DISTRICT COURT

The following people have been recently convicted of felony or aggravated misdemeanor crimes in Koochiching County District Court.

Ryan M. Councillor, 20, International Falls, was sentenced March 9 for first-degree felony criminal damage to property.

He was given a stay of adjudication of sentence. He was placed on five years supervised probation and ordered to enroll in substance abuse court. He may not consume alcohol or controlled substances and must submit to random tests and searches.

Cleve L. Costly Jr., 56, International Falls, was sentenced March 9 for gross misdemeanor driving after cancellation — posing a risk to public safety.

He was given a stay of adjudication and placed on two years probation to the court. He was ordered to pay \$300 fees and served 32 hours with the Sentence

to Serve program.

Jeremy J. Schaak, 27, International Falls, was sentenced March 18 to gross misdemeanor driving while under the influence of alcohol.

He was ordered to one year jail and \$3,200 fine and fees. All but 20 days jail and \$2,200 was stayed on court conditions and he was placed on one year probation to the court. He may not consume alcohol or controlled substances or enter bars or liquor stores. He must submit to random tests and searches and must follow the recommendations of an evaluation.

Christopher A. Seegert, 33, was sentenced March 12 for gross misdemeanor third-degree driving while impaired.

He was sentenced to one year jail and placed on three years supervised probation. The jail time was stayed on court conditions and he was ordered to serve 80 hours with the Sentence to Serve program. He must

follow the recommendations of an assessment and enroll in substance abuse court. He may not use alcohol or controlled substances and may not enter bars, liquor stores, or social gatherings where alcohol is served or consumed. He must submit to random tests and searches.

Thomas L. Sims, 23, International Falls, was sentenced March 9 for gross misdemeanor driving under the influence of alcohol.

He was ordered to serve one year jail and pay \$3,125 fine and fees. All but 30 days of the jail time and \$1,125 was stayed on court conditions and he was placed on three years supervised probation. He was ordered to follow the recommendations of an evaluation and serve 30 hours with the Sentence to Serve program. He may not use alcohol or controlled substances and may not enter bars, liquor stores, or social

gatherings where alcohol is served or consumed. He must submit to random tests and searches.

Joshua M. Smith, 29, International Falls, was sentenced March 18 for gross misdemeanor check forgery — offer/possess with the intent to defraud.

He was ordered to serve one year jail and pay \$3,475 fine and fees. The jail time and all but \$525 was stayed on court conditions and he was placed on three years supervised probation. He was ordered to serve 16 hours with the Sentence to Serve program.

Tanner B. Helms, 20, International Falls, was sentenced March 9 for gross misdemeanor possess pistol without a permit.

He was ordered to serve one year jail and pay \$3,175 fine and fees. The jail time and all but \$275 was stayed on court conditions. He was placed on three years supervised probation and ordered to complete a program.
