Protecting deciduous trees and shrubs against winter damage

the wrap on in the fall and leave on until the last frost in spring. Newly planted trees should be wrapped for at least two winters and the thin-barked species for 5 winters or more.

Deciduous trees and shrubs can suffer shoot dieback and bud death during the winter. Flower buds are more susceptible than vegetative buds. Plants that are growing vigorously in the fall are more at risk for dieback, so avoid late summer pruning, fertilizing and overwatering.

Root injury is another concern during winter. Roots don't become dormant as quickly as stems and branches and they are less hardy. Roots of most trees and shrubs are killed with prolonged cold temperatures. They

survive our winters because soil temperatures are normally much higher than air temperatures because the soil cools down more slowly than the air. Several factors influence soil temperatures. Moist soil holds more heat than dry soil. Snow cover and mulch provide insulation and keep soil temperatures higher. With newly planted trees, cracks in the planting hole can allow cold air to penetrate and kill newly formed roots. To encourage fall root growth and reduce injury, mulch new trees and shrubs with six to eight inches of straw or wood chips. Water them well before freeze-up to reduce frost penetration.

Frost heaving or repeated freeze/thaw cycles in fall and spring cause the soil to expand and contract which can damage roots and push new plantings out of the ground. Again, a four- to six-inch layer of mulch will help keep soil temperatures constant.

Rodents and rabbits can injure young trees by nibbling at the bark and girdling the tree. Trees can be protected by placing a cylinder of hardware cloth around

it. The cylinder should extend two to three inches below the ground for mice and 18 to 24 inches high for rabbits. There are protective sprays that can be put on branches that will prevent animals such as deer from eating them. Sprays would most likely have to be reapplied during the winter to maintain protection. Check with a garden center for preferred sprays and follow manufacturer's instructions for use.

Following the above tips for wintering trees and shrubs will help prevent winter loss, especially if it's a long and harsh one.
