Reading material for the shack

October is quickly slipping away and hunting season will be here soon. Be sure and take some reading materials for everyone in the family to the shack and stand. Here are some recommendations for kids.

The best hunters know a lot about the animal they are hunting. Spend your time waiting for deer by learning something about them in “All About Deer” by Jim Arnosky or “Never Grab a Deer by the Ear” by Colleen Stanley Bare. I think it would be wonderful to get near enough to a deer to be able to grab it by its ear.

We have a number of books for kids on hunting, with titles covering basic facts and safety information including “Hunting: Have fun, Be smart” by Jack Weaver, “Deer Hunting” by Thomas K. Adamson and for the bow hunter, “Bows, Does and Bucks: An introduction

to archery deer hunting” by Michael A. Dilozenzo.

Or maybe you want to learn more about the other large animals you might see in the woods including “Black Bear: North America’s Bear” by Stephen R. Swinburne, “Wolves” by Heather C. Hudak or for the brave, “Moose Attack” by Lisa Owings. And it would never hurt to brush up on your survival skills with “Survival Skills: How to

survive in the wild” by Simon Ellar.

Of course the kids in your life may prefer to just read; in that case, try “Skink No Surrender” by Carl Hiaasen. This versatile author of both adult and children’s fiction is hilarious any way you read him. His newest title for upper elementary students (and above) contains a missing girl, a hungry gator and only one way out.

Animal stories are always popular and war stories tend to do well, combine the two and you have the makings of a bestseller. “A Horse Called Hero” by Sam Angus is set in England on the brink of World War II with two children who befriend an orphaned foal only to have him stolen.

New readers might want to take “Mr. Pants: It’s Go Time!” by Scott McCormick or “Stars of Hockey” by Matt

Doeden with them to the shack.

If you have children that aren’t kindergarten age yet, please stop by the library and pick up a booklet “Reading Ready” which provides space for you to record the books read to each child and a place for them to do some drawing about the books they’ve heard read.

Reading to your children from the time they are born is one of the very best things you can do to help your child be successful in school and life. The library will allow each child to pick out a free book every time they listen to 250 titles.
