### Dog Custody Is Disputed

GALESBURG, Ill. (AP) — A custody wrangle was about the only disputed issue in the Harold Lynch divorce case in Circuit Court.

Judge Albert Scott ruled Thursday in favor of the wife, Mrs. Lynch. She gets custody of their small mongrel dog, Mitzie, but Lynch has visitation rights on the second and fourth Sundays of each month, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. The Lynches have no children.

### Soviet Paper Hails Chile

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda Saturday hailed Chile's decision to restore diplomatic relations with Cuba as a sign that "realistic trends are gaining ground" in Latin America "despite Washington's efforts."

The paper charged that the United States has tried to prevent Latin American countries from conducting independent foreign policy.

### Pike County Man Killed; Cousin Held

PIKEVILLE, Ky. — A Pike County man was shot to death late Friday night at the home of his cousin, who was charged with murder in connection with the 10:30 p.m. incident.

Dead as the result of a shotgun wound of the stomach and chest areas was 43-year-old George Reasford Pinson of Rockhouse Fork of Big Creek, near Sidney.

Lodged in the Pike County jail here and charged with murder was Jimmy Pinson, 25, also a resident of Rockhouse Fork, located south of Sidney off U.S. 118, about 17 miles north of Pikeville.

State police declined to give any details as to what prompted the shooting except to say it occurred inside the home of the accused.

### Cousin Gets Letter From De Gaulle

LILLE, France (AP) — The day of his death, Charles de Gaulle wrote to his cousin and told him, "Everything is calm here. I am continuing my big job and think very often of our (family), of those who are in heaven and those who are on the earth."

The phrase "my big job" was a reference to De Gaulle's work on his memoirs.

The letter, mailed Monday, arrived at the home of his cousin, Lucien Maillot, Friday, the day after De Gaulle's funeral.

Maillot is mayor of the town of Lambersart in the suburb of Lille, where De Gaulle was born.

The letter thanked Maillot for a greeting he sent De Gaulle on the general's saint's day. Maillot read a section of the letter to members of Lambersart's Municipal Council Friday night.
