Wagoner excited to be in charge of Sodbusters

wreynolds@hastingstribune.com Chandler Wagoner is a baseball journeyman; a former player who knows his own strengths and weaknesses and encourages others to find those out about themselves as

"I think one of the things that's most important to me is knowing what kind of player you are," Wagoner said on a phone call from Lawrence, Kan., earlier this week. "So, just getting these guys to realize who they are as a player and what their skill set is, I think, is super important for these guys to learn this summer.

Wagoner, who will coach the 2021 Hastings Sodbusters, was one of those players at the University of Oklahoma. He came out of a deep pool of baseball talent in Temecula, Calif., knowing he might not be the top dog somewhere. But he desired a college experience at a big school.

Wagoner chose the Sooners and became

mostly a role player. "I didn't a play a ton," he said. "I won't say it wasn't about playing time for me, but I wanted to play at a big school. That was my goal, so when I got the opportunity I took it whether I was going to play or not. I wanted a degree from a big school and then to go into coaching."

Learning from some of the best coaches at the college level was another benefit of going to a Division I. Wagoner developed connections early in life living in California, where baseball is played year-round and college coaches are always on the prowl.

Even though he didn't play at Kansas University, being in the Big 12Conference and maintaining a relationship with Jayhawks' coach Ritch Price proved to be important in his coaching start.

"I met (Price) probably when I was in elementary school," Wagoner said. "I think I was 7 and a bat boy for him when they were playing at San Diego. We kind of stayed in touch, and when I was at Oklahoma I obviously got to see him a few times a year."

Wagoner, 25, is currently a volunteer assistant coach at Kansas, following two years as a graduate assistant there. Before that, he briefly coached at Palomar College in San Marcos, Calif. Soon, he'll be in

charge, at least for a short few months when he joins the Hastings Sodbusters in the dugout at Duncan Field. His arrival will likely be a little late as the Jayhawks play in the Big 12 tournament beginning May 26.

The Sodbusters open the season May 22 against Fremont.

"I'm planning to be there a day or two after our season (at Kansas) ends," Wagoner said.

It'll be just the second time he's been the headman of a team. He's far from unfamiliar with summer baseball and how it operates, though.

"The Sodbusters are fortunate to have Chandler as part of the 2021 ball club," said Scott Galusha, the team's co-owner and general manager. "His knowledge and playing experience will undoubtedly be beneficial to our players."

Wagoner spent summers in Maine, California, and Massachusetts as a player and has since helped coach teams in San Diego and Palm Springs.

"This is probably my sixth or seventh stop in summer ball," he said. "There aren't too many places I haven't been for baseball at this point.

"I was totally pulled into it," Grace said with a smile.

Sodbusters' staff gave their all to make 2020 season happen

Everyone's world was changed last spring when the COVID-19 pandemic started, and the sports universe was no different. College basketball's biggest tournament was canceled, the Major League Baseball season was shortened by more than 100 games, and the NBA season lasted even longer than normal (something we thought was not possible).

The Expedition League experienced its own setbacks from the pandemic, but while some teams in the league were not able to have a season, the Hastings Sodbusters experienced one of their best seasons.

Hastings' Expedition League squad may not have gotten to play a full season, but the Busters had a little more than a month's worth of games and gave the Hastings community a little sense of normalcy in a time where it needed a lift.

"Surely there were some amazing hurdles we had to overcome in this crazy world we're living in today,' said Sodbusters' owner and Scott Galusha. "I was very happy and very pleased, our staff worked very hard working every day as if we were going to play, knowing that it was iffy all the way. When we finally got the go ahead, which was June 3, we had three weeks to put everything else together and get a baseball team going.

"We were able to accomplish that. There were a lot of limitations and A lot of things that we didn't expect we would have to work on, so we had our best year ever and that is a testament to our organization and how hard our group worked. We had our best year ever, and that is pretty impressive given the situation we had to deal with.'

Obviously, last season looked a little different than previous seasons; for example, the Sodbusters were limited in their allowed capacity at the start of the season. And one of the most time consuming differences was also one of the most important: the additional cleaning and safety measures.

Galusha said it may have been a lot of extra work, but it was all worth doing in order to give the fans the joy of watching baseball.

"We knew we were going to have some different rules with Covid and everything else, but almost very night it was me spraying the bleachers after every game. That was important, and I wanted to make sure I did it right. Not that my staff couldn't do it, but if it was going to go wrong I didn't want to say well I thought this happened," he said. "It was something different and something that was going to take some time, it added another hour and a half to the day, but it was one of the things we had to do in order to play and provide our community with some baseball and some smiles... that was well worth everything, seeing those people there smiling and enjoying the game."

The Sodbusters' staff had its daily routine shaken up, but it got through the season without any major hiccups. After the final game had wrapped up, Galusha said the staff felt like it could accomplish anything. It had just held a successful baseball season during a pandemic in a safe

The team's owner said Trevor Overmiller and Murphy Glen played huge roles on a daily basis to the

I'll probably get to cross a few more off my list this summer.

"I've never been to a lot of the places we're going to this summer, so it'll be cool."

Through the first three years of the Expedition League, rosters have been littered with Kansas Jayhawks, including the Sodbusters. It's partly how Wagoner got connected. Locals like Casey Burnham (Grand Island) and Hastings' own Brooks Asher were Jayhawks-turned-Sodbusters.

On this year's roster, there's only one Jayhawk so far.

Since Wagoner was snagged as coach later than usual, he didn't have much to do with the construction of it. Galusha, who did a majority of the recruiting, will manage the first week of games, or until Wagoner arrives.

Joining Wagoner on the coaching staff will be Luke Bay, who is currently a graduate assistant coach for Kansas State. Bay, a pitcher, played one full season for the Wildcats, in 2019, but his senior season was cut short due to the pandemic.

Wagoner and Bay got connected through Pete Hughes, the Wildcats' fourth-year head coach who was previously at Oklahoma.

"(Hughes) recommended (Bay) and we got in touch," Wagoner said. "He's a pitching guy and I was really looking for a guy to help run the pitching this summer. So, it helped to have a guy who is in to it and knew what he was doing. It seems like a good fit."

The Sodbusters will have a true battery as their coaching staff,

which Wagoner hopes help to translate into wins. Last year the Sodbusters led the Expedition League in walks issued (289), which panned out to be 5.7 per game as a pitching staff.

"Pound the strike zone will be a big (point of emphasis) for me," Wagoner said.

If there's one thing Wagoner wants out of his guys all summer, it's effort. He understands the relaxation aspect of summer baseball, but he wants the players to leave as better than they arrived. That means maintaining a competitive attitude.

"I feel like as a staff that's something we'll harp the most," Wagoner said. "If you're going to be out there, compete. Compete every day and it's going to be a fun summer. If you're not there to compete, it's going to be a long summer"

Grace was accompanying Ariana at church camp when Hoffman buzzed her phone with a photo absent of any context.

"I'm like, what is this?" Grace said.

"(Brian) is begging, 'Can we please host? His name is Anthony, here are his stats.' I have never seen this kid.

"He's from California, he needs a home!" Grace imitated her husband.

Long story short, Hoffman got his wish. First-year Sodbuster Anthony Ortega moved into the family's yellow home on University Avenue right around July 4, 2018. The family typically throws a large gathering for the holiday, which is when Ortega had his introduction.

For the next month, Ortega lived in the basement with close to no privacy, Grace recalled.

"And the poor kid, we didn't have a door on his room and there were two little girls in a playroom across from him," she said. "Poor Anthony had no privacy."

Since then, a door has been added and the girls, now older, have graduated to new hobbies

Andrew Shaw, the left-handed pitcher the Hoffman-Graces hosted in 2019 and 2020, was a beneficiary of the in-

stallation.

While different, Ortega and Shaw were both great kids, Hoffman and Grace concurred.

"Shaw is really friendly and outgoing where as Anthony, when he was with us, it was doing homework for summer classes," Hoffman said.

While not with the Sodbusters for a third summer, Shaw is playing elsewhere before pursuing a fifth college season with former Sodbuster coach Ryan McClaran at University of Maine thanks to the pandemic.

Ortega just graduated with his master's degree from Benedictine College in Atchison, Kan., and accepted a coaching position there.

The family has kept in touch with both players since their departure.

They sent Shaw away with a gift.

"The biggest thing at the house at the end of the night is we'll go home, pop popcorn in the Whirley maker and they think it's the best thing," Hoffman said. "At the end of the season, we'll get a package sent to them and in there is a Whirley pop, some popcorn, some salt. Kind of like a going away gift."

"Every time (Shaw) uses it, he sends a snapchat," Grace added. One of the best parts of hosting a player is when their family visits.

"It's fun because they'll come into town and we'll host them in the house and they really have a good time with us," Hoffman said. "We take them out to dinner; we show them Hastings."

Plus, a misunderstood aspect of hosting is how little the players are actually around. Contrary to popular belief, it's not a huge burden.

or wherever. And really, we ask at the be-

ginning of the season

about breakfasts and we get cereal or protein sandwiches, but they're really easy to host. They do their own laundry, they're self-managed because they're in college and they're adults."

Hoffman did joke that as "host dad" he likes to sit with the players after the game and chat.

"We'd talk about highlights of the game and it's a real dad moment," Hoffman said.

This year, the family is hosting Jake Bigham, a second-year Sodbuster, which means more memories and another member of the household.

"You're just part of the family at that point," Hoffman said.

Uniform redesign mixes old with new

wreynolds@hastingstribune.com As the story goes, Bryan Frew was on a drive to Kansas City, Missouri, during the fall of 2017.

The mission of the drive isn't important, but a byproduct of it is.

Frew, who had just announced the Hastings Baseball Team (not yet the Sodbusters) would be taking the field in the inaugural season of the newly-launched Expedition League, had plenty of items on his to-do list.

This out-of-state trip helped cross one of those off.

Frew needed a color scheme for his new, nameless team. Although a public survey for a team name was out, Frew knew in that moment what its colors would be — regardless of the chosen moniker.

The drive into Kansas City from the north, especially during the fall, is technicolor.

The picturesque route is full of vibrant green and yellow leaves, often falling from the trees and littering roadways and eventually drifting toward the Missouri River.

Frew admittedly wasn't preferential to green and yellow before this day. But now he was and to this day, is.

Still a co-owner involved in team operations, Frew now looks forward every year to seeing the green and vellow cover Duncan Field's turf and stands.

The original uniform

designs favored the green, a forest shade. Yellow, at that point, was mostly trim save for the first-year home hat which bore a white old-style "H" in the center of a bright saffron dome.

The Sodbusters initially had just two uniform variations. The tops were white and green, the pants white or grey. A black jersey was added shortly after. The hats were yellow and green. In year two, a black hat was tossed into the mix, replacing the yellow.

Year three featured more uniform variety, including a brand new, tricolored hat and a military camouflage uniform with a Busch Light patch on the SIEEV

Now, after various auctions and giveaways, not to mention more than 180 games of use, the Sodbusters will don an entirely new trio of tops and bottoms.

"In my career of high school coaching, I'm comfortable with a

three-year rotation as far as uniforms go," said co-owner Scott Galusha. "They get worn

pretty hard.

"We probably could have made it one more year, but our goal was to find a sponsor who would help us do that and the Nebraska Lottery stepped up. So, you'll see a patch on the sleeve.

The new look draws inspiration from the Oakland A's. For baseball fans familiar with the Major League club, the resemblance is uncanny.

The hats and white pinstripe pants are perhaps the most dissimilar — not by much — but nonetheless that was the vision. "We patterned the

things we're doing after (the A's)," Galusha said. That includes a redesigned logo. No H, no

team mascot, but a letter B on the cap. The B's, short for 'Busters — the team

nickname's nickname. "When I presented that to the rest of the staff, they didn't hate it, but they didn't love it at first," Galusha said with a laugh. "But as we started working on it and putting it together, they liked it

more and more." It led to an "I told you so" type of moment with Sodbuster staffers Murphy Glen and Trevor Overmiller that brought Galusha satisfaction.

"One of my favorite moments was when Murphy and Trevor opened the box of the hats and both said 'I hate it when you're right,' "Galusha said.

"The hats are certainly different, but I thought to switch it up wasn't going to hurt anything. We essentially had the same design on the hat for three years so we wanted to change it up.'

The team will have options of green, gray, or yellow for its uniform tops. The green is marked "Sodbusters' in cursive across the chest while gray reads "Hastings."

There is also an alternate yellow jersey, which, like the hat, has the new "B's" logo on the left pec next to the American flag. A jersey number in on the lower right side.

"I knew I wanted to be pretty standard with the home jerseys (green) and I just knew the grays would look nice," Galusha said. "Then we just decided

that we've had the same basic logo the entire time so we thought we'd just freshen it up a little bit and go with it on the hat and the alternative (yellow) jersey."

The pants options are white with green pinstripes and gray with a green and vellow double piping. The team will wear green socks.

"What you're going to see on Saturday night,' Galusha said. "is the tall green socks, the pinstriped pants and the green jersey."

Also new this year, the coaches' jackets feature a familiar H, but one different from anything the Sodbusters have previously worn.

This H is akin to what Hastings College and American Legion teams have worn through the years. It has a flared out left side stroke and slight slant to it.

"We just liked a little bit of a change," Galusha said. "There are a lot of jobs as a general manager of the Sodbusters, but one of the fun ones is getting to design those uniforms."
