We are hosting a party on Friday, Jan. 10, from 6 to 8 p.m., to allow people to get a first look at the exhibit and get a schedule of upcoming events. Since we are focusing on engineering, science,

math and technology at the library for the next eight weeks I thought I'd share some new science fiction. These tales set in the future all include adventure but also speculation. What might be? I spend a lot of time imagining the might be and I hope you do too, whether or not it is fantastical or mundane. It is only by imagining what is not yet, that we can get there. Ben Bova is one of the senior statesmen of science fiction. His newest title *Farside* is about trying to build telescopes on the farside of the moon, the side

that never faces the sun. Telescopes on earth have discovered a planet circling a sun only 10 light years away and these telescopes will be able to examine take pictures and gather spectra not possible from earth. But someone appears to be sabotaging the effort. *The Goliath Stone* by Larry Niven and Matthew Joseph Harrington is all about nanotechnology but not just for medical uses and now they seem to be alive, functioning on their own and on a collision course with earth. *Day One* by Nate

Kenyon reveals an enemy capable of occupying anything with a computer chip that sets out to destroy earth. Can hacker journalist John Hawke figure out what is going on and find a way back to his pregnant wife and young son? They may be the key to saving humanity. Like many authors, David S. Goyer and Michael Cassutt imagine a world where we've made contact with other species. And usually the results are pretty. It has been 20 years since man first made contact with extraterrestrial life and now most of the world

is under the dominion of the Reivers. Can a small band of humans figure out a way to save humanity? *The One-Eyed Man* by L.E. Modesitt Jr. features a freelance consultant sent to decide the fate of humanity on a colony world called Stittara.
