## Some great fall reading material

I know that many of you are preparing the shacks, deer stands and blinds for hunting season. Don't forget to stop by the library and pick up books and movies to take with you. The library has fiction aplenty – new and old but also books about deer, rifles, bows, and plenty of magazines on subjects ranging far and wide. Let us help you wile away the time this fall with great materials to read, watch and listen.

I'm sure many of you know plenty about preparing the deer once you've shot it, but for those new to the woods be sure and borrow our books like "The Hunter's Guide to Butchering, Smoking and Curing Wild Game and Fish" by Philip Hasheider for the information needed to properly prepare your game.

Four biographies that may be good titles to take out with you this fall include "The

Noble Hustle" by Colson Whitehead which details the harrowing seven-day gauntlet of the World Series of Poker in Las Vegas by someone who had never played in a casino tournament before with just six weeks to train.

"Nicholson" by Marc Eliot is a comprehensive tribute to a film legend whose career has spanned five decades. Or maybe "27" by Howard Sounes is more your type of book with six shorter biographies of iconic music stars who all died at

the age of 27. The book is aptly subtitled "a history of the 27 Club through the lives of Brian Jones, Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin, Jim Morrison, Kurt Cobain and Amy Whitehouse."

Finally it seems appropriate to include "The Women of Duck Commander" by Kay, Korie, Missy, Jessica and Lisa Robertson with Beth Clark. Learn surprising insights from the women behind the beards about what makes this family work.

If you prefer to do some learning while you wait for deer then maybe these three books will appeal to you.

"Woodworking from the Scrap Pile" by Derek Jones which includes 20 projects to make using offcuts. Or try "The Backyard Homestead Book of Building Projects" by Spike Carlsen which has 76 useful things you can build for workspaces, storage, garden, animals

and other outdoor places.

I don't want to leave out those who prefer to read fiction so here are a few new titles to check out. "Across the Cheyenne River" by John Nesbitt takes place in Wyoming on a ranch and involves murder and sweethearts and a place to call one's own.

Phillip Margolin is a bestselling author of crime fiction who spent over two decades writing his first historical fiction about justice in the American West. "Worthy Brown's Daughter" is set in Oregon just a year after statehood and the fates of desperate men willing to risk everything for justice and what they believe in.

Another historical novel, "The Adoption of Charlie Keenan" by Peggy Ann Vigoren is set in Ranier during prohibition and told by Cora Keenan after she is disowned by her father and abandoned by her husband.
