

On the Cover

Art was an important part of the Virginia Highlands Festival from its beginnings. Two of the founders of the festival were Ruby Ball and Dixie Lee Wingold who for many years ran a summer Artists' Cabin in Abingdon, where art classes were taught, and artwork was displayed and sold. The earliest display of work by local artists was at the Clothesline Art Show, where art was pinned on clotheslines,



and the show culminated on the last day of the festival at an art auction.

The cover photograph captures people looking at the artwork just before the auction is to begin. The auction was across the street from the Artists' Cabin. The house in the background is the David Gillock Rose House, which stood on East Main Street (where Mr. Siegner's Men's Shop is currently). It was the first "duplex" house in Abingdon.



Meet the Culinary Artists at a tour of Nicewonder Farm's Gardens and Greenhouse Wednesday, July 24 6-8pm • \$50

Talk with chefs, farmers and growers, taste local fare, and tour beautiful gardens when Culinary Arts & Traditions presents a preview event to the popular Appalachian Supper.

"Talk. Taste. Tour." is a great way for visitors to meet and talk with the culinary artists who are putting together the next day's supper that will spotlight the people and produce of the Appalachian region.

North Carolina husband and wife team Jamie Swofford, a chef turned farmer, and Keia Mastrianni, owner and baker of Milk Glass Pie, will join Damascus herbalist Lori Briscoe to conduct a tour of the tasting room, garden, and greenhouse at Nicewonder Farm & Vineyards the day before the Appalachian Supper.

"Visitors will have the opportunity to walk the gardens and also meet the people who raise the food," said Briscoe, who is facilitating the event.

Swofford, Mastrianni, Briscoe and others will be on hand to answer questions--and visitors can sample local fare. "Seeing food growing and then getting to taste those foods gives you a new point of reference with what something should taste like," said Swofford. "These are the simple things we're fortunate enough to see daily, living on a farm. We just want to share that with everyone."

Swofford worked as a chef for twenty years before becoming a farmer, incorporating the Appalachian food traditions he experienced as a child. As owner and operator of Old North Farm in Cleveland County, North Carolina, Swofford grows nutrientdense seasonal vegetables without the use of chemicals, synthetic fertilizers, or large equipment. He supplies area chefs, brewer-

ies, and cocktail craftsmen around his North Carolina home.

Mastrianni is also a writer and cookbook author. Her writing has appeared in many publications, including Bon Appetit, Gravy, Eater, and Bake from Scratch. She is the co-author of "Bruce Moffett Cooks," a cookbook written in 2019 with Chef Bruce Moffett of Charlotte, North Carolina.

Briscoe, owner of Appalachian Teas and Botanicals, grows and gathers herbs for tea blends and other botanical products with a focus on wellness. She is passionate about making connections between plants, people, and place. An herbalist, writer, and educator, Briscoe helps people experience what she calls the Magic & Medicine of Place. She is passionate about educating people about the value of the area's biological diversity and rich cultural heritage.

"Talk. Taste. Tour" takes the place of the annual Table Talk, a panel discussion format previously held with visiting celebrity chefs at the Virginia Highlands Festival. "Instead of listening to us talk, visitors will get a much more interactive experience," said Briscoe.

Appalachian Supper, elevated local fare at Hickory

Thursday, July 25 6pm Hickory at Nicewonder Farm & Vineyards

A presentation of regional food will take center stage when the Culinary Arts & Traditions celebrates traditional Appalachian cuisine and the regional chefs who are committed to keeping it alive. An Appalachian Supper will be held at 6 p.m. on Thursday, July 25, at Hickory, the signature restaurant for Nicewonder Farm & Vineyards in Bristol, Virginia.

Travis Milton, head chef at Hickory, compares this year's Appalachian Supper to a homecoming, of sorts, bringing together new ideas from old friends who share the same passion for preserving the region's rich heritage and culture.

This year's four-course meal will be prepared by Milton, along with Jamie Swofford and Keia Mastrianni, a husband and wife team who own and operate Old North Farm in Shelby, North Carolina. The couple is known for their memorable farm-to-table suppers.

Mastrianni is the owner and baker of Milk Glass Pie, the bakery she runs from their North Carolina farm. She shares her husband's passion for cooking with regional foods and supporting the local farmers who help sustain the farm-to-table movement. Before she stepped into baking, Mastrianni wrote about food all over the South. "We've known Travis for many years and over the years we have supported each other as we've grown in our professional roles," said Mastrianni.

Milton recently was named a James Beard semifinalist for the Best Chef Mid-Atlantic category, competing against culinary professionals in the Mid-Atlantic category. The Bristol, Virginia chef has received numerous culinary awards throughout the years, but this is the first time he's earned a nomination for a James Beard award. He was the only chef nominated from Virginia.

Milton's culinary journey began as a child cooking alongside his great-grandmother, who taught him many of the traditional Appalachian ways of cooking. After working in restaurants for decades, Milton is now seen as an authority on the farm-to-table style of dining, celebrating heritage crops grown by local Appalachian farmers.

Swofford believes he had the same grandmother experiences as Travis when he was a child. "The dinner table was the place where everything happened," said Swofford. "We want to bring that same enthusiasm and joy with us to Hickory for the Appalachian Supper." Swofford grows high-quality produce on Old

North Farm. Before he became a farmer, he spent nearly two decades in kitchens throughout the Southeast and abroad, giving him a unique perspective on how food should be grown. He utilizes no-spray farming practices that allow him to grow produce the old-fashioned way with the labor of his hands and without harsh chemicals.

The husband and wife team will bring produce from their own farm to the Appalachian Supper menu. "We'll have a full gamut of produce available in July, such as okra, fresh corn, and staples like tomatoes," said Swofford. The chef uses locally harvested ramps to make pickles-a delicacy that also will find its way to the Abingdon event.

"Our greens and culinary herbs will offer well-rounded flavors, too," he said. Honey made from their own bee hives and sorghum harvested from the North Carolina area also will have a place at the table, as well as his handcrafted shrub made from ingredients found in North Carolina. An award-winning drink, the Old North Shrub is a drinking vinegar flavored with fruits and herbs grown locally around his home.

Mastrianni founded her bakery on old-fashioned pies. "But, because we're so rooted on the farm, we focus on making seasonal fruit pies," she said. "Come July, we'll have a nice crop of peaches."

Food.Flowers.Fiber – Curated Farm Tours

Get back to nature by participating in the curated tour of four local farms-Full Bloom Farm House, Stormbrew Farm, Blue Door Garden, and Dreamland Alpacas-three of which are owned and operated by local women. This tour will showcase the diversity of farms in Southwest Virginia, giving visitors a chance to experience how food, flowers, and animals are raised on the farms.

Elizabeth Gardner, who owns Full Bloom Farm House, will lead the farm tour and accompany guests to the farms, all within a 10-mile radius of Abingdon. "It will be such as fun event for the whole family," said Gardner.

If you like farm animals, fresh flowers and produce, and lots of fresh air, then the "Food.Flowers.Fiber" farms tour is right for you. The tour from 1 to 4pm on Sunday, July 28, is free of charge, requires registration online and participants may purchase produce from the farmers during their visits. **









History of the Culinary Arts Committee


The Culinary Art Committee is the youngest of the major committees of the festival, evolving from the Home and Garden Committee of earlier years. In the past, there were many activities focused on women's interests and skills, from flower-arranging competitions to fashion shows to fabric arts exhibitions. Prominent among the early activities were Kitchen Tours, taking participants by bus

to homes to view new or remodeled kitchens.

In the 1990s, a Wine Tasting was held in the ballroom of the Martha Washington Inn complete with monogrammed wine glasses. Because Abingdon has had high-quality restaurants for many years, in the 1990s "Taste of Main Street" became an important festival event to highlight Abingdon's restaurants. This event was held on Barter Green. Later, the organization Appalachian Sustainable Development partnered with the festival on organic farm tours as well as food and herb foraging hikes.

Cooking Globally with Susan

Things have really changed since I moved to Abingdon in 1994. Cooking ethnic food, commonplace in England where I am from, was tricky as I could not always get the spices and ingredients that I needed. Now our supermarkets have many of these items routinely. That coupled with our wonderful fresh produce, meats and other items locally grown and produced mean these recipes are accessible to everyone.

Culinary events this year at Virginia Highlands Festival- both in the summer festival and our April events Eat.Drink.Love Virginia Highlands-have focused on the biodiversity, rich traditions and fabulous quality of local food. The best sources for locally produced products are found at the Abingdon Farmers Market which was established in 2001 with the support from Appalachian Sustainable Development. Abingdon's history is built on the ingenuity and resilience of farmers, growers, brewers and makers.

Barter Theatre enlisted Depression-era farmers to help support local theater and feed starving artists. This tradition of local farmers supplying produce to neighbors and friends continues each Saturday and Tuesday, from April through the holiday and winter seasons. If you have not been to the market, come on down! Spiced lamb over warm hummus.

Spiced Lamb over Warm Hummus Recipe

1lb ground lamb

Small red onion chopped finely

1 tbsp olive oil

3/4 tsp salt

1/4 tsp allspice

1/4 tsp black pepper

1/4 tsp cinnamon

15 oz of tomato, if using canned include juice

11/2 tsp harissa spice or 3 tsp harissa paste

Generous squeeze of lemon juice

2 tbsp toasted pine nuts

Chopped parsley

Hummus (10 ounce container) or make your own

Sauté the onion in oil until translucent, crumble lamb into the mix, and brown (a few minutes only), add tomatoes, salt, allspice, pepper, and cinnamon, and cook until thickened 15-20 minutes. This dish may be cooled, frozen and reheated at this point.

Toast the pine nuts by gently shaking in a small non-stick skillet over medium heat until they begin to brown. (Do not skip this

Just before serving warm lamb mixture add harissa and lemon juice and taste. Then warm hummus in the microwave. (Watch carefully and do not use the original packaging that store-bought hummus comes in.)

Place hummus in a serving bowl. Spoon hot lamb mixture over the top and sprinkle with toasted pine nuts and chopped parsley.

Juried Fine Arts

he 2024 Juried Fine Art Show will combine both adult entries and youth entries for a spectacular exhibition located at the Arts Depot. The exhibition will open to the public at 5:15pm, Friday, July 26. The Awards Ceremony and Juror's Remarks will be given by this year's juror Anna Buchanan at 5:30pm. The show will run through Sunday, August 4, closing at 5pm.

The exhibition of paintings in oil, acrylic, watercolor and other mediums will continue to be at the forefront of the show. Darkroom and digital photography will again be included in the fine art exhibition, competing along with other two-dimensional mediums including paintings, drawings and printmaking. Digital works on paper are also being accepted.

Curator Joe Champagne of the McGlothlin Center for the Arts at Emory & Henry College, chairs this 75th anniversary exhibition. He is a photographic artist and has also taught classes in dark room and digital photography and web design at the college.


Champagne has selected Curator Anna Buchanan of William King Museum of Arts to serve as juror for the combined exhibition. Buchanan will offer two workshops during the Virginia Highlands Festival.

Awards in the adult category are \$2,000 for Best in Show, \$1,500 for 1st Place, \$1,000 for 2nd Place, \$500 for 3rd Place, \$500 for People's Choice and \$250 for Honorable Mentions. The Youth awards are \$100 for 1st Place, \$75 for 2nd Place, \$50 for 3rd Place, and \$25 for Honorable Mention.

A non-refundable entry fee of \$20 is required for adults entering up to three submissions and a \$5 entry fee for youth entering up to three admissions. Drop-off dates for entries are 2 to 5pm on Saturday, July 20, and Sunday, July 21, at the Arts Depot.



History of the Juried Fine Arts

entral to the festival from its beginning were art shows and sales, art demonstrations, and art classes. Early art shows were held at the Martha Washington Inn, sometimes of works from private collections and sometimes from the Virginia Museum of Art. The first amateur art shows were called Clothesline Art Shows where paintings were pinned to a clothesline for the week of the festival, and then auctioned on the last day.

These early shows evolved into the most prestigious art show in the region, with hundreds of entries and thousands of dollars in prizes. During much of the festival's history, there were both art and photography contests, but in recent years the two contests have merged, to reflect photography's place among the arts. A photograph recently won "Best in Show" in the Juried Fine Arts competition. **

Juried Fine Arts

Anna Buchanan - Juror

Anna Buchanan serves as the juror for the Juried Fine Arts Show. She is the Curator of Contemporary Fine Art and Craft at the William King Museum of Art in Abingdon, Virginia. In the last four years, Buchanan has curated over 15 exhibitions and served as a juror for several regional art shows. She has worked in galleries and museums for 11 years.

"I have loved art and drawing as long as I can remember," explains Buchanan. "I grew up in Midland, Michigan and spent my summers visiting family in Grayson, Kentucky. My mother would take me to a small museum close to our house and we always had the best time. My mother loves impressionism, and she had prints


in our home of Mary Cassatt's work. When I began drawing, I tried to copy the prints that my mother had, cartoons that I watched, or patterns on the floral couch. I learned to draw by observation.

"When I was nine years old, my mother and grandmother knew that I could really draw—my family was so kind and supportive of my art practice. My mother signed me up for private art lessons. I learned everything from artist Kathleen Sullivan with whom I studied for ten years." In 2016, Buchanan realized a need to revamp art programs in her community and developed an arts outreach organization called Arts2Grow on her college campus. Arts2Grow reached out to local Girl Scout troops and Masonic homes and partnered with the Alma Community Arts Center to revitalize art within the area. Through art and activism, Buchanan hoped to get people thinking about the ways they can make an impact in their own communities.

Buchanan's drawing has been in several publications including See Spot Run, Pine River Anthology, LUMINA and Paper Darts. She has also exhibited her work at Kai Lin Gallery, Fe Gallery, Flora Kirsch Beck Gallery, Clemson University, and Holler House. **










Robert Morgan Featured Speaker



obert Morgan came to Creative Writing Day in 1992 along with Denise Giardina and Lee Smith. Thirty-two years later, he is returning to the Virginia Highlands Festival.

Robert Morgan's recent retirement from Cornell University has allowed him to be even more prolific as a writer. In the past two years, he has published his fifth short story collection, a biography of Edgar Allan Poe, and a collection of poems and short stories.

Morgan grew up in Hendersonville, a small town in the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina. He is spending more time in North Carolina in his retirement. He wrote of life in the North Carolina mountains in his novel "Gap Creek," which was an Oprah Book Club selection, and its sequel.

Ted Kooser, a former U.S. poet laureate, said, "In the past thirty years I have learned a great deal from this man, who is exemplary as a poet, as a prose writer, and as a human being." Morgan will be talking about the advantages and risks of writing in several genres on Saturday, July 27.

Robert Morgan Essays on the Life and Work

Poet Fred Chappell said, "'Gap Creek' is the work of a master. Robert Morgan knows every corner, every inch, of the way of life he portrays in this deeply affecting book."

Morgan's humanity and understanding of human nature are evident in his biographies as well as his novels. Writing about Daniel Boone, Morgan makes readers feel Boone's determination to reach Kentucky and the setbacks that come close to killing him.

Jesse Graves was a student of Morgan's at Cornell and the two have bonded over the craft of poetry writing. "Conversations with Robert Morgan," edited by Jesse Graves and Randall Wilhelm, was published in 2019. Graves also has recently edited a collection of Morgan's essays. He and Morgan will have a wide-ranging conversation on Saturday afternoon. **



Jo Allison is the author of a mystery series set in the 1910s, one accurate enough in its depiction of place that editors of a major publishing house sought her out to write Storied and Scandalous St. Louis: A History of Breweries, Baseball, Prejudice, and Protest. She is currently writing a series set in World War I.

Darnell Arnoult is the author of the novel Sufficient Grace and the forthcoming Incantations: Poems. She holds an MA from NCSU and an MFA from the University of Memphis. She has taught creative writing across genres for over 30 years. She is the recipient of the SIBA Poetry Book of the Year Prize and the Weatherford Award.



History of the **Writers & Readers Days**

iterary events have been an important part of the Virginia Highlands Festival since its beginning. Early festivals featured lectures on the state of contemporary literature and drama, with occasional poetry readings. Through the 1950s the American

Association of University Women organized a state creative writing contest, with the winners announced at the festival, where a day-long series of lectures and readings were held. A Creative Writing Contest, sponsored by the festival, was held for the next fifty years, with expanded readings, workshops, and lectures as part of what was then called Creative Writing Day.

Over the years many of the significant figures in Appalachian and Southern literature have participated in the festival: Reynolds Price, Randall Jarrell, Lee Smith, James Dickey, Clyde Edgerton, Barbara Kingsolver, Sharon McCrumb, Ron Rash, Bobbie Ann Mason, Silas House, and many others including the U.S. Poet Laureate William Stafford. Recently, the event has expanded to two days, with an emphasis on readers as well as writers.





75th Anniversary Concert at The Moonlite Drive-In Theatre

The Moonlite Drive-In, along with the Virginia Highlands Festival, is celebrating a big milestone this year and owners of the newly refurbished drive-in theatre and multi-purpose venue are inviting the community to be part of a celebration like no other in Abingdon.

The Moonlite Drive-In Theatre & Venue and the Virginia Highlands Festival, both celebrating their 75th anniversaries, are collaborating to kick off a pinnacle music show on August 3 that may be one of the largest events in Southwest Virginia this year. "It's a milestone year for both organizations. We are beyond excited to start an annual tradition together with this first concert!" said Deirdre Cole, Virginia Highlands Festival Executive Producer.

A live concert on the grounds at the historical theatre is scheduled during the Virginia Highlands Festival on August 3. The event promises to be one to remember with some of the most famous current musical artists performing. The concert, which will serve as a fundraising event for a full restoration of the theatre, is expected to attract thousands of people to the event. (During press time, details of the concert were not available.)

According to Seth Ritchie, music chair for the Festival, the Abingdon theatre will serve as a much-needed venue for musical events held during the Virginia Highlands Festival each year. "When trying to schedule music events for the festival, the venue has always been challenging," said Ritchie.

The theatre also will serve as a multi-purpose venue for the community, offering activities for the entire family, just as it did years ago.

The theatre, built and operated in 1949, was a popular destination for people in the community, said Renee Blevins, who along with her husband Kyle Blevins and their daughter Rebecca Crusenberry and son-in-law Chance Crusenberry, have purchased the iconic building in town with hopes of restoring the landmark to its original design.

Except for being used by the Barter Theatre during the Covid 19 pandemic in 2020, the theatre building has sat unused since 2016, falling in disrepair throughout the years and at risk for collapsing or being demolished.

Since March, the owners have gutted the building, installed new windows and doors, replaced the roof, and completed other remodeling efforts.

And, of course, work has been done to either restore or replace the historic theatre lettering that lit up the sky during its heyday.

Saving the Moonlite is a passion for the couple, both of whom are originally from Southwest Virginia and remember coming to movies at the theatre with their families as children.

"We want to bring it back to the way it was," said Kyle. "We will bring back a playground for the children, and we're talking about having putt-putt golf like it was in the day."

Other attractions will be corn hole, face painting for the kids, concerts, and car shows.

The concession stand will be designed to look like a 1950s diner.

"On the back wall of the concession stand, I'd like to show a looped video of the history of the theatre," said Kyle.

"Who knows, we may even have a circus or carnival here," he said.

Community support of the restoration has been overwhelming, said Renee, who has received as many as 7,000 new Facebook followers since their plans were announced.

"There are about 292 drive-in theatres left in the country," she said. "And I've already seen in the past week or so about four or five go up for sale.

"This one is finding a new life, and we couldn't be more excited."

usical performances dominated the entertainment of the early festivals. Even though the festival's original purpose was to celebrate Appalachian culture, the early programming emphasized opera, classical music, and jazz. Over the years, regional traditional musicians were showcased, including Wayne Henderson and Horton Barker. In recent decades, pop, country, and rock music has dominated, frequently at outdoor street concerts or the Market Pavilion.

Because Abingdon has Barter Theatre, the festival has not programmed theatre performances, except for an occasional one-person performance. Perhaps the most famous person to ever perform at the festival was Dame Judith Anderson, the most ac-



claimed actress of the mid-20th century, who was brought by Robert Porterfield to present a play that she had just completed on Broadway.

A Native American dance company from Roanoke performed in the very first festival. The famous folklorist Richard Chase taught English country and square dances on the lawn of the Martha Washington Inn. Occasionally national modern dance groups performed at Barter Theatre. For ten years, the festival developed a relationship with Folkmoot, an international dance festival in North Carolina, to bring one or two dance companies to Abingdon after their festival. They held performances and workshops at Barter Theatre and were hosted by Abingdon families.





A Day in Saltville

9am Birds and Flowers of the Saltville Well Fields Meet at Food Country Parking Lot, Saltville

The Well Fields in Saltville, Virginia, provide one of the most diverse and interesting birding experiences in our region. The Well Fields are the only inland salt marsh in the Virginia mountains. It has unique plants, fascinating geology, and a spectacular array of birds in every season. Birders are likely to encounter warblers, woodpeckers, herons, swallows, hawks, vireos, and vultures. With luck, we may see Virginia Rails, Great Egrets, Killdeer, Green Herons, White-eyed Vireos, Northern Parulas, Eastern Kingbirds, Yellow Warblers, and Bald Eagles. Bring your binoculars, a water bottle, sunscreen, and your curiosity for the natural world.



This strenuous 7.3-mile hike with 1,540 feet in elevation gain on the Backbone Rock Trail and Appalachian Trail is recommended for experienced hikers in good physical condition. Shuttle to Backbone Rock to start the one-way hike back to Damascus.

Backbone Rock itself is interesting to see, and the hike, though challenging, offers many vistas along the Appalachian and Backbone Rock Trails. Bring water, hiking sticks and possibly raingear, and wear hiking boots or shoes. Shuttle fee is \$5 payable as you board.

Hike on Clyburn Hollow Trail


Hike to the Great Channels





riginally, this committee was called the Human and Natural Resources Committee. Since one of the festival's founders was Harold Grogan, the head of the Chamber of Commerce, early activities promoted local industries with tours and exhibits. By the 1960s, camping trips on Whitetop, photographic excursions, and lectures on flora, fauna, and geology featured the new Mount Rogers National Recreation Area. When the Virginia Creeper Trail was established, there were bird walks, family bicycle rides, and races on the trail.

In the last 20 years, "A Day in Towns" programs have featured visits to natural and historic sites in neighboring communities, like Damascus, St. Paul, Mendota, and Saltville. Recently, organized hikes have been popular--to the Great Channels, along

the Appalachian Trail and, once again this year, on Whitetop. Tours of vineyards and a cidery have included tastings. There have also been lectures on bats, cougars, wildflowers, mussels, and other natural phenomena that make this area unique. 🎇



entral to the festival from its beginning was an Antiques Show since many of the organizers had antiques in their homes and there were many antique shops in town. Early festivals included displays in the Martha Washington Ballroom of antiques from family collections, frequently grouped by period or a particular type of furniture or accessory. The Antique Show evolved quickly into displays by antique dealers in the region who belonged to the Southwest Virginia Antiques Dealers Association. Visitors came to admire the antiques, not to purchase them.

After a gap in the 1960s-80s, French Moore, Jr. started a "flea market" on Barter Green during the festival. That evolved over a decade into a juried Antiques Market that eventually was held in large tents on an athletic field adjacent to the Southwest Virginia Higher Education Center and now has moved inside the building to its Grand Hall.



The 2024 Juried Arts and Crafts Show, a staple event of the Virginia Highlands Festival for more than 70 years, is expanding to attract a whole new generation of buyers. More than 45 vendors will be featured at the show on Barter Green in downtown Abingdon and about 25 on the lawn of the Martha Washington Inn, an early location for the show that has not been utilized for many years.

"We're really thankful The Martha is letting us come back to the lawn because it's such a traditional and beautiful place for the show," said Melinda Bruns, co-chair of the Juried Arts and Crafts Show since 2022.

Bruns feels a strong connection to the area and the Virginia Highlands Festival after spending many of her summers as a youth with her family in Bristol, Virginia. She fondly remembers her great, great aunt Virginia Caldwell demonstrating weaving on a massive old loom at the festival many years ago. Caldwell who owned the Old Deery Inn in Blountville, Tennessee, was known in the region for her love of antiques and historic preservation.

Since volunteering, Bruns has worked to shake up the event by bringing in new vendors. Gene Pecina, co-chair of Juried Arts & Crafts, works tirelessly in setting up the grounds and attending to the needs of the exhibitors.

The show is free of charge and open from July 26 to Aug. 4. To accommodate the 9-to-5 crowd, hours will be extended to 6 p.m. each day. And, for the first time, the show will stay open until 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 31, for after-hours shopping and live entertainment.

The show will include numerous vendors, many of whom have exhibited at the festival for decades, such as Mary Curtin who makes nature-inspired stoneware baskets; Annette White, an artist who paints on slate; Brenda and Hal Jones, who makes children's puzzles; and Mark Poole, a festival favorite for his wheel-thrown pottery.

But, this year, the show will also cater to the millennial age group, a new generation of art buyers who are reshaping today's art market. "We're pulling in some wonderful new contemporary artists along with a mix of those artists you know and love," said Bruns.

"There are people who still love traditional landscapes, and that's fine, but a lot of people my age don't always want a simple oil painting," added Bruns, 38, who is an artisan of sculptural needle felting made from roving yarn from sheep and her own Angora rabbits.



"There will be a lot of emphasis on non-traditional art styles," she said. "The new generation of buyers like collecting art that is a reflection of who they are. Art needs to speak to them--it's like a personal branding."

The show also was voted one of Sunshine Artist Top 200 Arts and Craft Shows in 2022 and Blue Ride County Magazines Best Arts and Craft Show in 2023. Voted "Best Art Event in Region" and "Best Festival in Region" by Virginia Living Magazine readers in 2024, the Arts and Crafts Show features pottery, jewelry, mixed mediums, paintings, photography, sculpture, soaps & lotions, and more.



History of the Arts & Crafts Committee

perhaps the most consistent emphasis of the Virginia Highlands Festival for 75 years has been to feature high-quality work by area craftsmen. During the early festivals, there were exhibitions at the Martha Washington Inn featuring ceramics, hand-hooked rugs, jewelry, handpainted wallpaper, furniture making and caning, silver and copper work, and corn-shuck dolls. Until the 1960s the emphasis at the festival was on exhibiting crafts and demonstrating how crafts were made, as an educational product, not on selling crafts. Through the 1970s, as the festival expanded, there were crafts sales and demonstrations in venues all over town. Finally, in 1979 the Craft Show moved to the lawn of the Martha Washington Inn, where it stayed until the Antique Market moved to Virginia Highlands Community College in 1987. Since that year, crafts

and art have been sold and demonstrated on the Barter Green, expanding for some years onto

the lawn of the Martha Washington Inn. It is now called the Juried Arts and Crafts Show. **

hildren's activities were rarely a part of the Virginia Highlands Festival in its early years. As the festival grew in scope, art classes were held at the Martha Washington Inn. Robert Porterfield was friends with Emmett Kelly, the famous clown, so children would have enjoyed his performance at the Barter Theatre and a workshop for children. Occasionally there were performing arts groups, like puppet theaters, booked for children, and children enjoyed taking classes in English country dancing and clogging. In the 1970s for several years, there were visits by the characters from the Land of Oz, a North Carolina theme park.

Eventually, there was a Youth Committee that programmed arts and crafts activities at a Youth Tent. The two most popular children's activities for many years were an annual Dog Show and a Bike Parade. Highlands Ballet frequently performed a ballet during the festival, and for many years there was a youth talent competition, "Abingdon's Got Talent." Of course, throughout the festival's 75-year history, Barter Theatre has had plays for children. 🥻














Gotwalt House on Historic Homes Tour

Jessica Gotwalt described finding their antique home as a "happy accident."

"I have a dangerous habit of checking Zillow constantly," laughed the Abingdon homeowner. "I saw this beautiful house full of potential and in need of a lot of love. It had everything I wanted, and I knew it could keep me busy for a lifetime."

In May 2022, Jessica and her husband Chris Gotwalt bought the home and have spent the past two years restoring the infrastructure and putting in their personal touches.

The house is an American Four-Square design, an Arts and Crafts architecture style popular from the mid-1890s to the late 1930s as it utilizes every square foot of floor space. The house will be part of the annual Abingdon Historic Homes Tour from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, Aug. 4 where participants can tour a variety of the best-preserved Federal, Victorian, and early 20th century houses and buildings in Virginia, all within walking distance of downtown.

The aging house was far from perfect when they started. While it captured their hearts for its convenient proximity to downtown attractions, spacious one-acre grounds, and beautiful woodwork, it needed a full infrastructure renovation. The extensive list of repairs included new electric wiring; plumbing; gutters; a new roof; heating, ventilation, and air conditioning; and kitchen and bathroom renovations.

"And, lots and lots of paint," said Jessica. "We did almost everything except for taking it down to the studs, which enabled

us to preserve the original plaster walls."

Through the renovation, the couple's goal was to preserve the feel and character of the house. "We are old house lovers," said Jessica as she showed each room. "These spaces have a feel and charm that can't be duplicated."

In their house the charm shows up in the stately mantels, original oak trim, and wavy glass windows. In fact, the day they bought the house, they pulled up yellow shag carpeting to find beautiful intact oak floors with irreplaceable one-and-onequarter inch wide boards that now look almost like new after refinishing.

The real fun came when it was time to decorate the interior with an overarching theme inspired by nature. The couple used wall colors that offer a moody modern style. "I feel like the house demands bold colors," said Jessica. The dining room walls are covered with large Dutch-inspired floral wallpaper that resembles the 1920s. A taxidermy peacock and deer are whimsical conversation pieces in the room.

Wall space is decorated with bright and lively paintings she found at local antique and thrift stores. The living room with its vivid blue walls contrasts with the emerald green velvet sofa---a combination that invites you to linger. The black walls in the sun room accentuate the numerous windows that open to beautiful scenery. Pink chairs offer a comfortable and cozy feel.

"A friend told me the décor resembles a British library," said Jessica. "Bold colors and cozy nooks are my vibe, so I loved that



Living History Tour of the Historic Sinking Spring Cemetery

The Historical Society of Washington County Virginia presents a Living History Tour of the Sinking Spring Cemetery. The guided group tours will walk through the picturesque burial ground, where the graves of at least nine Revolutionary War veterans, two governors of Virginia, and numerous Civil War veterans are among the notable graves in the cemetery. Also buried here is Landon Boyd, a 19th-century African-American leader who served on the petit jury empaneled by the federal government to try former Confederate President Jefferson Davis for treason. Interpreters in period costumes at selected grave sites will tell the remarkable stories of the people lying at rest.

The tours start at the cemetery entrance and last about an hour. Tickets will go on sale at 4:15pm with the first tours beginning at 4:30pm. The last tour will begin at 7:15pm. Abingdon's Role in the American Revolution Every day of the Festival, 10am-5pm • Free 1780 Muster Place (Colonial Road)

Learn about perhaps the most significant event in Abingdon's history--the mustering of troops for what became the Battle of Kings Mountain.

When the call to arms was made during the Revolutionary War in response to a challenge by British Colonel Patrick Ferguson to the Overmountain settlers of North Carolina and Virginia, the men of Washington County, Virginia, answered in force. Four hundred men made their way to the muster grounds in Abingdon, a well-known meeting place.

The field at the Abingdon Muster Grounds is a remnant of the original muster ground, then known as Craig's Meadow. They gathered under Colonel William Campbell on September 24, 1780, said goodbye to their loved ones, and headed south that

same day to join other Patriot militia who were gathering at Fort Watauga at Sycamore Shoals (today Elizabethton, Tennessee) on September 25.

Concurrently, troops were mustering throughout the foothills and mountains of the Upper South as well. Although they didn't know it yet, these Virginia troops would end up marching the farthest of any regiment of the campaign on their quest for safety and independence.

The resulting confrontation with Ferguson's troops, called the Battle of Kings Mountain, resulted in an overwhelming victory for the Patriots and is now seen as one of the most important turning points of the Revolutionary War.

The Abingdon Muster Grounds features the W. Blair Keller, Jr. Interpretive Center, and the northern terminus of the Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail. **

Experience one of the inaugural concerts of Appalachian Thunder, a new Celtic group, musicians from the Appalachian Highlanders Pipe and Drum Corps, who are interested in exploring new pipe and drum music. 

had threatened the "Overmountain Settlements" in Virginia, Tennessee, and North Carolina. They met other militias and defeated the British troops at the Battle of King's Mountain, one of the turning points of the American Revolution. **



History of the *History Committee*

bingdon has been the center of the region's history for two hundred years. As the Virginia Highlands Festival developed to celebrate the arts and culture of the area, it was natural also to showcase the town's history in the annual festival. The first history events were historical homes tours, not only in the town of Abingdon but also bus tours to historical properties in Emory and Bristol in the surrounding areas. The last excursions on the Virginia Creeper Railroad occurred during the festival.

As the tourism agencies in Abingdon began to market heritage tourism, historical reenactments of events from the Revolutionary War and Civil War, as well as reenactors portraying historical figures from Abingdon's past began to appear annually. For two years in the 1970s, there was an out-

door drama during the festival, "The Fighting Parson," based on the life of one of the town's founders, Parson Charles Cummings. Walking tours, ghost tours and history lecture series became popular. Then in the 2000s, with the establishment of the Abingdon Muster Grounds as the northern terminus of the Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail, a part of the national park system, there has been renewed interest in celebrating Abingdon's role in American history


Jeremy Sams to be Plein Air Juror

Our local James Beardawarded pastry chef, David Collier at the Girl and the Raven taught how to make croissants using laminated doughs. Other activities included placemat knitting and crochet classes at A Likely Yarn and an apron kit available from My Little Fabric Store.

Some culinary events are already planned for the next year. In the fall there will be a tasting tour of the new Commons including samplings from Brazen Raven, Rise, Platter & Pour, the Henhouse and Tumbling Creek Cider Company. In December a Gingerbread competition will kickoff the holidays. Chef Collier has promised to teach how to temper and use chocolate in baking. Many of our popular events will also be back next year.
