# Glenvil man charged in shooting of G.I. lawyer

Authorities have charged a Glenvil man for the shooting death of a Grand Island lawyer outside his law office.

Michael L. Petersen, 58, was charged with first-degree murder and use of a weapon to commit a felony this morning in Hall County Court. He is being held without bond in the Hall County Department of Corrections.

Petersen was arrested Thursday on J Street one mile

east of Hastings. Police say he was armed but offered no resistance.

Elsbernd is listed in court records as having represented a man named Michael L. Petersen in a 2002 divorce case involving a woman named Nancy Petersen.

A 58-year-old woman named Nancy Petersen was found shot to death Thursday in Buffalo County. Authorities have ruled the death as a homicide. Authorities say they are investigating whether the shootings are connected.

The Buffalo County Sheriff's Office says the death was not a random act, and preliminary evidence suggests she knew her assailant. Petersen's body was found Thursday morning near her home southwest of Kearney.

Authorities have ordered an autopsy on Petersen. The incident remains under investigation by law enforcement agencies.

Court records also show a 2009 case in which Michael L. Petersen sued Elsernd for \$57,300, alleging malpractice

in his divorce case. Petersen couldn't call in at the time scheduled but failed to ask for a continuance. The judge dismissed the case, citing that the statute of limitations on the claim had expired.

Elsbernd was shot in the torso around 6:30 p.m. Wednesday as he was standing by a red truck parked outside his downtown law office. He was taken to St. Francis Medical Center, where he died. Witnesses told police the

shooter had been parked in a public parking lot near the scene for "a considerable length of time before the shooting," Grand Island Police Chief Steve Lamken said at a news conference Thursday morning.

Investigators believe the man shot Elsernd with a rifle. Lamken said two shots were fired from the parking lot. "The Police Department

## Irrigators didn't water as much as expected

**ALMA** — According to preliminary metering data, irrigators in the Lower Republican Natural Resources District applied much less groundwater to their crops last summer than officials had expected.

In a report to the district's board of directors here Thursday, General Manager Mike Clements said that based on meters read so far this fall, the average usage per certified irrigated acre districtwide will be "way, way better" than anticipated.

"We're looking at just under 7 inches right now for the district on average," Clements told the board at its regular November meeting in Alma. "I about fell off my chair."

By and large, the 2013 crop year was a dry one from one end of the district to the other. The LRNRD encompasses all of Furnas, Harlan and Franklin counties plus most of Webster County and southern Nuckolls County. Headquarters are in Alma.

Some areas of the district were treated a little more generously by Mother Nature, however. Clements cited some locations of northern Franklin County as one example.

Whatever the case, district officials had been bracing for another year of high water usage. In 2012, which also was a dry year, the averages pumped by farmers in the district ranged from 8.49 inches per acre in Nuckolls County to 12.6 in Furnas County and 12.55 in Harlan County, for an overall average somewhere around 10.5.

Meter information available at this time is incomplete, as the job of meter reading will not be finished for some time. Open weather this fall has

HISTORIC PROPERTY HOME TO TWO SUCCESSFUL RESTAURANTS

**T**hen: On May 23, 1964, Dandy's Drive-Inn made its debut into what was already a bustling collection of drive-ins in Hastings. Cars queued in the 41-stall parking lot and families queued in the

narrow lobby to collect free, chilled cups of Pepsi, lemonade and root beer — giveaways that were part of the restaurant's grand opening lure. Topping the menu at the drive-in were the restaurant's notorious 15-cent hamburgers, 25-cent "Fishwich" sandwiches, and the whopping 44-cent "Big Dandy" burger, along with fresh-from-the-frier "French fried potatoes." Not only did the management give away free drinks for all paying customers at the grand opening, they also conducted drawings for six

free transistor radios and passed out "balloons and Indian feather bands for the kiddies" and "rain hats for the ladies." With this mash-up of food and freebies, the new Dandy's Drive-Inn had all the ingredients of a successful family business. **Now:** The easternmost of three Runza restaurants in Hastings has made its home at 126 N Elm Ave. for 35 years, and still touts the

## Burling receives Aggie Award, reflects on change

CHAMBER HONORS FORMER SENATOR FOR LIFETIME OF ADVOCACY

For Carroll Burling, Thursday evening's annual Farmers and Ranchers Appreciation Barbecue in Hastings was an opportunity to reflect on changes in life and changes in agriculture.

"Change is as much a part of life as taxes and death," said Burling, a lifelong Kenesaw area farmer who served in the Nebraska Legislature from 2001-09. "How do we put that in perspective? What changes, and what doesn't change?"

Thursday's 36th annual barbecue was sponsored by the Hastings Area Chamber of Commerce and organized by the chamber's Agri-Business Council. Around 750 people turned out on the Adams County Fairgrounds for the catered beef and pork sandwich meal and entertainment and to pay tribute to the former District 33 lawmaker.

Burling, 78, was called to the stage to accept the chamber's Aggie Award, which recognizes longtime contributions to agriculture and the community. He was accompanied by his wife, Bonnie, whom he thanked for supporting him in his civic and political activities as well as life on the farm.

"As most of you already know, she's the reason I'm standing here," Burling said.

Two of the Burlings' four grown children were in attendance. Dan still lives on the family farm south of Kenesaw and is the fifth generation of his family to farm in Adams County.

Burling has been active in the community for many years. He served as an officer of the Kenesaw Rural Fire District for several decades and as a member and president of the Kenesaw Board of Education.

He was a charter member of the Adams County Farm Bureau and took his involvement in that group to the state level, serving 12 years as a state officer, six years as state vice president,

and chairman of the Policy Development and Political Action committees.

He also has been active in church work, has volunteered in prison ministry, and has given his time with many other efforts and organizations, including the boards of The Bridge Inc. and Court Appointed Special Advocates of South Central Nebraska. He was the first president of the Tri-Family Ministries board of directors.

In remarks after receiving his award, Burling told the crowd that his grandfather farmed with horses for many years and wasn't too receptive when, around the time he turned 60,

tractors were becoming prevalent in the area. He told his son, Burling's father, that he was more comfortable working with horses and would leave the tractor farming to the next generation.

Likewise, Burling said, when his father turned 60, irrigation wells were becoming common in the Kenesaw area and he wasn't eager to get involved in that innovation.

"Dad said, 'I've farmed 40 years dryland and I'm not going to irrigate,'" said Burling, who started watering crops in 1954.

Time, and change, continued to march. In the mid-1960s, Burling said, he found himself with additional acres to farm

and in need of larger equipment. He went to his implement dealer and asked him if it would be possible to move up from a four-row planter.

"I said, 'Does anybody make a six-row planter?'" Burling recalled. "He said, 'I've never had anybody ask me that question.'"

The dealer did some research and found Burling a six-row planter, which was delivered in the spring.

"I bought a six-row planter sight unseen," Burling said. "It was the first one I'd ever seen when it came to my yard."

Dual wheels on tractors, tandem axles on grain trucks and, eventually, farmer-owned semi-trailers all arrived in due season

and were accepted, Burling said. But by the time he turned 60 himself, he was taken aback to find his new combine outfitted with all kinds of information technology, and his son had to explain what it all meant.

"I said, 'I've farmed 40 years without computers' — and you know the rest," he said.

He told his son to take charge of the farming with computers, and that he was going to get involved in politics. But, upon taking his seat in the Legislature in 2001, he found a computer had become an inescapable tool in the political arena, also.

During his years of service, Burling served on the

Legislature's Agriculture, Business and Labor, Government, and Military and Veterans Affairs committees. He served a total of eight years, having been re-elected to a second four-year term in 2004.

Now, he looks back on all the change he has seen in his career and realizes some essentials are just as they always were.

He talked about studying a kernel of corn, which still looks basically the same as it always did, and about all the work that goes into developing that kernel as seed and feed and fuel for the world.

"All of that's for naught if when that seed is planted it doesn't sprout," Burling said.

"Don't forget who's in charge of the seed sprouting."

Keynote speaker for Thursday's event was Juli Burney, a teacher, author and motivational speaker from Lincoln. Dawn Caldwell of Edgar, corporate communications director for the Aurora Cooperative, was the emcee. The Rev. Benjamin Siebert, associate pastor of Peace Lutheran Church in Hastings, offered the invocation.

The Chorus of the Plains, a men's barbershop group, sang the National Anthem and a patriotic medley.

Joe Ehrlich, a lawyer with the Hastings firm Seiler & Parker, presented Burling with his award.

## Dandy's: Property home to 2 restaurants

fresh-ingredient, friendly service philosophy that Dandy's paved.

That Runza location was the eighth Runza ever established, and was the first location built outside of the Lincoln and Omaha metro areas.

"It was really the first out-state opportunity Runza had," said Becky Perrett, director of marketing at the Runza national offices in Lincoln. "It's tucked into the neighborhood back there, kinda off the main drag, but also benefiting from the ball park and the college community close by."

The property at the east end of Second Street did indeed see long-standing success due to its proximity to Duncan Field, Hastings College and U.S. Highway 6. The area was home to a grocery store, an antique emporium and a bicycle shop before restaurants moved in.

In 1963, William Jellison, a local businessman, oversaw the construction of a Dandy's Drive-Inn, which was about half the size of the current Runza restaurant.

The Dandy's building was taken up mostly by the kitchen. There were no tables or chairs and customers could browse the menu from a narrow lobby before taking their food outside or to their cars to eat. At its opening in 1964, the drive-in had 10 full-time and four part-time employees, some of whom were car hops who brought fries and shakes right to folks in their driver's seats.

"As a kid, we'd go out there almost nightly. We'd swing in, get a couple of sodas, and just drive," said Harold Scheierman,

a 1963 graduate of Hastings High and Dandy's patron.

When Dandy's opened, Scheierman was 19 — "just a kid," he said.

Gas was 25 cents a gallon, and he and his friends used their driving freedom to explore town and frequent the many drive-ins that were around at the time.

"We had A&W, Whirlaway, Griff's Burger Bar," he said. "Down on South Burlington there was the big Burlington Drive-In. High school kids and young people met there all the time. Those places were pretty neat." Scheierman said that his

friends were such frequent faces at Dandy's, the owners would sometimes give them their sodas for free.

He now owns Total Package, a shipping and printing business in Hastings, and says he enjoys reminiscing about the drive-in days in Hastings, including the "stress-free" prices and the atmosphere of the restaurants and staff.

"It tasted different back then, because it was a different era," he said. "It wasn't just the food, it was the surroundings. It was the carhops who brought a tray up to your car and hooked it on your window. No one worried about cholesterol. Everyone loved to drink root beer — that was a big drink. It's a forgotten time."

After 12 years of business, Dandy's owners William and Tillie Jellison retired and closed up shop. They sold the building and Runza opened on Sept. 19, 1977.

Perrett said that Hastings is the only town besides Lincoln and Omaha that has ever had more than two Runza locations.

"Kearney only has two, same with Grand Island and North Platte," she said.

The Runza West location at 2604 W. Second St. opened in 1981 where Papa Ray's Pizza Cafe is now and would later move across Second Street to its current location. A third Runza was opened at 2900 Osborne Drive East in November 1995 and a fourth Runza operated inside the Imperial Mall from 1986-1999.

"If anyone asks, Hastings is

the town that loved Runza the most," Perrett said. "We are thankful and proud to be a member of a community that supports three stores to this day."

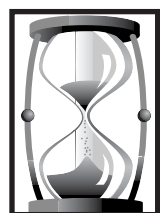
In 1979, the Runza East building added a new dining room on the west side and the new seating area that almost doubled the size of the original Dandy's building. That blueprint remains at the restaurant today, although the store has undergone a total of three renovations, including a remodeling of the interiors earlier this year, Perrett said.

In that year, all sandwiches at Runza — which included the original Runza sandwiches, Polish dogs, foot-long hot dogs, fish sandwiches, and quarter-pound hamburgers — were only 69 cents.

Don Everett, president of Runza restaurants at the time, said that he had his eye on Hastings because it was "a good, clean city."

"I think the restaurant and the community will be good for each other," he told the Tribune.

"I'd say he was spot-on," Perrett said. "That has really been a long-standing location."

believes that this was not a random act and that Mr. Elsbernd was targeted by the suspect," Lamken said.

Hall County Attorney Mark Young, who also spoke at the news conference, described Elsbernd as a good lawyer and a caring person.

Young said his office will go after the shooter "with both barrels, regardless of who the victim is."

The downtown office houses

several attorney offices — including the law firm of Bradley, Elsbernd, Andersen, Kneale & Mues Jankowitz — as well as the local offices for the FBI.

Elsbernd was a member of the Grand Island Public School Board. School district spokesman Jack Sheard said crisis teams were in place at Grand Island Senior High School and Barr Middle School, where two of Elsbernd's three sons attend classes.

helped the progress greatly, however.

Clements said the preliminary average he shared Thursday was based on perhaps 80 percent of the meters in the district, which already have been read.

In some areas, most meters already have been read. In others, work has barely begun. Some farmers have continued to water until recently, perhaps irrigating wheat fields or attempting to build soil moisture profile in anticipation of spring 2014.

In an effort to hold the line on pumping in 2013, the NRD enacted a one-year "hard cap" of 10.5 inches per acre, with a severe penalty for non-compliance. Under the cap, farmers would lose 3 inches from their five-year, 45-inch ration for the 2013-17 period for every one inch overpumped in 2013.

By early July, with rain scarce across much of the district and irrigation well under way, many farmers already were alarmed at the prospect of running up against the 10.5-inch cap before the crop was made, and either suffering the 3-to-1 penalty or else taking precipitous yield losses this season.

The farmers appealed to the board for concessions, and the board responded by allowing them to pool acres, transferring a portion of their ration between fields as a way of maximizing the water's benefit.

The district board already has decided that irrigators who sought and were granted permission for such transfers but did not end up following through on them will be able to reassign that ration to the original acres without any repercussions.

# Reaching rural America's potential

That was a daunting statistic that Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack pulled out in Lincoln last week.

Since the financial crisis of 2008, "Not a single net new job has been created in rural America. For the first time in history, we've lost population, 42,000 in two years," Vilsack said.

The relentless wheel of change keeps turning. For decades, the mechanization of agriculture eliminated the need for human labor in planting, harvesting and caring for animals. A square mile in rural Nebraska typically might have supported four families. These days, there might be one. Farmsteads were abandoned, overgrown and finally bulldozed away, as the countryside emptied of people.

But, as Vilsack affirmed at the second annual Rural Futures Conference sponsored by the University of Nebraska, rural America matters immensely to the nation and the world.

Rural America supplies the nation with food, energy, water and places for recreation. Opportunities abound.

Importantly, the technological change that once diminished opportunities in rural American now is entering a phase that creates new prospects.

The mobile communication devices that seem permanently attached to the American hands are redefining the meaning of community, said keynote speaker Tom Koulopoulos, founder of the Delphi Group.

"Kids are growing up constantly connected to each other and their devices. These devices become part of their community," he said.

Historically, people have gathered in cities to conduct commerce and communicate. That no longer is necessary.

Future generations will depart from cities in a "mass exodus," Koulopoulos predicted.

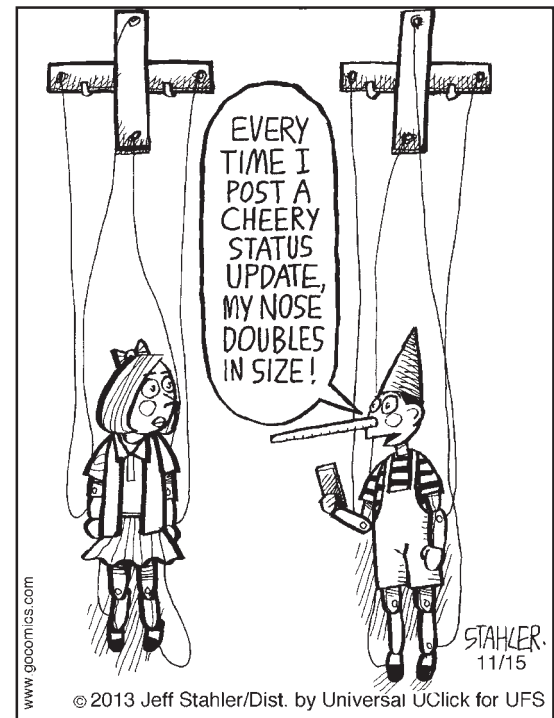
"These kids want meaning. They want quality. They want a better life. Kids realize they don't have to live in cities to get it."

It's important for state policymakers to do their part. Key to the future envisioned by Koulopoulos and others is the infrastructure to support those devices.

And high-quality broadband is threatened by the impending loss of federal subsidies. Consultant Michael Balhoff warned last month that without adequate broadband service, sparsely populated rural areas will become an "economic wasteland."

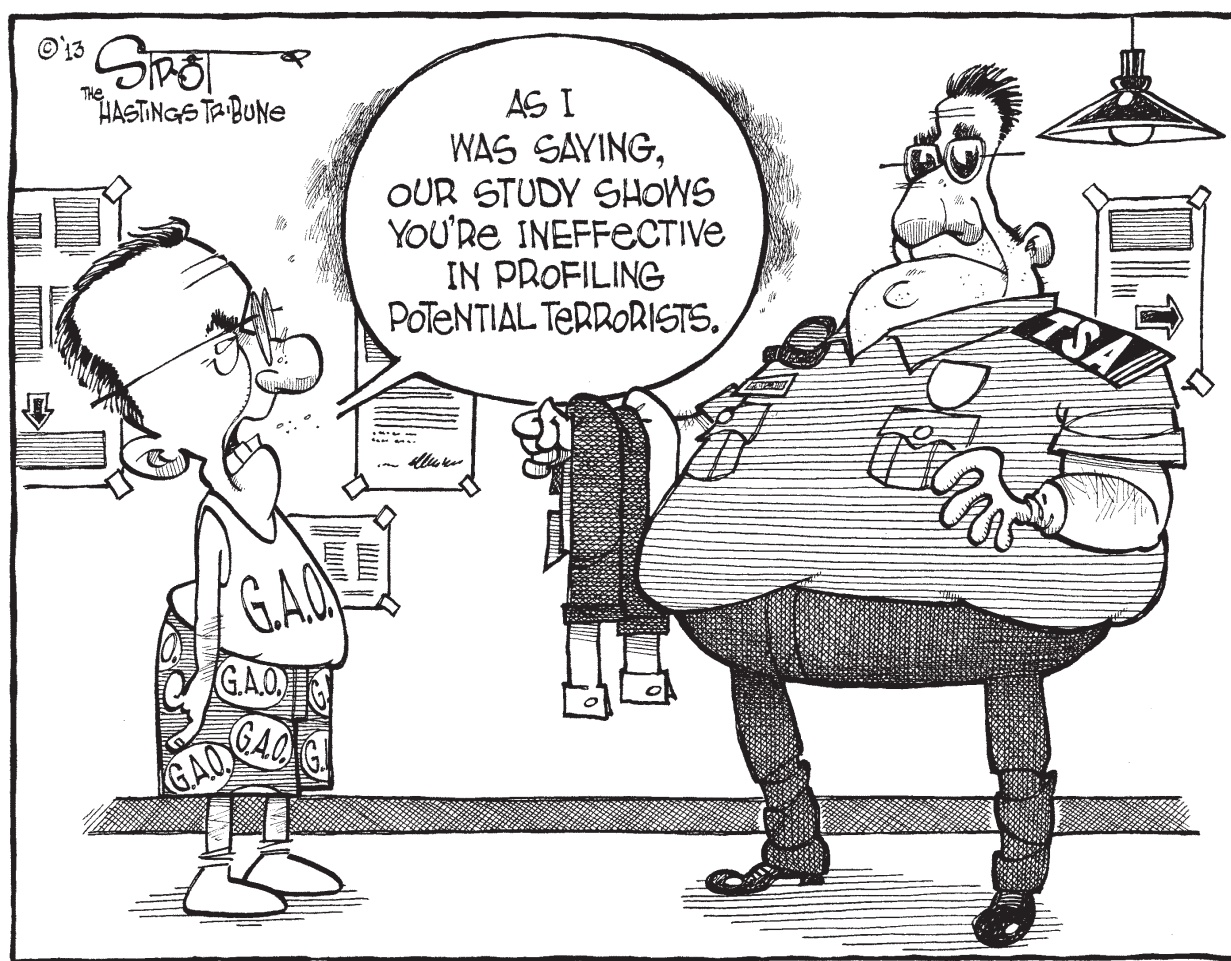
Already, the presence of broadband service in small towns spurs economic activity, University of Nebraska-Lincoln economist Eric Thompson said. Those towns also are likely to have more 18- to 43-year-olds and residents with college degrees, he said.

"We have not realized the full potential of what could be achieved by leveraging our resources, our intellectual capacity and our energy," NU President James B. Milliken said. He's right.

## A health care plan that makes more sense

Don't raise the bridge. Lower the river, divert the water, steamroll the riverbed, and install a bullet train as an "affordable" bridge substitute.

Such grandiose thinking is derailing ObamaCare at breakneck speed. Long after it has passed from the American body politic, ObamaCare will be remembered as a Smithsonian-grade specimen of what happens when too much government smother a manageable problem.

Well before the (un)Affordable Care Act became law, Obama complained in August 2009 that "46 million of our fellow citizens have no coverage." Meanwhile, the Congressional Budget Office forecast last May that, even if ObamaCare suddenly became as efficient as Swiss Federal Railways, 31 million Americans still will lack coverage in 2023. So, today's unfolding healthcare catastrophe will help — at best — just 15 million people. Given ObamaCare's 10-year outlay of \$2.6 trillion, this equals \$17,333 annually (or \$1,444 per month) per net beneficiary.

This is an astonishing cost for such a concentrated benefit. However, rather than target these 15 million people, ObamaCare unleashes chaos on 315 million Americans. Already, some 5 million people, and counting, have seen their health plans cancelled. Others are watching their work hours get chopped from full time to part time. Even more are losing their jobs outright or simply not getting hired. Doctors increasingly are choosing golf and tennis over bureaucracy and disrespect.

Among the American workers whom the Employee Benefit Research Institute surveyed last September, 88 percent were somewhat to

extremely satisfied with their health insurance. Why didn't ObamaCare just focus on the other 12 percent?

Atop its recurring inability to set priorities, Team Obama displays staggering managerial incompetence.

HealthCare.gov is a \$400 million misadventure in computer science. Its dysfunction surely helped limit October's ObamaCare enrollment to just 106,185 paying and non-paying participants — including a mere 26,794 in the federal exchanges — just 21.3 percent of Obama's 500,000 monthly goal.

Nevertheless, Obama considers this website novel.

"Just visit HealthCare.gov," Obama said in the Rose Garden on Oct. 1. "You can compare insurance plans, side by side, the same way you'd shop for a plane ticket on Kayak or a TV on Amazon."

David Axelrod, Obama's political guru, claimed on MSNBC's "Morning Joe" on Oct. 28: "This is the first time in history that you can make an apples-to-apples comparison about healthcare plans on line in front of you."

Obama, Axelrod, and their ilk need to escape their bubble. Websites that long predated ObamaCare already help Americans shop for health insurance as if they were buying books or albums. Indeed, if the people who brought us HealthCare.gov had listened to me, they would have saved America millions and spared themselves embarrassment.

"Websites like ehealthinsurance.com could become the cornerstones for a thriving, pri-

vate, national health-insurance market," I wrote in February 2010. "This is far more encouraging than Obamacare's creaky, Washington-driven 'exchange.'" Prospering since 1997, ehealthinsurance.com is what HealthCare.gov wants to be when it grows up.

Imagine if Obama simply had offered vouchers, or Health Stamps, to America's uninsured. Let's say each needy individual without coverage received \$5,000 to purchase insurance. Those with severe conditions could receive additional support. They then would have visited ehealthinsurance.com and similar websites. The uninsured could compare prices and buy whatever plans suited their circumstances. So, post-menopausal women need not purchase birth control and maternity coverage, as ObamaCare mandates. Childless male 23-year-olds would not be forced to buy pediatric dental insurance, as ObamaCare requires.

At roughly 29 percent of ObamaCare's cost, this rational approach would have fulfilled Obama's promise to cover the uninsured. Conservatives would be pleased to see freedom and choice central to this arrangement. Those who like their healthcare plans could have kept their healthcare plans. Period. And ehealthinsurance.com would have let America avoid the humiliation of launching an unworkable website as the whole world was watching.

Obama could have enjoyed all of this. Instead, and ironically, his massive, statist scheme has soiled the reputation of big-government liberalism — perhaps for decades.

### THREAT CHARGE

Using a firearm to commit a felony is a Class 1C felony punishable by 3-50 years in prison. Terroristic threats is a Class 4 felony punishable by up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

### DOMESTIC ASSAULT CASE

A 53-year-old Hastings man has denied striking his fiancée with a baseball bat.

Gregory K. Sears of 704 S. Wabash Ave. pleaded not guilty Thursday in Adams County District Court to second-degree domestic assault and use of a weapon to commit a felony.

Sears is scheduled to have a pre-trial hearing on Feb. 13, 2014, at 9:30 a.m.

Jeanne Woodrum reported to police that Sears allegedly sat on her chest and repeatedly struck her in the head with a baseball bat, according to the arrest affidavit. Woodrum managed to get away and ran from the house to a neighbor who called police.

Use of a deadly weapon to commit a felony is a Class 2 felony punishable by up to 50 years in prison. Second-degree domestic assault is a Class 3A felony punishable by up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

### METH CHARGES

A 24-year-old Hastings woman has been arrested and accused of selling methamphetamine.

Letitia R. Jackson, whose last known address was 1125 N. Williams Ave., was arrested Wednesday. She faces two charges of distributing meth, one charge of aiding in the distribution of meth and possession of meth.

Jackson is scheduled to have a pre-trial hearing on Feb. 13, 2014, at 9:30 a.m.

On June 14, 2012, a confidential informant arranged to purchase meth for \$150 from another woman, according to the arrest affidavit. Jackson drove the woman to the meeting location at Fourth Street and Denver Avenue where they picked up the informant and drove to Ninth Street and Ash Avenue, where the alleged transaction occurred. Jackson then dropped off the informant at another location.

On Nov. 28, 2012, Jackson allegedly sold another confidential informant meth for \$100 at 2424 Osborne Drive East.

On Nov. 30, 2012, Jackson allegedly sold another \$100 in meth to the same informant at 3001 W. 12th St.

On March 11, Jackson's roommate at the time gave police a purse, that reportedly belonged to Jackson, that allegedly contained two small bags of meth.

Distribution of a controlled substance (meth) and aiding and abetting the distribution of a controlled substance (meth) are each a Class 2 felony punishable by up to 50 years in prison. Possession of a controlled substance (meth) is a Class 4 felony punishable by up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

# Utility board recommends rate hikes

As a two-week long series of budget deliberations comes to a close, the Hastings Board of Public Works is moving forward with proposed changes that will likely impact the utility bills and check-books of HU customers in 2014.

Following a public hearing at its regular meeting Thursday, the board approved resolutions accepting the HU 2014 budget as well as proposed water and electric rate increases.

Water rates would increase 12 percent and electric rates 5 percent

next year. The two proposed rate increases need to go before the Hastings City Council for final approval.

Meanwhile, an 8-percent increase in sanitary sewer rates was approved by the board and City Council this past year and will also go into effect Jan. 1.

"These are not insignificant rate increases, we understand that," said board chairman Chuck Shoemaker. "But we also understand our responsibilities and challenges in all three of the departments where these increases are being put in place."

The increases mean that average residential customers will see their water and electric rates increase anywhere from \$1 to \$5 a month next year, depending on the season and demand.

The board stressed its responsibility to maintain reliable, safe and competitively priced services for area customers and feels that the increases are the best way to cover all of those bases.

The reliability of the utility systems and budget was put to the test just this week when a failure on the generator rotating equipment at Whelan Energy Center

Unit 1 caused an unprecedented outage.

A planned outage at the Whelan Energy Center Unit 2 earlier this month had just concluded, so luckily staff could rely on power from that plant as well as some emergency backup power to make up for the unscheduled shutdown at Unit 1. Those sources became critical when temperatures dropped drastically early Tuesday morning.

"We were scrambling for power Tuesday morning," said Al Meyer, assistant manager of HU.

## Heisman winner receives state pardon

LINCOLN — Forty-three years after he and two other men held up a gas station following a night of drinking, 1972 Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers was granted a pardon from the state of Nebraska on Thursday.

"I feel like the weight for that particular incident is off my shoulders," Rodgers said after he walked out of his Board of Pardons hearing.

The board voted 3-0 to pardon the 62-year-old Rodgers, who has spent his post-football life as an entrepreneur and pitchman in Omaha.

Rodgers said he has long regretted what he called an alcohol-fueled prank in the spring of 1970. The holdup occurred the night after he completed his last day of classes his freshman year and netted \$90 that was split three ways.

The crime was first investigated as an armed robbery. Rodgers pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of felony larceny and was sentenced to two years of probation. Rodgers has repeatedly denied that he had a gun during the holdup.

A pardon does not expunge Rodgers' record, but it does restore civil rights he lost after his conviction, such as the right to be a juror, hold public office and hold certain licenses. The board also gave approval for Rodgers to own a firearm, if he chooses to.

The pardons board is made up of Gov. Dave Heineman, Attorney General Jon Bruning and Secretary

of State John Gale.

Rodgers, wearing a red shirt under a dark blazer with a "Win Your Life" lapel pin, told the board that he has lived a mostly good life and had met the criteria for a pardon.

"I'm seeking a pardon because this incident happened when I was 17 years old," Rodgers told the board. "I had 10 minutes of insanity, which has hurt me my whole life."

Four friends, including Rodgers' high school quarterback, testified in support of Rodgers. Former Nebraska coach Tom Osborne, who was Rodgers' position coach, wrote a letter of support.

Gale mentioned that after the larceny conviction, Rodgers was picked up for driving under a suspended license in 1973 and had a drunken-driving conviction in 1997. Gale also noted that Rodgers' record continues to show felony convictions in California for firearms charges related to a 1985 confrontation with a cable-television technician who was disconnecting service from his house.

Rodgers said he planned to seek a pardon in California.

Gale said Rodgers was to be commended for his work with youth, returning to the university to earn

## Official: N-CORPE project remains on schedule

ALMA — Infrastructure work for a major streamflow augmentation project in the Republican River Basin continues at full steam, with completion of one if not both phases of construction scheduled for the end of December.

That was the word passed Thursday to directors of the Lower Republican Natural Resources District — one of four NRDs partnering to build the project in southern Lincoln County.

Mike Clements, LRNRD general

manager, said he had been updated on the progress Wednesday by Chris Miller with the Kearney engineering firm Miller & Associates, which designed the Nebraska Cooperative Republican Platte Enhancement project, or N-CORPE.

"They're progressing very nicely," Clements said, adding that the 42-inch pipeline that will carry water several miles from the well-field all the way south to Medicine Creek should be complete within a week or so.

Medicine Creek is a tributary of the Republican River. Eventually, the N-CORPE pipeline also will run to the north, allowing for groundwater deliveries to the Platte River system, as well.

Plans for N-CORPE call for a well-field consisting of 30 wells, all of which will feed water to the main

pipeline for delivery to the rivers in times of hydrological deficits.

For construction purposes, Phase 1 includes 13 of the 30 wells, whereas Phase 2 covers the remaining 17. Phase 1 is guaranteed to be complete by Dec. 31; phase 2 by March 1, 2014. But Clements said it's possible both phases will be done by year's end.

"Phase 1 is definitely on track to be fully operational by Dec. 31," he said.

In October 2012, the Lower, Middle and Upper Republican NRDs joined forces with the Twin Platte NRD to form N-CORPE and purchase a 19,500-acre expanse south of North Platte from Lincoln Farm LLC, an investor group based in Delaware.

The interlocal entity paid \$83 million for the property and has

retired 15,800 acres there from irrigation. The groundwater beneath the property — and there's a lot of it, since saturated thicknesses in the aquifer there range from 400-600 feet — will be saved for times when it is needed to boost streamflows.

Getting the project up and running by year's end is viewed as critical for the LRNRD and its hope of avoiding additional restrictions on irrigators in 2014.

On Nov. 20, the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources will provide preliminary estimates as to the size of groundwater supply-to-use deficits the Republican River Basin NRDs may have to make up through streamflow augmentation, dry-year leases and/or other initiatives in 2014.

## Hiring quality nurses

The Hastings Board of Education got its first look Thursday at rough numbers for salaries of different nursing programs to be implemented within the district.

The district currently has 5.5 full-time equivalent staff with one coordinator, 3.5 FTE registered nurses and 1 FTE licensed nurse practitioner.

The board first discussed the district's school nurse program in September when nursing director Annie Consbruck came forward with the request to hire another full-time nurse.

The 5.5 FTE the district has now for staffing is significantly under where it should be for a district with eight buildings, according to the National Association of School Nurses.

"Our present model is one that is recognized by the National Association of School Nurses as being sufficient for a 'well-student' population," Superintendent Craig Kautz told the board during its work session Thursday.

"And as we discussed last month, we have analyses that says our student population is not necessarily a 'well-student' population."

The nurses at Hastings Public Schools provide services from administering prescription drugs to helping students with diabetes testing, responding to sick children and helping with students who have behavioral issues.

After Consbruck made her request in September to hire another registered nurse, the board had more questions regarding the district's school nurse program.

Since that time, the board had postponed the hiring of an additional employee and directed administration to look further into options for the program.

The board had questions about the need to hire more

## 11 KILLED

**LINCOLN** — The state Department of Roads says 11 people were killed in traffic crashes last month in Nebraska.

The numbers released Thursday show nine crashes in October that had at least one fatality. Six vehicle occupants were not wearing seat belts.

One death occurred on an interstate, five happened on state highways, and five took place on local roads.

The department says one of the fatalities was a pedestrian. Eight of the deaths were in rural locations, and five of the people killed were age 24 or younger.

According to the data, 176 people have died in Nebraska traffic crashes so far this year. In 2012, there were 183 fatalities.

## OPPD RATES

**OMAHA** — The Omaha Public Power District isn't proposing any rate increases for next year even though it still can't generate power at its Fort Calhoun nuclear power plant.

The utility that serves 13 southeast Nebraska counties says it successfully limited expenses this year while it continued rehabilitating Fort Calhoun.

OPPD's board reviewed a proposed 2014 budget Thursday. The budget won't be official until the board votes on it on Dec. 19.

The year ahead is virtually certain to be the second in a row declared a Compact Call Year in Nebraska's portion of the Republican Basin. In Compact Call Years, extra steps are necessary to ensure compliance with the interstate Republican River Compact of 1943.

To arrive at the preliminary deficit figures to be made up, the state will be looking at 2013 pumping estimates and prospective usage for 2014. But Clements said actual pumping for 2013 eventually will be found to be much lower than the projections to be issued next week — projections based on power records from 2012.

"The projections will be way worse" than reality, Clements said — but added that the Republican Basin NRDs must begin working with the state's numbers even if they later are shown to be inaccurate.

The formal declaration of a Compact Call Year must be made by the end of December. The NRDs will have until Jan. 31, 2014, to present their offset plans to the state.

LarVern Franzen of Hastings, who retired as CCC's president in

2008, devoted a 41-year career at the college to advancing the cause of CCC and Nebraska's community colleges.

On Nov. 4, he received the association's 2013 Friends of Community Colleges Award at the NCCA annual conference at Mid-Plains Community College in North Platte.

Franzen began his career at CCC-Hastings in 1967 as an accounting instructor and was promoted to chairman of business-related programs in 1969.

In 1977, the Gothenburg native was selected to establish

the Lexington Center to serve citizens in the western part of CCC's 25-county service area. During his 10 years as an associate dean at the Lexington Center, he worked to build people's awareness of CCC and to improve the college's services in the area.

degrees in journalism and advertising and for, by all accounts, being a good father to his five children.

"You've done a lot of good things in your life as far as charity and with kids," Bruning said.

"For our purposes, we require 10 years with a clean record and in the end, we treat similar people similarly whether they're widely known or not widely

known. Mr. Rodgers has done what we've asked of any applicant."

Heineman said several people had contacted the board to weigh in against a pardon for Rodgers, hinting that he was being given special treatment. The board also received correspondence from people who pointed out that Rodgers had been hit with civil lawsuits for some of his business dealings.

The pardons board only considers crim-

inal acts as obstacles to a pardon.

Heineman gave Rodgers an opportunity to answer those who say he was given special consideration because of his status as an All-America football player.

"I don't think there's anything special about what I'm requesting," Rodgers said. "It's been a considerable amount of time that has taken place since the incident and I've actually had a pretty good history of trying to do positive things."

highly educated and more expensive registered nurses over licensed nurse practitioners.

During Thursday's meeting, Kautz presented the board with salary numbers on the low and high cost of the current program versus a full RN program with 7.5 FTE nurses and an LPN program with a total of 10 FTE.

"One of the things we have to do as we study this further is we have to understand the availability of qualified individuals whether they're RNs or LPNs," Kautz told the board.

In a recent conversation with

Consbruck, Kautz said she left him with a quote that stuck with him in this situation.

"We want to hire quality professionals," he said.

In the end, Kautz said the RN versus LPN might not be an issue if they're looking more at the quality of people.

"That really rang with me in the sense of Hastings Public Schools always tries to hire the best," he said. "I know there's budgetary forces that would say you want to hire as cheaply as you can. I think we need to take the experience of professionals considered for employment."

Kautz asked the board to give administration more time to conduct more

research on the available options and even look into the school-based clinic concept before any decisions are made.

"I would tell you from a professional personal prospective, a school-based clinic does make sense with the population we're serving," he said. "I think we need to be as much one-stop shop and try to get medical services to our students on timely services."

Kautz said he wants to look more into the programs at Grand Island Public Schools and Omaha Public Schools to find out how their programs work with the health care providers in the community and any existing school nurse programs.

## Police seek to have brutality suit dismissed

**OMAHA** — Several Omaha police officers being sued by a man who says they used excessive force in his 2011 arrest claim they are immune from such lawsuits and are seeking to have the case dismissed.

The videotaped arrest of Robert Wagner, of Omaha, in May 2011 outside an Omaha hospital emergency room led to accusations of police brutality.

A hospital security camera captured images of several Omaha police officers pinning down Wagner in the hospital's parking lot.

The video seemed to show one officer kicking him while he was restrained on the ground. Two officers were fired, but both were later reinstated following arbitration.

Wagner filed a federal lawsuit last November against the

city and several officers, saying the officers used excessive force and conspired to deprive

him of his constitutional rights. His lawsuit seeks an unspecified amount in damages. Wagner, who was at the hospital after a cousin was taken there with a mortal gunshot wound, said officers jumped him in the

parking lot after he directed an obscenity to a female police officer.

Wagner said he was frustrated because police had refused

to allow his girlfriend to enter the emergency room lobby, saying it was closed to the public for security reasons, even though they allowed a city councilman inside the emergency room.

Other than the remark, Wagner says he did not physically confront police or resist arrest.

But police have maintained that Wagner was combative and riling other people in the emergency room lobby against police.

Wagner was asked to leave, police have said, and was arrested because, once outside the emergency room doors, he turned to walk back in. Force was used, police said, after the 6-foot-4 Wagner punched an officer.

Late last week, attorneys for seven officers named as defendants in the lawsuit filed motions for summary judgment, saying they have quali-

fied immunity from lawsuits.

Thomas Mumgaard, a city attorney who is also representing six of the officers, said Wednesday that he had not yet received a reply from Wagner's attorney, but noted that they have at least 20 days to make one.

Mumgaard's brief in support of the motion for summary judgment says the officers could not have determined that the force used was excessive "in the rapidly evolving dangerous circumstances."

"Many of the officers in the hospital that night rightfully saw him as a troublemaker," the brief says.

Attorneys for Wagner did not immediately return a phone message left Wednesday seeking comment. An attorney for Officer Aaron Pennington, who is being represented by outside counsel, also did not return a message Wednesday.

"Things like this don't happen often, but it makes us see how important it is for our systems to be reliable and online."

The equipment that caused the outage was shipped to the manufacturer for repairs and staff estimates that WEC-1 will be back online in the next several weeks. The cost of repairs is estimated at \$15,000 and costs were also incurred from the purchase of backup power after the outage.

"That was one instance where one of our systems worked," said HU Manager Marv Schultes. "The failure occurred, we had technicians out there evaluating the situation, engineers were called in to assess the problem, and the equipment was sent to be fixed. We have those systems in place specifically for things like this."

In other budget discussions, Schultes said that the water department will continue to be a priority for the utilities staff as chemical filtering and treatments are purchased to address the nitrate and uranium contamination issues facing city wells.

"As far as lying awake at night, the water department is what gets your attention. Not only in terms of dollars, but also in its ramifications for the people," said HU Manager Marv Schultes.

The HU budget will be discussed in a joint work session with the board and City Council 7 p.m. Tuesday at the HU board room.

The group includes business, community and university leaders who helped brainstorm 10 important future Lincoln projects.

Jennifer Brinkman, a consultant for the group, says it became difficult to raise money for the arena because it's the project was in good financial shape.

In this auction, North-South had agreed to use transfer bids, but North forgot. So he assumed South's three-heart rebid indicated length in that suit.

Against four hearts, West led the spade king (luckily not a trump). The Rueful Rabbit ruffed in the dummy, played a diamond to his ace, trumped another spade, returned to the diamond king, ruffed a third spade, and took two club tricks ending on the board.

After a brief pause, R.R. trumped a diamond with his heart jack. West had to discard a spade. Then a fourth spade ruff was followed by another diamond. With this coup en passant, East could not stop South from scoring his heart king. Four hearts bid and made!

If you have never read any of these stories, start with the original book, "Bridge in the Menagerie."

# 'Challenger' TV film stars William Hurt

**NEW YORK** — The watching world was horrified when, on Jan. 28, 1986, the space shuttle Challenger exploded over Cape Canaveral, Fla., just seconds after liftoff. Seven crew members, including beloved Teacher-In-Space Christa McAuliffe, lost their lives and the manned space program was dealt a nearly mortal blow.

Five months later, the reason — two of the shuttle's O-rings had failed during launch — was made public, a major finding of the presidential commission formed to solve the mystery.

A vocal member of that commission was Richard Feynman, a world-renowned physicist and Nobel laureate whose sharp mind and dogged spirit led him to the design flaw, in the process exposing negligence and cover-ups by both NASA and the contractor supplying it the O-rings.

A new film, "The Challenger Disaster," stars William Hurt as Feynman (with co-stars including Brian Dennehy and Bruce Greenwood). Airing Saturday at 8 p.m. on Science Channel and Discovery Channel, it depicts his unswerving search for the truth, even in the face of resistance from his colleagues.

"In a way, Feynman interested me more than the project did," says Hurt. "This is mostly an event story, but I thought we could allow character to exist within the narrative and lead to a greater conclusion: Human courage is really what it's all about, and listening to your own instinctive, loving skeptic. That's what Feynman did."

It's a nippy fall day and Hurt is discussing the film, and many other things, with a reporter as he walks his dog, Lucy, in Manhattan's Riverside Park.

The 63-year-old Hurt, a TV, stage and Oscar-winning film star (for "Kiss of the Spider Woman"), has been taking an acting break this fall to play a different role, that of student, as this former Tufts theology major plunges, with undisguised humility, into a pair of courses at Columbia University: computer science

and Indo-Tibetan Hinduism. "I'm working pretty hard," he says with clear understatement as he unsnaps the leash worn by Lucy, a gentle Doberman pinscher-Labrador mix, who is nibbling some grass and contemplating the joggers.

"Your mind, your heart must learn to value yourself," Hurt says, pivoting back to what Feynman taught him. "That's where your answers will come from: Learn to bear your frustrations gladly, 'cause they're your teacher. YOU are your teacher."

An actor often outspoken about the frustration he bears as an actor ("I have a hard time finding work that will allow me to do what I know how to do, because they won't give me time to prepare") has only good things to say about shooting "The Challenger Disaster."

A co-production with the BBC, the film was directed by James Hawes ("Doctor Who," "Fanny Hill"), whom Hurt hails as "a great human being and a great director."

Under Hawes' stewardship, Hurt says, he got what he craves as an actor: "Not to be showing off, not to be insecure, but to open myself to a new look at life."

Hawes, speaking by phone from England, describes their first meeting while he was on a trip to New York last fall.

The pair took a stroll to visit, fittingly, the shuttle Enterprise prototype installed nearby at the Intrepid Sea, Air & Space Museum Complex.

"The sun was shining," Hawes recalls, "and we had the most extraordinary walk. By the end of it, we had a bond."

Once shooting commenced in South Africa, Hawes goes on, "I arranged for William to have a lesson on the bongos, because Feynman notoriously played them. I'm not usually that Method, but I knew that he is a man who loves his research. I'll never forget sitting there in the dying light of a South African evening with William Hurt and a bongo teacher hammering out rhythms."

In Riverside Park, Hurt describes his fascination with the character whose rhythms he channeled.

"I was so grafted to Feynman as a spirit," he says. "A spirit like that, you can legitimately worship. They don't want your enslavement, they want your freedom. Feynman wants your freedom!"

"Look! Here comes a cop!" he interrupts himself as he spies a parks department golf cart. "He'll arrest you," Hurt tells Lucy as he re-snaps the leash the law requires her to wear. "You'd go to prison. We'd go to prison together."

Feynman died in 1988 at age 69 of the cancer he was battling while on the commission, but his spirit lives on, including, Hurt hopes, in this film, and in the interest the film might spur in what Feynman stood for. That sort of impact, Hurt says, is what makes drama great.

"Being interesting for its own sake is worthless," he declares. "You have to be interested in a theme: The question of who we are, why we are, should be considered carefully and audaciously. Just attracting attention for its own sake is chaos."

# 'Anchorman' parody of TV news lands at Newseum

**WASHINGTON** — While Dorothy's ruby slippers from "The Wizard of Oz" are prize artifacts at the Smithsonian, Ron Burgundy's burgundy "Anchorman" suit might turn out to be the most popular item at the Newseum.

The museum about news and the First Amendment has opened "Anchorman: The Exhibit," featuring costumes and props from Will Ferrell's 2004 movie "Anchorman: The Legend of Ron Burgundy." The story of a fictional news team's sexist reaction to the arrival of an ambitious female reporter

was a parody of real tumult in the 1970s TV business.

For the exhibition created with Paramount Pictures, Newseum curators paired more than 60 costumes and props from the movie with real stories about TV news and the struggle for women to achieve equality in the newsroom.

"In any parody, there's a kernel of truth, right?" said Cathy Trost, the Newseum's vice president of exhibits. "There really was a time in news history when men owned the anchor chair and women were a novelty in the newsroom. The movie gets that right, though in a very over-the-top way, and we

wanted to show the reality behind the humor."

In addition to Burgundy's suit, displayed in a revolving case, the museum also exhibits his flute, mustache brush and a reporter's "Sex Panther" cologne. Costumes in the exhibit include those worn by Veronica Comingstone, the ambitious reporter played by Christina Applegate. There's also a replica of the "Anchorman" news desk.

For each detail from the movie, there's also a dose of reality. The Newseum pulled together stories of women who broke down barriers in television, including a Kansas City

news anchor who sued her station after she was demoted for being "too old" and "too unat-

## New breast milk policy planned for online sales

**CHICAGO** — An online breast milk exchange linked to bacteria contamination in a new study says it is changing its policies.

Researchers found high amounts of bacteria that could potentially sicken babies in three-fourths of samples they bought from women who advertised on the popular website, Only the Breast. A few of the 101 samples purchased contained salmonella, while others had evidence of fecal contamination, probably from breast milk sellers not properly washing their hands, said Sarah Keim, the lead author and a researcher at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio.

The study was published online Monday in *Pediatrics*.

An unidentified administrator for the breast milk organization issued a statement over the weekend saying the Incline Village, Nev.-based group is planning to stop informal "mother to mother" milk sharing and is forming a new milk bank program for sick babies that will involve better donor screening and "professional milk processing."

"Donors will be fully screened, tested and instructed on safe handling methods," and will be offered fair compensation, the statement said.

The statement didn't indicate if the research prompted the changes and a spokesman did not return email and phone messages seeking additional comment on Monday.

Human breast milk is sold for babies on several online sites for a few dollars an ounce, and offered free in several other online milk-sharing exchanges. Users include parents of adopted babies and mothers who have difficulty breastfeeding.

Breast milk is also provided through milk banks, whose clients include hospitals. They also charge fees but screen donors and pasteurize donated milk to kill any germs. The researchers also found bacteria in some of 20 unpasteurized samples donated to a milk bank but not as much as in the milk bought online.

With Internet sites, "you have very few ways to know for sure what you are getting is really breast milk and that it's safe to feed your baby," Keim said.

Sources for bacteria found in the study aren't known but could include donors' skin, breast pumps used to extract milk, or contamination from improper shipping methods, Keim said.

She advised against obtaining breast milk online.

# Strep scorecard to tell if you need a doc

**ATLANTA** — Debating whether to seek a strep test for that sore throat? One day there could be an app for that: Researchers are developing a home scorecard that aims to prevent thousands of unnecessary trips to the doctor for this common complaint.

More than 12 million people make doctors' visits for a sore throat every year. Usually the culprit is a virus that they just have to wait out with a little TLC.

In fact, the risk of strep throat is low enough for adults that doctors may skip testing them, deciding not to bother after running down a list of symptoms. That can leave patients wondering why they spent hours in the waiting room and had to pay the doctor's bill.

"If you could know that your risk was low enough that you wouldn't even be tested, you might actually save yourself a visit," said Dr. Andrew Fine, an emergency physician at Boston Children's Hospital.

The trick: Combine some of the symptoms that doctors look for with a bit of computer data to tell if strep throat is circulating in your geographical region. If the bug's in your neighborhood, that increases the chances that you've caught it, said Dr. Kenneth Mandl, a Harvard professor and informatics specialist with Boston Children's.

As a first step, Fine and Mandl turned to the records of more than 70,000 sore-throat patients who got strep tests and had their symptoms recorded at CVS MinuteClinics in six states between 2006 and 2008. They determined those people's risk of strep using the experimental scorecard approach and checked the computer model's accuracy against the strep test results.

Nationally, identifying those with less than a 10 percent chance of strep throat could save 230,000 doctor visits a year, the team reported Monday in the journal *Annals of Internal Medicine*.

The method wasn't perfect: It meant 8,500 strep cases would have been missed, or the diagnosis delayed, concluded the government-funded study.

But Mandl said it's unlikely that would lead to lasting harm as most of those infections would clear up on their own, or persisting pain eventually would send patients to the doctor. And he noted that the rapid strep tests that doctors use in their offices can miss cases, too.

Much more research is needed to prove if the method would work in everyday life and if a mobile app or a phone call to the doctor would be the best approach. The Boston team has begun the next step: Parents of kids who come to the hospital's emergency room for a strep test are handed a digital tablet and asked to fill out the scorecard first. Researchers will see how the combination of symptoms and local infection trends compare with actual strep test results.

Sore throats are a challenge. Strep throat, caused by bacteria named Group A streptococcus, is to blame for only about 10 percent of cases in adults, and 30 percent in children.

It's hard to tell who needs a strep test based on symptoms alone, cautioned Dr. Chris Van Beneden of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which helped fund the new research. But what is clear: Doctors should be sure it's strep before prescribing antibiotics because those bacteria-fighting drugs have no effect on viruses.

Yet research published last month in the journal *JAMA Internal Medicine* found 60 percent of adults who sought care for a sore throat received antibiotics. Unneeded antibiotic use can spur development of drug-resistant germs.

The Boston team looked at the flip side of the issue: Who could safely skip a strep check? Because strep is most common in children ages 5 to 15, doctors usually test youngsters with a sore throat for the bacteria.

For anyone 15 or older, Mandl said doctors may skip a test depending on symptoms. While a cough and runny nose are more typical of a cold virus, strep symptoms might include a fever, enlarged lymph nodes, tonsils with swelling or pus and lack of a cough.

So Fine and Mandl focused first on the over-15 crowd. Because feeling lymph nodes and peeking at tonsils could be difficult for the average layman, their scorecard posed easy questions: Is there a fever? Is there a cough?

Then came the key: The scorecard automatically merged those symptoms

with local trends in strep diagnosis.

It's a practice called biosurveillance. Already, hundreds of hospitals, clinics and health departments automatically report certain symptoms and diagnoses to the government. That lets officials track the spread of flu every year, for example — and some web sites now show flu activity by zip code so people can check if influenza has reached their community.

Likewise, results of strep tests are available digitally from testing laboratories, clinics, even large doctors' offices, Mandl said. They just have to be collected and used, which isn't routine.

In an accompanying editorial, Dr. Robert Centor of the University of Alabama, Birmingham, said too many clinics and emergency rooms still give a strep test to every sore throat patient. But he questioned if the home scorecard approach would make a difference, wondering if biosurveillance would be too costly or if average patients even would use it before seeking care.

## Testosterone treatments linked with heart risks

**CHICAGO** — Testosterone treatments may increase risks for heart attacks, strokes and death in older men with low hormone levels and other health problems, a big Veterans Affairs study suggests.

The results raise concerns about the widely used testosterone gels, patches or injections that are heavily marketed for low sex drive, fatigue and purported anti-aging benefits, the authors and other doctors said.

Men who used testosterone were 30 percent more likely to have a heart attack or stroke or to die during a three-year period than men with low hormone levels who didn't take the supplements. Hormone users and nonusers were in their early 60s on average, and

most had other health problems including high blood pressure, unhealthy cholesterol and diabetes.

The research doesn't prove that testosterone caused the heart attacks, strokes or death, but echoes a previous study in older men and should prompt doctors and patients to discuss potential risks and benefits of using the products, said study lead author Dr. Michael Ho, a cardiologist with the VA's Eastern Colorado Health System in Denver.

The nationwide study involved an analysis of health data on 8,700 veterans with low levels of testosterone, the main male sex hormone. All had undergone a heart imaging test and many had risk factors for heart problems, including blocked heart arteries. Risks linked with testosterone were similar in men with and without exist-

ing heart problems.

Nearly 26 percent of men using testosterone had one of the bad outcomes within three years of the heart test, compared with 20 percent of nonusers.

It's unclear how the hormone might increase heart risks but possibilities include evidence that testosterone might make blood substances called platelets stick together, which could lead to blood clots, the study authors said.

Previous studies on the supplements' health effects have had mixed results, with some research suggesting potential heart benefits but none of the studies has been conclusive.

The new study was published Tuesday in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*.

An editorial in the journal said it is uncertain if the study results apply to other groups of men, including younger men using the hormone for supposed anti-aging benefits.

"There is only anecdotal evidence that testosterone is safe for these men," said editorial author Dr. Anne Cappola, a hormone expert at University of Pennsylvania and an associate journal editor.

"In light of the high volume of prescriptions and aggressive marketing by testosterone manufacturers, prescribers and patients should be wary" and more research is needed, she wrote.

Annual prescriptions for testosterone supplements have increased more than five-fold in recent years, climbing to more than 5 million and \$1.6 billion in U.S. sales in 2011, the study noted.

**GRAND ISLAND** — The Bruning-Davenport/Shickley volleyball team knows it may not be as tall as the other teams.

At Thursday's Class D-1 state tournament match, some of the Eagles' fans even had a sign that said "Play Huge," and that's exactly what BDS did.

Colts rally from 14 down, beat Titans

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — The Indianapolis Colts keep digging themselves into early holes — and proving they know how to come back and win.

Donald Brown ran for two touchdowns, Andrew Luck added another and the Colts rallied yet again, this time beating the Tennessee Titans 30-27 on Thursday night.

The Colts (7-3) trailed 14-0 in the first quarter and have been outscored 35-0 in the first quarters in their past three games — two of them victories. They also have trailed in six games after the first quarter this season.

"At the end of the day winning is what matters," Luck said. "We were fortunate in this game to survive our mistakes and have a chance to win. ... But we know that's got to be fixed."

Adam Vinatieri kicked three field goals, including a 50-yarder, and Coby Fleener had a career-high eight catches for 107 yards to help the Colts bounce back quite nicely from a 38-8 home loss to St. Louis. They have yet to lose back-to-back games under coach Chuck Pagano and are 8-0 coming off a loss. "Obviously, starting out like that

is something we're all too familiar with," Fleener said. "That's something we have to work and get corrected."

The Colts are back in charge of the AFC South too, now having beaten all three divisional opponents on the road.

"We're not worried about that yet," Luck said. "We're worried about this next game."

The Titans (4-6) lost their second straight and fifth in six games, blowing the big lead. Chris Johnson ran for two touchdowns and 70 yards in the first quarter, but had only 16 yards after that.

"We've got to find that winning formula, whatever it is," Titans quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick said. "We have to find a way to pull these games out at the end. It's a tough locker room in there right now. That's two in a row that kind of slipped away from us. Two big ones, two costly ones for us."

Fitzpatrick drove the Titans 80 yards in four plays, capping the drive with a 19-yard TD pass to Delanie Walker with 1:54 left. But the Titans, just like they did in becoming the first team to lose to Jacksonville this season on Sunday, couldn't execute an onside kick with the ball not even covering 10

yards before Colts linebacker Pat Angerer covered it up.

The Colts had the ball less than 6 minutes in the first quarter and wound up holding the ball more than 32:23. They also outgained the Titans 366-340 after Tennessee opened with a 148-4 edge in total offense with its quick start.

Indianapolis sealed the victory with an 11-play drive capped by Brown with an 11-yard TD with 3:01 left, and the Colts ran on 10 of the 11 plays for 60 yards. That was the Colts' fourth drive of 11 plays or more, and Brown praised the maligned offensive line for a phenomenal job. So did Pagano, who said the linemen took it personally. "They had a point to prove," Pagano said.

Luck finished 23 of 36 for 232 yards passing.

The Titans came out with the start they only wish they had Sunday losing to Jacksonville 29-27. Fitzpatrick did not turn the ball over once replacing Jake Locker, who's out the rest of the season with a Lisfrac injury to his right foot.

The Titans were up 17-6 at half-time and looked to be in control as the Colts had a mini-meltdown with three personal fouls including

linebacker Erik Walden head-butting Delanie Walker after ripping the helmet off the Titans tight end.

The Colts won their fourth straight and for the ninth time in 10 games over their divisional rival with Vinatieri's 30-yard field goal as the first half expired helping settle the Colts down. That was the first of 20 straight points as they dominated in the third quarter holding the ball for more than 11 minutes in taking a 23-17 lead.

They opened the third quarter with an 11-play drive where Luck completed all five of his passes for 42 yards, including two on third down. Brown capped the drive with a 7-yard TD.

Then Devon Wylie, signed to the roster Tuesday for an injured Damian Williams at returner, ran into teammate Craig Stevens and fumbled on the kickoff for Tennessee. Daniel Herron recovered for the Colts at the Titans 20, and Luck scrambled for an 11-yard TD two plays later.

It was yet another special teams gaffe this season by the Titans.

"For whatever reason, we just can't hold onto the football," Titans coach Mike Munchak said. "Another seven-point play really."

A strong start in the next set helped the Whippets overcome the third-set loss, as Minden went on a 6-0 run to post an 8-3 lead.

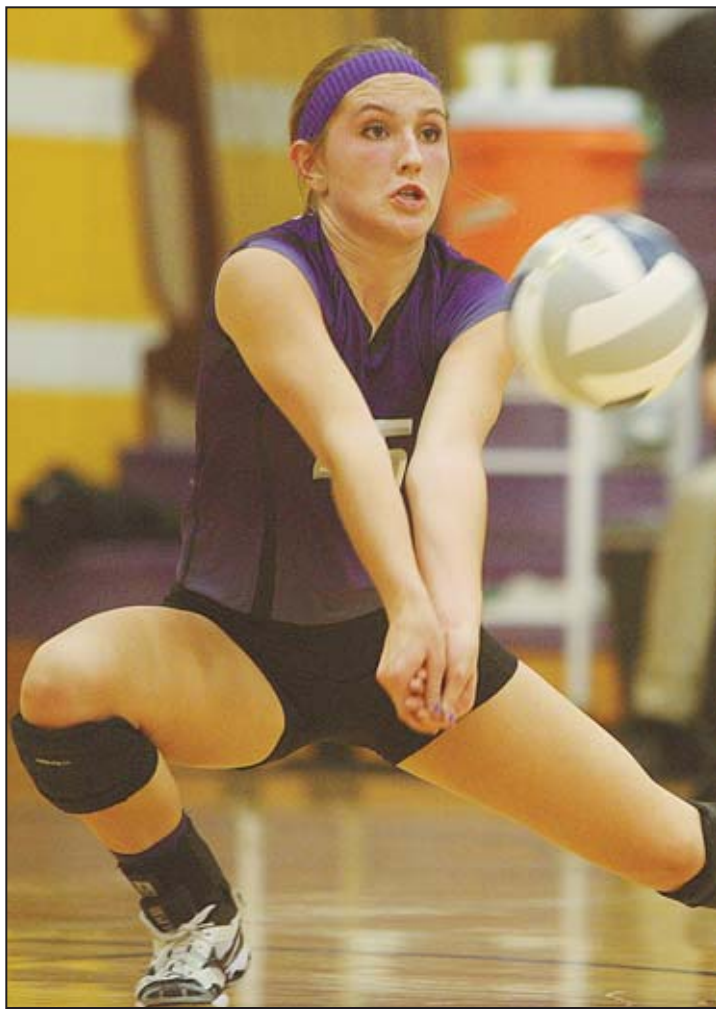

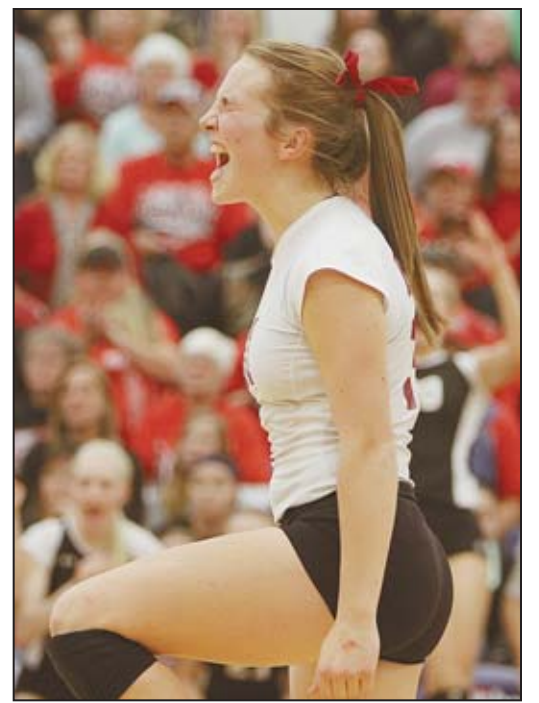

**TRAIN CAR CHANGE**

**OMAHA** — U.S. railroads are supporting new safety standards for rail cars that haul flammable liquids to address flaws that can allow crude oil, ethanol and other substances to leak during accidents.

The Association of American Railroads said Thursday that railroads support making upgrades to the fleet of 92,000 tank cars that carry flammable liquids.

The Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration is considering a plan intended to fix a dangerous design flaw in a rail car commonly used to haul oil and other hazardous liquids from coast to coast.

Safety experts say the soda-can shaped car, known as the DOT-111, has a tendency to split open during derailments and other major accidents.

Government speeds research on car safety systems

**WASHINGTON** — The government is speeding up research on safety systems that automatically prevent drivers from operating their cars if they are drunk or aren't properly buckled in.

Officials also said Thursday that they expect to decide by year's end how to encourage automakers to make some special safety systems already in certain high-end vehicles available in more cars. Those systems warn drivers before a collision that they are about to run into another vehicle and can brake automatically to avoid a crash or make it less severe.

The innovations — collision avoidance, seat belt interlocks and driver alcohol detection systems — hold the potential of dramatically reducing traffic fatalities, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

As they looked ahead to emerging safety technologies, officials released data showing the first increase in highway fatalities since 2005. There were 33,561 traffic deaths in 2012, or 1,082 more than the year before.

Despite the government's best efforts, some Americans are still driving drunk, driving distracted and not wearing seat belts, David Strickland, the agency's head, told reporters in a conference call.

"These technologies are in within reach," he said. "They

address the top three highway safety threats. They have the potential to significantly decrease those deaths. We only need the will to act."

The 3 percent increase in highway fatalities may be due in part to last year's unusually warm winter, which length-

ened the motorcycle riding season.

Seventy-two percent of the increase occurred in the first three months of the year. Most of those involved were motorcyclists or pedestrians, the government said.

Preliminary data so far this

year indicates traffic deaths may be dropping again, Strickland said.

The seat belt interlocks would prevent cars and trucks from being driven when the driver or a passenger isn't buckled in properly.

The agency said this poten-

tially could save about 3,000 people a year.

The agency is examining whether it should change safety standards to allow automakers to use the devices to satisfy current government requirements for occupant protection in crash tests.
