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

nce upon a time, Kyle Busch was the most hated driver at Bristol Motor Speedway. Busch was serenaded by boos before, during and after races.

Instead of sulking, Busch turned those negative reactions into motivational rocket fuel.

With a mix of aggression and intelligence, Busch earned a total of nine Cup wins at BMS.

To make matters worse, Busch often antagonized his haters in snarky postrace interviews. Now consider the case of Denny Hamlin.

For various reasons, Hamlin has emerged as the resident bad boy of Bristol.

From the start to the finish BMS events, fans boo and jeer Hamlin.

And just like Busch, Hamlin has channeled that negativity into motivation. Hamlin has earned two straight Cup wins at Bristol, including the 2023 Night Race. The vitriol increased when Hamlin teased his detractors in his Victory Lane interview.

"Hey, I beat your favorite driver - all of them," Hamlin

Earlier this spring at BMS,

Hamlin relied on tire management and patience to claim the Food City 500.

The 2024 season for Hamlin has been anything but easy for Hamlin - on and off track.

But the most hated men in Bristol will still be a factor in Saturday's Night Race.

Hamlin developed his race craft competing on short tracks across the Mid Atlantic region. He simply knows when and where to push his car.

As for his detractors, Hamlin has come to accept

"At some point I've got to realize that I'm probably not going to win the most popular driver award. I've come to the conclusion of that and I understand it," Hamlin said last year at

"They think they bother me. But clearly, it's having an opposite effect. I welcome any fan to want to come to the dark side. All five of my fans are still out there chanting my name."

Third Straight

Bristol win could add much to Hamlin's legacy

f Denny Hamlin wins Saturday's Bass Pro Shops Night Race, he would etch his name alongside some legendary racers at Bristol Motor Speedway.

The Chesterfield Virginia native enters Saturday sporting a two-race BMS win streak. While a win assures Hamlin would advance to the next round of the NASCAR playoffs in the quest for his first series championship, a third straight victory on the high-banked 0.533-mile oval would add his name to two incredibly short lists.

Only four drivers have captured three or more consecutive victories in Bristol history since the track opened in July 1961, track records show.

Fred Lorenzen was the first, wheeling the Holman-Moody Ford to two and then three straight wins in 1963-64. Cale Yarborough did Lorenzen one better, winning all four races here during the 1976 and 1977 seasons.

Darrell Waltrip began a remarkable seven-consecutive race winning streak with wins in 1981-82. Nobody else was able to join that club until Kurt Busch broke through, winning

three straight in 2003 and 2004, over the 127 NASCAR Cup Series races contested here.

Bristol master Waltrip's remarkable seven in a row spanned from March 1981 through May of 1984 – prompting vendors to sell "Anybody but Waltrip" T-shirts. A streak that appears all but unapproachable in today's ultra-competitive climate.

Yarborough's success like Waltrip's, came while driving cars fielded by Junior Johnson.

It would also be Hamlin's fifth Bristol victory, tying him for seventh all-time among BMS winner with Hall of Famers Jeff Gordon and David Pearson. Hamlin's four victories currently has him tied for ninth all-time with Bobby Allison and Carl Edwards.

Lest anyone think Hamlin is a heavy favorite to claim that third straight Bristol trophy, consider the list of drivers who won two straight here but fell short of claiming three in a row over the past 64 seasons. That list includes the aforementioned Pearson, Bobby Allison, Richard Petty, Dale Earnhardt, Alan Kulwicki, Rusty Wallace, Kyle Busch (twice) and Brad Keselowski.

Playoff PUSH

Between Kyle Busch's victory in the 2018 Food City 500 and Hamlin's current success, Bristol fans witnessed ten consecutive Cup races without a repeating winner.

Also, should Hamlin sweep both 2024 races, it would be just the second time this century and the first time in two decades, flashing back to young Kurt Busch's Bristol prowess while driving for car owner Iack Roush.

A Bristol single season sweep has been accomplished 14 times by nine drivers – seven of whom are enshrined in the NASCAR Hall of Fame – and the Busch brothers who are almost certainly bound for that

Drivers who swept two wins in one season at BMS include Fred Lorenzen (1964), Bobby Allison (1972), Cale Yarborough (1974, 1976, 1977), Richard Petty (1975), Darrell Waltrip (1981,1982,1983), Dale Earnhardt (1985, 1987), Rusty Wallace (2000), Kurt Busch (2003) and Kyle Busch (2009).

Consider also that Hamlin's most recent success came during wildly different circumstances in the last two

Last fall saw a number of early lead changes but once Hamlin took control of the race, he led the final 135 laps which were run caution free. He won the Bass Pro Shops Night Race by 2.4 seconds over Kyle

This spring's Food City 500 saw a track record 54 lead changes in a wild race marked by unexpected tire wear, frequent green flag pit stops to change tires, and 98 laps run under caution. Hamlin's decisive pass for the lead of teammate Martin Truex, Jr.,

occurred with just 17 laps remaining.

Oddsmakers will doubtless list Hamlin as one of the prerace favorites. However, history and the precarious nature of Bristol racing - where calamity seemingly awaits in every corner - suggest his task will be far from easy.

yler Reddick entered the 2024 NASCAR Playoffs as the regular season champion.

How much does 23XI Racing driver want to follow up that achievement with the overall title?

"It is the whole reason I'm doing this, so pretty bad," Reddick said.

The next step on that championship hunt comes in Saturday's Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway.

In nine career Cup starts on the concrete version of BMS, Reddick has recorded an average finish of 20.3. But he has a good feeling about this week

"I think Bristol could be a really good race for us," Reddick said.

The last run for Reddick at BMS turned into an endurance test.

"We got in a wreck on lap 40 when we stayed out and had a bunch of damage," Reddick said. "I was kind of stuck behind cars running a pace, multiple laps down at the tail of the field, but I was able to drive my way up to the No. 15

spot."

Considering the chaos all around him, Reddick came

away pleased with his salvage job in the No. 45 Toyota.

"I was kind of doing it every stage with a destroyed race car," Reddick said. "At the very end, I got kind of hung up behind cars with completely corded tires. Next next thing I knew, Martin (Truex) and Denny (Hamlin) were right there with me.

"End even with a wrecked race car, I felt like we were pretty good. We weren't racing for much of anything that Bristol race, but I was really pleased with how fast our car was with how much damage we had."

The 2024 regular season offered a much smoother ride for Reddick. He recorded 11 top five finishes, including wins at Talladega and Michigan.

"That's just a testament to all the hard work that everyone at 23XI puts into this," Reddick said. "We're on Year 4 of their goals, right?

"It's just been really fun the last two years to be a part of this process of building up to where we want to be."

Reddick finished a careerbest sixth in the 2023 Cup standings.

"I think with the way this

Bowman hopes to steer the attention back to his on-track performance this weekend at Bristol Motor Speedway.

"I don't think you can change much now," Bowman said. "I've been working super hard and trying to do everything that I possibly can. I just have to go do my thing and go from there."

Bowman began his Playoff

push in style with a fifthplace finish at Atlanta Motor Speedway. He hopes to build off that effort in the Bristol Night Race.

In 14 Cup starts at Bristol Motor Speedway, the 31-yearold Bowman has crafted an average finish of 19.6 with three top-fives.

The big question entering Saturday is whether drivers will have to contend with a repeat of the tire management battle of attrition that unfolded in the Food City 500 in March.

"We just need to buy in and execute at a high level over 10

weeks."

That top-five effort at Alanta came after a month that Bowman described as "miserable."

"We had the crash at Indy. We crashed at Daytona. And obviously we had some issues at Darlington," Bowman said. "It was frustrating, but we've had some fast race cars sprinkled in there."

Don't expect this calm native of Tucson, Arizona, to get caught looking ahead.

"Honestly, I'm so week-toweek that I don't even know what the next tracks are after

the first round," Bowman said. "We're super focused on the Round of 16. And obviously with Atlanta, Watkins Glen and Bristol, there's so many things that could happen.

"It's pretty easy to have someone else ruin your day at two of those three. Yeah, we just need to go execute at a high level, and go week-toweek from there."



has one final chance to conquer Cup Series at Bristol

When you ask Martin Truex Jr. how his relationship is going with Bristol Motor Speedway, you get an odd look, a smile and finally a chuckle.

Admittedly, the relationship needs a little work.

In 34 Cup Series starts at Bristol, Truex has managed to salvage just three top five finishes, and only five top 10s.

When you look at his performance at other tracks it is well above average. For some reason he and Bristol just don't get along.

"It's never been my best track," Truex Jr. said. "I don't go there beaming with confidence, but over the years I've had a few opportunities."

The driver of the No. 19 Bass Pro Shops machine will head to the .533-mile all-concrete, high-banked bullring for the final time as a full-time Cup competitor on Sept. 19 for the crown jewel Bass Pro Shops Night Race.

Truex would like nothing more than to grab a Playoff victory in front of his sponsor Bass Pro Shops at their title race in pursuit of his second NASCAR Cup championship at the ultra-challenging Bristol Motor Speedway, and finally conquer The World's Fastest Half-Mile.

When you say it like that it sounds like the ending to a fairy tale.

Truex has seen BMS's unique Victory Lane high atop the Ballad Health Care Center, just not from inside a Cup car.

He won a Xfinity Series race at Bristol in 2004 and also claimed a Craftsman Truck Series victory on the Bristol dirt in 2021. And he nearly grabbed that first Cup victory this past March, on St. Patrick's Day, but Denny Hamlin got in the way

at the end.

"We were so close there in the spring, I feel like, and I could taste it," Truex said. "...Yeah, I guess this tire management thing fit into my wheelhouse.

"Man, the difference was just coming out of the pits so far behind Denny. I had to use mine up more on the last run. The last four, five laps of the race, were cord. (But) I gave it a hell of an effort."

Should Truex get that Cup

win this week he would join an elite list of drivers who have conquered Bristol in all three of NASCAR's top touring circuits. Those drivers include Mark Martin, Carl Edwards, Kyle Busch, Joey Logano, Brad Keselowski and Kevin Harvick.

"Man, it would be so awesome," Truex said. "It would be incredible. Yeah, we've not had much luck there, but we've been getting better at it, I feel like, and in the spring, we ran really strong. It's going


to be a whole new tire situation and everything. Hopefully, we can go there and have a chance It would be a cool race to win."

Win or not, after this season Truex plans to set sail in a large body of water somewhere on the planet and throw out his fishing rod. That's his ultimate happy place.

"Enjoy life, race a little for fun—I'm not sure exactly yet," Truex said. "I'm still trying to figure things out."

Wagaring Isn't just

for stick and ball sports - NASCAR bets also popular

A race fan wanting to place a wager on their favorite driver to win Bristol's Bass Pro Shops Night Race, the NASCAR Cup championship or any combination of "prop" bets today has nearly limitless gambling choices.

Online sports wagering is legal in Tennessee, so fans can log on with their phone and spontaneously bet from their seat through any of a dozen or so licensed vendors.

Or they could spend hours analyzing trends and probabilities before plunking down hard-earned cash.

Can't go to the race? Tennessee and Virginia residents have the same opportunity with mobile or online betting or by venturing out to the Bristol Casino's sportsbook.

NASCAR.com and most of the nation's top sportsbooks provide updated odds and background information on every driver in the field.

Sharp-eyed readers may already know that Mike Szvetitz of FrontPageBets provides weekly analysis and odds before each NASCAR Cup Series race on the Herald Courier's website.

For the recent playoff opener at Atlanta Motor Speedway two weeks ago, his picks were

Ryan Blaney - who lost there in February in the closest three-wide photo finish in NASCAR history – and Penske Racing teammate Joey Logano. Both were at plus 1,000 or 10-1 odds of winning.

Brad Keselowski, Denny Hamlin and Kyle Busch were next in line of favorites, followed by Kyle Larson, Chase Elliott, William Byron at 14-1 and previous Atlanta winner Daniel Suarez at 18-1.

Regular season champion Tyler Reddick was his "long shot" pick based on a best finish of fifth in 2023 in his eight career starts there. Szvetitz picks obviously faired well, with Logano taking the win over Suarez and locking himself into the second round of the playoffs. Blaney finished third, while Larson and Hamlin saw their days ruined by crashes.

NASCAR.com listed odds prior to qualifying, with Blaney, Logano and Busch all at 10-1.

Clearly, the oddsmakers did their homework.

Such predictions typically look first at a driver's performance at a given track. Ryan Blaney, for example had 12 starts at Atlanta with a

driver rating of 99.1. He'd run 81% of his laps there in the top 15 with an average finish of 10.6

In addition to past performances, oddsmakers also consider how a driver and team are performing leading up to the race.

That's a bit tougher this year because the regular season ended with a flurry of surprise winners as Austin Dillon, Harrison Burton and Chase Briscoe each emerged from far left field to land in victory lane in three of the final four regular season races.

Nine different drivers visited

victory lane in the regular season's final nine races.

Michigan winner Tyler Reddick claimed the regular season driver's title over Kyle Larson by a single point.

Let's consider the performance of six drivers – Kyle Larson and Chase Elliott from Chevrolet, Blaney and Logano from Ford along with Reddick and Hamlin from Toyota.

Over the final six races of the regular season, Larson had the best average starting position at 8.1, narrowly better than Hamlin's 8.3 and Elliott's 9.0. Blaney had a starting average

of 9.1, Reddick was at 9.3 and Logano

That didn't hold true at Atlanta with Hamlin having issues and starting 38th, Reddick 23rd and Elliott 16th. However Logano, Blaney and Larson all qualified in the top 10.

followed by Larson (13.3), Elliott and Hamlin at 15.0 each, Blaney (16.5) and Logano (21.6). All except Reddick had at least one finish outside the top 30, with Hamlin suffering two and Logano three finishes in the 30s.

At the playoff opener, Logano, Blaney,

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at BMS in July revealed "heavy" tire falloff

oncerns about tire falloff remain following a day-long Goodyear tire test Tuesday at Bristol Motor Speedway, according to a group of NASCAR Cup Series drivers who spent the day speeding around the highbanked half-mile concrete oval.

The tire manufacturer and NASCAR returned to a Bristol track that refused to take rubber during the spring Food City 500, prompting unusually high tire wear, a wild day of drivers attempting to conserve their tires in a memorable contest won by Denny Hamlin, who secured his fourth Bristol victory.

The test was held in advance of the September Bass Pro Shops Night Race, the first cutoff race in the NASCAR Cup Series playoffs.

Tuesday began with cars, equipped with a tire compound like what ran here in the spring, spreading out and running laps in all three grooves. But virtually no rubber adhered to the racing surface and teams reported visible cording of the tires after a modest number of laps, Cup Series driver Chase Briscoe said following the test.

"It's hard to say how much you can really take away from the test but, for us, we still had some tire issues - cording

and things like that. There's no rubber really laid down so I'd say it was an improvement from what we had last time," said the driver of the No. 14 Ford for Stewart-Haas Racing.

"It's weird. I don't quite understand how the spring race played out like it did. It would be different if it was the first Next-Gen race we ever had here but we ran other races and never had that problem. Even today we were replicating it to a certain extent," he said.

By late afternoon, black tire rubber was plainly visible in the bottom groove of turns 1-2 and turns 3-4. Other segments of the track - the middle and up near the wall -- showed little to no trace of rubber, which typically adheres to the track and fosters an opportunity for two and threewide racing.

Briscoe said tire wear "got better" throughout the day but drivers "committed" the bottom groove during the afternoon portion of the test after speedway officials applied a coat of PJ1 traction compound.

"Early, we could run 25 or 30 laps. There at the end I ran 40 laps and, at the end of 40, the tires were shot. They didn't have much left," Briscoe said. "If there were more cars here then who knows what it

would look like. It creates a unique challenge and it puts a lot in the driver's hands and the team's hands to figure that out."

Briscoe said his final 40lap run was flat out versus a race environment where he could have paced himself and preserved the tires.

"We felt like there was still some heavy wear, so they put the PJ1 down here about halfway through the day. I vote for the PJ1 and I'm a fan of it as long as it stays on the narrow side," said Chris Buescher, driver of the No. 17 Ford for Roush-Fenway-Keselowski Racing. "PJ1 seems to wear out a little bit more throughout a race; throughout a weekend. My hope is, if it wears down, it would start moving the groove around,"

Buescher said Tuesday's 95-degree temperatures were beneficial.

"We needed a hotter day on track to be able to compare data. It was cold last time and there were theories around that being some of the issues. We needed some more heat in the racetrack," Buescher said. "We were hoping we would come in and a little bit of temperature would be able to make it that 40 to 60-lap window and control your own destiny a little if you could save some. Ultimately there was still pretty heavy wear."

Austin Dillon, driver of the No. 3 Chevrolet for Richard Childress Racing, was also a

fan of the PJ1. "Goodyear realized the PJ1 was very helpful for the tire and made it live a lot longer. The resin that they ran last time doesn't seem to let the rubber lay down and it just dusts up," Dillon said. "Laying rubber down, you can run longer runs. The tire felt fine and we had good lap times. The tire did fall off quite a bit. Over 30 laps it was almost a second; pretty good falloff."

John Hunter Nemechek, driver of the No. 42 Toyota for Legacy Motor Club, said he enjoyed the tire conservation required in the spring race.

"I know I am probably one of the few, but I really enjoyed

t's hard to believe that more than two decades ago three simple words were said in Bristol Motor Speedway's Victory Lane that would catch fire and ignite a proud mantra.

It's. Bristol. Baby.

The buzz from that statement continues to connect with NASCAR Nation. Many of them flock to BMS's North Lot at Entrance No. 1 and take social media selfies with the large historic monument dedicated to that

singular moment that proudly welcomes visitors to the venue.

It was a wild scene in that victory lane.

As Dale Earnhardt Jr. emerged from his red No. 8 Chevy one hot night in August 2004 he was asked by television reporter Bill Weber why winning the crown jewel Night Race was so special.

The third-generation driver didn't hesitate. He quickly uttered the memorable phrase like it was on a script.

"It's Bristol, baby!" a jubilant

Earnhardt said.

Since then that phrase has taken on a life of its own. Today it remains as meaningful and powerful as it was that night. It has become synonymous with Bristol Motor Speedway and the amazing experience it offers to fans.

"I'm just really, really, really, glad that I won tonight, because this is like the Daytona 500," Earnhardt Jr. said at the time. "This is like winning at Charlotte, or like winning in

Atlanta. These are the tracks, the historic tracks that have been around for years that are at the top of my list (of places) I want to win."

As BMS celebrates the 20th anniversary of that momentous occasion, the legend himself is returning to suit up and compete on the storied high banks once again.

Earnhardt Jr. is entered in the Food City 300 NASCAR Xfinity Series Race on Friday night, Sept. 20.

It is the second consecutive year that he will race in that event, which is also the Xfinity Series regular season finale.

Last year Earnhardt Jr. had fans on the edges of their seats as he was in contention for most of the night.

He led 47 laps and appeared to be heading to Victory Lane. A faulty wire ultimately ended his night and he finished 30th overall.

"Somehow the shift control caught on fire," Earnhardt Jr. told the media following the race. "Saw some smoke in the car. I smelt it, and I said, 'I hope that's not me,' but that last lap, I saw a big fire ball down in the tunnel, in the car. I felt it, obviously.

"My uniform was burning up. I was like, I can't keep going. I've got to stop. Usually when you stop, the fires get bigger. So I pulled over by the pit stall, and some of those guys are pretty alert, and they helped me out.

"I hate it. We were going to finish in the top 10, maybe top-five. Had a shot at winning it, if the car was going to run good at the end. But trying not to mess nobody's night up at the same time, it was hard. But I had fun."

After the dejected Earnhardt pulled off his racing helmet last year, he was able to immediately put on his team owner hat from JR Motorsports and with a big smile go celebrate in Bristol's victory lane anyway.

One of his team drivers, Justin Allgaier, ultimately won the race in the No. 7 JRM Chevy.

"I was happy about our car winning," Earnhardt continued during his post-race interview in the BMS Media Center. "I couldn't wait to see Justin. Couldn't wait to tell him how proud and happy I was."

Earnhardt Jr. will once again be at the controls of his popular blue and yellow No. 88 Hellmann's Mayonnaise Chevy Camaro as he puts his focus on grabbing another Bristol Motor Speedway victory.

'wild' Night Race at BMS

hase Elliott knows all about consistency and the pressure of NASCAR Cup Series Playoff racing.

Since his first full-time season in 2016, NASCAR's most popular driver has only finished outside the top 10 in points once.

Does Elliott have a formula for the Playoffs?

"I can't really say that I have changed my process. But I have certainly had a lot of fun in the last 10 weeks just because there is something on the line," Elliott said in a recent press conference.

"I enjoy that aspect of being a competitor and showing up each week because it could be a make-or-break weekend for you. I think that is fun, you know."

Elliott figures to have more fun in Saturday's Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway.

NASCAR fans are also an expecting different degree of Bristol fun, especially considering the bizarre nature of the 2024 Food City 500 where tire management became the storyline.

"The Bristol thing in the spring was just such a weird deal, and it sounds like they really want to recreate that from everything that I have heard," Elliott said. "I don't know that we knew why that happened in the spring.

"But if they successfully fabricate craziness, then yeah, it's going to be wild. I don't know that you are really going to know that until you get there, and you are kind of in the moment.

For now, Elliott is taking a wait and see approach.

"You just have to get in there and try to figure it out. Because some of those things are going to be hard to plan for."

For Elliott, the appeal of the postseason comes down to big

stages and high drama.

"You go to a race and your back is against the wall and you have to perform," Elliott said. "You either show up and get it done. Of if you didn't, you get your report card that day and you didn't do a good enough job.

"I like that aspect of that there are intense moments over the course of that stuff. Am I a fan of all the aspects of it. Maybe not necessarily, but I do enjoy the fun meter of being a competitor in the last 10 weeks."

Elliott has recorded three top-five finishes in points. He failed to make the Playoffs in 2023 but emerged with his only championship in 2020.

"I think our odds are good," Elliott said. "I don't really take a look at a particular round being a problem any more than any other. I think that if we can just get the things that we need to do, going right, I think we can be good all the way through it.

"it's just about being there on a weekly basis. You do that, and you will get your chances."

the spring race. It made the driver have to save tires instead of going all out every lap and try to predict where the falloff was going to be and there were crew chiefs making strategy calls, like whether to pit under green," Nemechek said.

The pit areas of Nemechek and Buescher featured long tables filled with engineers poring over data on laptop computers.

"Some people say it's chaos I guess, but overall, I thought it was a great race," Nemechek said. "From a spectator standpoint I went back and watched the race (on TV). I thought it was great."

Briscoe said he was glad not to have to make decisions about tires but expects the product this fall will be just fine.

"I think you'll see the same Bristol race where the bottom is really, really good and by the end it will be top and bottom," Briscoe said.

Planty of Work

left as Suarez reaches playoffs for second time

aniel Suarez earned his second berth into the NASCAR Cup Series playoffs in 2024 after winning the second race of the season at Atlanta Motor Speedway

Now comes the hard part for the pilot of the No. 99 Trackhouse Racing Camaro.

"I feel like as a driver I'm much better than two years ago," said Suarez in a recent interview. "The team is better than two years ago. We're smarter and we're faster. But we still have a lot of work to

The next work project for Suarez and his team comes in Saturday's Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway.

According to Saurez, his team has already solved some

major clues.

"We found some stuff in the last couple months and definitely got in the right direction," Suarez said. "With that being said, we are not winning races yet.

"We can compete consistently in the top 10. But we know that to make it to a championship that's not going to be enough. We have to continue to push and continue to learn."

Compared to mega teams like Hendrick Motorsports and Joe Gibbs Racing, the Trackhouse operation is an underdog. Trackhouse driver Ross Chastain failed to make the 2024 Playoffs.

"In 2022, Trackhouse was actually one of the best teams. This year hasn't been the same," Suarez said. "We've been working extremely hard, but the results have been

slower than we thought they were going to be.

"I wouldn't consider myself one of the favorites for the championship but that's not going to change my mentality of who am I as a racecar driver and the potential of the 99 team and Trackhouse."

The mentality of all drivers and crew chiefs changes as the stakes increase and the spotlight intensifies during the Playoffs.

Suarez knows the game.

"Drivers are very greedy, and I believe we've been given pretty much everything we got at least for the last couple months," Suarez said. "Maybe there is a little bit more risk that we can take at times in the playoffs.

"But every round is going to be different, every race is going to be different and every driver is going to be in a different position so it's pretty important to be aware of the whole situation and just do your thing."

Does Suarez feel any more pressure to make a Playoff run compared to the 2022 season?

"The pressure is the same," Suarez said. I feel fortunate that I have great people around me that have helped me a lot with the mental aspect. I love pressure."

their season average finish. Larson and Hamlin, not so much.

During the regular season, Hamlin led laps in 19 of 25 races. Larson led in 18 races and Reddick 15 races, while Blaney, Elliott and Logano each led in 13 regular season races.

Larson and Hamlin find themselves near the bottom of the standings after miserable days in Atlanta.

What about Bristol?

In short track races, Hamlin and Larson have each scored 200 points with Hamlin taking two victories – including the Food City 500 – while Larson is winless on short tracks this year. Chase Elliott, Joey Logano and Bubba Wallace round out the top five of drivers who've scored the most short track points thus far.

Hamlin is riding a two-race win streak at Bristol, the first driver to win back-to-back here since Kyle Busch in 2017-2018. Hamlin's four victories – including three in the Bass Pro Shops Night Race -- rank him second among active drivers at Bristol, trailing only Kyle Busch.

Speaking of Busch, while the twotime series champion failed to make the playoffs, his Richard Childress Racing Chevrolet has figured in the outcome of several races. He finished a close second to Chase Briscoe at Darlington and second to Harrison Burton at Daytona. Busch ran with the leaders much of the day at Atlanta before finishing seventh.

Busch returns to Bristol where he is the all-time winner among NASCAR's top three series. He has amassed nine total Cup wins plus nine in the Xfinity Series and five in the Craftsman Truck Series. That is a remarkable 10% of his total 231 NASCAR victories.

Larson scored one Cup victory here in the 2021 Night Race, with some help from teammate Chase Elliott who hounded leader Kevin Harvick after those two made contact on the race track, allowing Larson to slip past.

Larson posted top-five finishes in four of the last five Bristol races and scored an Xfinity Series victory.

Logano is already locked into the next round, but his three Bristol victories – including two in the Night Race – define him as a favorite. He is also one of just

six drivers to win Bristol in all three of NASCAR's top divisions.

In the five BMS races contested during the Gen 7 car era, Toyota driver Christopher Bell has one victory, one second- and one third-place showing.

In search of a darkhorse? Consider Chris Buescher who captured the 2022 Bass Pro Shops Night Race and led 169 laps. He finished fourth in this race last year but has struggled to win in 2024.

All of that means absolutely nothing when the field takes the green flag on Sept. 21 and spends the next three hours slicing and dicing around the world's fastest half-mile oval.

And if the last month of the season has taught race fans nothing else, its that anyone can win on a given day – with the right mix of circumstances and a dose of racing luck.





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
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EFFECUTanxious for the BM5 challenge

The NASCAR Cup Series Playoffs began in nightmarish fashion for Chase Briscoe at Atlanta Motor Speedway.

Just before the conclusion of the race's first stage, Briscoe's car slammed into the rear end of the Kyle Larson machine.

Both drivers escaped serious injury, but Briscoe's hopes for a championship run dimmed.

Just one week before Atlanta, Briscoe earned his Playoff bid by winning the regular season finale at Darlington Raceway.

"That's NASCAR," Briscoe said. "You can be on top one week and you can be at the very bottom of the mountain the next week."

Briscoe hopes to resume his

climb in Saturday's Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway.

"I think we're gonna be really good," Briscoe said.
"We've started in the top three or four there the last three times we went to Bristol. We've obviously had really good speed and we tested there about a month-and-a-half ago."

What did Briscoe learn from that Goodyear tire test at Bristol on July 16?

"I think you will see the same typical Bristol racing where we start at the bottom early and then by the end you can run the top and bottom," Briscoe said.

Of course, the tire issues in the Food City 500 this spring

stumped drivers and crew chiefs.

"I don't quite understand how that race played out like it did," Briscoe said. "It would be different if that was the first Next Gen race we ever had here, but we've ran other races and never had that problem. Now it's like a thing to figure out. It's definitely interesting, but also a lot of fun."

Briscoe was among a group of six drivers during the July test at BMS that was held in muggy weather.

"Early in the day we could run 25 to 30 laps and there at the end I ran 40 laps," Briscoe said. "If there were more cars there, we would've had more rubber. It does create a unique challenge and it puts a lot in the driver's hands."

In four Cup starts on the concrete version

of BMS since 2021, Briscoe has recorded an average finish of 16.8.

"The slick and wore out tracks, where we're slipping and sliding around is typically when we're our strongest, so I feel like we can win any of the

two," Briscoe said.

"I'm excited for the challenge, truthfully. I think we all knew when the Playoffs started that (Atlanta) was gonna be the one race where you could really dig yourself a big hole."

Byron

expects the unexpected in Night Race

he 2024 Food City 500 at Bristol Motor Speedway was a treat for fans and a puzzle for teams.

Due to tire attrition, the drama featured 54 lead changes and ever-changing storylines.

Drivers, crew chiefs and engineers have spent the past few weeks trying to figure out a plan for Saturday's Night Race at BMS.

What sort of show does Hendrick Motorsports driver William Byron and his veteran crew chief Rudy Fugle anticipate?

"I don't know what to expect yet," said Byron in a recent press conference. "I think we have some things to dissect and learn.

"It really depends on how the resin interacts with the track and how the tires wear, or if they rubber in the track and it's like how it's been in the past. I'm not sure really. We'll see."

Since every Hendrick driver qualified for the Playoffs, Byron will not be lacking for race notes at Bristol and beyond.

"Obviously, everyone is out for themselves. It's how the format is and the way the racing is, but you have to share notes and learn from each other to have the best possible result," Byron said.

"I feel like we do that really well. Nothing really changes in the Playoffs, but it's nice to have everyone pulling the rope in the same direction."

Byron finished a careerbest third in the NASCAR standings in 2023.

Evers since opening the 2024 season with a victory in the Daytona 500, Byron has been considered a strong bet for the championship.

"We've been waiting for this for a while," Byron said. "As soon as you win early in the season, your goals shift to what can we do to get bonus points and what can we do to get ready for the fall.

"That's really what has been it's about. Now we get to put that to the test and take it one race at a time."

The latest Playoff hunt for Byron began with a ninth-place effort at Atlanta Motor Speedway. That positioned him in

the No. 4 position in the standings.

Byron has won a total of 13 Cup events during his sevenyear run with the Hendrick empire. The next step is a title.

"I think we have prepared a lot for the Playoffs and I feel

Bistol Tuned Wild

again at unpredictable Food City 500

t was a Sunday to remember at Bristol Motor Speedway.

Before the start of the NASCAR Cup Series race, motorsports and baseball fans were buzzing over a comment from FOX Sports studio host Chris Myers that BMS could "soon host a Major League Baseball game."

Then, things really got wild. In one of the strangest events in track history, the Food City 500 morphed into a small-town Late Model or Street Stock showcase.

Due to severe tire wear, drivers and crews had to scrap their original race strategy and revert to Plan B or even Plan C.

Less than halfway through the event, drivers were reducing speed to prevent blowouts.

How crazy was this melodrama?

There were a record 54 lead changes, and only five cars finished on the lead lap. That was the fewest since a 2004 event at Dover.

It was no surprise that

veteran drivers with short track backgrounds adapted to the challenge.

Race winner Denny Hamlin spent a couple decades competing on abrasive surfaces at Virginia tracks such as Langley, South Boston and Martinsville.

While other drivers panicked on Sunday, Hamlin simply adapted and thrived.

"I know that I had a huge role in the result," Hamlin said.

For the most part, drivers seemed to appreciate the rare chance to determine the outcome instead of relying on crew chiefs, engineers and pit crews.

Sunday's show drew universal praise among print and electronic media outlets across the nation.

There was one major exception to the rave reviews.

Consider the comments of NASCAR's resident golden boy Kyle Larson.

"I've never run a race like that, and I hope I never have to run one like that again," Larson said. "It's honestly probably a black eye to Goodyear just with all that rubber that couldn't get laid down and just wearing through tires and all that."

Remember it was Larson that complained the most about the Dirt Race experiment at Bristol among other events in recent seasons.

Of course, the key question for Bristol Motor Speedway is whether or not the show resonated with spectators.

With all the pit stops and conservation tactics, this four-hour marathon was not an easy follow even for veteran observers.

The attendance, which was not helped by overcast skies, was slightly above the turnouts for the spring races from past years.

One of the key elements of the fan experience at BMS has long been camping.

The decision by NASCAR officials to do away with Friday qualifying sessions in favor of one day shows appears to have greatly reduced the number of BMS campers for the spring

Bristol to host Cup races on April (3, Sept. (3



As expected, the date for the 2025 Food City 500 at Bristol Motor Speedway has been shifted to April 13 with the Night Race set for Sept. 13.

Following weeks of speculation, NASCAR released the full 2025 schedule Thursday afternoon.

For the first in track history, both race weekends at BMS will feature

all three of NASCAR's marquee series, as the NASCAR Xfinity Series and NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series will join the Cup Series for three days (April) and three nights (September).

The Food City 500 has been moved four weeks later than last year's event, which was held on St. Patrick's Day weekend in March.

Along with the Cup race, the April race weekend will include the SciAps 300 NASCAR Xfinity Series race on Saturday, April 12, and the WEATHER GUARD Truck Race on Friday night, April 11.

"We had so much fun with our retro-themed Food City 500 that we are going to do it again and bring in some different elements this time around to add to the experience," said Jerry Caldwell, president and general manager of Bristol Motor Speedway.

The Night Race will once again serve as the cut-off race in Round 16 of the NASCAR Cup Series Playoffs and will move to one week earlier on the calendar from Sept. 11-13.

For the second time in track

history, all three NASCAR races during the weekend will be Playoff events, as the UNOH 200 presented by Ohio Logistics will be race two in the opening round of the NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series Playoffs and the NASCAR Xfinity Series will open its Playoffs at Bristol with the Food City 300.

vle Larson won 10 races en route to the 2021 NASCAR Cup Series championship.

Fans and pundits have been predicting another title from Larson ever since.

Flash forward to 2024. Behind four wins and 10 stage victories, Larson entered the Playoffs as the top seed.

Does Larson feel another any pressure to claim another trophy and to perform well in Saturday's Night Race at Bristol Motor Speedway?

"I think I've always had a good approach to the playoffs - just taking it week-by-week and trying not to put myself in too big of a hole," said Larson in a recent press conference. "But in 2022, I crashed at the ROVAL towards the tail end of the race and missed out in advancing to the next round in the driver's points.

"We still made it in the owner's points, and then went on to the Championship Four

that year with the owners. I don't really think it's changed much, even after winning the championship."

According to Larson, the strength of his Hendrick Motorsports team is all about speed.

"We're really fast at every race track, including road courses and superspeedways," Larson said. "I know it might not seem like it at times, but I think our execution is great.

"We've also overcome adversity so I think we're wellrounded as a team. We've gone to the final four the last three years, so that gives us a lot of confidence as well."

Of course, the unpredictability of the Next Gen machine is a concern for all drivers and crew chiefs.

"It's NASCAR and Next Gen racing, so it's always crazy," Larson said. "There's always a couple of heavy guys that get knocked out somewhat early that could very well be

deserving champions.

"It's hard to predict who's going to be in the Championship Four. But yeah, there's definitely some good teams. But like I said, a lot of stuff can happen."

Bad stuff happened to Larson in the Sept. 8 Playoff opener at Atlanta Motor Speedway.

In the first stage of the highspeed event, Larson's car shot up the track after the back end became loose.

After slamming the wall with the right front, Larson's car was hit by Chase Briscoe.

"That was a huge hit," Larson said. "I'm not really sure, what caused it. I was actually sort of like tight loaded in the corner. That was pretty far out the corner and stepped out. I don't know. It just all happened really fast.

Entering Atlanta, Larson was 39 points above the cutline.

"I don't love seeing Atlanta in the playoffs at all. And even

Watkins Glen for that matter. I like those tracks, but they're just sketchy places," Larson said. "But if they're going to be in the playoffs, I would rather them be in the first round than the second or third round.

"Having the bonus points and playoff points that we've earned throughout the regular season is nice. It doesn't guarantee anything. You still have to not run into any trouble, especially in back-toback weeks."



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
