Playoff pressure ramps up under Bristol spotlight

ix weeks after hosting the Speedway Classic and 90,000 baseball fans, Bristol Motor Speedway jettisoned the astroturf field and welcomes the major leaguers of NASCAR for three pressure-packed nights of playoff racing.

For the first time, all three of NASCAR's top series will be in playoff mode as drivers and teams jockey to advance to the second round and maintain their shot at reaching the championship four at Phoenix in November.

For drivers outside the championship bubble, this is the Bristol night race – one of the brightest spotlights in NASCAR – and a chance to add their name to a list of the sport's best and hoist the gladiator's sword in victory lane.

Activities are scheduled to begin during the afternoon of Sept. 11 with practice and qualifying for both the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series and the ARCA Menard's Series.

Kicking off the action will be the Bush's Beans 200 for the ARCA teams, a race won last year by William Sawalich, who now competes for Joe Gibbs Racing in the Xfinity Series.

Truck Series driver Lawless
Alan is currently third.

Also notable about the ARCA race, social media influencer Cleetus McFarland – aka Garrett Mitchell, is scheduled to make his fourth series start of the year in the Mark Rette-owned Chevrolet.

McFarland, who pioneered Crown Vic short track racing with an event here at Bristol, is now recognized for both his social media antics behind the wheel of almost anything and his exemplary volunteer work providing emergency aid to North Carolina families impacted by Hurricane Helene.

Like last year, this race will decide the ARCA East title. Entering the event, Isaac Kitzmiller holds a slim 19-point margin over Tyler Reif, with Zachary Tinkle just 11 points back in third place.

Thursday's nightcap will again be the UNOH 200, the middle race in the opening round of the Truck Series playoffs.

Regular season champion Corey Heim locked himself into the next round with a victory at Darlington and just 38 points separates the second through eighth-place drivers. After Darlington, Chandler Smith and Kanen Honeycutt find themselves below the cutline while Jake Garcia is but two points above. For the first time, the NASCAR Xfinity Series will begin its playoffs at the "Last Great Colosseum," meaning victory in the Food City 300 can lock any of the playoff drivers into the next round.


JR Motorsports Chevrolet teammates Connor Zilisch and Justin Allgaier have enjoyed banner seasons with eight and three wins respectively, while Austin Hill also has a trio of victories.

That sets the stage for Saturday night's crown jewel Bass Pro Shops Night Race. While Kyle Larson is the defending Night Race winner -- and turned in another dominant showing here in the spring -- the No. 5 team has appeared a bit vulnerable during the second half of the regular season.

Teammate Chase Elliott finished second in this race one year ago while four-time Bristol winner Denny Hamlin was second here in the spring and third last fall. All three are in the playoff field, but one misstep here could prove disastrous to their title hopes.

looks to build off Darlington success

ASCAR Cup Series driver Chase Briscoe doesn't flinch from pressure.

Just consider his last two seasons.

Entering the 2024 Bristol Night Race, Briscoe was 21 points beneath the elimination line for the Round of 12.

It was time to respond. And with an eighth-place finish, Briscoe advanced by a margin of 11 points.

In the opening event of the 2025 playoffs on Aug. 31, Briscoe dominated the famed Southern 500 at Darlington Raceway with his Joe Gibbs Racing team.

That was the same race where Briscoe qualified for the 2024 playoffs with a lastgasp victory.

"I've always just loved highpressure situations," Briscoe said. "I feel like I just perform better for whatever reason."

"I feel like my whole career has always been a highpressure situation, right? There was no backup plan. You might only get one race, you got to go perform and show your worth."

Briscoe has faced scrutiny ever since he was selected to replace Martin Truex Jr. at Joe



Gibbs Racing.

Entering the 2025 season, the four-year Cup resume for Mitchell, Indiana, native featured two wins and 13 topfive finishes.

"I've always felt like every week I'm still auditioning to prove that I belong here," Briscoe said.

Briscoe has drawn praise for his work ethic off the track and clean style on the track, but he has yet to reach superstar status.

That search for respect continues this week at one of the ultimate proving grounds in motorsports - Bristol Motor Speedway.

"Certainly, the higher the pressure is the better I feel like I do for whatever reason." Briscoe said. "That midsummer stretch where there's not a lot going on I typically struggle.

"But again, the higher the pressure, the better I do for whatever reason. I guess it's a good trait to have, especially with what the playoffs are. I don't know."

The JGR team has not won a Cup series championship since 2019 when former team driver Kyle Busch executed the task.

After leading 309 of the 367 laps at the fearsome Darlington layout, Briscoe suddenly became part of the championship conversation.

According to his crew chief James Small, the 30-year-old Briscoe has the essentials to bring home a title his debut run with the powerful Gibbs operation.

"Oh, 100% yes," Small said. How trying was the process of replacing a high-profile veteran driver like Truex?

"It was a difficult and new situation for everybody," Smalls said. "We had a little bit of learning to do and we

had some new people on the team as well.

"We had some speed. It just took a little to jell and get everybody on the same page and to understand what we're trying to achieve every week."

The goal now for Briscoe is to build off the Darlington dance.

"It was definitely nice for us to start our playoffs in the way we did it. Not just winning, but I felt like we dominated," Briscoe said. "Hopefully we can just ride this momentum." agregory@bristolnews.com

he Bristol Night Race has long ranked among the marquee events in all of motorsports.

For various reasons, the 2025 edition of NASCAR's Bristol bash has extra meaning.


Flash back to the Food City 500 in April. It was not a fun experience, especially for longtime track followers.

Once again, the weather in the mountains of Northeast Tennessee was miserable on Friday and Saturday with 40-degree temperatures and

And yet again, actionhungry fans were left disappointed in Sunday's main event. Due in large part to the constraints of the NextGen car, there were just four lead changes and three cautions. The final 235 laps went incident free.

The last Bristol event with fewer cautions came in August of 1982.

If you root for Kyle Larson or just appreciate his masterful driving technique, the show was a treat. Larson controlled 411 laps and was never really



challenged.

Good luck finding a highlight reel from that romp.

But night racing is a different animal, especially at Bristol.

Surely, there will be some exciting night moves this weekend. Right?

Given the high stakes, race fans, BMS officials and area business owners have been praying extra hard for pleasant weather. One needs to consider the evolving nature of sports entertainment and the versatility of grand stadiums like Bristol Motor Speedway to understand the big picture here.

In August at BMS, the MLB Speedway Classic between the Atlanta Braves and the Cincinnati Reds attracted a Major League Baseball regular season record crowd of 91,032.

With seating for 155,000, there is no limit to the scale or type of event that BMS can host.

Remember the record gathering of 156,990 for the 2016 Battle of Bristol college football game between Virginia Tech and the University of Tennessee.

There has been widespread speculation and debate regarding the next extravaganza at BMS,

especially since the renewed discussion over a dome or retractable roof.

Let's hope that Saturday's Night Race creates some spectacular moments and lasting memories.

A throwback to the glory days of short-track mayhem would definitely help restore some of the glamour at Bristol Motor Speedway and set the stage for bigger things to come.

Chance to advance:

Breaking down the playoff field

or the sixth
consecutive year
the Bass Pro Shops
Night Race will double as the
cutoff race in the opening
round of the NASCAR Playoffs.

In short, the championship aspirations of four teams will be scuttled once the checkered flag waves on Saturday night. The burning questions are who will advance and who will spend the final seven races of the season racing for pride?

None of the four drivers eliminated in 2024 – Martin Truex Jr., Brad Keselowski, Harrison Burton and Ty Gibbs – are in the playoff field this year. From 2023, only Joey Logano is in the field from a group that also included Kevin Harvick, Ricky Stenhouse Jr. and Michael McDowell, who were all eliminated after Bristol.

In 2022, the playoff clock struck midnight for Austin Dillon, Tyler Reddick, Kyle Busch and Kevin Harvick. In 2021 the four drivers eliminated were Reddick, Aric Almirola, Kurt Busch and McDowell and, from 2020, it was Ryan Blaney, William Byron, Cole Custer and Matt DiBennedetto. A look at past performance on the track is typically a good indicator of who should have the best chance of advancing but with only three former Bristol winners among the 16 playoff drivers – not counting Christopher Bell's victory in the 2023 Food City Dirt Race – a deeper dive is required.

The most obvious answers of who might advance, based on past Bristol showings, are Kyle Larson, Denny Hamlin and Joey Logano. They have nine combined wins but – greater than that – there are 52 combined top 10 finishes and every spot is worth points in NASCAR's playoff era.

Additionally, running in the top ten, or better the top five, late in a BMS race is a great place to capitalize if the leader gets into trouble or gets collected in someone else's mess. Hamlin leads the trio with 13 top five finishes in 36 Bristol starts, or 36%. Larson has eight in 18 races – tops among all drivers at 44% and Logano has six in 30 starts, or 20% of his races, he's finished in the top five.

Among drivers without a BMS points race victory, Chase Elliott has five top fives and nine top tens in 16 Bristol

starts. Elliiott, of course, won here in 2020 when Bristol hosted the NASCAR All-Star race.

While Elliott enjoyed a banner 2025 season with 13 top-ten finishes and only failing to finish one race, teammate Alex Bowman was the last driver making it into the playoff field on points, at the regular season finale at Daytona. Bowman also has 16 BMS starts on concrete with a respectable three top-five finishes to go with five top 10s.

Who has historically not performed well here? Josh Berry, Austin Cindric, Austin

Dillon, Ross Chastain and Tyler Reddick. Between them are just two top-five finishes and eight top tens in a combined 46 starts.

Shane Van Gisbergen only started this year's Food City 500 and he will need better than the DNF he chalked up in April.

Laps led and lead lap finishes are another solid performance indicator. Larson leads all active drivers with 1,762 laps led while the next lap Hamlin leads here will be his 1,200th.

Nine of the playoff drivers have led laps here while William Byron, Chase Briscoe, Cindric, Chastain, Dillon, Reddick and Van Gisbergen have not.

Beyond former BMS winners, Blaney has led 555

laps, Bell 360, Elliott 444 and Bowman 76.

Qualifying and track position being vital is a common theme in the Cup Series today but its always been that way at Bristol.

History shows that that 102 of 129 Bristol Cup races have been won from starting in the top ten, with front row starters winning a combined 43 times. Only eight Bristol races have been won by drivers starting outside the top 20.

Let's look at the opposite ends of the spectrum. Denny Hamlin has four poles and has started 23 of 36 BMS races from a top 10 position, including the last 11 in a row. That is clearly a contributing factor to him finishing 54% of those races in the top ten.

nose races in the top ten.

Joey Logano has 22 top-ten

starts here, which juxtapose nicely with his 19 top-ten finishes.

Elliott is the only other driver in double digits sporting 12 top-ten starts in his 16 races. Bowman has six, while Larson, Byron and Bell have five apiece.

Chase Briscoe has three topten starts to go two top-ten finishes while Bubba Wallace has two of each.

Chastain, Reddick and Van Gisbergen have yet to qualify and start from the top ten here.

Nothing can sabotage a solid run quicker than getting in a crash and calamity looms everywhere at Bristol. A DNF would be the easiest way to get eliminated from a tight playoff points battle.

Among the playoff drivers, Logano has three DNFs in 30 BMS starts, or 10% of his races, while Bowman also has three DNFs in 16 starts, or 19%. Hamlin, Blaney and Dillon each have twice failed to finish on the Bristol concrete.

Speaking of not being

around at the end, Blaney and Bubba Wallace failed to finish seven of the 26 regular season races this season. Josh Berry recorded five DNFs in the regular season and four others had four each – Austin Cindric, Ross Chastain, Joey Logano and

The most DNFs recorded during an entire season by a NASCAR championship winning driver in the playoff era was six by Martin Truex, Jr, in 2019.

Alex Bowman.

Still uncertain? Let's look at

lead lap finishes.

A green flag lap at Bristol occurs in 15 seconds and, if the race sees a long green run, it's easy for drivers in the middle of the pack to go one or more laps down. Just think about all those times you were yelling at slower traffic to get out of your favorite driver's way.

While Kyle Larson has the best average, with 14 lead lap finishes in 18 races, teammate William Byron has six in 12 races (50%) and Bowman has five in 16 races (31%). Chase Elliott is also solid with 10 of 16 (63%). Chevrolet driver Ross Chastain is at 40%.

In the Toyota camp, besides Hamlin, Bell is at 63%, Briscoe 50%, Reddick 25% and 23XI teammate Wallace at 25%.

Among the Fords, Logano is at 50% and Blaney 41% while Austin Cindric and Josh Berry have yet to finish on the lead lap in their eight combined races.

Any or all of that may come into play during the Bass Pro Shops Night Race because, after all, that's why we race.

Bristol's stadium atmosphere unique to NASCAR

t every stop on the NASCAR road show, drivers are asked the same question.

The most popular driver in the sport knows the routine and gives the same reply.

"People always ask me about the best racetrack and the best races," Chase Elliott said. "It's hard to beat Bristol."

Elliott made an appearance at the sprawling K1 Speed go-kart racing facility in Nashville last month to promote the Sept 13. Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway.

There is a good season why Elliott is such a fan of Bristol.

Entering the Food City 500 in April, Elliott was tied with Kyle Larson as the most successful active driver at BMS.

In 16 starts, Elliott has recorded five top-five and nine top-10 finishes with one pole.

He also won the July 16, 2020, All-Star Race at Bristol by holding off the sport's resident bad boy Kyle Busch over the final 15 laps.

With a crowd estimated at 20,000, it was the largest gathering for a sports event in the United States since the early days of the Covid pandemic that March.

"To me, tonight felt like an event again," Elliott said after that win. "I feel like we've been missing that piece for a couple months. It just felt really good to get NASCAR back. I mean, NASCAR is built on the fans."

Elliott reflected on that landmark achievement during his visit to Nashville last month.


"It was a different vibe in the middle of Covid," Elliott said. "The track wasn't totally closed off or totally back open, but it was great to have folks back in the grandstands and not hear crickets.

"We had a really good car that night. And were able to lead a good chunk of the race."

According to Elliot, the overall Bristol experience with the fans and major league vibe is special.

"We don't get that stadium environment in racing like you get in football and other sports," Elliott said. "Bristol has always been the closest thing to that. It's a lot of fun for us as competitors and the fans feed off that."

Elliott was back in Bristol on Aug. 2 for the MLB Speedway Classic baseball game between the Cincinnati Reds

and the Atlanta Braves.

The Georgia native and life-long Braves fan was even selected to throw out the first pitch with Major League Baseball Hall of Famers Johnny Bench and Chipper Jones.

"It was so cool to see that game come to life and to be there for the first pitch, even with the rain." Elliott said. "I wish the game could have been played as scheduled, but it was neat to see it personally."

The Speedway Classic attracted an MLB regular season crowd of 91,032. That broke the mark of 84,857 established Sept. 12,1954 at Municipal Stadium in Cleveland.

For Elliott, it was a fitting

show for his favorite track.

"Bristol does such a great job of bringing the action of what NASCAR has to offer to the fan in an intimate manner," Elliott said. "Everything is right there close."

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Putting Kyle Larson's

dominance into perspective

ith back-to-back dominating victories at Bristol Motor Speedway, Kyle Larson has already etched his name into the track's record book, but if he authors another similar beatdown in the Bass Pro Shops Night Race, he would enter a very exclusive club.

Larson won last fall's NASCAR Playoffs cutoff race by leading 462 of the 500 laps around the "World's Fastest Half Mile." It marked only the twelfth time a Bristol winner has topped the four-century mark and that performance ranks fourth all-time among drivers who have led between 400 and 500 laps here.

In April, the driver of the blue, white and red HendrickCars.com Chevrolet dished up another impressive outing, leading 411 laps to capture the Food City 500 and his third career Bristol win.

The only comparable performance by a single driver in a two-race span was by Bobby Allison, who in 1972, started both Bristol races from the pole and led 458 and 445 laps, respectively, to sweep both that season's

Bristol Cup races.

Allison was driving a Chevrolet prepared by Junior Johson and crew chief Herb Nab and that pair would figure prominently in the vast majority of four other, comparable dominating Bristol victories.

The race before Allison's sweep, in the July 1971 Volunteer 500, Charlie Glotzbach set a race speed record that stood for decades, by leading 411 of 500 laps in the only Bristol race ever run caution free. Wheeling a Junior Johnson Chevrolet, with some relief help from Tennessean Friday Hassler, they averaged 101.074 mph.

Last fall, Larson shattered that 53-year-old record with an average pace of 101.277 mph, despite five caution flags for 36 laps!

The average speed for this spring's Food City 500 also topped the century mark – for just the fourth time in BMS history – at 100.746, with just three cautions for 30 laps.

Only one driver ever led every lap of a Cup Series race at Bristol. That occurred in March 1973, when Cale Yarborough returned to

NASCAR after a brief foray into Indy Cars, to put another Junior Johnson Chevrolet on the pole and lead all 500 circuits of a race interrupted by rain.

He nearly did it again four years later.

In April 1977, Cale Yarborough came just five laps short of the unthinkable, leading 495 laps and claiming that season's Southeastern 500 – besting second place Dick Brooks by seven laps at an average speed of 100.989 mph. That race was slowed by just two cautions for nine laps and marked only the second time Bristol's average race speed topped the century mark.

For the record, three other drivers led the remaining five laps, the times Yarborough came to pit road.

At this point, it's probably fair to give Yarborough an honorable mention for another dominant showing. During the 1976 season, Bristol was one of many NASCAR tracks to shorten the length of their races, so both contests were run to 400 laps instead of the traditional 500.

For Yarborough and Johnson, the August 1976 race was a shorter day at the office but another long day for the competition. Yarborough led the final 373 circuits, or 93% of the laps run that afternoon. If one applies that percentage to a 500-lap contest, it equates to 465 laps. Of course, no one could say what might have occurred during those hypothetical extra 100 laps at Bristol.

Not surprisingly, Yarborough is Bristol's alltime leader in the laps led department with 4,305 in 29 races. Larson, interestingly, has climbed to ninth all-time here with 1,762 in 18 starts, with over 850 coming in just the last two races.

These were neither the first nor the last times someone would punch a 400-plus lap leader ticket.

The first time this occurred here was In April 1962, when Bobby Johns of Miami, Fla., led 430 laps to win the second annual Volunteer 500 – by six laps over second-place Fireball Roberts. Johns, fans might recall, was a relief driver for winner Jack Smith in the inaugural 1961 Volunteer 500.

In March 1964, Fred Lorenzen drove his Holman-Moody Ford to the front and led 494 laps. Despite his engine dropping a cylinder with 30 laps remaining, Lorenzen was able to hang on to win by a half-lap over second-place Fireball Roberts, who made up a five-lap deficit in the closing laps of the Southeastern 500.

Junior Johnson was still driving then but Lorenzen's crew chief was Herb Nab.

Three other NASCAR Hall of Fame drivers have a 400-plus lap Bristol victory on their resumes. Nine-time Bristol winner Dale Earnhardt captured the 1987 Night Race by leading 415 of 500 laps – the first time that kind of dominance occurred under the lights.

Rusty Wallace, who also sports nine BMS victories, led 425 circuits to claim the 1999 Food City 500 – the 49th Cup Series victory in his remarkable career and the first such domination on a Bristol concrete surface.

Somewhat surprisingly, Bristol's winningest driver –



Darrell Waltrip – is not in this club. Waltrip led over 3,400 laps and has 12 Cup wins – but never reached 400 laps in a single race.


The last driver to ring this bell, before Larson, was Matt Kenseth, who drove a Jack Roush Ford to the front and paced the field for 415 laps to win the 2005 Night Race, also on the original concrete.


While that makes an even dozen times the winner has led over 400 laps here, there is one more performance worth noting. On a sweltering July afternoon in 1964, NASCAR's King, Richard Petty, led 442 circuits around Bristol and appeared invincible as laps to the checkered flag counted down.

But it wasn't to be.
Sporting a three-lap lead
over second-place Fred
Lorenzen, Petty's Hemi engine
expired with just four laps



remaining in the race. Petty pulled down onto the track's apron and tried coasting toward the start-finish line. Lorenzen was able to pass Petty's wounded Plymouth three times and capture his third straight Bristol victory. dmcgee@bristolnews.com

Larson leads 462 laps, aces Bristol Night Race exam

Bristol Motor Speedway is one of the toughest tests in motorsports and Kyle Larson aced that high-speed exam.

The Hendrick Motorsports driver led a total of 462 laps Saturday night en route to winning the famed Night Race.

That was Larson's careerhigh for laps led in a Cup event. The last driver to lead at least 400 laps at BMS was Kyle Busch 16 years ago.

"It was just great execution by the team," Larson said. "We practiced good, qualified good and had a great car in the race.

"Bristol is my favorite track and it's so much fun to run under the lights here. I hope the fans enjoyed that methodical run."

The crowd was estimated at 120,000 for Saturday's Playoff cutoff event, one of the largest gathering at BMS in many years.

Has Larson ever had a better car?

"That's hard to say," Larson said. "I've had a lot of good cars since I came to Hendrick Motorsports."

With flawless work from his pit crew, Larson was basically never challenged once he grabbed the lead on lap 33.



"We've dominated a lot of races, but we haven't closed

them all out," Larson said. "It feels really good to close one

out like this.

To the delight of his many

admirers, Larson dominated with textbook laps while carving through traffic and passing cars on the high and low sides of the track.

Larson was in front at the end of the first 125-lap stage. That was the 11th stage win of the season for the multitalented driver from Elk Grove, California, who also won the second stage.

"I kind of managed my stuff and passed cars at the end. The car was phenomenal," Larson said.

Chase Elliott finished second, with Bubba Wallace, Denny Hamlin and Christopher Bell rounding out the top five.

Hamlin entered the night outside the Playoff cut line and facing heavy pressure to advance into the Round of 12.

With a consistent pace, Hamlin climbed to second on lap 238 and was steady from that point en route to clinching his ticket.

"I wanted to win the race, but Larson was really strong," Hamlin said. "Our car was solid and we were really good toward the middle stage.

"The car was loose toward the end and it was hard to hang on. We weren't as good as we've been here the past couple races, but it was a good day overall. It's all offense for us from this point

As expected, Hamlin was greeted by a thunderous round of boos and jeers during the pre-race introductions.

In stoic fashion, Hamlin responded with a simple "Thank you."

Saturday's technical drama offered a big contrast from the chaotic tire-degradation marathon in the spring BMS race.

Goodyear officials actually brought back the same tire used in the spring. The biggest difference from the two races was the cold weather in the spring compared to the warm conditions Saturday night.

Ty Gibbs, Martin Truex Jr., Brad Keselowski and Harrison Burton failed to advance into the next round of the Playoffs.

Truex was forced to the rear of the field on lap 335 for speeding on pit road. Truex had been running in the top five most of the night, but never recovered from his

penalty.

"We had a good car and we got a lot of points in the first two stages,"Truex said. "I guess we needed to run second and third to make it to the next round, but we didn't get a chance to see if we could have

"I'm just gutted for my team. We all put in a lot of work the last three weeks and all season long. I guess we're just snakebit."

Gibbs was also doomed by a speeding penalty late in the

"We were really good in practice and qualifying but were just a little too loose in the race," Gibbs said. "That speeding penalty was on me. It's unfortunate, but I'm proud of my guys."

Wallace was also greeted with a chorus of boos during introductions. He reacted by smiling, blowing kisses and wishing the University of Tennessee football team good luck in Saturday's game against Oklahoma.

"We have to go to work to figure out how we can be two spots better," Wallace said. "But all-in-all, we were best in class in multiple categories.

"I just appreciate the effort. It stings, running this well when you are not in the Playoffs, but it just makes you hungrier for next year."

Alex Bowman, who had led of total three laps in his BMS career before Saturday, started from the pole and controlled the first 32 laps before Larson stormed to the front. Bowman finished in the No. 9 spot.

There were only 23 cars remaining lap the lead lap after 115 circuits.

The first caution came on lap four when the car driven by John Hunter Nemechek smacked the outside wall following a spin.

Except for the stage 1 break, there was not another caution period until lap 243 when Joey Logano was forced into the pits after his car slammed into the inside wall.

Fans rose to their feet on lap 329 when the Corey LaJoie car hit the outside wall following contact from Josh Berry.

The were a total of five cautions on the night for 36 laps. \blacklozenge





Justin Allgaier was dealt several doses of bad buck. After leading the first 60 laps, the series veteran lost the rear bumper cover on his car following a collision with the Austin Green machine.

When the race resumed on lap 65, Allgaier was 24th.
Allgaier assured his crew

over the team radio that he would charge back through the field and that's exactly what he did. Allgaier was running third on lap 154 when he was involved in another spin. This time, Allgaier's car suffered heavy damage.

Smith said. "Round two is kind of the haymaker round. You've got the Charlotte Roval, Talladega and Martinsville.

"A lot can happen

between Charlotte Roval and Talladega and then even Martinsville. Hopefully, we can just make it to that round and we can execute there and try to make it to the final four."

Counting the Xfinity series, Smith has advanced to the NASCAR playoffs five times.

"With that, I've gained a lot of experience and knowledge on how to manage each race and each round. Because at the end of the day, the goal is to make it to Phoenix to have a shot at winning the championship," Smith said.

"This playoff system doesn't necessarily reward the guy that's got seven wins for the season. It awards the guy who makes it to Phoenix and beats the other three once you get there."

According to Smith, the key to mounting a playoff run comes down to the basics.

"The biggest challenge is probably just execution on the racetrack, between the pit crew and between pit calls," Smith said. "We just have to make sure we all execute and we're all rowing the boat in the same direction."

"I'm confident with all of the things that we've got and all of the resources that Ford provides us with, that we have everything right here at our disposal to at least make it to Phoenix."

BMS repeat, this time as title contender

NASCAR Truck Series driver Layne Riggs solved the Bristol Motor Speedway puzzle last September as a spoiler.

This week, the secondgeneration racer from Bahama, North Carolina, will try to double his Bristol fun as a championship contender.

"Of course, there's a lot of pressure, but I feel like I'm ready for it," said Riggs in a recent press conference.

Flash back to the second event of the 2024 NASCAR Truck series playoffs at Bristol.

Despite not qualifying for the playoff round, Riggs won the opening event at the Milwaukee Mile. The next stop was BMS and UHOH 200.

After passing Corey Heim for the lead on lap 121, Riggs stormed to his second career victory.

Entering this year's UNOH 200, Riggs trails only Heim in the playoff standings by a 59-point margin.

"I was wishing I was in it last year, but I still had the opportunity and got a couple of wins," Rigg said. "I'm glad the points worked out this season and I'm glad we got some wins before the playoffs this year."

According to Riggs, he has all the essentials with his No.

"I know what it takes to go fast and to put everything together to make a championship run," Riggs said. "I'm just very grateful that I got the opportunity to go for it now and try to do the same thing I did last year." The Sept. 20 race at New Hampshire will serve as the cut-off event for opening round of the Truck series playoffs.

"New Hampshire is very similar to the Milwaukee Mile," Riggs said. "Our goal is to maximize our days to gain more of a points buffer."

Following New Hampshire,

races will follow at the Charlotte Motor Speedway Roval, Talladega and Martinsville before the Oct. 31 finale at Phoenix Raceway.

"Hopefully heading into a Talladega and a Martinsville that is such a wildcard, we will have enough points buffer to say, 'Hey, let's just have a good, solid day. If you're in the hornet's nest, back out a little

bit."

"No Hail Mary's in the playoffs. That's the goal for us," Riggs said.

Qualifying for the UNOH 200 presented by Ohio Logistics, is scheduled at 4:10 p.m., on Sept. 11 with the green flag set to wave at about 8 p.m.

Defending race winner William Sawalich, 17, captured Thursday's ARCA Series Bush's with just four laps remaining. Sawalich held off Landen Lewis (Ocean Isle Beach, N.C.) in the two-lap dash for the trophy.

"We had to be cautious around the lapped cars tonight. And there were lots laps.

Sawalich, won eight ARCA races this season, has support from the Joe Gibbs Racing empire and from ARCA series veteran Frank Kimmell.

Lewis is another rising star with VIP connections.

The first-generation racer from Eden Prairie, Minnesota, clinched the ARCA East championship in the process.

The race was slowed by a record 13 cautions for 76 laps, including six stoppages over the first 100 laps.

The final caution came

of restarts, so I had plenty of chances to work on them," Sawalich said. "I can't thank (Lewis) enough for racing me clean. We've been friends for a while and it's great racing with him here."

Navigating around slower cars and mastering the highspeed turns like a veteran, Sawalich led a total of 103 He drives for the Kevin Harvick, Inc. team and has guided the development of Harvick's 11-year-old son Keelan in the Legends car ranks. NASCAR Hall of Famer Ron Hornaday, who was in the BMS pits Thursday, serves as the driving coach for Lewis.

Rev Racing driver Lavar Scott finished third, with his teammate Andres Perez (Mexico City, Mexico) in fourth and Dean Thompson from Venturini Motorsports next in line. Perez is the ARCA national points leader.

Meanwhile a perfect day turned into a nightmarish night for 18-year-old Connor Zilisch.

Entering the race, the fourtime race winner needed only to finish among the top 12 to clinch the ARCA East championship with his Pinnacle Racing Group team.

Zilisch earned the pole with a lap of 123.777 mph, with Sawalich in second.

The nightmare sequence came on lap 65 when Zilisch slammed into the spinning car of female racer Logan Misuraca. Zilisch was unable to return to the track and finished in the No. 26 position.

"It's frustrating to end a season like that and lose a championship in that way, but we've had a hell of a year and we have nothing to hang our heads about," Zilisch said. "When you have an eightrace championship, any one race can take you out of contention."

The Sawalich crew informed their driver of the championship implications shortly after the Zilisch crash.

"That was kind of a surprise in the middle of the race," Sawalich said. "The news made me happy and gave me the drive to go after the win."

Sprint Car sensation Corey Day (Clovis, Calif.) finished seventh in his second career ARCA start. NASCAR Cup Series title contender Kyle Larson is one of the biggest supporters of Day and he supplied a pit box and several Cup Series crewmen for Day in Thursday's event.

Amber Balcaen knows frustration. The series regular from Winnipeg, Manitoba, has worked with six different crew chiefs this season struggled to a 25th place effort Thursday.

The race featured a familiar face in Peterson Motorsports rookie driver Mitch Gibson, a King University graduate now living in Weyers Cave, Virginia. He finished in the No. 30 spot after qualifying 24th.

Gibson served as a crewman in all three of the top NASCAR series, including stints with the Abingdon-based Morgan-McClure Motorsports and Henderson Motorsports teams. He has competed in numerous Late Model races at tracks across the south.

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Riggs playsplayoff spoiler, snags UNOH 200 trophy

ayne Riggs wanted to be a spoiler in the 2024 NASCAR Truck Series playoffs.

Mission accomplished. Relying on old tires, the second-generation racer earned his second straight series win in Thursday's UNOH 200 at Bristol Motor Speedway.

Riggs, the 22-year-old son of former NASCAR competitor Scott Riggs, claimed his first career Truck Series victory on Aug. 25 at the historic Milwaukee Mile.

"We have just learned so much together with the cars and trucks," Riggs said. "My crew chief (Dylan Cappello) is bad ass, and the average age on our team is in the 20s."

Riggs struggled badly over the first half of the season in the No. 38 Front Row Motorsports Ford. He exorcised his frustration with his charge at Milwaukee, and then dislocated his shoulder in the post-race celebration.

"To be running the way we were and all of sudden go back-to-back in the Playoffs is so amazing," Riggs said. "Man, I wish we were in the Playoff mix because I think we would be a real threat to win the

championship."

Defending race winner Corey Heim finished second, with Rajah Caruth, Christian Eckes and Nick Sanchez next in line.

"We had a great truck and great pit stops," Heim said.
"We just didn't have it at the end when the (track) grooves started to move around. It was a still solid points day, and that's what you need for the Playoffs."

Caruth, who entered the night below the Playoff cutoff line, earned his first career stage win to open the race and mounted a consistent finish in his Hendrick Cars. com entry.

"We just executed the race and I'm really proud of my team," Carruth said. "I'm happy for Layne. He deserved the win. We just fell short at the end."

Spire Motorsports driver Connor Zilisch, 18, won the pole with a near flawless effort of 15.325 seconds at 125.207 mph. Zilisch led the first 41 laps but managed just a 19th playoff place finish. Bristol marked the third career Truck start and second pole for Zilisch.

"A lot of great people help



to make this all happen, from Chevrolet to Scott Speed and everyone at Spire Motorsports," said Zilisch shortly after his pole run. "Driving fast cars makes me look good and I'm thankful to be in the position I am with the teams I get to work with."

With 13 laps left, Riggs maintained the lead on the restart by going to the high side of the track.

"I wasn't scared to throw it against the fence tonight," Riggs said. "I'm so glad they didn't put the PJ1 on the track.



The first of four caution periods came on the final lap of the second stage when the Zilisch truck spun after a tap from Nick Sanchez.

Heim emerged as the winner of the second stage.

Following an extended period of track cleanup, 29 laps remained when the drama resumed with Riggs at the front.

Fans rose to their feet on lap 181 for a spin involving the Jack Wood truck. Wood was bumped from behind by Ben

Stefan Parsons qualified in the No.13 spot for the Abingdon-based Henderson Motorsports team. After falling back to 25th to begin the third stage, Parsons came home in the No. 16 spot.

Former IndyCar racer Marco Andretti and Justin Carroll were the only drivers who failed to qualify.


"Bristol is a special place for me," Allgaier said. "There's just something about the track that suits my driving style."

Following the Aug. 30 Xfinity event at Portland International Raceway, Allgaier trailed only eighttime race winner Connor Zilisch in points.

Allgaier and the 19-yearold Zilisch are teammates on the powerful JR Motorsports team.

Saturday's Food City 300 at Bristol will serve as the opening event in the Round of 12 Xfinity playoff schedule.


Allgaier hopes his proven formula for Bristol can translate into another joy ride in the mountains of Northeast Tennessee.

"When you've conquered Bristol, you feel like you've conquered the world. It's definitely a special feeling."



3. Jeff Gordon vs. Rusty Wallace - Bump and Run

With laps winding down in the 2002 Night Race, Rusty Wallace had the lead and a shot at his first win in over a year. But Jeff Gordon wasn't going to wait politely. He executed a textbook bump-and-run - similar to the 1997 Food City 500 nudging Wallace just enough to steal the win. Gordon's precision and Wallace's frustration made this moment unforgettable. While the victory was Gordon's fifth Cup Series triumph at Bristol, it was his lone win in the crown jewel Night Race.

4. Texas Terry holds on to win 1995 Night Race

Terry Labonte passed Earnhardt for the lead late in the 1995 Night Race and the Intimidator stalked Labonte until turn four on the final lap and made his move. He put the nose of his No. 3 Chevy to the rear of Labonte's No. 5 Chevy and

sent the "IceMan" spinning on a wild ride across the finish line. Labonte's out of control car impacted the outside wall twice before coming to a stop. The images of his heavily damaged race car smoking and leaking fluids in victory lane is a timeless capture after what transpired on the track. Labonte famously said in Victory Lane, "I hadn't put a scratch on it all night right there until the end, but that's just the way it goes."

5. Kyle Busch Sweeps the Weekend (2010 and 2017)

Love him or hate him, Kyle Busch's dominance in August 2010 was jaw-dropping. He became the first driver in NASCAR history to sweep all three national series races at the same track on the same weekend—Truck, Xfinity, and Cup—all under the lights of Bristol. It wasn't just history; it was total domination. The feat solidified Busch's reputation as one of the sport's most talented drivers. Busch showed that his 2010 effort was no fluke by repeating the effort in 2017. Busch remains the only Cup Series driver in history to win all three NASCAR races in a weekend.

6. NASCAR goes primetime on ESPN in 1985

The 1985 Night Race was the first primetime telecast

of a NASCAR race in history. ESPN carried the race and the fans watching from home and at the track were treated to an awesome showdown as rivals Dale Earnhardt and Tim Richmond battled door-handle to doorhandle throughout the race. Earnhardt used his patented bump and run maneuver to eventually get past the talented Richmond on lap 482 and hung on to the lead with Richmond second all the way to the checkered flag. Earnhardt called it "good, close racing" and a frustrated Richmond said it was Earnhardt's "typical tactics" after the race. The race, which offered amazing action from two of the greatest to ever drive a stock car, is often pointed to as one that helped solidify NASCAR as a major national sport.

7. Dale Jr. shouts It's Bristol Baby! In 2004 Night Race victory

Dale Earnhardt Jr. won the 2004 Night Race, his only Cup Series victory at the challenging bullring. When the television reporter asked him why the win was so special, he blurted out "It's Bristol, baby!" and from that time on the phrase took on a life of its own. Today, it continues to be one of the track's main mantras, and also serves as the track's

social media handle on nearly every platform. That weekend Earnhardt Jr. also won the Xfinity race on Friday night, giving him the first double win in Bristol history.

8. Tony Stewart's Helmet Throw

This moment didn't feature an on-track winner, but it remains one of the most memorable in Night Race lore. In the 2012 Night Race, Matt Kenseth and Tony Stewart were racing hard for the lead in the middle of the race, but made contact coming off turn 4. Both cars spun down the frontstretch. While Kenseth was able to continue, Stewart's car had to be picked up by the wrecker. A furious Stewart waited on

pit road until Kenseth's Ford approached then delivered a perfect strike - sending his helmet bouncing off Kenseth's hood - then motioning to the cheering crowd as he climbed into the ambulance.

9. Carl Edwards and Kyle Busch battle during, after

In the 2008 Night Race Carl Edwards bumped Kyle Busch out of the way with 30 laps remaining and then raced away from his rival to claim the checkered flag. After the race Busch retaliated and bumped Edwards in the cool down lap... then Edwards moved back down the track and returned the post-race bump to Busch, turning his car around. NASCAR then called Busch to the pits while



Edwards performed his winning backflip at the startfinish line.

10. The Water Bottle Toss

Another confrontation to come out of the wild and crazy 1995 Night Race, won by Terry Labonte, was a very hottempered Rusty Wallace going after Earnhardt in the pit area on pit road. Both had started near the back and discussed working together. But on the race's fourth lap Earnhardt spun Wallace out exiting turn four. An unhappy Wallace

hunted down the Intimidator on pit road and threw his bottle of water, which landed on Earnhardt's face. The pair of rivals then had an intense discussion before going their separate ways. •
