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after four to five years. The open pit will be 500-650 meters deep, though the underground portion could stretch up to one kilometer into the ground, he said.

“While we have a 14 year mine life today, the

resources open at depth, meaning we have not found a bottom, despite the million meters of drilling we’ve done over the past 15 years,” Stanfield said. “That means that underground could continue for a very long time.”

The mine’s production output would be 23,000 tons per day, which Stanfield

said isn’t huge, but would also be one of the larger gold mines in Canada.

The project’s environmental impact hasn’t been taken lightly, Stanfield said, and the company has recorded four years of water, air, plant, and wildlife quality data to measure the potential impact.

“That extensive assess-

ment is still underway, and will continue throughout operations,” Stanfield said. “You’ll be comparing your operating permits against your expected conditions during operation. This mine will have some of the most stringent environmental standards applied for any new mine anywhere in the world.”

REPORT

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The report is available in two versions: a detailed report of 238 pages written for a technical audience, and a summary report of 22 pages highlighting key findings and written for a general audience. Both versions of the report are available at the foundation’s website: lowwf.com/sobr-download or at the IJC website: ijc.org.

The report contains information compiled by the editors and the editorial

committee from information in the original 2009 report and from published and unpublished research that has become available since 2009. Many of the information gaps identified in 2009 have been filled in the past five years and this new science is the focus of the second edition.

In addition to updating all information, the report has an expanded scope with more information about the entire basin. The 2009 report focused on Lake of the Woods and the Rainy River and their direct tributaries. Coverage now includes areas

upstream of the Rainy River, with inclusion of a great deal of data for Rainy Lake, Namanagan Reservoir and other lakes in Voyageurs National Park, as well as information in the headwaters region.

The report is published by the foundation. Preparation of the report was a collaborative effort, led by the editors and editorial advisory committee, and its completion would not have been possible without the contributions of numerous researchers, resource managers and agencies in the basin.

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customer requested more time in the facility, he said, and because of their relationship, they made it work.

“We typically want to end our season when the ambient temperature gets beyond 68 degrees, our system is really not designed for operating, especially on those lower temperatures,” Nevanen said.

The customer was pleased with the experience, Nevanen said, and was able to enjoy the nice summer weather in his downtime.

“He went from a coldbox

one day to a pontoon the next day,” Nevanen said. “He said, ‘I don’t think that’s ever happened before.’”

Jaguar Land Rover management staff will tour the facility next month, Nevanen said, and will outline changes they’d like to help make to the facility to better fit their needs. They will also seek exclusive use of the facility for part of the next testing season, he said, so the KEDA will have to accommodate that request.

“They keep raising the bar, and I think that’s good for us and good for our customers,” Nevanen said.

The facility has received

an “amazing” amount of requests from new customers for next testing season, Nevanen said, which is impressive, considering it is not advertised much.

“We haven’t spent a lot of advertising dollars because we don’t need to,” Nevanen said. “We are already at capacity for next year.”

Pavleck said he hasn’t given up on the idea of expanding the cold weather testing facility. A past plan for a facility, which included a track, ultimately had its funding vetoed by former Gov. Jesse Ventura.

“We’ve got the right people in place to make this hap-

pen if we collectively want to make an effort and take that opportunity,” Pavleck said. “It’s always risky, but we’ve yet to fail with cold weather testing.”

An advantage now that the facility didn’t have in the past is the relationships built with customers, Pavleck said. The timing may be right to take advantage of the conditions and look to expand the facility, he said.

“You only get a certain window of sympathy when you’ve had an economic downturn,” Pavleck said. “We may want to really push that this coming legislative session.”
