Time to rethink your landscape

Anticipation and reality face gardeners every year. Each year gardening magazines and books present lovely images of well-designed, but overly ambitious, yards that we attempt to emulate.

Seed catalogs encourage us to try more varieties than we have time, energy, or space to deal with. And then the garden centers tempt us in the spring after our long, cold winters with a bounty of beautiful plants that we just have to try. Many times

our eyes are bigger than our stomachs. The reality of gardening can overwhelm us and yet we still want attractive yards and landscapes.

The principles of simplification, repetition, and good choices can produce attractive results that allow us to enjoy our yards with less impact. Less input is good for the environment as well as for us. Native species require less fertilizer, less irrigation, and are adapted to our seasons and soils. Less disease, fewer insect problems, and adaptation to our local pollinators are other benefits.

Simplify by choosing plants with similar needs for soil, light and moisture. Repeating swaths of the same plants can make a very big impression too. Good cultural practices will produce the best results. Begin with a weed and grass-free area; add a few inches of compost, working it into the top 6 or 8 inches (unless you are in a tree root zone where

you must not do this), and water well. Plant seedlings or the largest size plants you can afford, spacing appropriately to the plant's size and mature size. Water and mulch well with last year's leaves 3-4 inches deep — natural and inexpensive.

In a sunny yard a large planting of rudbeckias, echinaceas, and liatris will provide lots of bloom. These plants are all perennials that will also seed themselves back and create a solid mass of plants with even more bloom year after year. Grouping varieties will aid pollinators and create more impact. People will stop to stare.

Another good choice for sunny areas requires fewer plants initially; these plants have the potential to become quite large and can be used as privacy borders or background plants. A garden of grasses spaced well and mulched can produce a dramatic effect that is attractive all four seasons. After green-up in the spring they will sway in the breezes all summer, turn to lovely, varied hues in the fall with have interesting seeds.

Shapes and heights can vary; some are spikey and stiff; blue oat grass can be used in specimen groupings. Others are vasselike and delicate like Northwind Switchgrass. Still others are tall with plumes like Karl Foerster. Wind a soaker hose among the plants and water until well established

or when it gets quite dry. Cut back in the spring, remove the debris and mulch well. Elegant and simple, but very effective in a large area.

A planting of native ferns in a shaded area is stunning and looks good all summer — unless dogs or children run through the area. Follow similar planting, growing, and watering techniques and give them a spring haircut.

Less negative impact on the environment takes place with native plants and it means less work for you, once established. More visual impact occurs with large swaths of the same plant or with those of compatible natures such as those that grow in prairies.

Think about yourself and the cost factors that go into mowing, trimming, fertilizing lawns, and then think about how Mother Nature creates such lovely landscapes with her choices.
