History at the library

‘Soudan Mine – Then & Now,’ set for April 7

A look at the Soudan Mine is coming to the International Falls Public Library. Presented by the Arrowhead Library System, “Soudan Mine – Then & Now,” is a free program scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. April 7 at the library.

The Soudan Mine began as an iron ore mine, but today it is a Minnesota State Park, bat hibernacula, world-renowned particle physics lab, and national historic landmark. Join James Pointer, interpretive supervisor at Soudan Underground Mine State Park; and Al Lipke, outreach education coordinator at Soudan Underground Physics Lab, as they take audiences from the opening of the mine in 1882 to the current search

for exotic neutrino particles and dark matter.

Pointer will share the story of the mining operations and the role the state has played in fostering other research. The mine provides a unique habitat for bats, so Pointer will also discuss current happenings with their bat population.

An unexpected benefit of maintaining the underground mine is the cutting edge research facility it now houses, said a news release. Lipke will explain why the mine is the perfect location for the physics lab that takes advantage of the depth of overhead rock, low background radiation levels, and constant environmental conditions. Lipke will talk about how scientists from around the world travel 2,341 feet below the surface

at the Soudan Underground Laboratory to answer questions about the universe we live in.

After learning about the mine, the lab and the resident bats, the experience can be completed this summer with a trip ½ mile underground on a mine or lab tour at the Soudan Underground Mine State Park.

This program, sponsored by Arrowhead Library System, was funded in part or in whole with money from Minnesota’s Arts and Cultural Heritage Fund. DISTRICT COURT

The following people have been recently convicted of felony or aggravated misdemeanor crimes in Koochiching County District Court. The information is provided to The Journal by court staff.

Kyle J. Bergman, 19, International Falls, was sentenced March 23 for felony first-degree criminal damage to property.

He was sentenced to one year and one month at the Minnesota Correctional Facility, St. Cloud, and ordered to pay \$75 court fees. The jail time was stayed on court conditions and he was placed on five years supervised probation. He was ordered to enroll in a program and complete with aftercare.

Lawrence A. Eberhart, 58, International Falls, was sentenced March 23 for felony fifth-degree possession of drugs.

He was given a stay of imposition of sentence and placed on five years supervised probation. He was ordered to pay \$425 fine and fees and may not use alcohol or controlled substances. He must follow the recommendations of an evaluation and submit to random searches. He was ordered to serve 40 hours with the Sentence to Serve

program.

Bobbi Jo Mckay, 17, Stillwater, was sentenced March 23 for felony fourth-degree possession of drugs with the intent to sell.

She was given a stay of adjudication and placed on five years supervised probation. She was ordered to pay \$500 fees and must submit to random searches. She must give a DNA sample to the state and may not use or posses firearms or dangerous weapons. She must follow the recommendations of an evaluation and may have no contact with a co-defendant. She was ordered to serve 80 hours with the Sentence to Serve program.

Richard C. Van Drunen, 60, Littlefork, was sentenced March 23 for felony issuance of dishonored checks.

He was given a stay of adjudication of sentence and placed on five years probation to the court. He was ordered to pay \$200 court fees and \$2,199.25 restitution.

Douglas A. George, 33, Ray, was sentenced March 23 for gross misdemeanor obstructing the legal process.

He was sentenced to one year jail and \$3,175 fine and fees. The jail time and

all but \$225 was stayed on court conditions and he was placed on three years supervised probation. He was ordered to follow the recommendations of an evaluation and may not use alcohol or controlled substances. He may not enter bars or liquor stores or attend social gatherings where liquor is being served or consumed. He must submit to random tests and searches and serve 40 hours with the Sentence to Serve program.

Robert E. Riley, 22, International Falls, was sentenced March 23 to gross misdemeanor contributing to the delinquency of a child or status as a petty offender and gross misdemeanor domestic abuse — violate order for protection.

He was ordered to serve seven months jail on each charge, with the sentences to run concurrently.

April M. Askey, 38, International Falls, was sentenced March 23 for gross misdemeanor driving while under the influence of alcohol.

She was sentenced to one year jail and \$3,200 fine and fees. All but 90 days and \$1,400 was stayed on court conditions and

she was placed on three years probation. She was given credit for two days served and may serve the remainder of the jail time under home detention with electronic monitoring. She was ordered to follow the recommendations of an evaluation and may not use alcohol or controlled substances. She may not enter bars or liquor stores

and must submit to random tests. She was ordered to serve 120 hours with the Sentence to Serve program.

Travis K. Wegner, 25, Littlefork, was sentenced March 23 for gross misdemeanor second-degree driving while impaired.

He was sentenced to one year jail and \$3,200 fine and fees. All but 30 days jail and \$1,400 was stayed

on court conditions and he was placed on three years supervised probation. He may serve the jail time under work release and must serve 120 hours with the Sentence to Serve program. He was ordered to follow the recommendations of an evaluation and may not enter bars or liquor stores. He must submit to random searches and tests.
