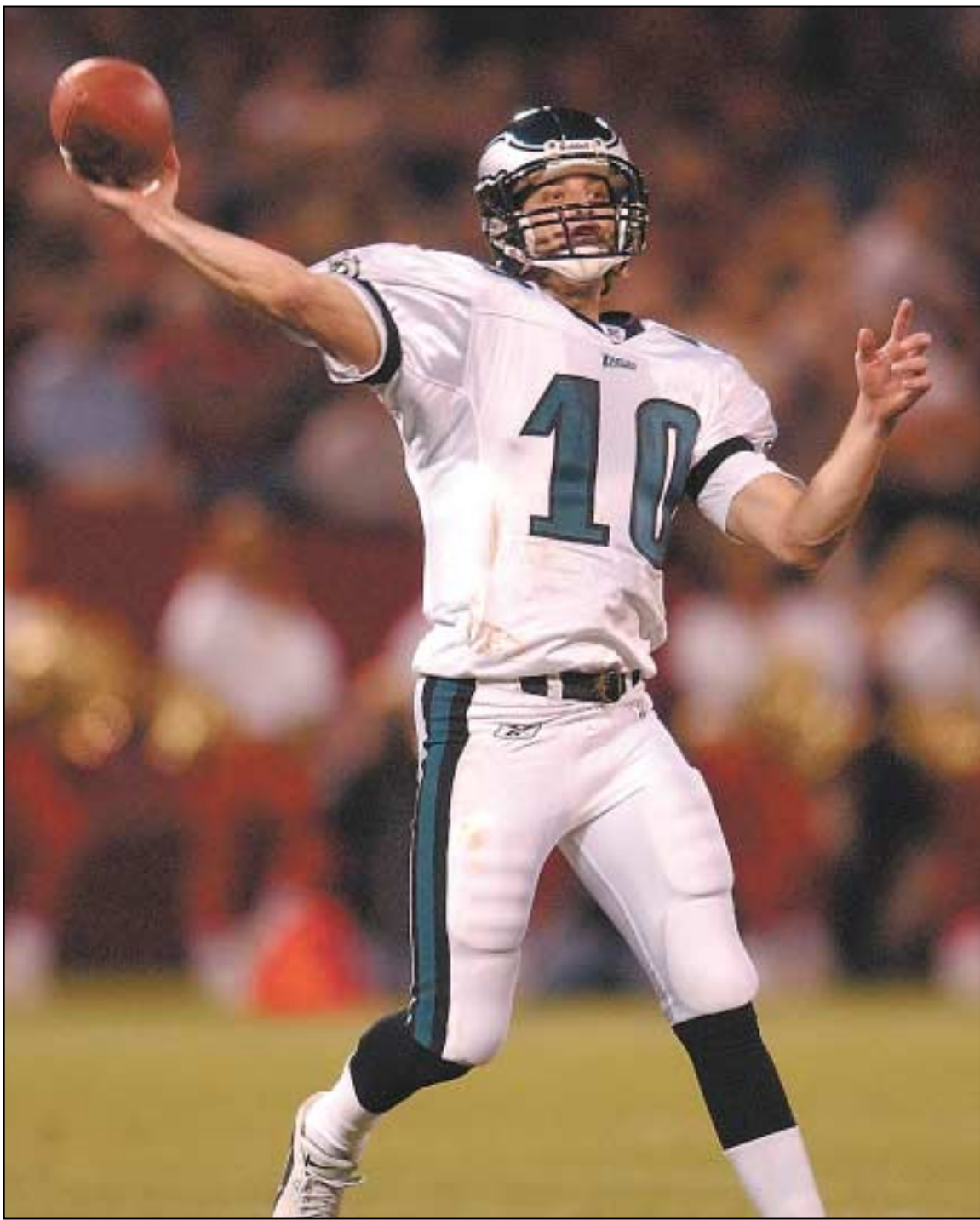
The No. 13 Buffaloes play Nebraska on Friday afternoon at Memorial Stadium.

## Detmer passes test

**SAN FRANCISCO** — Dozens of players reverently crowded around the cart to offer words of encouragement to Koy Detmer. The game was all but decided, and Detmer's fine play earned admirers in both uniforms.

As long as the Philadelphia Eagles don't run out of quarterbacks before the end of January — a distinct possibility at this rate — there might be no limit to how far their impressive offense can go.

Filling in tremendously for injured Donovan McNabb, Detmer passed for 227 yards and two touchdowns and rushed for another score before leaving with a dislocated left elbow late in the Eagles' 38-17 win over San Francisco on Monday night.

Detmer's big night began and ended with a fall. He tripped on the first play from scrimmage, and he hurt his elbow late in the third quarter, his legs flailing in excruciating pain after his awkward landing. Before he was carted off, the Eagles' entire bench emptied onto the field to wish him well along with the Niners' defense.

"It meant a lot to me," Detmer said. "I was in pain and disappointed at the same time. It was an incredible night up to that point. ... That was a great show of sportsmanship on (San Francisco's) part. They showed me a lot of respect."

Nobody will know how long Detmer will be out until he's re-examined in Philadelphia on Tuesday, but third-stringer A.J. Feeley,

who finished for Detmer, expects to start Sunday against St. Louis.

Before the fall, Detmer completed 18 of 26 passes while executing with remarkable precision for a player who'd thrown just 17 passes since 1999. McNabb is expected to miss the rest of the regular season with a broken ankle, but in Detmer's first start since 1999, he was outstanding for nearly three quarters.

"Koy's a pretty tough nut, so if he's rolling around out there, you know there's something wrong," coach Andy Reid said. "It wasn't a cheap shot or anything."

Using all of his many options in Reid's unpredictable game plan, Detmer carved up the 49ers' confused secondary and staked the Eagles (8-3) to a big lead.

## NFL calls Sapp hit on Clifton legal

**TAMPA, Fla.** — Tampa Bay coach Jon Gruden said Warren Sapp is not a dirty player and criticized Green Bay coach Mike Sherman for initiating an obscenity-laced argument with the Buccaneers All-Pro defensive tackle.

Sherman angrily confronted Sapp on Sunday, accusing him of taking a cheap shot at Chad Clifton during a third-quarter interception return that led to the go-ahead touchdown in the Buccaneers' 21-7 victory over the Packers.

Sapp vehemently denied that he leveled Clifton with an illegal hit and also refuted Sherman's contention that he made the situation worse by celebrating while Clifton remained on the ground.

The NFL reviewed the play Monday and said no disciplinary action will be taken because the hit was clean.

Gruden defended Sapp, saying the block not only was clean, but that Sherman was wrong for instigating the post-game exchange that overshadowed a meeting of the teams with the top records in the NFL.

"Warren Sapp did nothing illegal or malicious. He made an aggressive play," Gruden said Monday. "When a ball is intercepted, we're trying to score. No matter how that play is interpreted by a coach on another team or a fan of another team, Warren Sapp made no error whatsoever. And the celebration had nothing to do with the guy being injured, I can guarantee you that."

Clifton remained hospitalized in Tampa for a right hip injury that Sherman said could end the offensive tackle's season. The coach said the third-year pro separated ligaments that hold the pelvis together and might not be able to travel back to Green Bay until late in the week.

"It's a dangerous game, it's a tough game, it's a physical game. That much I understand," Sherman said. "I responded yesterday to what I thought was inappropriate. If the term is unnecessary roughness, I thought it was unnecessary. And even more so, I thought the reaction afterward was what I responded more to."

Gruden and Bucs linebacker Derrick Brooks insisted Sapp was not celebrating Clifton being down on the ground, but rather Brian Kelly's interception and 31-yard return at a critical point in the game. Four plays later, the Bucs scored a touchdown and added a two-point conversion for a 14-7 lead.

"That's something that gets lost," Brooks said. "You make a hit on someone, you don't know if that guy is hurt or not. You're celebrating the play. What happens after the play, of course, is sad. But at that time, it's not celebrating hurting someone. If anyone has that perception, then I have to question that person."

Sapp, unavailable for comment Monday, hit Clifton in front of the right shoulder and was surprised that Sherman took exception. One person who wasn't shocked by the block was former Bucs coach Tony Dungy, now with the Indianapolis Colts.

"I thought there was a little too much made of it because when you get balls you try to score and you try to block. So if you're on offense, you better try to get off the field or you better try to make the tackle," Dungy said.

## Report: Solich ready to name offensive coordinator

**OMAHA** — Nebraska football coach Frank Solich plans to name a new offensive coordinator next week, the Omaha World-Herald reported in its Tuesday editions.

Citing an unnamed source, the newspaper reported that Solich planned to give up his play-calling duties.

Solich is one of only a dozen

Division I-A head coaches who also serve as offensive coordinator. Solich has indicated this season that he was considering having someone else call plays for his team.

Receivers coach Ron Brown, believed to be a possible candidate for the job, said Tuesday that Solich hasn't told him that an announcement was imminent.

"I don't know anything of the

sort," he told the Associated Press.

Quarterbacks coach Turner Gill, also thought to be a candidate, did not immediately return a telephone message left at his office Tuesday by The Associated Press.

Solich told the World-Herald after Monday's practice that he would wait until after the season to announce any decisions. The

Cornhuskers finish the regular season Friday with a home game against Colorado.

"Most likely, as we finish out the regular year, we'll look at things and go from there," Solich told the newspaper. "An evaluation process is always ongoing, but when a season ends, you always look at things and if there's anything there you move forward with it."

Nebraska ranks 10th in the Big 12 and 59th nationally in total offense. The Huskers' 377.6-yard average is their lowest since 1969.

If Solich were to hire an offensive coordinator from outside the current staff, one of his assistants would have to leave because NCAA rules allow only nine full-time assistants.
