immigration, and it won't reduce the jobs magnet that inevitably draws people here.

If Democrats were smart, they'd let Trump build whatever he wants on the border in exchange for massive concessions on other policies. But the Democratic base is too adamantly against The Wall, which it considers a symbol of exclusion and xenophobia, to make this negotiating strategy possible. Upon contact with the enemy, Trump will be lucky if The Wall ends up as much more than architectural plans and demonstration projects.

WESTMORELAND -Corbin Ltd. specialized in producing men's clothing and moved its factory to Huntington from New York in 1957. The new factory was located on Vernon Street in the Westmoreland section of Wayne County. It continued to operate until 2003. The factory is now under the direction of Coalfield Development Corporation and has been re-purposed as the West Edge Factory. It will house multiple tenants as well as Refresh Appalachia, a local

produce marketer. Currently, Coalfield has a wood shop in the factory where they produce wood items using re-purposed wood.

counties struggling to keep up with their jail bills and also meet their other obligations may need more financial tools to cope successfully.

Currently, county governments have few options to raise more revenue when needed to deal with a true budget crisis - a result of the tight control that state government generally has on local public bodies in the Mountain State.

Perhaps state policy makers should join with local government representatives to explore ways that county governments can raise more fee and tax revenues when truly needed. This isn't a call for promoting sharp county tax increases across the state, but it is reasonable to loosen the reins on counties to some degree so that meeting the jail obligation can be met without hurting other services required of county governments. And since county commission members are elected, the voters will have a say in turning out any officials that go too far.
